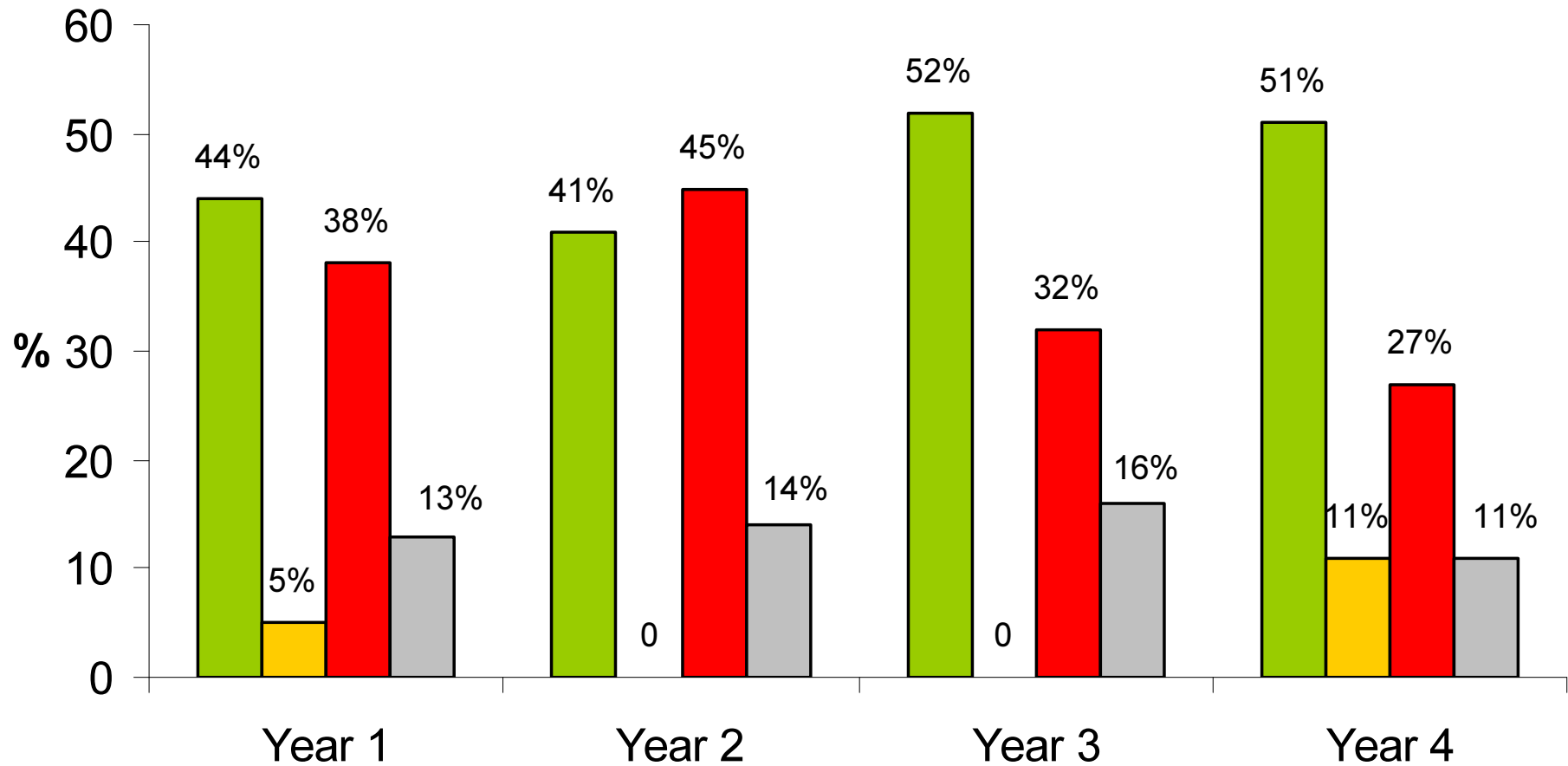

# Performance so far



# Performance headlines

## Positive signs of growth

- GVA and new business growth are going in the right direction
- Visitor offer/economy remains strong
- Our overall employment rate is holding up – 2,524 people helped into work

## **BUT**

- Levels of children living in poverty remains static

## Cohesive communities

- 88% satisfaction with local area - an all time high
- An increase in net number of new homes being built in the city

## **BUT**

- Fuel poverty rate compared to the Core Cities has worsened

# Performance headlines

## Supporting families and young people

- Teenage conceptions down again, -24% since 2010
- KS2 success – 72% of pupils getting level 4+ in reading, writing and maths, moving Nottingham from 145<sup>th</sup> to 117<sup>th</sup> in the rankings

## **BUT**

- Despite 50.3% of pupils getting 5 A\*-C GCSEs, Nottingham is still below the current Core Cities average
- Levels of child obesity at age 10-11 (Year 6) remain high at 22% - compared to England average of 18.9%

## Safer Nottingham

- A modest fall in crime compared to last year
- An increase in the number of people successfully completing drug treatment to 18.4%, but not on track for current target

# Performance headlines

## Tackling health inequality

- Smoking prevalence down by 3 percentage points and continues a downward trend
- 52% of adults are doing 150 minutes of physical activity per week
- The proportion of people with poor mental wellbeing has decreased to its lowest level since 2010

## **BUT**

- Continued high levels of alcohol-related hospital admissions.

## Cleaner and greener

- CO2 emissions continue to fall and our levels of energy from low or zero carbon emission technology have risen.

## **BUT**

- Recycling rate performance remains challenging
