29 <u>MINUTES</u>

The Committee agreed the minutes of the meeting held on 30 September 2015 as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

30 HEALTH AND WELLBEING STRATEGY ENGAGEMENT

James Rhodes, Strategic Insight Manager, introduced the report on behalf of health partners and gave a presentation on the development of the priorities for the next Health and Wellbeing Strategy, due to be launched in June 2016.

He informed attendees that there is a toolkit for groups to run their own engagement sessions and an online survey on the Health and Wellbeing website to feed in views. James also made paper copies of the survey available at the meeting.

Basford and Bestwood Area Committee - 25.11.15

Social isolation and loneliness has emerged as the most common issue from engagement sessions run so far. Other key issues include the cost of living; mental health, knowing what services are available, lifestyle factors and the disproportionate impact of poor health on BME communities.

The following points were raised in discussion:

- a) Social isolation and the difficulty in addressing it, as it is difficult to know who to target; the potential involvement of the Independent Living Co-ordinators in tackling social isolation and the possibility that older men may be more isolated than older women;
- b) Poor attendance, particularly of children, at dentists;
- c) The usefulness of the graphics in the slides presented by James, detailing key factors affecting the health of Nottingham city citizens, and how it would be helpful for this to be displayed in a range of locations across the area;
- d) The importance of the involvement of the Fire Authority more in health and wellbeing work;
- e) The need for councillors to be aware of what is going on in their communities and to have their say on how services should be shaped.

RESOLVED to note the report and to signpost and promote any engagement and consultation events/ activities amongst citizens in Area 2.

31 AREA PRIORITIES

The Chair informed the Committee that the Deputy Leader has asked all Area Committees to put forward key priorities for their area. The following issues were identified for further development in each ward and discussed to identify shared priorities for the area:

- a) Youth provision;
- b) Social isolation for older people;
- c) Bringing derelict sites into use;
- d) Crime and grime.

32 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES

(a) <u>PERFORMANCE</u>

Wade Adams, Tenancy and Estates Manager at Nottingham City Homes (NCH) updated the Committee on key issues and themes that link back to local priorities and performance as described in the report.

Wade outlined previous scheme approvals and noted that there were no additional schemes to approve at this meeting.

NCH is making progress in tackling anti-social behaviour. The company won two awards at the National ASB Annual Conference on 10 November - Team of the Year and Best Project for Strelley KO Boxing Club.

RESOLVED to note NCH performance as detailed in the report, and that there were no environmental schemes to approve at this meeting, and congratulate Nottingham City Homes on its achievement of two National ASB Awards.

33 WARD PERFORMANCE: QUARTER 2 – JULY TO SEPTEMBER 2015

Dale Griffin, Neighbourhood Development Officer, introduced the report of the Corporate Director of Commercial and Operations, highlighting achievements and emerging issues in each ward.

The following issues were raised in discussion:

- a) Joint working on youth issues partners, including Right Track and the Council's Family and Community Teams have started to work together to identify what is happening in the area, what is working and what needs to change;
- b) The importance of and the success of ward walks, which bring councillors into direct contact with citizens, who are then able to discuss their views of the area.

RESOLVED to note the report and to thank the Neighbourhood Development Officers for their work in relation to ward performance.

34 POLICE UPDATE

Inspector Bruce Clarke introduced himself as the new Police representative reporting to the Committee. He has been involved in neighbourhood policing for several years and noted the significant improvements in crime levels in Area 2 in recent years.

The following issues were raised in discussion:

 a) Concern about enforcement of the 20mph limit on local roads - portable gun operations to check speed have not identified a significant problem. It may be a perception of speeding, but it may also be that there is a need to check speed early in the morning and later in evening, which is when citizens report that they are most disturbed;

- b) Crime has reduced in the area, particularly in dwelling burglaries, motor theft, criminal damage and anti-social behaviour;
- c) Increases have been seen in sexual offences, violence (particularly domestic violence) and burglary 'other' (eg of sheds). Violence now includes harassment (ie not necessarily physical contact), which may account for the increase;
- Police priorities are to focus on shed break-ins in Basford and environmentals (as crime is so low) in Bestwood;

Councillor Woodings left the meeting during this item (17.45).

RESOLVED to note the information provided by Inspector Clarke and ask him to publicise the enforcement of 20mph speed limits.

35 BASFORD AND BESTWOOD AREA CAPITAL

Dale Griffin, Neighbourhood Development Officer for Bestwood ward, introduced the report of the Corporate Director of Commercial and Operations, detailing the latest spend under the Area Capital Fund.

There were no new schemes to approve, but Dale drew attention to a decommitment of funding from the Bestwood budget as the Eden Glade scheme is not going ahead.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Physical inactivity is a significant problem in Great Britain with 29% of people in England failing to achieve 1x30 minutes of sport or physical activity per week. The ParkLives programme aims to activate the community and provide a programme of free to attend healthy lifestyle activities, sports and events delivered in Local Parks all around the City throughout 2016. The programme also aims to mobilise a network of local people who can all help promote and help to lead the sessions. It is hoped that these people will also help to sustain the programme beyond 2016.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 ParkLives Programme

ParkLives is a sport, health and physical activity project funded by Coca Cola GB as part of their £20m investment to get 1 million people active by 2020. The project forms a partnership between Coca Cola GB and the local authority who project manage ParkLives in their area.

On 17th December 2015, the Government launched its new Strategy for Sport, 'Sporting Future: A new Strategy for an Active Nation'. This new strategy will see a shift away from traditional sports to a broader definition of what constitutes physical activity and this change aligns nicely to this Park Lives Programme of activities and the City's own Sport & Physical Activity Strategy 2015-2019.

ParkLives started in 2014 in three areas; Birmingham, Newcastle and the London borough of Newham. The emphasis of the project is about having fun on a park in an active way. It doesn't have to be a high intensity fitness class or a sports coaching session, it is an informal activity that promotes being active on a regular basis in a fun and social way. Cost and inconvenience are the two main barriers that people face in becoming more active and ParkLives overcomes these by providing free activity across the city in peak and off-peak times. The ParkLives initiative started in Nottingham in May 2015.

2.2 Nottingham ParkLives Vision

To get more families, friends and communities actively participating in a broad range of park based fun recreational and sporting activities.

2.3 Nottingham ParkLives Outcomes and Outputs plan

- 1. To formally designate 20 parks and green spaces as Activity Parks
- 2. To reach those who are most unlikely to participate from IMD areas and activate 60,000 people during the two year programme.
- 3. To provide weekly activities in all primary parks and an intensive programme of activity for families over the school holidays
- 4. To support the development of Friends Groups in each Active parks and recruit and train volunteers to build capacity and support future delivery of the Active Parks project.
- 5. To generate interest and support with the community in order to drive forward a wide range of parks improvements and help improve the parks to Green Flag Standards.
- 6. To look to existing delivery partners to establish and run the parks sessions across the city.

2.4 <u>Headline Statistics from the 2015 Nottingham ParkLives Programme.</u>

- Over 450 physical activity sessions between June and October in 19 parks across Nottingham city
- 2 mass-participation events
- Supporting 6 community events
- Over 15,000 attendances

2.5 ParkLives Programme 2016

In 2016 the ParkLives Team will again run a free to attend programme of weekly healthy lifestyle, sports, activities and events in local parks all over the City.

The key emphasis this year will be about activating the entire community, training and developing a local network of people who can get involved and *help sustain* the programme in future years.

Appendix 1 contains a draft 2016 ParkLives programme.

To help deliver the 2016 programme the ParkLives Team is now looking to identify and recruit local people who can who can volunteer to help promote and run the ParkLives sessions.

• ParkLives Ambassadors.

Key Responsibilities: - To help promote the ParkLives sessions and be a local champion who can encourage local groups and individuals to get involved and be active in their local park.

• ParkLives Activators Key Responsibilities: - To actively get involved in assisting / leading local ParkLives sessions. This could be as a walk leader, organising a weekly game of rounder's or running a weekly Zumba class in the park.

• Training and Support

As part of this programme the ParkLives Team will help provide support and training on all aspects relating to the ParkLives programme and how to promote and deliver the sessions.

Easylink – the accessible bus service for Nottingham

Introduction

Easylink is the new accessible way to get round Nottingham for people who struggle to use existing bus and tram services. Easylink provides a door to door service using fully wheelchair accessible buses allowing passengers to get to the shops, leisure activities, medical appointments or anywhere else they want to go. Easylink is operated by Nottingham Community Transport on behalf of Nottingham City Council and Nottinghamshire County Council.

What does easylink offer? -A door to door accessible service available from 8am to 7pm Monday to Friday to go to the shops, theatre, cinema, social events, medical appointments to visit friends and family or anywhere else you want to go. It offers

- Regular friendly fully trained drivers who can assist you on and off the vehicle
- Brand new fully wheel accessible vehicles with a rear lift and space for up to 2 wheelchair as well as up to 8 conventional seats
- Low cost travel for concession card holders and free travel for their escort or companion if they need one
- The ability to book a journey up to 7 days in advance for a 1 off trip, 6 weeks in advance for regular journeys or 3 months in advance for a trip to a medical appointment

How do I join Easylink? - To make use of the service you need to register with Nottingham Community Transport. If you have a Mobility Citycard concession card issued by Nottingham City Council you are automatically a member of the Easylink scheme. Those people who don't have a Mobility Citycard but still struggle to use conventional bus or tram services please contact Nottingham Community Transport to discuss joining the scheme.

How much will it cost to travel on Easylink - The fare charged is based on the distance travelled as the crow flies. Please see the table below

Distance travelled	Fare for a concession card holders	Standard Fares
Up to 1 mile	£1.50	£3.00
1-3miles	£2.50	£5.00
3-5 miles	£4.00	£8.00
5-10 miles	£7.00	£14.00

When a passenger books a trip they will be given an exact price for that door to door to journey. If they require an escort or companion to assist them they can travel for free.

How do I join?

If you have a Mobility Citycard issued by Nottingham City Council you are automatically a member and don't need to join.

If you have a disabled concessionary card issued by Nottinghamshire County Council and live within the Greater Nottingham area (please see enclosed area map), simply contact us to confirm your membership. (All eligible County concessionary pass holders will be contacted in advance).

If you live within the Greater Nottingham area and struggle to use the main transport network, but don't have a disabled concessionary card please contact us to discuss joining.

You may be entitled to a 50% fare reduction if you hold a current and valid concessionary travel pass. You will need to show this to the driver each time you travel

As a member you are entitled to **50%** discount off the standard fares when showing a valid concessionary travel pass, please show the driver when boarding the bus.

Cancellation charge - If your trip is not required, please contact us and cancel **before** the bus arrives for collection. The charge for your journey will still be payable if cancellation is not confirmed.

Bookings can be made up to 7 days in advance. You can also block book a regular trip for up to 6 weeks in advance, e.g. a weekly social club.

If you have a medical appointment, booking is available up to 3 months in advance.

We will make every effort to meet your requested time, but we also try to accommodate other passengers on the easylink vehicle so we may ask you to adjust your time slightly to fit our schedule, and make more efficient use of the service.

Customers need to be ready to leave 10 minutes before their scheduled departure time.

If you need assistance when travelling, your companion or escort can travel free of charge. Please let us know you are bringing someone with you when you are booking your ride, so that we can make sure there is room.

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Basford and Bestwood Area Committee – 24 February 2016

Police update: quarter 3 - October - December 2015

Basford Ward

Compared to the same time frame in 2014, we have a reduction in dwelling burglary with 13 fewer offences, a reduction of nearly 28%. All crime is down by over 13%.

There are also reductions in robbery (down 66%) and ASB offences (down 23%). There have been increases in criminal damage, with 10 more offences, theft up 11 offences and 1 extra sexual offence.

Highlights of NPT activity during this period include:

- Local persistent offender found guilty at Nottm Youth Court, for theft of pedal cycle, and sentenced to youth referral order of 9 months, with 10 days activities.
- Robbery offender charged for offence at the bus stop outside the library on Vernon Road.
- Drugs warrant executed on Rempton Drive.
- Community Protection Warning Notices issued by CP Officers on Naworth Close and Acton Avenue for environmental issues.

The Community Priority throughout Q3 continues to be off road bikes, which are causing nuisance around the whole ward.

Recorded sexual offences have also seen an increase of 8, but it is worth noting that we are routinely seeing historic reports from the 70s and 80s.

Our main focus during this period has been on ASB. In July we saw successful use of dispersal powers and a 3G CCTV camera around Kyle View. However, we saw a move in the problem firstly to the Elmbridge area then to the Chediston Vale Park area and the Ridgeway. A dispersal authority was successfully used around Elmbridge, with numerous breaches pursued through to summons: the youths involved were also all visited at home, followed by warning letters. The youth service devised a program to deliver to a number of them and assisted. NCH have also assisted in home visits and warning letters. A number have now gone through the court and YOT are working with some.

Also contributing to an increase in ASB figures are a few persistent noisy neighbour complaints, which in some cases generated daily calls. These have been passed to CP to lead on and the use of CPN warning notices have been utilised, along with noise referrals.

During this period we have continued our street to street initiative around Elmbridge and Chediston Vale, completed 64 surveys and promoting Neighbourhood Alert. This has deliberately been focussed around the areas affected by ASB with a view to increasing reporting and trust and confidence.

Bestwood Ward

Compared to the same time frame in 2014, we have a reduction in all but two crime categories! All crime is down 81 offences – nearly 25%.

There were 21 fewer burglaries of homes, 3 fewer robberies and 3 fewer cars broken into or stolen. There are also reductions in burglary other (sheds garages etc), criminal damage and drug offences. There have also been overall decreases in violence, with 11 fewer offences in total, although there was a small increase (2 more) in 'violence without injury' offences. There was an increase in reports of antisocial behaviour with 17 more matters being noted.

Our main focus during this period has been on ASB. Together with CP we have tackled youth ASB issues in and around the Elmbridge area and the Ridgeway, as well as a number of noisy neighbour complaints. We continue to use CPN warning notices and to make Noise Pollution referrals for these matters.

During this period we have continued our street to street initiative as well as executing a number of drugs warrants – acting on intelligence supplied by the community to tackle issues that cause them concern helps to increase reporting, trust and confidence.

The ward priority for this period was in relation to the environmental issues in the Belconnen Road and Wyton Close areas.

CDP Board Priority Tasking Update

Area Committee will be aware that The Crime and Disorder Act 1998 established a statutory duty on agencies to work together to reduce crime and disorder, this was accommodated through the establishment of Community Safety Partnerships (CSPs). In Nottingham the Crime & Drugs Partnership is the city CSP.

Nottingham has employed several methods since 2005 to deliver partnership problem solving and tasking. In December 2014 the Partnership Beage aggreed to dissolve Locality Boards and move to a

citywide model to deliver interventions focused on people, places and premises and the priorities set out in the Partnership Plan.

The purpose of the CDP Board Priority Tasking is to take an intelligence led and collaborative approach to identify effective interventions to reduce crime, re-offending and anti-social behaviour by focusing on people, places, premises and the priorities set out in the Partnership Plan. The Group will also serve an important function as a forum into which any partner agency can escalate intractable issues and seek help in solving those problems through a partnership problem solving approach.

The following is a brief summary by the respective Ward Neighbourhood Development Officers highlighting key issues:

WARD: BASFORD, (Park Lane, Stockhill and Whitemoor Beats) Neighbourhood Development Officer, Gursharan Singh Nijran

Key Successes

During this quarter (October to December) there have been a number of successes including:

- Covert action against dog fouling operations and ASB. ASB van on regular patrols in Basford.
- Completion of Stockhill Park Children's Play Area.
- Completion of Brooklyn Park Children's Play Area
- Selwyn Close environmental improvements completed.
- Community engagement through the local TRA's and community centres
- MyBasford Facebook page continues to grow with internal departments adding regular updates. This can be viewed at <u>www.facebook.com/mybasford</u>

- All Crime: is down 6% over the same period from last year.
- All ASB: was down by 13% (decrease of 37 calls) for the year to date period.
- There are now 632 (8.6%) households in Basford signed up to the **ALERT** system, with many households signing up to get information via Twitter and Facebook.
- **Cleanliness Index:** The target set for the city centre is 86% and the Basford score for quarter three is 87%.
- **Graffiti Reports and Fly Tipping:** Both show significant increases from the same period last year.
- Fly Tipping: Shows an increase of five incidents on the year to date figures.
- Fire: Deliberate fires are down 29% compared to the same period in the previous year.

What is the Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) focussing its work on?

The NAT will be continuing to focus its work upon:

- Improving the visual appearance of neighbourhoods
- Reducing crime and anti-social behaviour
- Supporting activity for young people.

The figures given below show some key statistical points for the latest data performance (see appendix A for more detail):

- **Crime:** For the year to date (up until December) all Crime was down by 11% compared to the same period in the previous year. This equates to 106 less offences.
- ASB: was up by 16 incidents (2%) for the year to date (up until December).
- Fire: The volume of deliberate fires for the year to date (up until November) was down 35 incidents or 47%.
- **Cleanliness Index:** score was at 86 for October and 86 for November. The target set for the city centre is 86
- **Graffiti Reports:** There was a reduction in the number of incidents in the year to date (up until November) showing a 28% reduction on the previous year.
- **Fly Tipping:** 237 reactive incidents year to date (up until November) of fly tipping. Overall fly tipping was up 21% for the year to date compared to the previous year.
- **Dog fouling:** 35 reactive reports year to date (up until November) showing a reduction of 16 incidents of dog fouling equivalent to a 31% reduction on the previous year.
- **Unemployment:** year to date shows a 20% reduction on the previous year.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importapge to local communities.

- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2015 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2015-2016.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme, have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund and the Local Transport Plan (LTP). To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
