36 <u>MINUTES</u>

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 20 November 2014 as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

37 AREA JOBS PLAN

The report was presented by Chris Grocock (Employment and Skills Officer) and Bill Husband (Manager, NG7 TEA). The main points were as follows:

- Nottingham City Council is committed to reducing unemployment and NG7 TEA is funded to co-ordinate Employment and Skills activity in the Berridge and Sherwood Wards. They engage with the local community to attempt to remove barriers which are causing unemployment.
- There are 5 key priorities:
 increase the employment rate of the working age population;

- increase the number of adults with Level 2 Skills;
- lead and deliver a community coordination strategy for employment and training;
- incorporate financial inclusion, benefit and debt advice in provision;
- deliver a programme of community recruitment and information events.
- NG7 TEA work with partners to engage those in the community who are the hardest to reach. They work with locals on 3 key areas:
 - Work ethic;
 - English and maths skills;
 - Work experience.
- Berridge has a diverse range of residents and a large number of Polish speakers are attending NG7 TEA, in order to improve their English skills and increase their employability. There are currently 4 work clubs located in Berridge and Sherwood, which locals can access.

In response to questions from the Committee, the following additional information was provided:

- NG7 TEA are looking to increase the number of locals referred to the Sherwood Enterprise Centre to help increase the number of people becoming self employed and starting new businesses;
- Tuntum Housing Association are offering their residents £1,000 to help them to set up their own business;
- Work is ongoing with Djanogly and other local schools to ensure that support is being offered to young people and that employability is on the school's agenda;
- Help is being provided to smaller communities such as the Kurdish community to assist in increasing their employability.

Resolved

- (1) to note the actions in the plan and receive a six-monthly update from NG7 TEA and the Employment and Skills Team;
- (2) Chris Grocock to provide local ward Councillors with a copy of those who are currently accessing the service;
- (3) due to concerns raised by the Committee over the key figures for Berridge, Bill Husband is to provide Councillors with a breakdown of the statistics, showing each community group.

38 FIT IN THE COMMUNITY

Martin Barradell (Employment and Skills Officer) presented the report. The main points were as follows:

- Fit in the Community is a three year sports project which is being run between Nottingham City Council and Nottingham City Homes;
- the aim of the project is to get 5,500 social housing tenants more active. This has been broken down into 3 age groups 14-24, 25-59 and 60+;

- the project is looking at making sports in the community more accessible and to provide potential users with training and support;
- Nottingham City Homes staff, neighbourhood police, community groups and champions all help to engage and identify potential users. The sessions which are offered are free and Nottingham City Homes tenants can also access volunteering opportunities in a wide range of training, including first aid, disability awareness and safeguarding;
- to date, almost 1,000 tenants and city residents have taken part in the project;
- the next steps are to:
 - increase participation by women and girls, linking to the 'This Girl Can' campaign;
 - continue to build the community workforce and to develop casual community coaches and community volunteers;
 - work with Activity Co-ordinators to develop the offer within the independent living schemes;
 - continue effective working with existing partners and continue to develop relationships with new ones.

Following questions from the committee, the following additional information was provided:

- residents who do not live in a Nottingham City Homes property are also being targeted by officers (neighbourhood police and community groups);
- Community Champions are used to promote local activities and sessions;
- groups that already exist and meet are approached, in order for members to be signposted to relevant activities;
- a webpage is available for Fit in the Community, through the Nottingham City Homes website, which allows users to find activities local to them;
- TV adverts are helping to promote sports. However, advertising needs to be incorporated on a local level and it needs to be relevant for the audience it is aimed at;
- work is undertaken in each ward for 4 weeks at a time and officers are looking into extending the scheme across the whole city.

The Committee advised Mr Barradell to contact Central College Nottingham, as they have groups which work with harder to reach communities.

RESOLVED to note the report and that the thanks of the Committee to Mr Barradell for the informative presentation be recorded.

Leigh White, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented the report, informing the Committee of the latest position regarding the Area Capital Fund 2013-15 for Berridge and Sherwood wards.

40 WARD PERFORMANCE QUARTER 3 - UPDATE

John Marsh, Locality Manager, presented the report and also provided an update from Nottinghamshire Police, due to the Committee receiving apologies from Inspector Yates. The main points were as follows:

Sherwood ward

- 1) Burglary overall an increase of 27 offences;
- 2) Robbery overall a reduction of 12 offences;
- 3) Theft from motor vehicle overall a reduction of 10 offences;
- 4) Violence with injury overall an increase of 15 offences.

The Drayton Street area has become a hotspot for fly tipping and general uncleanliness, so an action plan has been developed to improve this area. Work is being undertaken to look at redeveloping Peggy's Park.

Crime overall is up by 2% for the year to date. During Quarter 3 there was a decrease of 43 crimes compared to Quarter 3 in 2013.

Cleanliness is up by 6% compared to last year. There have been 6 incidents of graffiti, showing a decrease of 63%. There has also been a decrease in incidents of fly tipping compared to the same quarter last year.

Berridge ward

- 1) Burglary overall an increase of 35 offences. A micro beat in Forest Fields is now incorporated as part of Operation Graduate;
- 2) Robbery overall an increase of 5 offences;
- 3) Theft from motor vehicle overall a reduction of 17 offences;
- 4) Violence with injury overall an increase of 20 offences.

Berridge and Sherwood Area Committee - 19.02.15

The ASB patrol car operates every other week in the ward. Crime has decreased by 17% for the year to date, with a total of 313 being reported.

The index score for cleanliness for Quarter 3 is 93%, which has exceeded the Neighbourhood Target of 86%.

1 incident of graffiti has been reported compared to 12 the previous year. This is a decrease of 92%. Incidences of fly tipping have also decreased by 34%.

The Committee raised concerns about the accuracy of statistics provided in the reports, as they did not seem consistent but, as no representative from Nottinghamshire Police was present at the meeting, this could not be discussed further. A resident present at the meeting also raised a question in relation to the crime statistics, but an answer could not be provided.

RESOLVED

- (1) to note the ward performance quarter 3 report and the Police update;
- (2) that the Chair, Councillor Ibrahim, raise with Nottinghamshire Police the issue of non-representation at this Committee and request measures are put in place to ensure a senior officer attends every Area 5 Committee meeting;
- (3) that the Locality Manager request Nottinghamshire Police email Committee members an explanation of the statistics prior to the next meeting;
- (4) that the next meeting contain an item specifically on crime;
- (5) that the Locality Manager analyse the statistics provided for cleanliness, fly tipping and graffiti for the year to date to show monthly variation and inform Committee members accordingly.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget approved in March 2013, Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million Citywide from 2013-2015.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people.

- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances, such as economic conditions and change in land values.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

The ward performance reports provide updates on key issues and themes which link back to local priorities and strategic themes in the Nottingham Plan 2020. The reports provide summary updates on the following key themes:

- ward priorities;
- community engagement;
- Finance
- safer theme crime and anti-social behaviour (ASB);
- neighbourhood theme environmental issues and housing;
- working theme unemployment rates;
- housing;
- community protection;
- fire;
- health theme local health priorities.

The following is a brief summary by the respective ward Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs):

<u>Ward: Berridge</u> NDOs: Debbie Royle and Beth Hanna

Ward data is given for Quarter 4 (January-March). Data is compared with the same time frame in 2014.

Ward Priorities:

Berridge Ward Priorities for April - June 2015 can be seen on the front page of the appendices. These priorities are reviewed quarterly with key partners via the monthly Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) meetings. We continue to focus on improving parks and open spaces and traffic management and parking issues. We are following up actions from the Environmental Week of Action at the end of March that engaged with the community to make improvements to the public realm. We contribute to the Central Locality Domestic Violence Forum Action Plan to prevent Domestic Violence that accounts for approximately half of reported violent crimes in the ward. We are working with registered social landlords to improve communication of environmental issues, including waste management, to tenants and workers. We are leading on the Central Roma working group to develop an action plan and are currently looking at environmental and educational issues.

Community Engagement:

NDOs have organised monthly Ward Walks in the ward. Local Action Group meetings take place every 6 weeks throughout the ward. We have organised a Family Spring Fun Event with a range of activities and stalls, including the planting of hanging baskets to brighten up Berridge Road, working with traders to improve the area. We have been working with partners including community groups to develop work with new and emerging communities including the Central Locality Roma Working Group. We continue to engage and support community groups in applying for the Councillor Ward Budget including a new Social Café to open at the New Basford Community Centre.

Crime:

Crime has increased by 10% (152Crimes) in Berridge for the year to date with a total of 1743 being reported during the year. In Quarter 4, there is a decrease of 2% with 7 less crimes for the same Quarter last year..

<u>ASB:</u>

Year to date ASB in the ward has decreased by 1% with 2 fewer incidents reported.

Criminal Damage

Year to date Criminal Damage in the ward has decreased by 1% with 1 fewer incidents reported.

<u>Cleanliness:</u>

The index score for Berridge for Quarter 4 is 91% which has exceeded the Neighbourhood Target of 86%. This is a decrease of 2% compared to last year.

Graffiti Reports:

3 incidents were reported, compared to 16 in the previous year. This is a decrease of 81%.

Flytipping:

329 incidents were reported year to date compared to 563 the previous year. This is a decrease of 42%.

Unemployment Rate:

Unemployment has fallen year to date by 20% from 11714 to 9426.

Deliberate Fires

Year to date there were 8 fewer fires (30 compared to 38) than the previous year – this represents a decrease of 21%.

Ward: Sherwood NDOs: Lylse-Anne Renwick and Angela Bolton

Ward Data is given for Quarter 4 (January-March). Data is compared with the same time frame in 2014.

Ward Priorities:

Our current neighbourhood priorities are to tackle ASB issues in Pirate Park, start additional consultation on Peggy's Park redevelopment and continue to work with partners to improve issues in the areas surrounding Nottingham Prison and to support our community centres.

Community Engagement:

NDOs have organised 3 ward walks in different parts of the ward and have visited residents to hear specific concerns about their streets. We also had an on-site NAT meeting at Pirate Park.

Crime:

Crime overall has slightly increased in this quarter. During quarter 4 incidents has increased by 50.

<u>ASB:</u> - ASB has increased this quarter. The incidents increased by 61 from 85 (Q4 2013/14) to 146 (Q4 2014/15), 72% increase compared to the same period last year.

<u>Criminal Damage:</u> - Incidents increased by 3 from 47 (Q4 2013/14) to 50 (Q4 2014/15) a 3% increase compared t the same quarter last year.

<u>Theft</u>: - Theft has remained the same as in this quarter $4 \ 2013/14 - 107$. There has been no change.

<u>Violence</u>: - Incidents has increased by 2 from 64 (Q4 2013/14) to 66 incidents (Q4 2014/15) a 3% increase as against the same quarter last year.

<u>Burglary Dwelling</u>: - Burglary dwelling has decreased by 2 from 26 (Q4 2013/14) to 24 (Q4 2014/15) a 2% decrease.

The Locality Targets will be focussed on during the Week of Action.

<u>Cleanliness:</u> - There have been no change to the cleanliness score. The number of incidents remains the same – 92. The expected cleanliness score for the city is 86%.

<u>Graffiti Reports:</u> - Graffiti incidents has decreased by 5 from 11 (Q4 2014/14) to 6 (Q4 2014/15), a 45% decrease.

Fly Tipping: - Incidents has decreased by 29 from 45 to 16, a 64% decrease.

<u>Unemployment:</u> - The number of unemployed decrease by 443 a 30% decrease.

- 2.3 The Ward Performance report captures work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as the Ward Action Plan, NAT action log, Crime and Drug Partnership (CDP) plans and other partners' implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance reports are co-ordinated by NDOs, with data analysis undertaken by the CDP.

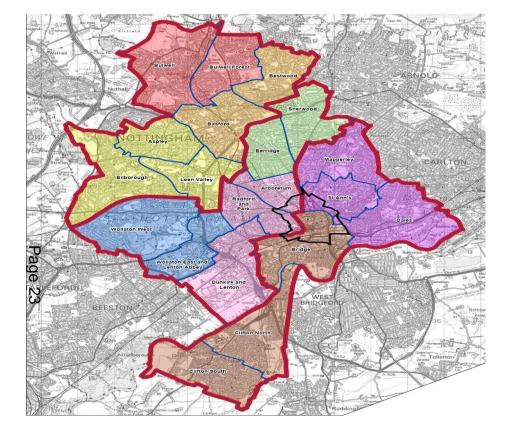

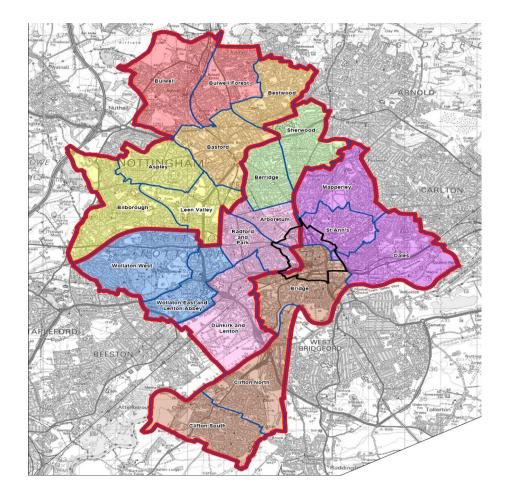

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Sums of £19,557 for the Berridge Ward and £165,569 for the Sherwood Ward remain for housing environmental improvements for the year 2015/2016. This includes any carry over figures.
- 2.2 The proposed schemes must fit at least one of the following criteria:
 - improvement of security for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. door entry, lighting, fencing, garage sites);
 - improvement of the environment for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. dealing with graffiti reducing anti-social behaviour, parking issues, drying areas resurfacing);
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- improvement of spaces for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. installation of community facilities or areas on land under NCH management).
- 2.3 Suggestions for schemes may be from a number of sources including Tenants and Leaseholders, Tenants and Residents Groups, Councillors, Local Area Group meetings, Ward Walks, Area Panel, Housing Patch Managers and Neighbourhood Development Officers.
- 2.4 Any amount left in the Housing Environmental funding budget will carry over into the new financial year and can be allocated for schemes identified in the year 2015-16.

3. OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 None.

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS (INCLUDING VALUE FOR MONEY)

- 4.1 NCH has provided a quotation for the proposed work via an agreed competitive tendering process.
- 4.2 Once a City wide programme is agreed, works will be carried out by approved contractors and it is anticipated that further savings may be found. It is anticipated that more schemes may be completed as a result of these savings.

- 5.1 To ensure local development in decision-making the Area Panel and Local Area Groups have been actively involved in the process. Local Tenant and Resident groups have also been consulted and a full consultation of residents has taken place in the affected blocks.
- 5.2 The Housing Environment Fund will enable a series of improvements to take place that will improve security, spaces and the environment for local people.
- 5.3 The funds available are limited and are targeted at the most vulnerable tenants in the area within the criteria set out at section 2.2 of this report.

6.1 As this report does not include proposals for new or changing policies, or services an Equality Impact Assessment has not been carried out. However these proposals aim to improve the quality of life and wellbeing for residents.
