REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR, NET

LETTER FROM MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC

- 1. A member of the public has written to the Committee complaining that NET has not been included as part of the National Bus Concessionary Travel Scheme for pass holders who reside outside of the Nottingham area.
- 2. The National Bus Concessionary Travel Scheme was introduced on 1st April 2008 and entitles eligible users to free off-peak travel on local buses anywhere in England. Other modes such as ferries or trams are be outside the new national concession, but local authorities retain the ability to offer concessions that go beyond the statutory minimum as an additional benefit. Where such wider concessions are introduced they are funded from local authorities' own resources. Generally, any additional concessions a local authority chooses to offer will only be available to eligible residents of that area.
- 3. Transport for London, Midland Metro, Manchester Metrolink and Tyne and Wear metro only offer free or discounted tram travel to residents of the area. At the present time Sheffield Supertram is the only UK tram system offering free travel to residents from outside the area as part of the National Bus Concessionary Travel Scheme.
- 4. The views of the Committee on this matter are sought.
