31 MINUTES

The Committee agreed the minutes of the meeting held on 27 November 2013 as a true record and they were signed by the Chair.

32 SCHOOL (TRAFFIC) ENFORCEMENT PROGRAMME

Susan Thorpe, Traffic Management, informed the Committee of a project, arising from the findings of a steering group, consisting of the County and City Councils and Page 3

Nottinghamshire Police, to address complaints from residents about parking during school drop off and pick up times and stated the following:

- (a) a toolkit has been designed, and sent to all 110 maintained schools within the City Boundary, containing a guide to writing a School Travel Plan, Walking Bus guidelines, a parking support leaflet, a 'keep me safe' poster, a full Road Safety Education delivery toolkit, a home to school template letter and information on parking in a responsible manner;
- (b) the Parking Enforcement Team will be visiting each school in the area for a Week of Action and their presence should deter some people from irresponsible/illegal parking. The visits would be on a rolling schedule, which will be varied so as not to follow a set pattern;
- (c) the CPOs will first speak to those parking, highlighting the dangers of irresponsible parking, then advise them that they should not be parking where they are and, finally, if the parking continues, enforce via a fixed penalty notice (FPN);
- (d) unfortunately it was not possible to work out if there were 'persistent offenders' as records of FPNs issued was not kept on a name basis;
- (e) the work being undertaken will also involve educating people on driving and parking safely outside schools, although Nottingham has the best road safety record in the country for school journeys, with child casualties dropping from 100 in 1990 to less than 20 in 2012.

RESOLVED that the project was noted and welcomed.

33 BECKHAMPTON ROAD SAFETY SCHEME

Navid Arif, Highway Design, and Sarah Cooke, Accident Investigation and Road Safety, updated the Committee on the proposed road safety scheme for Beckhampton Road and stated the following improvements were planned:

(a) Southglade School area

- (i) new zebra crossing (on existing raised plateau outside school);
- (ii) additional double-yellow lines from the beginning of the zebra crossing, starting outside 180 Beckhampton Road:
 - to just before 172 Beckhampton Road and down Belsay Road (stopping just before numbers 4 and 7);
 - to the playing field past Bala Drive and down Bala Drive (stopping just before number 1);
- (iii) removal of the bus stop outside 221 Beckhampton Road;
- (iv) installation of a new bus stop next to the playing field, past Bala Drive;
- (v) installation of Zebrites at various locations outside the school entrance.

(b) Robin Hood Infant/Junior Schools' area

- (i) installation of a new humped zebra crossing (to replace existing pedestrian refuge outside 117/119 Beckhampton Road):
- (ii) introduction of a zig-zag 'School keep clear' road marking outside the Infant School;

- (iii) introduction of double-yellow lines on both sides of the road from just before the junction with Eastglade Road (outside 84 Beckhampton Road) to just past the Junior School boundary;
- (iv) existing bus stop outside the school grounds to be relocated (further down Beckhampton Road, away from the school entrance) and improved to allow easier access for passengers;
- (v) installation of Zebrites at various locations outside both school entrances and installation of a flashing 'school' sign on the bend outside 81 Beckhampton Road.

RESOLVED to note the proposals and that the Committee welcomed the proposed works to improve safety outside the schools concerned.

34 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES - UPDATE

Kevin Hornsby, Regional Housing Manager North, Nottingham City Homes, updated the Committee on the Bestwood Housing Office refurbishment and stated the following:

- (a) the office is currently closed and is being stripped out and re-fitted to allow for better ways of working;
- (b) the staff are working out of Bulwell Riverside and from locally-based surgeries/drop-in centres;
- (c) the Tenancy Estate Team will be split between the refurbished office and Loxley House to allow for easier access by citizens;
- (d) NCH have done a leaflet drop in the local area to inform citizens where they need to go while the office is closed and what the new offices will include i.e. a publicly accessible IT suite;
- (e) the current car park will be reconfigured to include an additional 5 parking spaces, and there were ongoing discussions with a local landowner to try to buy extra land to use for more spaces;
- (f) as the furniture will be replaced, the existing furniture is to be given to local charities and community groups for free;
- (g) it is proposed that the new office will open in mid-June 2014.

RESOLVED to note and welcome the progress on the Bestwood Housing Office refurbishment.

35 NOTTINGHAMSHIRE POLICE - UPDATE

Inspector James Woolley updated the Committee on Police activity, crime trends and anti-social behaviour in the wards since the November 2013 meeting.

RESOLVED to note the update.

36 WARD PERFORMANCE: 2013/14 QUARTER 3



- •The new lighting has been designed to meet the requirements of the latest British and European Standards and Nottingham City Council's specification.
- •This means that columns cannot always be replaced in their original position
- •We understand that some residents have had the benefit of lighting from the existing system on their property but we cannot always replace them in the original positions and therefore the benefit cannot always be retained



Respect Survey 2013 Summary Findings

Methodology & Sampling

- (i) Face-to-face Interviews
- (i) Random Sample of 2700 city residents
- (1) Representative of all wards and deprivation levels in the city
- (1) The final data set from the survey was weighted to correct for the disproportionate sampling scheme used. The data was weighted to the 2011 census on ward, and age and gender at ward level.
- (i) NB: Last year's results have been re-weighted in line with the new census data

Margin of Error, Confidence Intervals and Confidence Level

City-wide = +/- 2% (interval of 4%)

Ward = \pm 10% (interval of 20%)(approx)

Arboretum = \pm 4% (interval of 8%)

Dunkirk and Lenton = +/-4% (interval of 8%)

Confidence level is usually reported at 95%

i.e. 5% chance that the data collected in the sample just by random chance has abnormally high or low values that don't represent the population







Perceptions of ASB in the City Centre by year (very or fairly big problem) (%)




Perceptions of Anti-Social Behaviour in Local Neighbourhood by Year (very or fairly big problem) - (%)



Change in ASB over time


Perceptions of Anti-Social Behaviour Issues in Local Area Over Time (very or fairly big problems) - (%)



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












Satisfaction with Response to report of ASB (%)



Feelings of safety in the neighbourhood after dark (proportion who feel very or fairly safe) - (%)



Feelings of safety in local neighbourhood after dark (very or fairly safe) - (%)




Feelings of safety in Nottingham City Centre when it's dark by Year (%)








How much is your own quality of life affected by crime? (%)



How much of a problem if at all do you think crime is in your local area? (very & quite big problem) (%)




Crime and Community Safety Issues - Ranked 1st (%)

WARD: BASFORD, (Park Lane, Stockhill and Whitemoor Beats) Neighbourhood Development Officer, Gursharan Singh Nijran

Key Successes

- Establishment of Mothers and Toddlers Group at Heathfield CC by the Familly Community Team as part if the early intervention strategy.
- Action around traffic offences at junction of Vernon Road and David Lane (Level crossing junction).
- Covert action against dog fouling operations.
- Consultation around parking issues on Bagnall Road
- Community engagement through the local TRA's
- Introduction of the My Basford Facebook page

What are the emerging issues?

- Anti-social behaviour on the Heathfield Estate. Action plans are in place and partners have worked hard to challenge this problem. Further action is pending.
- Rubbish and fly tipping a number of days of action and community events are planned through the spring to challenge this.
- Henry Mellish Sports Centre new operating models are being explored.
- Budget savings further savings requirement may lead to reduction in service

Events that have happened

- Phase 2 of the Budget Consultation was well attended with good contribution from citizens
- Community clean up on Stockhill Park

Events Planned

- A number of community clean ups in partnership with local school and the Nottingham Trent University.
- Summer events on Brooklyn, Heathfield and Vernon Park.
- A deep clean of the Rosegarth estate.

What is the Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) focussing its work on?

- NAT is prioritising action to reduce auto crime. Whilst there was rise in this type of offence
 early in the new year, increase patrols and advice offered to citizens has seen reductions in
 March and April.
- Deliberate fires This shows a big increase in this quarter, mainly due to offences in the Heathfield area. Fire and Rescue and Community Protection colleagues continue to investigate and educate about the dangers of fires. The year to date figure however is down 13% on last year.
- Improving the environment and around the estates and a regular rota of anti dog fouling

patrols around streets which continue to cause problems. A number of clean up events are planned through spring.

• The North Locality has targets to reduce criminal damage, shop thefts and violence. Although there have been increases in a number of crimes figures this month, year to date figures show that we are on target to meet these reductions.

The figures given below are a comparison between November 2012 and November 2013 data.

- All Crime: is down by 3% compared to the same quarter in the previous year but 3% up for the year to date period. Criminal damage is down 5% (3 crimes), shop thefts down by 7% (4 crimes) and violent crime down by 60% (1 crime).
- All ASB: was up by 15% (increase of 18 calls) compared to the same period in the previous year, but down 2% for the year to date period.
- There are now 632 (8.6%) households in Basford signed up to the ALERT system.
- Cleanliness Index: The target set for the city centre is 86% and the average figure for Basford continues to show a healthy improvement and the latest quarterly average score for Basford is 88%. The March index is 94%.
- **Graffiti Reports:** 10 incidents (increase of 6) in March compared to the same month in the previous year.
- Fly Tipping: 27 incidents (increase of 16) in March compared with March 2013.
- Community Protection: 0 Court outcomes in December 2013.
- Fire: Deliberate fires are down 13% on the year to date.

WARD: Bestwood (Bestwood Estate, Bestwood Park and Top Valley Beats) Neighbourhood Development Officer - Dale Griffin

Key Successes

During this quarter (January – March 2014) there have been a number of successes including:

- Bestwood Got Talent auditions and final. Audience of 230 at final.
- Group of local Police Cadets trained, raised aspirations and supporting community event.
- Area 2 Easter Children with additional needs event
- Launch of Bestwood Estate Messy Church
- Community events organised by the community centres including New Year Lunch (Bestwood Park), Easter Parade (Leen Valley), Easter Fair (Bestwood Estate).
- A partnership approach to tackling a rise in deliberate fires in the area.
- Establishment of My Bestwood Facebook page to provide a further channel of engagement with residents.
- Bestwood continues to stay ranked in the top 5 safest wards in the city for levels of crime. In quarter four theft showed a significant reduction with a 36% less on the same period the year before.
- Respect for Nottingham Survey undertaken in Nov / Dec 2013 results for Bestwood Ward Second highest ward behind Wollaton West with 64% of respondents perceiving a strong sense of community where they live. Only 18% of respondents felt crime was a problem in their area, placing Bestwood Ward with the third lowest perception behind Wollaton West and Sherwood.
- Citizen survey undertaken in Nov / Dec 2013 results for Area 2 86.9% of respondents satisfied with the local area as a place to live. 76.5% of respondents satisfied with the cleanliness of the local area. 88.8% of respondents agree that the local area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together.

What are the emerging issues?

- The total all crime for 2013/14 resulted in a 6% increase compared to 2012/13 which is a fair result when there have been challenges upon agency budgets and the impact of welfare reform. Bestwood is still ranked as the 5th safest ward in the city behind the two Wollaton and two Clifton wards.
- Domestic violence continues to be a concern. FCT have seen a rise in referrals. In response
 work is being undertaken to develop a domestic violence task and finish group in Area 2.
 Additional work includes raising awareness of positive relationships through the Stronger
 Families and Freedom Programmes. CDP funding is being used to support awareness
 raising training with teachers and pupils at Big Wood School.
- ASB has continued to rise in this quarter compared to the previous year. This is primarily for noise complaints, which correlates with the change in recording systems and police responsibility. The police continue to work with Community Protection and Nottingham City Homes where ever possible to reduce complaints/issues and provide solutions.
- Improving the visual appearance of neighbourhoods continues to be a priority and hotspot areas will be tackled in turn.
- The NAT has highlighted the need for more capacity to enable welfare reform support services to reduce waiting times.
- The NAT have identified gaps in provision for one off employment advice and support in preparation for employment or apprenticeships for 16-18 year olds. Work will be undertaken with Right Track to see what can be done to address this.

What is the Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) focussing its work on?

The NAT will be focussing its work upon:

- Improving the visual appearance of neighbourhoods
- Reviewing the health needs of the area
- Reducing crime
- Supporting employment initiatives in the area

The figures given below show some key statisting to this quarter:

- Crime: was down by 19 offences in quarter four compared to Jan-March 2013
- ASB: was up by 39 incidents in quarter four compared to Jan-March 2013
- Cleanliness Index: score is at 93 (Jan 2014). The target set for the city centre is 86
- **Graffiti Reports:** 8 incidents (no change) compared to the same month January in the previous year
- **Fly Tipping:** 46 incidents (increase of 26) compared to the same month January in the previous year
- **Unemployment:** Continues to show improvement with JSA claimant rates however still within the top group of wards for highest unemployment.
- **Fire:** There has been an increase in the number of deliberate fires during quarter four of 19 offences compared to the same period in the previous year.

- 2.3 The Ward Performance Reports capture work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind, the report such as the Ward plans and other partner's implementation plans.
- 2.4 The North Locality Board has been established now since September 2012. It delivers a multi agency/partnership approach to managing the locality, providing an overview of area performance and policing priorities, performance management and problem solving of key challenges. In the north, this has included a focus on parking issues, cannabis, theft from shops, criminal damage and violent crime, including domestic violence. Area Chairs, or these right innated representatives are invited.

Minutes are issued to all Ward Councillors.

- 2.5 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the Crime and Drugs Partnership.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2013 an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million citywide between 2013-2015.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

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2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme, have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
