

REPORT OF CORPORATE DIRECTOR OF NEIGHBOURHOOD SERVICES

NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING IN THE WEST AREA

1 SUMMARY

This report details the progress made to date with the neighbourhood policing pilot in the West Area.

2 RECOMMENDATIONS

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT:

- Members of the West Area Committee note the report.
- Members determine the type of information they would like to see being presented to this committee and how often
- Members consider the role the committee plays in monitoring the initiative and ensuring its accountability to local people in the West area

3 BACKGROUND

- 3.1 Neighbourhood Policing (being launched now under the title of “Safer Neighbourhoods” by Nottinghamshire Police) is a national initiative that will be rolled out throughout the country by March 2008.
- 3.2 The initiative is based on the notion of local people identifying the problems relating to crime and anti-social behaviour that are most important to them, giving local people direct influence over determining local priorities.
- 3.3 Neighbourhood Teams have been created for the Safer Neighbourhoods initiative for each beat area comprising a Beat Manager, Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs), supported by Neighbourhood Wardens.
- 3.4 The initiative recognises the need for joint working between communities, the police and other agencies to resolve problems.
- 3.5 There is also recognition that in order to improve trust and confidence within the community there needs to be effective engagement, communication and feedback.
- 3.6 Performance management of the initiative relies on a mixture of “local perception” measures (e.g. increased % of people who feel that they can influence decisions in their area, increased % of people who feel satisfied with policing in their area,) and measures relating to reduction of certain categories of crime and anti-social behaviour (dwelling burglary, criminal damage to dwellings). See appendix 1 for fuller

details. The Home Office is in the process of producing further guidance on this matter.

- 3.7 In Nottingham we have two pilots. Both pilots were initially introduced in June of this year. This report deals with the one in Broxtowe Local Area Command (the area covered by the West Area Committee and a bit of Wollaton).

4 PROGRESS WITH THE INITIATIVE

- 4.1 New PCSOs were appointed by the Police and were inducted into the force and into their new role. In total 14 PCSOs were appointed for the Aspley/Bilborough LAC.
- 4.2 Through a collaborative arrangement between the Area Focus team, the Police, and staff from Community Services Division a session on Neighbourhood Policing was staged for local agencies.
- 4.3 Being aware of the need to make the initiative as representative as possible of the views of local people Community Services staff working with the Police drew up a community engagement strategy.
- 4.4 A series of community engagement activities have been staged by 3 Area Community Officers at which the neighbourhood policing initiative has been publicised (two community events, three community safety events, 8 public meetings, stalls at events and at Bilborough market, questionnaires, door-to-door work etc). Broxtowe Partnership Trust has undertaken some initiatives on the Broxtowe estate. Police involved in the initiative have attended many of these activities.
- 4.5 Regular meetings have been staged between Broxtowe Partnership Trust, Community Services staff, and the Police Inspector and Sergeant involved in the initiative to check progress and to deal with problems with community engagement.
- 4.6 A session on community engagement for all the Police involved in the initiative was staged at which the Police determined their role in the community engagement strategy.
- 4.7 Policing and Housing teams are in place and operating at a local area level through Beat Managers (10), PCSOs (14), Patch Managers, and Neighbourhood Wardens.
- 4.8 Local Action Groups (LAGs) have been established for each of the beat areas. These are mechanisms for bringing together local people to look at the issues raised by local people through the community engagement process. These started to come into being from July, have started to meet on a regular basis and are now managing the projects across all the beat areas.
- 4.9 It is recognised that a considerable amount of administrative support is required to service the LAGs (and other aspects of engagement) at present and that this has put additional pressure on existing staff to do this. There is also a concern about the long term sustainability of this level of input given that some of posts involved are only funded until March 31st 2006.
- 4.10 At each LAG people consider the issues they would like to see addressed and prioritise those issues. "Problem profiles" are produced detailing the issues, solutions,

and actions to be undertaken. Action undertaken on each problem is reported to the following meeting of the LAG and new priorities are determined.

- 4.11 Multi-agency tasking meetings have been instigated to deal with the immediate issues and to manage the issues arising out of the area.
- 4.12 The Community Safety Working Group (CSWG) is in the process of being restructured to form a group that will ensure, among other things, the delivery of the aims and objectives of the safer neighbourhood's initiative. The CSWG will meet on a monthly basis and will report to the West Area Committee.
- 4.13 Approximately 9000 newsletters and questionnaires have recently been delivered to houses in the Bilborough, Denewood, Beechdale, Strelley and Balloonwoods beats. More details about the results from these will be available at the meeting, but a quick analysis of 100 of the forms which have been returned for the Bilborough beat show that this has been an effective way of reaching people who are unable to attend meetings e.g. because they are full time carers or are unable to get out. The majority of people surveyed are concerned about groups of young people on the streets. The newsletter gives a map of each beat area together with the beat managers contact details and has resulted in some additional calls to the police.

5 FEEDBACK ABOUT THE INITIATIVE

- 5.1 Appendix 3 gives an idea of the range of problems that are being raised through the initiative. Some common themes being prioritised through the LAGs include anti-social behaviour, drugs, concerns about youth hanging around, mini-mopeds.
- 5.2 Action being taken varies from area to area depending on the problems being prioritised. Appendix 4 gives examples of problem profiles and details of action in response to the problems being raised.
- 5.3 A considerable number of local people have been involved in the initiative in one way or another as can be seen from appendix 5.
- 5.4 An evaluation of Nottingham's two neighbourhood policing pilots has been undertaken by the Home Office and the report was largely positive regarding the delivery of Safer Neighbourhoods initiative in the West Area.
- 5.5 Initial feedback to date from local people who have been involved in the LAGs indicates that there has been an improvement in relations with the police, that there is a satisfaction with the increased visibility of the police in the area, that problems raised within the LAGs area being dealt with, and that the police are giving feedback about what is being done. There is positive feedback from people who are involved in the initiative at this level. It is intended to get fuller feedback from those who are involved and also from those who do not attend LAG meetings.

6 SUGGESTED ROLE FOR THE WEST AREA COMMITTEE

- 6.1 The West Area Committee has a vital role to play in the initiative in three respects. Firstly, members of the West Area Committee input information to the police about local issues through their normal contacts and/or meetings they attend and this

becomes part of the “intelligence gathering” information that is fed into the Local Action Group processes.

6.2 Secondly, the Area Committee’s Community Safety Working Group has an important role in terms of scrutiny and ensuring service delivery, which is then fed into the Area Committee. The CSWG would also pick up broad themes across the area and raise the issues with the Area Committee.

6.3 Finally, the Area Committee itself has an important function to play in receiving reports on progress on the initiative and looking broadly at how the initiative is developing, It is seen as vital that the information fed into the Area Committee is then used to influence the targeting of mainstream resources to the area.

7 EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES IMPLICATIONS

7.1 The initiative is aimed at all residents living in a locality. Special efforts are made through a broad community engagement process to reach those whose voices and views would not normally be heard.

8 STRATEGIC AIMS

8.1 The initiative is **customer-focussed**, aiding **regeneration**, helping to make **Nottingham a safer city**, and **encourages local involvement**.

9 BEST VALUE

9.1 Work undertaken on the safer neighbourhood initiative is in line with the principles of best value.

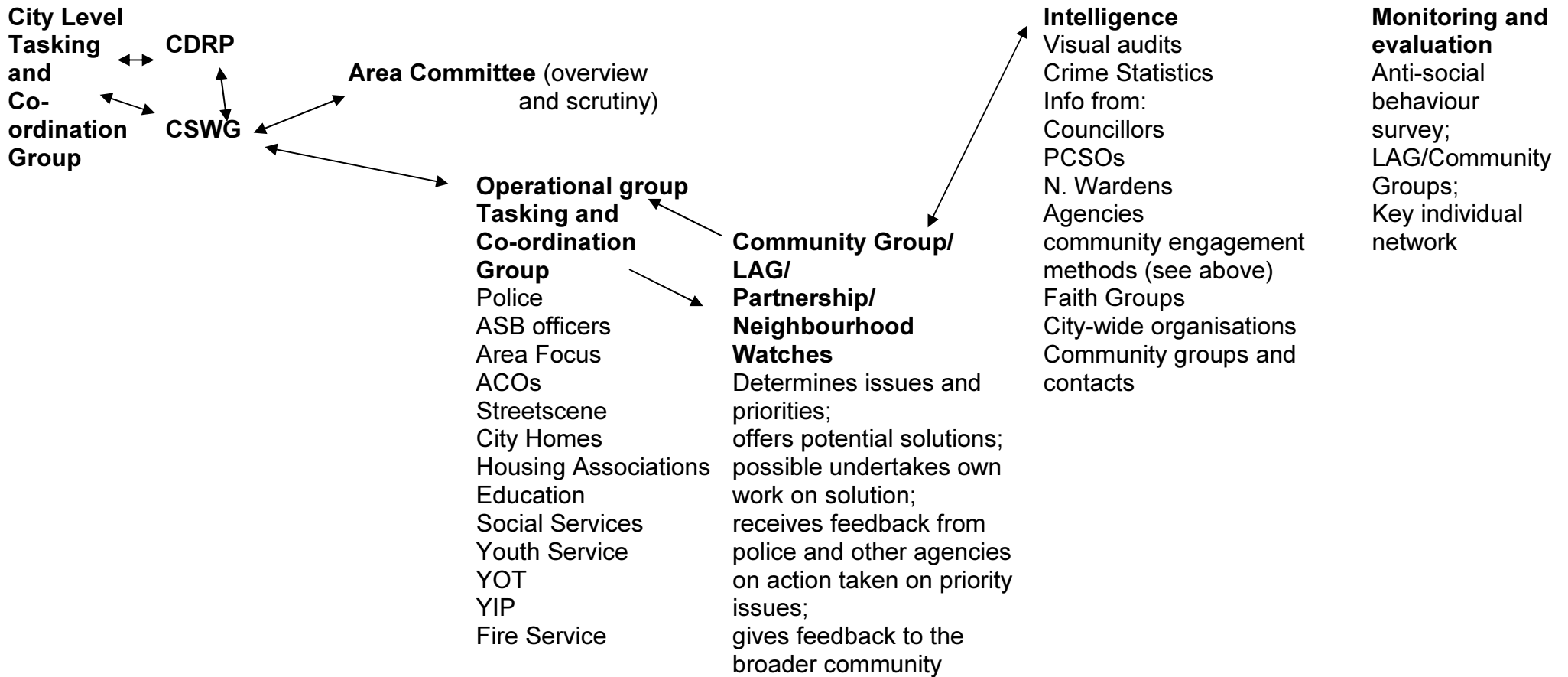
Proposed Performance indicators

Performance indicators are based on the Safer Stronger Communities Fund mandatory indicators to avoid additional data collection. Preliminary agreement has been reached to utilise the Nottingham City Council ASB survey to provide data for the perception indicators. Comparison will be made with areas that do not have neighbourhood policing teams to help identify if any changes are city wide or due to the initiative.

- 1, Increase the percentage of residents surveyed who are
 - i. Involved in local decision making
 - ii. Feel that they can influence decisions in their area
- 2, Reduce the perception of local drug use or drug dealing
- 3, Increase % of public satisfied with policing in their area
- 4, Increase % of residents feel fairly or very safe after dark
- 5 Reduce BCS comparator crime
 - i. % reduction in dwelling burglary
 - ii. % reduction in vehicle crime
- 6, % reduction in measurable anti social behaviours –
 - i. Criminal damage to a dwelling
 - ii. Abandoned vehicles

Appendix 2

Note on Operational Group/ Tasking and Co-ordination Group. There are a variety of agencies/departments who could potentially be involved. In each pilot area there is a "core" group of agencies/departments involved in Tasking Group/Operation Group meetings with other less central agencies/departments having named individuals who can be contacted to deal with an issue if and as it becomes relevant to the community.

Issues arising from Neighbourhood Policing Meetings and Consultation events in Bilborough Ward – September 2005

During the summer, there have been 8 public meetings in Bilborough and one in Leen Valley for people to come and talk about the issues in their areas. These have been jointly arranged by the Area Community Officers and the Police. Stands have also been at various community events eg the three community safety events, Amber Fun Day, Strelley Parklife, Beechdale Information Day, Bilborough Market with questionnaires asking people what the main problems are in their area and where they are happening. Over 400 people have either come to the meetings or completed survey forms.

Some of the categories below overlap eg some of them could fit into anti social behaviour, but this would not have given enough detail to be constructive and so they have been kept separate in the summary below.
