# 40 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES

Further to minute 30 dated 3 December 2014, Chris Holloway, Nottingham City Homes, presented the report, detailing the latest position in West Area in regard to the Decent Homes Standard, the door and slate roof replacement programmes, regeneration and environmental schemes, key messages from the Tenant and Leasehold Congress and updates from Tenant's and Resident's Associations. The main points were as follows:

# • Denton Green, Broxtowe

The new build of 4 x one-bed bungalows is well under way and a completion date of April 2015 is expected.

### • Cranwell Road, Strelley

Project delayed due to a bat survey.

# Keverne Court

Passenger lift replacement to commence by end of financial year.

### • Lindfield Road, Broxtowe

Work is ongoing for the creation of brick walls with a low level railing to sit on top, installing a single and double gate where necessary between numbers 177 and 252.

During discussion, Ward Councillors stated that NCH need to realise that 3-bed properties are not required in the Aspley area and more emphasis should be given to 1 and 2-bed dwellings instead.

# **RESOLVED** to note the latest position in regard to Nottingham City Homes' works and performance.

### 41 AREA JOBS PLAN

The report was presented by Nigel Jackson, Employment and Skills Manager, and Audrey Leach, Groundwork. The main points were as follows:

- Nottingham City Council is committed to reducing unemployment and Groundwork is funded to co-ordinate employment and skills activity in West Area Wards. They engage with the local community to attempt to remove barriers which are causing unemployment;
- there are 5 key priorities:
  - increase the employment rate of the working age population;
  - increase the number of adults with Level 2 Skills;
  - lead and deliver a community coordination strategy for employment and training;

- incorporate financial inclusion, benefit and debt advice in provision;
- deliver a programme of community recruitment and information events;
- Groundwork work with partners to engage those in the community who are the hardest to reach. They work on 3 key areas work ethics, English and maths skills and work experience;
- West Area has a diverse range of residents and is one of the most deprived areas in the city;
- work is ongoing with local schools to ensure that support is being offered to young people and that employability is on the school's agenda;
- help is being provided to local smaller communities (such as to the Kurdish community in Area 5) to assist in increasing their employability;
- self-referral is now permitted to allow more people to enter the programme, with 21 new starters in the last 6 months;
- the programme is placing a high focus on literacy and numeracy skills as those are considered most important by prospective employers;
- the Jobs Plan is area-focussed so includes all agencies, not just Groundwork..

# **RESOLVED** to note the actions in the plan and thank Mr Jackson and Ms Leach for the informative presentation.

### 42 <u>'FIT IN THE COMMUNITY' PROJECT</u>

Siobhan Reilly (Project Development Officer) presented the report. The main points were as follows:

- Fit in the Community is a three year sports project which is being run between Nottingham City Council and Nottingham City Homes (NCH);
- the aim of the project is to get 5,500 social housing tenants more active. This has been broken down into 3 age groups 14-24, 25-59 and 60+;
- the project is looking at making sports in the community more accessible and to provide potential users with training and support;
- NCH staff, neighbourhood police, community groups and champions all help to engage and identify potential users. The sessions which are offered are free and NCH tenants can also access volunteering opportunities in a wide range of training, including first aid, disability awareness and safeguarding;
- to date, almost 1,000 tenants and city residents have taken part in the project;
- the next steps are to:

- increase participation by women and girls, linking to the 'This Girl Can' campaign;
- continue to build the community workforce and to develop casual community coaches and community volunteers;
- work with Activity Co-ordinators to develop the offer within independent living schemes;
- continue effective working with existing partners and continue to develop relationships with new ones.

In response to questions from the committee, the following additional information was provided:

- NCH provide the statistics, including residency details, so monitoring of where users live can be undertaken;
- the project was trialled in Aspley and St Ann's and work is undertaken in each ward for 4 weeks at a time. Officers are looking at extending the scheme across the whole city;
- residents who do not live in an NCH property are also targeted by officers;
- Community Champions are used to promote local activities and sessions and details are included in the NCH newsletter;
- groups that already exist and meet are approached, in order for members to be signposted to relevant activities;
- a webpage is available for 'Fit in the Community', through the NCH website, which allows users to find activities local to them;
- TV adverts are helping to promote sports. However, advertising needs to be more 'local level' and it needs to be relevant for the audience it is aimed at.

# **RESOLVED** to note the report and thank Ms Reilly for the informative presentation.

# 43 NOTTINGHAM CITY SERVICES

The Committee received a presentation by Heidi May, North Locality Manager (Neighbourhood Services), regarding the work of City Services, which includes services such as street cleaning, bin collections and graffiti removal. The main points were as follows:

- 90% of reported fly tipping, graffiti and dog fouling was cleared within 48 hours and every street in the city is included in a 12-month cycle of inspection;
- the cleansing index scores for January 2015 were Aspley 87%, Bilborough 88% and Leen Valley 88%;
- there was now a more flexible workforce, which meant that issues got resolved quicker. Partnership working has also led to quicker resolutions;

- challenges to productivity are bins wrongly presented, dog fouling, fly tipping etc and the public need educating to change behaviours;
- proposals for 2015 include a bin sensor pilot for Aspley, new ways of working to improve productivity, moving apprentices into full time vacancies and income generation.

# **RESOLVED** that the thanks of the Committee to Ms May for the informative presentation be recorded.

# 44 BULKY WASTE SERVICES

The Committee received a presentation by Ryan Oliff, Waste and Recycling Team Leader, regarding the work of the Bulky Waste Service, which includes bin and skip collections. The main points were as follows:

- in 2014, the service emptied over 7 million bins, collected 50,000+ bulky waste jobs, delivered 7,500 new or replacement bins and removed 1,500 abandoned bins;
- 'bulky waste' is classed as household items that are too big for the normal bin, and the service will also collect 'white goods' and electrical items (by appointment only);
- the service is in different areas of the city each day, with West area being on a Wednesday, and is free for city residents;
- the waste collected is taken to Wastecycle, Colwick, where it gets sorted and recycled etc.

# **RESOLVED** that the thanks of the Committee to Mr Oliff for the informative presentation be recorded.

### 45 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES

The Committee received a presentation by Chris Holloway, Nottingham City Homes (NCH), regarding the work they undertook to meet the 'Neighbourhood Nottingham' theme of the Nottingham Plan 2020. The main points were as follows:

- what is working well:
  - partnership arrangements;
  - strict enforcement (fly tipping, graffiti etc);
  - Responsible Tenant Reward;
  - skips (hire, collection etc);
- challenges:
  - Welfare Reform and the current economic downturn;
  - disputed ownership;
  - available resources;
  - staff turnover and vacancies;

- plans for 2015 include:
  - a move from the 'Decent Homes Standard' to a 'Decent Neighbourhoods' programme;
  - improving Green Spaces (such as Munford Circus);
  - creating dementia-friendly gardens and public spaces;
  - creating new allotments and 'grow your own' opportunities.

# RESOLVED that the thanks of the Committee to Mr Holloway for the informative presentation be recorded.

# 46 <u>COMMUNITY PROTECTION SERVICES</u>

The Committee received a presentation by John Davis, North Locality Manager (Community Protection), regarding the service. The main points were as follows:

- Community Protection is a nationally unique service created to tackle ASB and enviro-crime;
- the service includes:
  - 100 Community Protection Officers and 30 auxiliary CPOs providing a visible presence in neighbourhoods;
  - Enforcement Officers investigate serious ASB and enviro-crime, provide witness care and compile court cases (and attend as a professional witness if required);
  - Environmental Health deal with issues such as housing standards, pest control, dog wardens and pollution control;
  - Trading Standards customer protection providers;
  - Food Safety ensure all food sold in the City is safe to eat and provide a food hygiene rating of businesses;
  - Parking Services Civil Enforcement Officers (parking wardens) enforce yellow lines, zig-zags, parking meters etc;
  - CCTV monitoring of 203 street cameras and 1,000 high-rise flats cameras (also monitor flats' fire alarms and door-entry systems);
  - taxi licensing for all hackney carriage and private hire taxis in the City (including enforcement and customer complaints).

This report provides Councillors with the latest spend proposals under the Area Capital Fund and Nottingham City Homes (NCH) Environmental Improvements.

#### Recommendations

That the Committee:

(a) notes the Area Capital Fund and NCH Environmental Improvements monies available to Aspley, Bilborough and Leen Valley wards as outlined in Appendices 1 and 2;

(b) approves the committed schemes for Leen Valley and Bilborough Wards and the decommitted scheme in the Bilborough Ward as highlighted in Appendices 1 and 2.

# 1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2013 an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million citywide for 2013-15.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

# 2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.2 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme, have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.3 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.4 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.5 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

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## Anti Social Behaviour : Problem Solving and Performance

In summary ASPLEY WARD issues.

- No burglary problem. Seasonal increase in shed breaks in the summer. Most of our burglary offenders who live on patch offend off patch, that is they are travelling criminals.
- AUTOCRIME. No problems. Two weeks ago we had a one off issue with three offenders who were arrested. The low level issue is people leaving valuables in vehicles that are on show and then stolen. This includes tools left in vans.
- Domestic Violence. Whilst the headline stats are a decrease in DV we are not seeing a reduction in calls to service. Therefore we believe the problem is still a priority and high demand. We have a significant number of repeat victims, a number of which are high risk. The high risk are managed by Domestic Violence Team, we manage the interventions on the medium risk.
- Cannabis –we manage the problem of cannabis by risk assessing due to our limited resources. The problem of cannabis grows being robbed from house is a concern due to the associated violence either through threats or actual assault. This also includes offenders getting the wrong house and threatening an innocent person. Cannabis is easily available on the estates with young people as well as adults smoking it.
- Neighbourhood Priority Woodfield Rd three families are the hub of issues. We are targeting them through partnership working. Exploring the use of CCTV and civil enforcement as well as criminal enforcement.
- ASB On the Street on the estates mainly young people. Areas of focus include Allendale Avenue on Aspley and Woodfield Rd/The Rocks (both ASB with youths hanging around and Mini Motos entering the Country Park.)
- Other issues Shop Theft. We are working with our Precrime department to reduce this. Starting with Iceland Store on Nuthall Rd.

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#### February 2015

### **BILBOROUGH WARD ASB PRIORITY FEBRUARY 2015**

There have been recent incidents of ASB and criminal damage along Bracebridge drive in Bilborough. The locations reporting a problem have been at the Coop Store. A group of up to 10 youths have been causing a nuisance to staff and customers accessing the store. This group have also been seen to gather in the car park of the Pelican Pub which is very close. Although we cannot connect this group to reports of damage to Bus shelters, it is highly likely that members of this group are involved. This is a recent problem and is not connected with to the same core group that have been the focus of previous priorities in the area. Core members of this group are relatively new to the area and have begun to form links with some local youth who have come to Police notice in the past.

#### <u>Update</u>

Trading standards completed test purchases in the area. Patrols were adjusted to deal with the levels of ASB. Over 20 joint warning visits were completed to young people involved and their families. Appropriate warnings were put in place. We have monitored the behaviour of the young people visited and warned. The vast majority have kept away from trouble. They are still in the area but the behaviour of the main group has improved. This enabled us to identify those in the group who were still adamant to cause problems. Our process has ensured that this small minority are identified quickly and understand that we see through each and every incident that they are involved in. This quickly escalates through the 5 step process and links into to possible Tenancy action. Although now only a couple have come to notice recently, this has been for incidents reported in other areas of the City and not related to the ASB in this plan.

#### NOVEMBER 2014

#### **BILBOROUGH WARD ASB PRIORITY NOVEMBER 2014**

We have identified numerous locations on our area that have been targeted by a group of local youths. It appears that the attraction to these locations is that they can gather out of the public eye and away from directed patrols. This results in an increase in ASB and low level crime in the area.

Complaints have been made from residents around underage drinking and noise. The below locations are all properties occupied by vulnerable members of the community.

#### Location

Cuxton Close Strelley Nottingham.

Glenbrook Crescent Beechdale Nottingham.

Fremount Drive Beechdale Nottingham.

Bracebridge Drive Bilborough Nottingham.

#### <u>Update</u>

With all the locations identified we have now seen a reduction in calls to service regarding the youths involved in this plan. Attention to these locations through high visibility patrols have acted as a real deterrent. Our links with Social care and NCH have highlighted vulnerabilities that have resulted in one elderly male being moved to warden aided housing as a temporary measure.

Our efforts to maintain attention on the small number of youths involved, has led to lots of multi-agency safeguarding meetings. These meeting were based around several of the youths and they have been dealt with as a group by all services involved. This has led to a more constructive and effective process rather than discussing them separately. One of this group is now in secure accommodation. The others are subject to regular intervention. This is an on-going process. However the impact on the community is now relatively low. We have seen a reduction in incidents involving these youths however they are still the focus of lots more intervention.

Housing action has taken place.

Current assessment of this priority is that the impact of these youths in the community, and the vulnerable locations identified has reduced significantly. I will close this priority as completed.

The vulnerable people and the youths concerned will continue to access the services of Police and other agencies. As they have done before this issue was discovered. This priority has stopped this group preying on the individuals identified and put in place Social care support/review for all involved.

#### AUGUST 2014

### BILBOROUGH WARD ASB PRIORITY MAY 2014

We have seen a developing trend around criminal damage on the Bilborough ward over recent weeks. Several Buses have been targeted along Bracebridge Drive and Wigman road. Windows have been smashed and NCT have recently considered removing the service. We have also seen an increase in criminal damage at Glenbrook School on Wigman road. 46 windows have been smashed over recent weeks.

We have put initial patrols into the area concerned which has had an effect. However it is clear that we need to identify the suspects and address this clear disregard for public safety and the nuisance to essential public services.

#### <u>Update</u>

During this period extensive patrols were put in place. Keys were obtained for vulnerable locations to assist with access. We utilised TROJAN Bus and completed patrols with the Bus company. Youths were stopped during patrols in the areas of concern. However there was no evidence to link any these youths to the damage previously reported. Home visits were conducted to offer advice and warnings about being on these locations without permission.

No further incidents were reported and the high visibility has been successful. Victim satisfaction was also improved as our patrols were regularly spotted by on site management. There was a risk of the Bus company removing a vital service to the area due to the incidents being reported. As a result of our joint patrols with the company this did not happen.

Both of these issues would have had a clear impact on the community had they not been dealt with. The School would have not been able to open for the new term. Many would have been restricted without having a Bus service running through the community.

#### 12 MAY 2014

### BILBOROUGH WARD ASB PRIORITY MAY 2014

Our previous priority identified a group of youths causing problems at an identified location. Measures put in place have restricted this group's ability to attend this address. This has resolved the issue; however the youths identified have been responsible for ASB across the Bilborough ward. Each time we tackle an issue at a location this group (OR MEMBER OF THIS GROUP) can be seen to be involved. Lots of work has gone into tackling localised ASB - we do not currently have any specific location on the Bilborough ward that is suffering protracted ASB or crime.

The aim of this priority is to deal with the Youths we have identified. It is clear that when these youths gather we have an increase in ASB and low level crime. Some of this group have recently been dealt with for motoring offences involving scooters, failing to stop, TWOC. By targeting this group, being fluid with our patrols and actions we can maintain our efforts to reduce their offending.

Our engagement shows that the community are concerned about youths hanging around, Rowdy nuisance behaviour, speeding vehicles. It is clear that by concentrating on this group we will capture the concerns of the community and be targeting the right people in the right places.

#### <u>Update</u>

This tactic has allowed us to continue to work with the few youths concerned to reduce risk to themselves and the community. Safeguarding meetings continue and information sharing has gone a long way to stop members of this group offending further. Due to the amount of low level crime and ASB associated with these individuals, it is appropriate that our priority remains concentrated on them.

#### **BILBOROUGH WARD**

#### 4th February 2014

#### **BILBOROUGH WARD ASB PRIORITY - February 2014**

#### Glenbrook Crescent Denewood

This address is attracting visits from youths in the area. Once at the address there are complaints of noise and possible Drug taking (smoking Cannabis). We can also see that there are similar reports in the local area which suggests the same youths visiting the location are responsible for low level crime and ASB as they travel to and from this location.

#### <u>Update</u>

This priority was set up to deal with a group that were attending a specific location and causing ASB in the area. The resident of this address is a Wheel chair user who allowed access to these youths and was not assisting agencies trying to deal with the problems being caused. As a result of this priority Tenancy action was taken against this male and an injunction was quickly secured. Our patrols were also increased at this location. NCH are currently looking for suitable accommodation for this male.

As a result we can see that calls to this location have reduced. These youths have not returned to the address and to date the occupant has begun to engage with other agencies. The neighbours are all elderly and this is a significant factor that we recognise. However we have achieved the aim of this priority which was to reduce calls to this location. There are very clear strict measures in place to manage the issues at this location. As a result this priority will be closed. This male has since voluntarily left the address.

The youths identified have now moved on. We continue to work with other agencies to deal with them. They will remain the focus of our attention and our new priority will be around how we manage them and reduce their effect on the community.

#### LEEN VALLEY WARD

#### May 2015

This priority was put in place to deal with a spike in criminal damage on Aspley Lane, between the SPAR shop and Beacon Public house. Several cars were attacked by a group of youths whilst stationary in traffic. These cars had the wing mirrors kicked from their vehicles. We could also see that there had been several damage reports to Bus shelters. We were not able to confirm if the incidents were linked to the same group.

#### <u>Update</u>

Patrols enabled us to identify a group of youths who were congregating in the location. This group were from various locations on the Aspley Ward. Although CCTV identified them being in the location during the reported damage, there was no evidence to prosecute further. Despite this we did visit each young person and speak with them and a parent. This has been recorded. Again the majority of the visits were met with support from the parents. Our patrols were increased in the area to ensure a visible deterrent. This priority will be closed.

#### LEEN VALLEY WARD

#### FEBRUARY 2015

Over recent weeks we have had calls to the Ainsley road area regarding a group of youths causing ASB. This group were spoken to and were aggressive and confrontational toward Police. Details were taken and it was established that this group were well known for various SAC offences across the City. Not all lived locally and it was obvious that they were visiting youths who do live in this area. Patrols were put in place and residents were spoken to as part of a priority survey. We have established that there is under reporting of incidents due to fear of possible reprisals of this group. A concern was that this group could be intimidating local residents. There have been reports of nuisance motorbikes being ridden around this location late at night.

#### <u>Update</u>

Joint visits completed and appropriate warnings put in place. This resulted in a reduction in the numbers gathering and fewer calls regarding ASB. One of the main nominals was charged with over 10 separate motoring offences. This was mainly to do with Mini motor's being ridden in a dangerous manor around the area. We also installed overt CCTV at the address of a local resident that had previously been targeted by members of this group. Identifying the main culprits ensured that we were able to concentrate them. The beat team used evidence from offences that they had committed locally, they also investigated matters from other LAC areas to ensure that they were dealt with as a priority. Plan closed.

#### LEEN VALLEY WARD

#### November 2014

Anti-Social behaviour and thefts from Allotments along Southfield road Ainsley estate.

A family had recently moved into the location and we very quickly started to get complaints about the behaviour of one of the Children. This ranged from low level criminal damage, to racial abuse.

#### <u>Update</u>

Joint visit was conducted and appropriate warnings put in place. The beat team made efforts to try and use the Restorative Justice route to repair any problems this youth had caused. Support from this youths Mother also contributed to solving this issue. Referrals for support were made. We have not had a repeat of these problems since.

#### LEEN VALLEY WARD

#### August 2014

As the weather gets warmer and when the schools break up for summer holidays, there is an increasing number of young people congregating in the open spaces on the ward, namely King George V Park and Melbourne Park. There have also been reports of fires being started on these parks. These reports have come from the Fire Service and also from local residents.

The community have informed us that one of their main priorities and worries is in relation to rowdy nuisance behaviour, and some mention the parks specifically, including the alleys/gates which are at the park entrances. There have also been reports of young people, possibly underage, drinking and this also causes concern for the community. There has been information from the community about young people being on the park and throwing stones at the windows of residents bordering the park as well.

Along with this specific ASB there has also been mention of the community's concerns about dog fouling and littering in the whole of the ward, including the parks. There is one incident recently from Melbourne Park in relation to a motorbike, so this could be an indication that there is more to come, particularly as there is a drive at the minute to tackle the mini moto problem on Broxtowe Country Park. It is likely that when the problem is moved on from there the suspects will move onto other open spaces, and these are two of the closest locations.

Historically, in previous years there have been reports of fires being set on the parks and so this is another indication that this problem needs to be addressed as it is showing to be a trend in the summer months.

#### <u>Update</u>

This priority was put in place to pre-empt the possibility of calls increasing during the summer months. Unless there are any other issues of concern. We revert to patrolling open spaces, parks etc. Providing reassurance and reducing incidents called in.

### **SUMMARY**

Over the last 12 months our aim has always been to reflect the fears and concerns of the community. Research shows that Rowdy nuisance behaviour and groups of youths hanging around have always been high up on the list for residents in Bilborough. I am happy that as a result of this, our efforts to deal with certain groups of young people in the area have also enabled us to reduce associated crime. By tackling the right people at the right levels, with the right people has contributed to the success we have had.

The priorities that we have planned over the past 12 months have not all been about the same group of youths. It has been a difficult year. As soon as we appeared to control one situation then we quickly became aware of another potential issue. Our strengths have been our ability to work as a team; we are all able to do something.

- To make sure the NPT's take ownership of the partnership work where the child lives. This child may be causing issues on another beat area, or even ward. This ownership means that every incident, every breach has a consequence. If the NPT's do this for each other it will put an element of control and consistency on the family and their responsibilities.
- Joint visits to be conducted. Warnings to be implemented ASAP.
- Identify the main offenders. Concentrate attention on them to ensure any incidents involving them are captured and dealt with appropriately.
- Identify recent new associations. Individually these youths may not cause much concern. Taken as a group the impact can be much greater.
- We have at times utilised our own ASB patrols to ensure there is consistent attention in the right areas. Vulnerable locations and people are identified and patrols are adjusted.
- Utilise the Alert system use of this system to link in proactive patrols. Publishing officer contact details.
- Quality Priorities that identify the fact that people involved in ASB can also be responsible for crime.

#### ANTI SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR: PROBLEM SOLVING AND PERFORMANCE - COMMUNITY PROTECTION

#### West Area Committee Report; January to March 2015

Uniformed Services is the uniformed frontline services and processing teams within Community Protection. It also covers, CCTV, fines processing, residential and blue badge permits.

The core purpose of the service is public safety through the regulation and enforcement of Council functions.

Community Protection is commissioned by Nottingham City Council and hosted by the City Division of Nottinghamshire Police. Community Protection contributes to the long term vision for the City of Nottingham for 2030; Go ahead Nottingham, Safe, Clean, Ambitious, Proud. It does this through the alignment of its business and activity to the priority headings within the Sustainable Communities Strategy, particularly but not exclusively Safer and Cleaner Nottingham.

The purpose of Uniformed Services is to deliver a Safer Nottingham for our Citizens through the provision of a single, integrated, uniformed compliance and enforcement function.

#### The outcomes of Community Protection, in line with the Council's priorities are.

- Delivery statutory services in line with legislation to ensure public safety.
- Support the Nottingham offer through compliance and enforcement to ensure public safety.
- Making lawful and proportionate use of monitoring and surveillance to ensure public safety.
- Supporting a safer transport network.
- Provision of services to support the night time economy to contribute to wider public safety
- Discharge the Council's statutory functions in relation to Public Safety, Protection and Wellbeing.
- Responsive to customer and Councillor Needs

#### **Deliver CP's core values**

Community Protection has five over-arching values which emphasise the expected work- ethic of its organisation:

- We do what's right, not what's easy We're fair, this isn't about quick fixes
- We're proud of ourselves and we're proud of Nottingham First impressions matter
- We constantly innovate to get quicker and fitter value for money and getting things done
- Whatever we do, we always do our best
- We're here to make life better this is what drives us

This report will deliver a brief overview of Community Protections work in relation to the Safer aspect of Nottingham City Councils agenda. Below you will find figures, broken down into ward areas, which cover the last quarter of the 2014-2015 business year in relation to the West Area constituting Aspley, Bilborough and Leen Valley.

The figures have been drawn from the Weekly Respect figures that Community Protection Officers produce, that demonstrate the types and numbers of the most commonly occurring issues that we encounter via proactive patrolling, intelligence and the priorities of our Citizens and Councillors.

#### Definitions

**FPN** – Fixed Penalty Notice, these are issued to offenders to allow them a chance to discharge the offence that FPN was issued for by way of a fine. The majority of the FPNs issued for each Ward were for littering offences with 1 (one) on Aspley and Bilborough issued for someone failing to clean up after their dog.

**Dog Op** – Dog Fouling is a priority for many of our Citizens and the CPOs perform regular Dog Fouling Operations both ad hoc and intelligence led basis at Hotspot areas where Dog Fouling has been identified as a persistent issue. **Scrap** – This refers to checks on Scrap Metal Dealers, the CPOs will approach people they see collecting scrap metal and check that they have the requisite licenses and transfer notes, in an effort to tackle illegal scrap metal dealing and theft.

LBA – Letters Before Action are issued by CPOs when they identify an Environmental Issue, such as a property or area with a large accumulation of waste. The LBA gives the owner of the property a specified amount of time to rectify the issue. Whist this may not at first glance appear to relate directly to the Safer agenda, we can see from the Broken Window theory that 'run down', 'unkempt' and neglected areas and properties can attract anti-social behaviour and so as well as improving the general appearance of the Neighbourhoods, tackling this issue also helps reduce the likelihood of ASB.

**Noise** – or Noise Intervention Visits. Noise has been an emerging priority now for some time and whilst we have a robust system in place to address this issue it does require a period of evidence gathering, whilst the issue can potentially continue. As we seek to offer continuing support to our citizens and also to assist in the evidence gathering process, we encourage those people who feel they are suffering from Noise Nuisance to call us every time. Therefore whilst these figures may seem high some will represent repeated visits to the same addresses.

**Intel** – This figure represents Intelligence submissions entered by the CPOs on to the Police Intelligence system in relation to known and/or suspected offenders and suspicious incidents. Intelligence submissions can often form the final piece of the jigsaw to secure action against an offender and the CPOs being street level front line officers are ideally positioned to interact with communities to gather such intelligence.

**Casework** – This is a combined representation of the number of interventions the CPOs have undertaken in response to incidents reported to our ASB Line, through Councillor Case Work or our other internal systems. Casework runs the gamut from people reporting untidy gardens to Noise complaints to other forms of Anti-Social behaviour and aside the CPOs proactive work represents the majority of our day to day work.

Following is a small selection of the good work that has been carried out by the CPOs of the Broxtowe Team over the quarter:

#### Leen Valley

Kennington Road became a priority on the ward; CPO Siddons worked hard with NCH to tackle a wide range of issues (overgrown alleyways, messy gardens and ASB). CPO Siddons and CPO Johnson tackled the bins on street problem and between the two of them issued 17 FPN's. To date over 20 have been issued by other members of staff and there has been a vast visible improvement on Kennington as well as the surrounding areas.

CPO's Johnson and Siddons attending a dog chipping event set up my DCO Barber on Melbourne Park on the 30/04/15 during the event they raised awareness, handed out free goods and obtained Intel which was then used to plan future Ops in and across the wards.

#### Aspley

In April CPO's Butler and Johnson were called to a job where a Royal Mail bag full of opened and unopened post were discovered for addresses in the Broxtowe area. On attendance they recovered the Royal Mail bag and got in touch with the RM fraud and internal investigations department who collected the bag and thanked us for our efforts as this related to a job that occurred at Christmas. They also discovered a pair of illegally copied VRM plates that came back to an address in Broxtowe who were terrified to find out that they had had their plates cloned and thanked us for making sure that they would not be used for criminal activity. The VRM plates were surrendered to Police and submitted them as exhibits.

CPO's Johnson and Butler attended a job in the Aspley ward where the people involved were all identified as a group that had been causing a lot of ASB theft and criminal damage in the Aspley ward. They have since been heavily monitored by Police and CP. CP and NCH have conducted joint tenancy warnings on some of them to restrict their behaviour and as a result this group has been improving through these limitations.

#### Bilborough

CPO Butler and Ratcliffe attended a job that was called into both Fire and Police for a house fire that trapped a vulnerable older woman. CPO's Butler and Ratcliffe attended with fire conducting crowd management and scene press for Fire to stop people walking through unless they lived nearby once the fire was maintained. On entry the Fire foreman informed the CPO's that there was a cannabis grow inside the address. The CPO's flagged this up to control that sent the cannabis dismantling team out who discovered and removed 40+ plants from the address. An excellent result for CP and the Police.

**Priority tasking** – Due to all the hard work from all members of the team and the intelligence they've provided the priority tasking for the Bilborough and Leen Valley wards have been closed off, tenancy warnings have also been issued by Ruth Norman off the back of all the hard work.

#### **Enforcement Officers**

Our Enforcement Officers that deal with the wider ASB and Environmental Legislation supported by the CPOs have had the following results recently in Broxtowe area. There are several other cases currently with our legal team.

1x Injunction secured against a male on St Michaels Ave; Cannabis Grow.

1x 5 Year Suspended Possession against NCH tenant on Fenwick Road; Cannabis Grow.

1x PDPA against address on Withern Road.

1x on-going Possession action against tenant on Coleby Road; Cannabis Grow.

2 x on-going Possession orders in Aspley and Bilborough for undisclosed reasons

#### **Emerging Issues**

Alongside our normal duties and continuing dedication to tackling Dog Fouling and reducing the impact of nuisance noise, the Broxtowe team are also currently working on a Partnership approach to tackle the increase in Anti-Social Behaviour on Broxtowe Country Park. The ASB reported in this area is mostly related to Off Road Motor Bikes and we intend to implement a robust plan using all the tools at our disposal to tackle this issue.

#### Other

Following a recent restructure with in Community Protection the position of Senior CPO for the Broxtowe team is vacant. We are currently recruiting for a new full time replacement but in the interim, SCPO Simon Whalley will be running the day to day management of the team. The new structure reduces the number of supervisors but looks for greater integration with parking enforcement which is often a cause of issues in an area.

Also our former base at Aspley Housing office has been closed and the CPO Team has been displaced to the Bulwell and Oxclose Lane Police Station whilst Broxtowe Police Station undergoes refurbishment. Cars have been provided to make sure that officers displaced during building work are able to get to the area quickly; the new Night Car service is having a real impact on both noise calls and general ASB. Simon is the SPOC for all councillor issues in the area and we are recruiting to fill both vacancies in the SCPO rank and front line colleagues.

## ASPLEY

## 1<sup>st</sup> April 2012 To 31<sup>st</sup> March 2015

#### **Description of the scheme**

There are 19 fully functional cameras installed at strategically positioned locations in the Aspley area.

There are also 4 columns used for the City Wide re-deployable cameras in the area and 1 re-deployable camera was used during the period of evaluation.

The system is operated and monitored 24 hours a day 365 days a year by trained and dedicated staff at the Nottingham City Council CCTV Control Centre.

During this period the CCTV Control Room carried out 198 Viewings and released 89 items of media to the Police.

Over this period we have linked in with our partner agencies on ASB operations such as OP CACOGEN

#### **Incidents of note**

<u>20/04/12 – CCTV</u> Officer James Pykett spotted a male acting suspiciously by the bus stop on Aspley Lane. Whilst monitoring the male was seen to bend down under the bus stop and take a handbag which belonged to a female who was sat waiting for a bus. The male then cycled off with the bag the owner of which was unaware. James kept the male on camera whilst he contacted the Police who attended and arrested the male and returned the bag back to its owner.

**10/06/13–** Suspicious male & vehicle spotted on Withern Rd. Police informed & directed to vehicle. Vehicle & male stopped & searched. Large amounts of deal bags & small amount of cannabis found.x3 male arrested.

**12/06/13-** After hearing of a fight on Lindfield Rd, CCTV Officers spotted a group and called Police. On Police arrival one male was found to have been stabbed. The group saw Police & CCTV observed an object being discarded in a hedge. Police were directed to the group & the location of the object. Police recovered a machete and some cannabis. Male & female from the group were arrested

**17/10/13** – Following reports of a car being abandoned in the middle of Alwyn Road, CCTV Officer checked playback and was able to see males leaving the car. He then checked the area and spotted the males changing clothes. Police were informed and arrested one male for possession of Class A drugs.

**02/12/13 –** CCTV Operator monitored x2 males with baseball bats chasing x2 other males up Westwood Road. Police were informed and attended. Two males were arrested. Footage was then supplied to the Officers.

<u>19/05/14 – CCTV</u> Officer Pykett observed a male hiding from the camera on Withern Road. Suspicious activity was then seen at the rear of a vehicle with items being loaded into the boot. The vehicle was then driven off and parked up on Broxtowe Lane, the male left the vehicle parked up and walked back up Coleby Rd.Police were informed and attended stopping the male on Coleby Road, the male was breath tested and found to be over the limit he also had cannabis on him. On checking the vehicle the boot was found to contain stolen red diesel. The male was arrested.

**14/08/2014** - Broxtowe Sgt contacted the Woodlands control room to inform officer J Pykett that a Dylan Denham was wanted. At 08:54 Woodlands officer sighted a male that the officer believed to be a Dylan Denham entering 178 Woodfield Road. Woodlands monitored the front and back door of the property and informed police. Police officers were onsite and 1 x male arrested (Dylan Denham) Police officers were offsite where they took Dylan Denham to Bridewell.

Development of in-house community mediation service, the service is due to be launched later in the year. We will soon be launching a marketing and recruitment campaign to recruit volunteers to deliver community mediation. Volunteers will be trained to accredited mediator status through NCHs tenant academy and supported by NCH's Community Mediation Officer. We will be looking to partners to help promote the recruitment campaign and encourage community interest.

In July 2015 NCH Housing Patch Managers and TEMs will be attending hate crime training delivered by the Sophy Lancaster Foundation. The training will be innovative and be delivered in a workshop format.

It will explore and challenge delegates stereotypes and beliefs system and give an understanding of the legal aspects around Hate Crime. It will recognise alternative subcultures and their relation to Hate Crime looking at the impact and effects of Hate Crime in the lives of victims, families, communities and perpetrators.

It will explore how to overcome barriers to reporting and effective partnership working.

NCH are about to commence development of our NCH tackling ASB and Crime strategy. Focus groups have already been held with partners, tenants and residents and staff.

#### 1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) Strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2015 a Local Transport Plan capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2015-2016.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

#### 2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

- 2.4 It was agreed by the North Locality Board, that the focus for the Board moving forward would be Employability, Domestic Violence and Violence, Public Realm and Anti Social Behaviour. The board will maintain a focus on crime, but the targets have been broadened out to reflect the local needs and priorities of the North. The Locality Board, together with partners will take a proactive approach. The board will be reviewing evidence including statistics every month to ensure good progress. Area Chairs, or their nominated representatives are invited. Minutes are issued to all Ward Councillors.
- 2.5 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the Crime and Drugs Partnership.

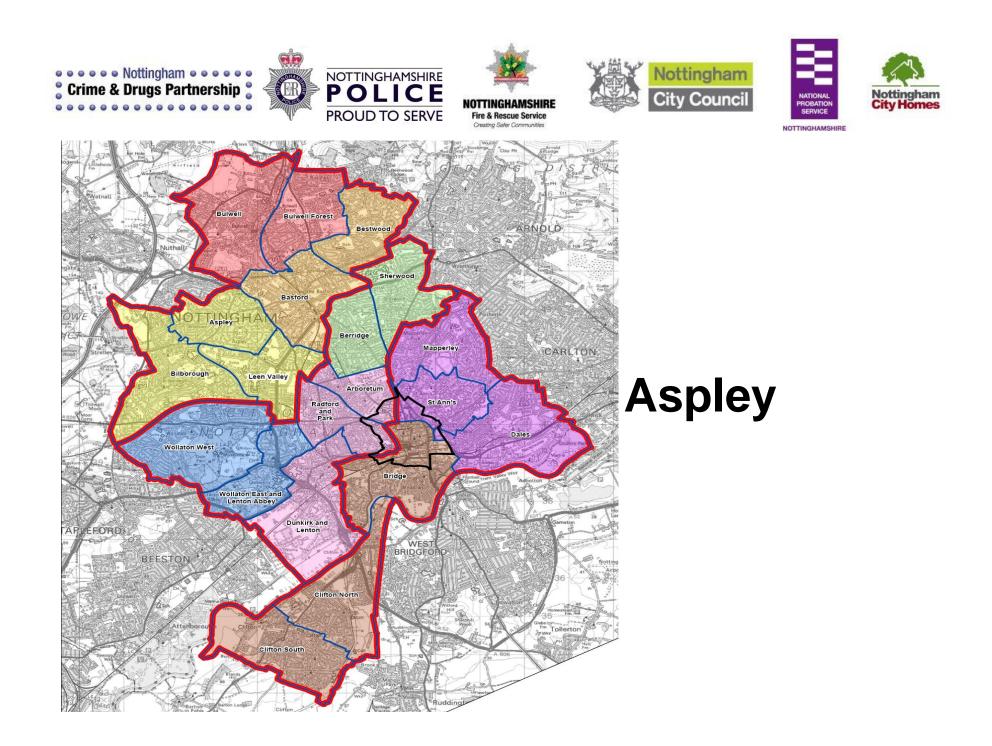

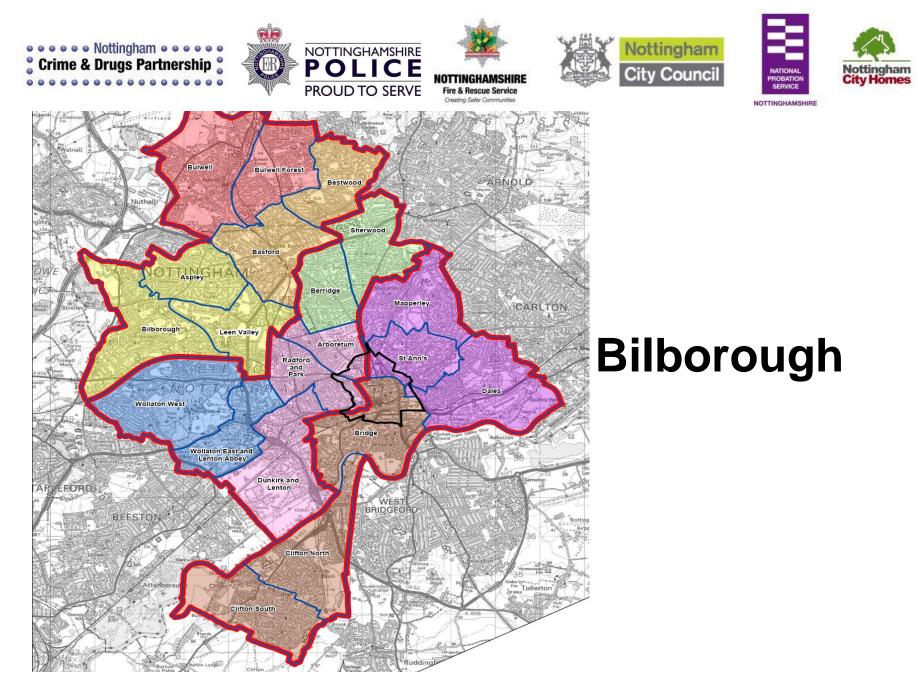

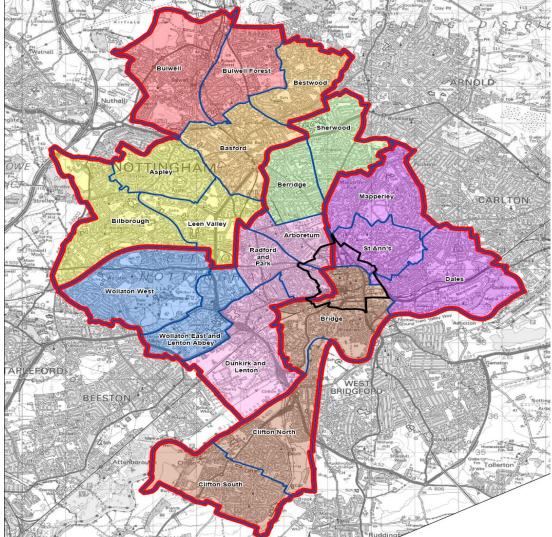
