Aspley DV project –update

Main aim was to create a whole community approach to reducing repeat domestic violence

Overview of some of the progress to date:

- •Actions planned to inform, educate or service different segments of the community
- •Campaigns have been targeted through a variety of media and through a range of community settings and was a feature of weeks of action
- •Great (Good Relationships are Equal And Trusting) project delivery is underway in local primary schools as is healthy relationships programme local secondary schools; a sixth form media campaign has been agreed;
- •Training provided to school staff to co-deliver programmes for sustainability and to understand DV and how to respond to disclosure
- •Training provided to all local professionals to create a common understanding of DV and how to respond to disclosure
- •Freedom Programme© delivered for women from Aspley community, plans to introduce community change makers from programme cohorts
- •New referral routes for DV have been established and greater family support provided
- •Specific improvement activity in key services, such as Family Community Teams and police, regarding the quality of intervention in DV cases
- •Healthy relationships programme delivered to all local young offenders and specific 'choices' for young people with greater signifiers of abusive behaviour has been commissioned, reviewing expansion to other cohorts



Aspley DV project – update

Areas requiring further development

- Introduction of community change makers
- Evaluating community attitude shifts
- •Improving perpetrator interventions
- •Introducing prevention programme for young males who are not on statutory orders

Performance

- •3 fold increase in Aspley DV cases receiving intensive support since April
- •20% of intensive support cases have been self referral
- •No significant change in the number of incidents of DV in Aspley
- However in April to September 2012 there was a 41% reduction in individuals who experienced repeat DV
