19 WARD PERFORMANCE: QUARTER 1 2014/15

The Committee considered a report of the Director of Neighbourhood Services, detailing performance in the 3 wards during the period June to September 2014 against key performance indicators.

RESOLVED to note the report.

20 FAMILY ARTS IN BILBOROUGH (FAB) PROJECT

The Committee received a presentation by Shamila Chady, Artist in Residence, FAB Project, and Carmel Bradley, Bilborough Education Improvement Partnership Manager, informing it of the Family Arts in Bilborough project (FAB). It was stated that a video about the project can be viewed at http://vimeo.com/104922561.

- this is a 2 year project, funded jointly by the Arts Council, partnership schools and local ward councillors, with a total available funding for the 2 years of £50,000;
- year 1 of the project has been very successful. One of the greatest achievements has been to attract a creative artist-in-residence (Shamila Chady) who has lots of artistic expertise, and has built positive relationships with a range of people. She has worked proactively with age-groups from five-year-olds to adults, including groups of autistic and special needs children in the partnership schools (Brocklewood, Melbury and Portland Primary and Djanogly Strelley, Samworth and Firbeck Academy);
- feedback has confirmed that the artist's friendliness helped break down different types of barriers and many families, who wouldn't normally get involved in school activities, became involved because it wasn't perceived as threatening, and

relations between the schools and parents have improved as a result. Participants also valued the creative time spent together as a family and with others;

- one of the aims of the project was to make participants more aware of the opportunities available at Lakeside Arts Centre as, in previous years, it has struggled to attract local families to participate in events, such as the International Children's Festival. This year there was an offer to cover taxi fares for families who wanted to attend so that they could come and go at a time which suited them. Only one family took up this offer yet this year saw the best turn-out ever at the Festival (including 14 Bilborough families that took part in artist's workshops, mixing with people from different backgrounds);
- in addition to the Children's Festival, there were successful family visits to Lakeside Arts Centre, St Mary's Church (Tess Jaray exhibition) and the Yorkshire Sculpture Park. Only about 10% of the families involved had been to these venues before, confirming that the project is reaching the target group, raising awareness of art and, hopefully, inspiring families to visit art venues in the future;
- Shamila supported 80 children and young people across the partnership schools to prepare for their 'Arts Awards' (see description below), using creative opportunities to do this. For example, a small group of secondary students preparing for their Bronze Award planned and delivered an outdoor workshop (using natural materials) to young children and their families as part of the Yorkshire Sculpture Park visit:

'Arts Awards - supporting young people, who want to deepen their engagement with the arts and build creative and leadership skills, to achieve a national qualification.

Through Arts Awards at five levels, young people aged up to 25 can explore art forms, including performing arts, visual arts, literature, media and multimedia. The Awards build confidence, help young people to enjoy cultural activities and prepares them for further education or employment.

Arts Awards is managed by <u>Trinity College London</u>, in association with <u>Arts</u> <u>Council England</u>. Since its launch in 2005, the Award has grown quickly and is now flourishing in arts centres, colleges/schools, community projects, libraries, galleries, local authorities, theatres, youth clubs and youth justice settings.'

- Shamila liaised with the local library and a community organisation to revitalise a small outdoor area earmarked as a community garden. Participants at the Children's Festival worked with the artist to produce a set of clay tiles, based on a garden theme. These were then glazed and fired by local families working with her and together they designed and installed a wall mosaic which the community group were delighted with. Feedback from families involved in the project has indicated that they are very proud of their art pieces and see them as valuable community assets;
- one of the lessons learnt was that the amount of time required by Shamila, both for planning and for 'finishing off' of the art pieces e.g. grouting, glazing etc, was

underestimated. This will be redressed next year by using more of the budget towards artists' fees so that this element of the project is adequately resourced;

- at some of the schools, the timescale for getting families involved was a little slower than anticipated and next year it is intended to get this element of the project off the ground earlier through careful planning and liaison with key staff. The only disappointment this year was the low turn-out of families to the end-of-year project exhibition at the local library. This may have been due to the timing of the event (after school in the last few days of term) combined with extremely hot weather. This will be explored more with families next year but, as a result, it is proposed to hold next year's final exhibition during the school day (in a local school with air-conditioning) and provide transport to assist families to attend;
- outputs are as follows:

21 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES SCHEMES: LATEST POSITION

Chris Holloway, Nottingham City Homes (NCH), updated the Committee as follows:

1. Decent Homes

2014-15 is the final year of the Nottingham Decent Homes programme. Constructor partners Keepmoat and Bullock continue to improve kitchens and bathrooms where required. Single glazed windows are replaced and heating systems upgraded as and when NCH can gain access to properties.

A letter was sent in July 2014 to customers who have previously refused the improvement work or not allowed access to their property. The letter asked them to contact NCH so improvement work can be planned-in by end March 2015. After March 2015, a 'Maintaining Decency' programme will continue to ensure properties meet the Nottingham Decent Homes Plus Standard.

2. Door replacement programme

All wooden doors will be replaced during the financial year between now and 2018, subject to access to properties.

3. Slate roof replacement

Slate roofs across the City are being replaced and there are 149 in Aspley, 76 in Leen Valley but none in Bilborough. Tenants have been invited to an information event and will be contacted prior to work commencing.

4. Houses in Multiple Occupation

Refurbishment of houses in multiple occupation, including a Nottingham Decent Homes programme of kitchen and bathroom replacement, new windows and doors and decorating of communal areas. NCH are working with the Allocations Team to help tenants find alternative accommodation during the extensive refurbishment.

5. Equalities Act work

The Equalities Act 2010 works covers the following schemes being undertaken at 60 Independent Living Schemes throughout the City:

- Kitchen refits to allow for a range of access and use requirements;
- WC refits to allow for a range of use access requirements;
- External access ramps;
- Laundry adaptations to taps and machinery heights;
- High contrast signage throughout independent living schemes;
- Communal doors, access and thresholds;
- Car parking surfaces and marking.

In West Area, the above works have commenced, and are on track, at Stanwick Close, Beechdale, Kibworth Close, Heathfield and Bramley Green, Broxtowe.

6. Denton Green, Broxtowe

New build of 4 x one-bedroom bungalows due to commence in September 2014 (and complete 6 months later), work being undertaken by Robert Woodhead & BEST (Broxtowe Education, Skills & Training).

7. Lindfield Road, Broxtowe

Work ongoing to complete a scheme, for the creation of brick walls with low level railing on top, in Aspley at 53 properties between 252 - 177 Lindfield Road. Also installing a single and/or double gate where necessary.

8. Tenant and Leaseholder Congress (TLC)

The newly re-formed TLC held its first meeting on 29 January 2014. Membership consists of Chairs from each of the customer panels and NCH representatives from within the Area Committee areas, ensuring good local representation, to higher level involvement within the decision-making processes at NCH. TLC have so far discussed and/or influenced such matters as rent setting and the Responsible Tenant Reward Scheme, a new repairs agreement, the proposed Service Review Programme 2014-15 and the Tenants Conference in September 2014.

The TLC and the NCH Board meet on a quarterly basis and are developing new ways to work effectively together. Shared objectives include jointly supporting the delivery of the Tenant and Leaseholder Involvement Strategy and the Corporate Plan. This has been proposed to link tenant involvement and the Board and to ensure tenants' and leaseholders' interests are at the heart of the organisation and to ensure transparency and accountability of decision making on behalf of tenants and leaseholders through sharing information and collaborative working.

9. Tenant and Resident Association updates

Broxtowe Community Club was formed in July 2014. Group members have attended training through the Tenants Academy and put those skills to use at the local 'Tour de Broxtowe', where they offered face painting to local residents. They are in the process of applying for funding via a Community First grant.

BelsATRA have run their summer club, including taking young people away for a residential visit in North Yorkshire, and the summer club continues to be run for people in the area.

DADTRA have run several activities this year, including a hanging basket sale, hosting a meeting with the Leader of the City Council and organising a bus trip to Great Yarmouth and have started monthly housing surgeries from the DADTRA community house.

New Whitemoor TRA has applied for a special 'On Fire' grant for an older person's day, with the aim of putting on an activity at Naburn Court Independent Living Scheme for 35 tenants and residents.

SMART and STARA are working with the Tenant and Community Involvement Manager to develop 12-month action plans with the aim of increasing membership and delivering some area based projects.

A new group is in the process of being formed in the Beechdale area. The group are hoping to hold their AGM in October 2014 and elect their committee.

10. <u>Responsible Tenant Reward Scheme</u>

Staff from the Aspley Housing Office have ensured that the new 'Responsible Tenant Reward' scheme has been embedded and used robustly in the West Area. There have been 5 removals of the responsible tenant reward since it was introduced in May 2014 (3 for drugs, 1 for Anti Social Behaviour and 1 for an untidy garden).

11. 4 Star Estates

The new programme of assessing our estates began in April 2014. The Broxtowe Estate was one of the first to be assessed by our Tenant Inspectors and received the maximum 4 stars. The star ratings are now based on partnership working and tenant engagement, alongside the visual appearance of neighbourhoods. Aspley and Broxtowe have traditionally performed well in terms of close partnership working and it is pleasing to see this work recognised.

12. Social return on investment

A recent analysis on work undertaken in the Aspley ward with young people looking for work has proven to be a success, with many of the young people finding full time work or training. It has been calculated that for every £1 invested by NCH, £20.57 was generated in 'social value' which, in this case, was represented by residents perceptions of the area in which they live, opportunities for employment and their perception that the council and NCH act on the priorities they set. NCH are happy to continue this work and methodology for 2015 with Councillor McCulloch and her 'Communities Taking Control' scheme.

13. Cranwell Road

Decommissioning

- out of 84 flats being decommissioned, only one is still occupied and this leaseholder should be agreeing by October 2014 to sell;
- in response to vandalism and Health and Safety issues, rear access to vacant blocks is being secured by NCH repairs teams. Litter and fly-tipping continues to be an issue and NCH caretaking staff and council Neighbourhood Services are doing their best to keep on top of this.

Demolition

- of the 11 blocks and set of five garages, one block remains occupied and three are affected by bat licences. This leaves 7 blocks and garages that NCH could start demolishing from October 2014, with others to follow in December 2014;
- There are cost advantages in commencing the demolition, with all the buildings being ready due to service connections and contract arrangements, so a compromise maybe required to avoid a period of discontinuity.

Construction

 In February 2014, Planning Committee approved 11 bungalows and 17 houses and, in October 2014, a further 8 family houses and a 12 x one-bed apartment block is recommended for approval. The on-site start date is expected to be January 2015, with completion expected in July 2016.

22 CRIME AND DRUGS PARTNERSHIP (CDP) PROVISION IN WEST AREA

The Committee received a joint presentation by Ian Bentley, Crime and Drugs Partnership, and Apollos Clifton-Brown, Framework Housing Association, regarding drug and alcohol use / services within West Area. The main points were as follows:

- in West Area, GPs (based at 11 'health' venues) and pharmacies (at 8 locations), offering drug and alcohol treatment services, are as follows:
 - the Forest Practice, Bilborough, Beechdale and Lime Tree Surgeries, the Strelley Health Centre and Boulevard, Melbourne Park, Bilborough, Grange Farm, RHR and Aspley Medical Centres;
 - o Lloyds, Coop, Boots, Vantage and Omega;
- according to the 2012-13 'Crime Survey for England and Wales', the proportion of people who had used cannabis during the previous 12 months year has steadily reduced since a peak in 2003 (down from approximately 11% to 6%);
- however, according to the same survey, use of 'legal highs' or NPS (New Psychoactive Substance) has increased in the last year, as has alcoholrelated hospital admissions increase. This shows a shift away from opiates and towards NPS and alcohol.
- currently, one of the most popular <u>psychoactive</u> plants, which can induce 'visions' and other hallucinatory experiences (with approximately 1.1% of people stating in the survey that they had used it) is Salvia divinorum, also known as Diviner's Sage, Ska María Pastora or Seer's Sage, but usually just by its genus name, Salvia or, as it is native to Mexico and part of the mint plant genus, Mexico Magic Mint;
- another popular 'high' (with approximately 6.1% of people stating in the survey that they had used it making it the 2nd most popular NPS) is nitrous oxide, also known as laughing gas or hippy crack, which is inhaled and makes users feel euphoric and relaxed, although experts warn it can cause death on the first use due to suffocation.

- Also, during 2013/14 there were 38,695 attendances by Nottingham City residents at sexual health services. Of these attendees, 2,614 were residents of Aspley, and 1,743 of Aspley resident attendances were at Victoria Health Centre;
- Sexual health clinic access in West Area by Nottingham City residents during 2013/14 was 298 at Bilborough College and 140 at Strelley Health Centre;
- C-Card registration and pick up is provided at approximately 15 sites across the West Area.

1. <u>REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS</u>

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2013 an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million citywide between 2013-2015.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.

Key Successes

Small Steps Big Changes Promotion event at Minver Sports Centre 23rd October 2014 As part of the SSBC (Small Steps Big Changes) funding, in partnership with SSBC and Aspley Partnership. We held an open day at the Minyer Sports Centre during half-term to promote the new SSBC programme. The event was a great success with 130 people/children in attendance.

What is SSBC?

Nottingham is one of 15 areas to be awarded a share of £185 million from The Big Lottery Fund in 2013 to develop long-term plans to support parents of children aged three and under in four of the Nottingham's wards.

Small Steps Big Changes (SSBC) is an opportunity to change the lives and life chances of Nottingham children in Aspley, Bulwell, Arboretum & St Ann's.

- SSBC will scale what works to improve the lives of young children in four areas of the city, including successful local initiatives such as:
- peer breast-feeding support
- supported book-gifting
- parent-child relationship programmes
- infant massage classes
- 'learning-through-play' schemes in the homes.
- Through co-production and parent-powered change, the program will drive the creation of the ten year Lottery-funded programme that will focus on preventing problems and helping children to live happy, healthy and fulfilled lives.

- Set up a steering group for a new project 'Our Place' working with a range of partners including: Groundwork, BEST, Housing Association. Its aim is to improve intergenerational cohesion.
- Funding and partner commitment to hold a Bilborough Gems initiative this year.
- The Space Arts project which aims to encourage local participation in the Arts has proved a great success. Some achievements include: art in schools with parents and children, Bilborough resident participation in Lakeside Arts Centre.
- New Tenants and Residents Association in the Beechdale Area.
- Refurbishment of Strelley Social Club to become a community centre for the area, with improvements to the exterior and a revitalised boxing club.
- Improvements at the junction of Fremount Drive and Wigman Road to make it safer for pedestrians and drivers.
- New houses, flats and bungalows on Cranwell Road.
- Traffic safety improvements on the Firbeck Estate and the junction of Westwick Road and Birchover Road to make the areas safer for schoolchildren.
- A new footpath on Harvey Hadden Park from the Chingford Road area to Wigman Road, which has been requested by residents.

The board will maintain a focus on crime, but the targets have been broadened out to reflect the local needs and priorities of the North. The Locality Board, together with partners will take a proactive approach. The board will be reviewing evidence including statistics every month to ensure good progress. Area Chairs, or their nominated representatives are invited. Minutes are issued to all Ward Councillors.
- 2.5 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the Crime and Drugs Partnership.

Estimated Survivors of Domestic Violence



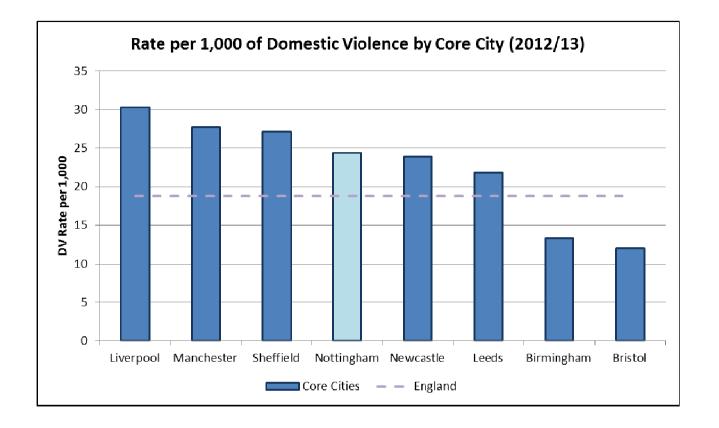
According to the British Crime Survey (2010/11) between 4% and 6% of men will be the survivor of domestic violence at least once in a 12 month period. In Nottingham City there is estimated to be between 1 in 3 and 1 in 4 females affected by domestic violence at least once in a 12 month period.

This is based on the association between social deprivation and physical violence against female survivors.

In comparison to the Core Cities, Nottingham City saw the fourth highest rate per 1,000 of the population, aged 18 or above, of Police recorded domestic violence incidents and crimes in 2012/13. Nonetheless, this was above the average rate for England as a whole and could reflect a level of reporting in Nottingham that is higher than for England overall.

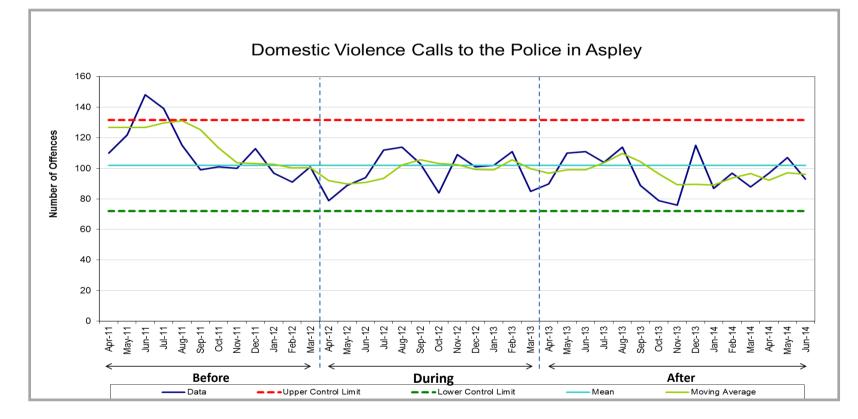
Although Aspley has seen relatively stable figures in domestic violence calls to the police, this ward saw the highest volume compared to the remaining 19 wards in the City. The ward also saw the second greatest volume of domestic violence recorded crime despite a year to date reduction.

With regards to calls to the Police, both Aspley and Bilborough saw a higher rate per 1,000 of the population than the City average. This was also the same for recorded domestic violence crimes.

The Financial Impact of Domestic Violence

- In 2008 Domestic violence, in all forms, was estimated to have cost the economy in England and Wales £5.7 billion based on public services and loss of economic activity due to injury (Walby, 2009).

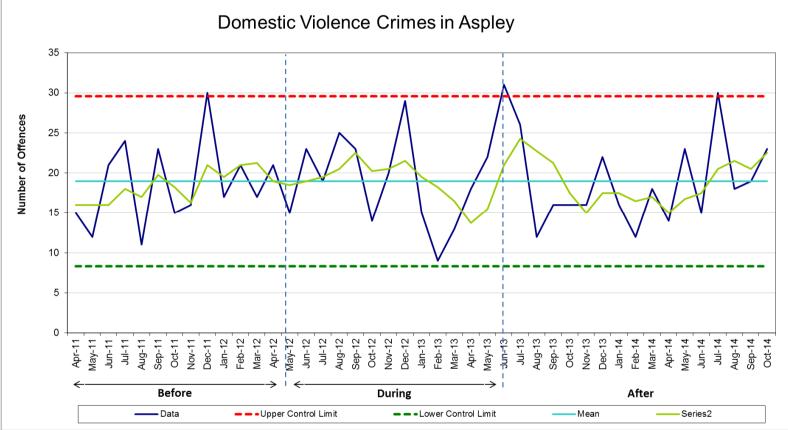

Reporting remained relatively stable during and following the intervention in Aspley; however, this followed a reducing trend in reporting in the 12 months prior.

Nonetheless, this only represents those reporting to the police and it could be possible that the intervention has increased reporting to other agencies, such as WAIS, or has encouraged disclosure to practitioners working in the area as part of the intervention in order to gain emotional support.

Aspley Domestic Violence Project



Those reports to the Police in Aspley that were converted to crimes remained relatively stable; however, there was a very slight increase. Considering the reduction in reporting to the police, the stability in domestic violence crimes suggests an increase in the severity of violence; such that a higher proportion of reports are being 'crimed'. Therefore, the intervention may have had an impact on reporting to other agencies; however, there has been no impact on the severity of violence inflicted on the survivor.

Nottingham City Council's Children & Adults department has recently completed a restructure which most significantly impacts the Vulnerable Children & Adults (formerly Family Community Teams) Directorate and the Children's Social Care (formerly safeguarding) directorate. This has resulted in changes to our Head of Service tier within these Directorates.

The main changes are:

- 1) The three Heads of Family Community Teams (North, South and Central) have been restructured to create two new Head of Service roles
 - the Head of Early Help Services and the Head of Extensive and Specialist Services. Mark Andrews (formerly the Head of FCT North) was confirmed in post as the Head of Early Help Services but has recently secured another role at Rutland County Council. Mark will be leave Nottingham City Council in January 2015. The Head of Extensive and Specialist Services is currently vacant.

- The full transition of teams within the Vulnerable Children and Families directorate will be completed by the end of November
- It has been agreed that, until the end of the financial year (March 2015), Helen Blackman will take responsibility for the strategic oversight[∞] ٠ of the Vulnerable Children & Families directorate and the line management of the two Head of Service roles. Councillors have agreed additional interim capacity that will work directly to Helen, leading on particular programmes of activity. Amy Weir has recently joined the Directorate to fulfil this role to drive improvements and innovation across these services.

Children's Centre Performance update

Data is broken into area performance indicators and target groups. The Vulnerable Children & Adults aim is to register, reach and achieve a sustained contact of 65% and over to achieve a good outcome in the next Ofsted inspection.

Ofsted Judgement scoring of the performance data:

65% and over – Outstanding or Good Under 65% -Requires improvement or Inadequate

West Area (Aspley, Broxtowe and Bilborough) currently deliver 26 open access sessions plus support, when possible, 11 midwife clinics to promote Early Help.

Current key challenges:

- 1. Preparation for Children's Centre inspection next one will be area based and cover the three Children Centres
- 2. Early help post restructure has resulted in more resource for Under 5's group support, adult learning, training and employment through volunteering opportunities and sign positing to initiatives such as Talent Match and Working links and plans are being developed.
- 3. Leadership and governance. Training on advisory boards has been completed and an area work shop has been held, which identified key actions to ensure services are challenged and reflect the needs of the community.

A restructure of the Play and Youth Team was completed in July 2014 and transitions took place during September 2014. There are now two grades of post, which are senior and play and youth worker.

Background

Family Nurse Partnership (FNP) is an evidenced based programme developed and rigorously tested in Randomised Control Trails (RCT's) throughout the States over 30 years, Targeting teenage parents the programme is based on theories of Attachment, Self Efficacy and Human Ecology the programme shows significant outcomes in improved maternal outcomes in pregnancy, improved economic sufficiency and outcomes in school readiness. The programme also influences short term health outcomes of increased breast feeding rates and reduction in smoking together with spacing of second pregnancies. Longer term outcomes were evidenced through reductions criminal activity and intervention through the criminal justice system. It is one of only two programmes evidence to be effective in Safeguarding Children as cited by The Lancett.

FNP was adopted by the Department of Health in 2007 as an early intervention preventative programme and has been developed to include the delivery of the Healthy Child Programme and sits at the targeted end of Health Visiting. Expansion nationally of FNP has taken place to date and the FNP programme is now being delivered in over 100 sites in the country. Results from National research is due to be released in the spring 2015.

The Local Picture

FNP has been provided by CityCare across Nottingham City over the past 7 years with over 350 clients completing the programme. Expansion has taken place and now 2 teams of Family Nurses (10 wte) work out of Children's Centres in Broxtowe ad Best wood,

Currently commissioned to offer the service to 225 young women under 19 in their first pregnancy. This reaches approximately 40% of the eligible population. Recent Big lottery funding will fund a further 2 Nurses to increase coverage to 100% in some areas of the city including West Area. Currently 26 clients in West Area are participating in the programme.

In October 2015 commissioning responsibilities will transfer from NHS England to Public Health in the Local Authorities.

How does it work?

- Specially trained Family Nurse practitioners offer intensive home visiting weekly and fortnightly from early pregnancy until the child is 2 years old. Working alongside maternity services in pregnancy. From birth to 2 years the FNP programme integrates the HCP and the Family Nurse replaces the role of the Health Visitor for clients on the programme.
- The programme is based on a therapeutic relationship between the Nurse and the client. The Nurse uses a strength based communication style to keep clients engaged and motivated. Partners/Fathers and family members are encourage to join in the programme where possible. Materials are targeted at Dads as well as Mum. The motivation for change comes from parents wanting to do the best for their child.

The programme covers a variety of themes which include:

Healthy Relationships (40% of clients on the programme identified being physically hurt by someone close to them) Diet

Smoking

Infant Feeding

Attachment – what does good parenting look like – how does it feel from the baby's point of view

Aspirations and goals for the future and pathways into work.

Play and Boundary setting.

Is it working?

Data is recorded into a National Data base managed by the FNP National Unit.

Nottingham is meeting all fidelity measures (targets) in line with National goals and exceed them in some areas,

58% of clients initiate breastfeeding at birth. 26.3% sustain breastfeeding at 6 weeks which exceeds the national average.

100% of clients on the programme make a reduction in smoking and a small number quit smoking.

By the time the child is two years old any clients have engaged in some kind of education, training or employment.

Families are supported to take up the two year placement offer as they leave the programme.

A recent caseload analysis using the Children's Partnership Family Support Pathway identified of 152 clients 62.5% sat within the remit of additional support 31% in Extensive support and 6.5% in protection. Demonstrating that the service works with a variety of complexity in the caseloads.

Areas of need identified most for the clients were:

Housing, employment and finance Family and Social Relationships Emotional and Behavioural Development Family History and Functioning Basic Care and Protection.

Working partnerships with other agencies are vital to the success of the clients and their children and work takes place with midwifery, GP's, Housing, the voluntary sector, children's centres and social care before transfer back to universal health visiting services at the childs 2nd birthday.

The Clients

The Clients are fundamental in the development of the programme. We engage their expertise when recruiting Family Nurses. They are active members on our advisory board and they have been involved in ministerial visits.

Quarterly clients surveys are facilitated and client feedback reports:

'I have seen changes in my partner we're happier'

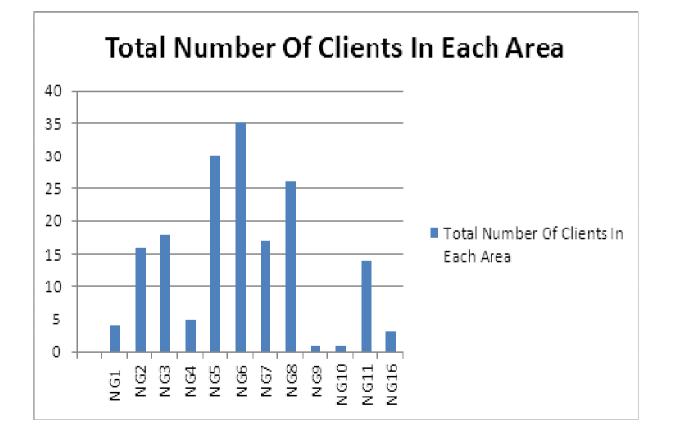

1 Introduction

This paper will give a brief overview of how the Health Visiting Implementation Plan has transformed the early support offer to families in Nottingham City and in particular Area 3.

2 Background and Context

In 2010 the Government set out its vision for the future of Health Visiting in England for expanding and modernising the Health Visitor service by March 2015. In early 2011 this was supported by the publication of the Health Visitor Implementation Plan 2011-15 – A Call to Action. This was further highlighted as a priority area in the Operating Framework for the NHS in England 2012/13.

Nottingham CityCare Partnership has a challenging target to expand the number of Health Visitors from a baseline of 69.4 whole time equivalents(2011) to 154.7 whole time equivalents by March 2015 (an increase of 123%). At the time, the enormity of this challenge was recognised by both the clinical commissioners and Strategic Health Authority, and it was recognised that Nottingham had the largest requirement for increase in Workforce throughout the East Midlands region. Despite this challenge Nottingham CityCare has worked in partnership with NHS England, Health Education East Midlands and Higher Education Institutes to embrace the Health Visitor Implementation Plan and thoroughly supported the plan for increasing the workforce and modernising the Health Visiting Service delivered to children and families within the City.

3 Local Context and the Challenges

- Need to increase from 69.4 to 154.7 WTE which poses significant challenges
- Limited capacity of provider to train students with such a low WTE start point
- The need to revise training methodologies in order to support the increased number of students and the need to train the existing staff to take on this mentoring role has been central to the success of the expansion project
- The need to ensure there were sufficient planned numbers of commissioned health visitor student places (12 month duration), to ensure achievement of the required local trajectory by April 2015
- The need to ensure the retention of students within the city post qualification
- Loss of existing, experienced health visitors to other disciplines, retirement

4 Progress to Date

- As at 30th October 14 there were 99.58 WTE Health Visitors in post against the 31st March 2015 target of 154.7 WTE
- Further recruitment from the January 2015 students plus oversupply from neighbouring providers are anticipating. It is anticipated that there will be an additional 35 Health Visitors working on the City in January 2015.
- For Area 3 that will mean, approximately an additional 10 newly qualified Health Visitors working in Area 3
- 4 Levels of Service Provision
- Emphasis on Universal Provision of visits and assessments throughout early years and close partnership working with all other agencies where vulnerabilities are identified
- Working together with early Years on combined 2- 2 ½ year assessment

5 Transform Early Support in Nottingham City

Safeguarding and early intervention

- Increased Health Visiting resource targeted in priority areas
- Improved immunisation rate for hard to reach groups e.g. complex families
- Increased support for vulnerable young people e.g. travellers, homeless

9 Transfer of 0-5 children's public health commissioning to local authorities

From 1 October 2015, the Government intends that local authorities (LAs) take over responsibility from NHS England for commissioning (i.e. planning and paying for) public health services for children aged 0-5. This includes health visiting and Family Nurse Partnership ((FNP) targeted services for teenage mothers).

The Healthy Child Programme (HCP) is the national public health programme, based on best knowledge/evidence to achieve good outcomes for all children. The transfer of 0-5 commissioning will join-up that already done by LAs for public health services for children and young people 5-19, (and up to age 25 for young people with Special Educational Needs and Disability. This will enable joined up commissioning from 0 to 19 years old, improving continuity for children and their families.

The following commissioning responsibilities will not transfer to local authorities;

- Child Health Information Systems
- The 6-8 week GP check (also known as Child Health Surveillance

10 Mandating Elements of the Healthy Child Programme

- The Government's aim is to enable local services to be shaped to meet local needs.
- Some services however need to be provided in the context of a national, standard format, to ensure universal coverage, and hence that the nation's health and wellbeing overall is improved and protected this includes some of the HCP services.
- The potential for mandating elements of the HCP was set out in *Healthy Lives, Healthy People1:* A range of public health services are *already* mandated, for example, on national child measurement.
- Building on the mandation of services outlined above, and subject to parliamentary approval, the Government now intends to mandate certain universal elements of the 0-5 HCP namely:-
- Antenatal health promoting visits
- New baby review
- 6-8 week assessment
- 1 year assessment
- 2-2½ review
- Evidence shows that these are key times to ensure that parents are supported to give their baby/child the best start in life, and to identify early, those families who need extra help (early interventions). These elements are delivered by health visitors or (less often) through FNP as part of an on-going relationship with families and communities.

Balloon Woods Briefing Paper

Balloon Woods is an open access adventure playground. Open access means where children can come and go as they please, unless agreed with parents/careers and staff that they are collected.

Balloon Woods is a unique site, situated in the middle of a wood so can offer environmental play activities.

There is an inclusive core offer to families of children with additional needs, where support can be provided for children who may need support to access activities. The play centre is open Tues, Weds, Thurs evenings and two sessions on a Saturday during term time and Monday – Friday during school holidays.

Activities include arts and craft activities, outdoor adventurous play. National and local events and festivals are celebrated throughout the year. During school holidays, low cost day trips and outings are offered to Children, Young people and their families which are supervised by staff.

19 from Wollaton area – 3 have additional needs

14 from Bilborough area – 3 have additional needs

There are also some attendances from: Radford, Sherwood Rise, Forest Fields, Sneinton, and Beechdale areas of Nottingham City, with 1 or 2 children and young people from Stapleford, Beeston and Chilwell areas of the county.

Historically Balloon Woods and Wollaton Vale Youth club was managed by the Family Community Team in Bilborough area, until August 2011 when it was handed over to the Wollaton Team.

In 2009 £52,500 from Aiming High Capital Funding was invested to refurbish the centre; it is now more accessible for young people with additional needs.

Whats working well?

Due to the restructure new staff have adjusted well to their roles and responsibilities and future planning and resource development is being taking place.

What's not working so well?

Level of attendances from the Bilborough area is low with only 14 individuals attending. These young people tend to come from the "Coventry Lane" area of Bilborough as it has been reported that it is too far for the young people to walk from the "Birchover /Central Bilborough area" especially during the dark nights.

Over the next financial year we need to consider how to use this resource more effectively to serve the Young people in the Bilborough area or do we continue to invest in a resource if we are unable to serve these young people.

Outreach work has taken place within the Wollaton Vale Area from Team 5 Play and Youth workers, which has resulted in Wollaton Vale Youth Club opening at Wollaton Vale Community Centre working in partnership with Team 3 to deliver these sessions weekly.

Plans for the future

Discussions to take place with Team 3 to identify if transport can be provided for the young people from the centre of Bilborough/Birchover so they are able to access Balloon Woods Play centre especially during the dark nights.

Would it more cost effective to use Birchover Community Centre to deliver and serve the young people in Bilborough?
