### 1. BACKGROUND

### **Forest Sports Zone**

The £5.2m heritage restoration of Nottingham's inner-city 77 acre Forest Recreation Ground is well underway and will transform the site to a key green space for the area and the City, as well as to its former Victorian glory.

The current Forest Multi-Activity Pitch (FMAP), however, is not addressed in the heritage project and requires refurbishment and a new management approach to better fit with current and future demand.

#### The current FMAP facilities:





Key drivers for the project are:

- · significant demand from local residents;
- · current poor quality sports provision;
- lack of dedicated facility management;
- important health issues /concerns affecting the local population;
- accessibility to good quality sporting facilities and the way current agencies employ these restricts community usage for potential / current users.

#### **Vision**

To create a top class sports provision on the Forest site with state of the art sporting facilities which are inclusive and accessible to all members of the community, particularly aimed to engage disadvantaged groups.

To use sport as a vehicle for engaging young people who would otherwise drift into crime, anti-social behaviour and gang related activity.

#### **Sports Zone Proposals (see site map at Appendix 1) include:**

- construction of a new full size 3G pitch;
- upgrade of the existing FMAP;
- · upgrade of existing grass pitches;
- · cricket training nets and artificial wickets;
- new multi-use games area;
- new pavilion to service sports teams and accommodate community engagement programmes (planning permission secured in October 2012).
- a management and maintenance plan to ensure the facilities are well managed and kept in good use;
- an ambitious outreach programme to target young people who do not normally access facilities and who would otherwise drift into crime;
- creating a range of new apprenticeships and accreditations;
- supplementary mentoring and lifestyle coaching.

#### **Wider Benefits**

Nottingham partners have a strong track record of using sport to engage excluded and disadvantaged groups, particularly teenagers and young adults who are already, or are at risk of, becoming involved in crime and antisocial behaviour. Starting with sport as common ground, workers are able to build trust with young people, taking them on to achieve qualifications, build their confidence and aspirations, and develop their social and

relationship skills. Using sport in this diverse area is also expected to help break down barriers between different ethnic and cultural groups and enable groups from different areas of the City to work and learn alongside each other.

The Pavilion will enable youth and sports groups to offer targeted support, relationship and sexual health advice, education opportunities and routes to employment to young people usually considered 'hard to reach'. This is much more than just a sport facility, it is an opportunity to build bridges, develop aspirations and reduce tensions in a deprived area.

#### **Partnership Approach**

#### Partner aims:

- to operate and maintain a vibrant, high quality mixed use sports facility including but not limited to football, hockey and cricket with new changing/clubhouse facilities;
- to engage and maintain community participation based not on short term grants but on a sustainable/realistic business model;
- to engage disadvantaged young people who would otherwise drift into gangs, crime and antisocial behaviour, using sports as a vehicle to:
  - o deter the use of drugs, getting into crime and joining in gang culture/activity;
  - o offer a variety of educational and lifestyle training opportunities such as:
    - education in lifestyle coaching e.g. sexual health;
    - re-engagement with the education system;
    - apprenticeships opportunities.

# **Future Management**

Nottingham Forest Football in the Community are at the preferred status stage for the management and operation of the site once the proposed improvements have been undertaken.

The interested party is a trust with charitable status who have opportunities for attracting funding towards developing the site.

Concession terms are to be agreed and will be for a minimum of 20 years (final length of contract dependent on funding bid terms).

#### **Arboretum Café**

The former public house building at the Arboretum was demolished following a fire in December 2006 leaving only two buttressed brick wing walls standing, together with the boundary walls, steel fences, gates and a coach house. The site is now secured with a timber fence between the two wing walls to the south, palisade fencing to the east and west and the stone boundary walls, steel fence and coach house to the north.



#### **Proposals**

Proposals for a new café and community building on the site are progressing with initial design concepts received and consultation undertaken at on-site events during 2012. The

building will include a café, toilets, education room and restoration of the existing historic "stable-block" building.

Outline costs for a building were received in January 2013 and total approximately £381,000, including contingencies and fees. However, these estimates do not include external landscaping.

The current funding proposals are as follows – including a proposal to allocate further Section 106 funding to the project to enable the external landscaping works to take place at the same time as the build:

# Name and brief description of proposal / policy / service being assessed

Forest Sports Zone – Concession for the future operation and management of the site.

The future operation & management of The Forest Sports Zone is being offered up as a saving and as such is being outsourced as a concession through the Nottingham City Council procurement process. As such all tenders received will be subject to the statutory procedures in place for such a process including the transference of staff. The Council's aim is to no longer subsidise the operation going forwards. The subject of this EIA is to assess the proposed transfer of Forest Sports Zone to a third party organisation ensuring that there is continued community access.

Nottingham City Council considers that for a third party organisation to take on the operation provides the best opportunity. A third party offers the possibility of being able to attract capital investment to help further develop the site, which in the first instance will extend current provision and in the longer term offer a better quality facility to undertake community programmes and projects which will have beneficial impact s on local residents.

The Council believes there will be interest in operating this facility and therefore is undertaking a proper procurement process.

### Information used to analyse the effects on equality

The service has looked at how it currently provide opportunities for community engagement on the site and has a number of service level agreements with sports clubs and schools to use the site which impact on local residents. In transferring the operation & management of the site there will agreements that ensure there are future agreements to ensure local clubs, schools & groups continue to se the site.

Consultation has taken place with local interested groups, stakeholders, schools and local residents to determine their interest in improving the site. 95% of respondents thought the Sports Zone needed to be improved and there were 177 suggestions for improvements.

The preferred operator will be delivering agreed projects and programme including coached activities, training schemes and community based provision at the site directed at local residents especially those who are at risk of crime & anti-social behaviour, low educational achievement or have high risk of ill-health.
