51 MINUTES

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 18 February 2016 and these were signed by the Chair.

52 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES UPDATE REPORT

Kristian Murden, Area Housing Manager at Nottingham City Homes (NCH), introduced the report providing updates on key issues and themes which link back to local priorities and the strategic themes for Nottingham City Homes. Kristian highlighted the following:

- (a) a consultation exercise was held recently with Winchester and Woodthorpe residents to discuss future improvement works including external wall insulation and heating upgrades. Positive feedback was received and artists impressions of the improvements were taken favourably;
- (b) fencing upgrades in Northwood Crescent and Springfield Street are now complete, and other areas are being investigated to see if they would benefit from a similar scheme:
- (c) NCH have recently taken over the caretaking of the Frobisher and Wilmington garden flats. This has already had a positive impact on the tenants as they have a caretaker on a daily basis so the areas are kept very clean and tidy.

The following comments were made during the discussion which followed:

- (d) the positive consultation from residents of Winchester and Woodthorpe is very positive, considering there will be major work and upheaval for them whilst this is ongoing;
- (e) there are some gaps in the new fencing on Northwood Crescent.

(3) investigate the gaps in the fencing at Northwood Crescent and resolve the problem.

53 POLICE UPDATE

Inspector James Woolley, Nottinghamshire Police, provided a verbal update to the Committee, highlighting the following:

Berridge Ward

- (a) in quarter 4, overall crime was down. There were small increases in anti-social behaviour and robbery, and reductions in burglary and vehicle crime;
- (b) at the year end, overall crime was down, with reductions in robbery and dwelling burglary, but a slight increase in violence. There has been a change in policing inspectors to Rob Wilson and Sergeant Shipley;

Sherwood Ward

- (c) in quarter 4, overall crime was down 10%. There has been an increase of violence of 29%, but reductions in robbery and burglary and a large 67% reduction in vehicle crime. There have also been reductions in shoplifting and anti-social behaviour:
- (d) at the year end all crime was down by 4%. Violence has increased by 19% but burglary, robbery and vehicle crime are all down. Issues with crime at the prison have been in the news, but the police is working with the prison to prevent this;
- (e) the sergeant for Sherwood is now Nick Wealthall, the beat managers are the same as before and the area is losing one Community Support Officer. A new Facebook page has been launched for policing in the area and has been very successful:

Committee members would like to see crime figures included in the ward report as they used to be. The new ward report format is in a period of review so this will be fed back.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 From April 2013, the public health function was transferred to local authorities as a result of the Health and Social Care Act 2012. The Council subsequently became responsible for improving the health of their local population including health improvement, health protection and the commissioning of public health services.
- 1.2 Councillors are directly involved with their local communities and able to understand and identify the needs for health and wellbeing services specific to the local population.

- 1.3 Over the past 18 months, Councillors have had a series of meetings with public health and commissioning colleagues to consider local health data and experiences of local residents in order to support the planning and provision for local health and wellbeing services commissioned by the Council.
- 1.4 This report is an update of the work to date, including the engagement and information provided by Area Committee members on the remodelling of the healthy lifestyles public health services. Committee members are invited to consider the work so far and advise on next steps.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Local health profiles were developed by the Public Health team using nationally available data to better understand the health and wellbeing needs of local residents. The data was arranged at Nottingham Ward level to enable commissioners and Councillors to have a clearer picture of the health and wellbeing needs for their ward compared to Nottingham overall and to wards across England. Councillors from each of the Nottingham City wards met to discuss the data profiles and to add further insight that would enable a greater understanding of local need.
- 2.2 School health and area committee level health profiles were also produced to aid local understanding and planning. Public health services were mapped and included within directories for each area; these were presented to Area Committees during 2015.
- 2.3 Area Chairs as part of their Area Cluster Review process invited Public Health to present the health profiles and local health priorities. It was identified that further awareness and understanding of the commissioning process for public health and health services would be useful in a separate session.
- 2.4 The health profiles can be found on the Nottingham Insight website: https://nottinghaminsight.org.uk/f/96676/Library/Public-Health/
- 2.5 The commissioning awareness session was well attended by Area Chairs and Councillors and received good feedback and requests for further sessions that were more topic focused such as teenage pregnancy, smoking and mental health in young people. Part of the session included an overview of the modelling and engagement of a live commissioning review. Councillors agreed to contribute to the live review through a series of questions discussed with their respective Area Committees. The responses to the consultation and an overview of how the results from the consultation have been considered are included in the appendices to this report.

- 2.7 Some of the key benefits for engaging with Area Committees becoming involved in this way include:
 - Increasing efficiency, saved officer time in undertaking community based questions with citizens
 - Improved quality, hearing from a wide and diverse range of stakeholders

- Increased effectiveness, supporting evidence of services being developed to meet the needs of citizens
- 2.8 The feedback from the Area Committees has informed the development of the service specifications. The new model will be going out to tender in the autumn with the new model and services to be in place by April 2017.
- 2.9 Possible Next Steps
 - Possibility of linking Area Committee priorities with up and coming strategic commissioning reviews, e.g. List of Area Committee priorities to aid commissioner to make the link to up and coming commissioning reviews.
 - Consider what would be the most effective and efficient way of communicating to Area Committees Public Health updates and key information.

Appendix One

Area Cluster Feedback, Adults Healthy Lifestyles New Model.

July, 2016.

From April 2017 a new Adults Healthy Lifestyles model will be in operation in Nottingham City, below are the responses from Area Clusters gathered to help inform and shape the specification of the new model.

 Ensure services are targeted at those who need them, delivering the right services to the right people that are culturally appropriate, are inclusive and bespoke to meet community needs.

The new behaviour change and weight management service will sit within a newly created pathway, this will allow for citizens to benefit from universally available services, targeted services and higher more intense services for those with more complex needs, allowing citizens to flex between the different interventions to meet their needs through the process of change. The smoking cessation service will require the new provider to deliver a creative and innovative approach to addressing community needs. See appendix two.

 We need to deliver services in places people feel comfortable going such as community centres and be delivered at time that suit citizens.

The new services will be required to be accessible out of core office times to meet the needs for those with work and childcare commitments. We will stipulate in the contracts the need for the new provider to deliver services (where financially viable) in community centres and leisure centres.

 We should consider utilising GP and prescribing services to offer services on prescription and joint working with other agencies to tackle health concerns.

GPs can already refer into Adults Healthy Lifestyles services and this will continue with the new provider, the new services will be commissioned as part of a pathway with the Clinical Commissioning Group to more intense services and with Sport and Leisure for more universal services. The social prescription pilot in Bulwell, Bulwell Forest and Clifton will continue to prescribe to healthy lifestyles services and if scaled up across the city, this will continue to feature.

Communications methods to utilise and make best possible use of digital media, health
message should be promoted where people go for example supermarkets. We should
consider the role of the workforce as agents of change in promoting health messages and
consider getting health messages directly in to citizens and community groups through
accessible and inclusive communications about what's available locally.

A new integrated Health and Social Care directory of services will be available by the end of the year; this will enable easier access to all services available to Nottingham Citizens and help support the workforce in signposting citizens. The new provider will be expected to maximise the use of digital technologies where appropriate.

• Delivery of preventative services such as Health, and these to be promoted to increase uptake of early intervention opportunities.

We will be pilot third party health checks as part of the new Adults Healthy Lifestyles model.

Services need to be affordable activities and we need to maximise the use of leisure centre
access and use of public open spaces – parks.

NCC Sport and Leisure management are part of the steering group for the development of the new model, and we are working collaboratively to deliver and inform citizens of free activity services in the City. All the targeted and specialist Adults Healthy Lifestyles activities will be free at the point of access.

• Consider how we can get the `conversation going` about health in the community and look at how we can maximise community capacity in communities to help each other.

This is a priority action in the Draft Health and Well Being Strategy for Nottingham City (Outcome 4: Nottingham's environment will be sustainable - supporting and enabling its citizens to have good health and wellbeing).

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 NG7 Training, Employment and Advice (NG7 TEA) was appointed by Nottingham City Council as the Area Based Lead Organisation in April 2016 to coordinate the Area Based Grant for Area 5 following the successful delivery of the first round of the Grant.
- 2.2 The total allocation of the Area Based Grant for 2016/17 for Area 5 is £170,968 including management fee.

- 2.3 A Needs Analysis for Area 5 informed the developed of 4 key priority areas/themes which support the strategic priorities of the Nottingham Plan 2020 and the Nottingham City Council Plan 2015-19 as well as identification of local priorities.
- 2.4 NG7 TEA undertook consultation for each priority area and liaised with key stakeholders and the local voluntary sector organisations, establishing a process to identify a range of delivery partners to develop provision in order to address the identified priorities, targets and outcomes.
- 2.5 Details of priorities, funding allocation and delivery partners for 2016/17 are set out below:

- 2.6 NG7 TEA has met with each delivery partner and agreements specifying the service delivery, targets and expected outcomes to be delivered as well as monitoring requirements have been issued.
- 2.7 Due to the delays in commencement of the Grant programme not all partners were able to launch their activities on 1st April 2016 so delivery of activities is at variable stages and each partner has plans in place to ensure the annual targets and outcomes are met. NG7 TEA will be undertaking performance monitoring and providing detailed report of activities and progress to the Area Committee twice a year.
- 2.8 NG7 TEA in agreement with key stakeholders and the delivery partners has agreed themed based consortium meetings aligned to current wider partnership meetings for that theme, where appropriate, to avoid duplication and meeting overload. It was agreed this model would ensure delivery partners are embedded within and connected to the wider networks for their priority/theme, facilitating better communication of relevant information, increasing understanding and knowledge of provision and gaps and enabling the sharing of good practice.

The Role of Community Representatives

- You will be encouraged to act as an ambassador for the Area Committee to help to raise the profile of the work done by the Area Committee.
- You should attend all Area Committee meetings, events, training etc wherever possible.
- If you cannot attend the meetings try to find someone who will cover for you.
- You should represent the views of residents and of your group or community who live and work in the area.
- All business representatives should have business premises within the area.
- You will be encouraged and entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings.
- Events and training will be held for you to give you the confidence and knowledge to be actively involved within the Area Committee. We will ask you what training and events you would like.
- You will be invited to put forward items for discussion at the Area Committee meetings. You will need to do this at least 3 weeks before the date of the meeting.
- You will be encouraged to tell us when things are not running well.
- You will find it much easier to fulfil your role if you have read the reports before the
 meeting and, if possible, had a chance to discuss the report with your community
 group. Everyone will benefit from this as it allows the community representatives to
 play a much more active role and makes for a more effective and informed
 contribution to discussions and debate.
- Most importantly, any relevant information should be passed back to your community group to any local friends, neighbours or colleagues. None of the information made available during the meetings are secret or confidential.
- One of the biggest challenges for the Area Committee is to keep people informed.
 Your agreement to pass on information, display and distribute any publicity material
 in community venues and promote involvement in the work of the Area Committee
 and to take an active role in local community consultations is appreciated.

CENTRAL LOCALITY - COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES: THE CRITERIA AND PROCESS FOR SELECTION

INTRODUCTION

- Encouraging greater participation in service delivery and decision making was one of the main reasons for establishing Area Committees in 1995.
- The new terms of reference give Area Committees more responsibilities which in turn will have an impact on the involvement of local representatives.

THE CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

- Community or Voluntary organisations that wish to be represented on Area Committees will be properly constituted (i.e. have a constitution/terms of reference, have regular meetings, and operate an Equal Opportunities Policy)
- All community group representatives (except those representing citywide organisations), should live in the area and seek to represent the views of their group(s) or community organisation and not individual viewpoints.
- Community Group representatives will have established networks/systems for
 passing information to the Area Committee from groups that they represent, citizens
 that they aim to serve within their area and likewise feedback information from the
 Area Committee.
- Representatives will be selected each civic year (normally in May). Only one nomination per group will be accepted by the Area Committee at any given time. Any person from the group can attend Area Committee meetings although only the nominated community representative will be allowed to speak. If the community representative is unable to attend a meeting, the group can nominate an individual to speak on behalf of the community representative for the group.
- Any member of the public may have the right to attend Area Committee meetings as an observer.

POWERS OF COMMUNITY GROUP REPRESENTATIVES

- Community Group Representatives are entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings and can 'influence' the decisions (but cannot vote on any matter) being made by the area committee.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to claim expenses for travelling and care costs related to attending Area Committee meetings.
- Community Group representatives will be able to submit items for inclusion on the Area Committee agenda at least three weeks before the meeting or in advance of the meeting with the agreement of the Chair.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to attend specific events and training across the city in order to carry out their role and responsibilities in relation to Area Committee/Working.
- Community Group Representatives can make formal presentations at Area Committee meetings on community projects/initiatives with the prior agreement of the Chair.

POWERS OF COUNCILLORS IN RELATION TO COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES

- Only Councillors can vote on all matters in respect of the Area Committee
- If a representative fails to attend committee meetings consistently without good reason, the Area Committee may approach their organisation for a replacement.
- If a representative is deemed to persistently not abide by the corporate policies of Nottingham City Council, (e.g. Health & Safety, Equality and Diversity), he/she will be required to resign their position as local community group representative on the Area Committee
- Councillors may choose to invite representatives from other organisations outside their geographical area in order to widen participation from under-represented groups.
- Councillors will allocate a small 'rolling budget' for reimbursement of Community Group Representatives' expenses.
- If Community Representatives find it beneficial and have made a request, Councillors will provide community group representatives with an opportunity to meet together with the Locality Team prior to each Area Committee meeting, to discuss the agenda or other items of concern.

THE PROCESS

- Each year Councillors must determine the number of Community Representatives that they wish to represent the community. This may be based on a set number of places per ward or according to specific interests and issues in the area. Representation should take account of the population make up of the area. Where under-representation exists, city wide groups may be approached for representation.
- Once per year (normally in March) the Locality Team will send out nomination forms by post, (together with an Area Committee information pack), to all community organisations in the area, inviting them to nominate a representative from their organisation to be involved in Area Committee meetings
- Locality Managers will assess completed nomination forms to ensure that the selection criteria are met and will produce a report for Area Committee detailing nominations received.
- Councillors will decide which of the nominations should be selected for community group representation at Area Committee meetings, taking into account the population make up of the area or specific issues/interests in the area.
- Those community group organisations selected will be notified in writing of the offer by the Locality team. Details of future dates of committee meetings will be sent out at the same time.
- A review will take place each civic year (by Councillors advised by officers) to determine what groups are the most appropriate to be represented on the area committee
- Where nominations are not accepted, a letter explaining why will be signed by the Chair and sent to the organisation, together with details of other options for involvement in area working.
- Where groups are dissatisfied with the decision, they have the right to appeal to the Area Committee within four months.
- Councillors will then enlist the assistance of other Councillors of the city (Area Chairs Panel), to review the decision and any decision made thereafter, will be final.

- 2.2 These priorities demonstrate a link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015 - 19. Actions for each priority will be developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships. The Area priorities were reported to the last Area 5 Committee on 25th May 2016 and will be updated annually.
- 2.3 The area priorities listed in 2.1 sit within wider pieces of work and broader agendas which are being addressed by multi agency approaches across the City. This could, for example, include more targeted use of funding such as Ward Councillor budgets to support healthy eating initiatives or the use of Area Capital to develop an outdoor gym facility.

These priorities will be updated for each area committee, taking into account discussions at NAT meetings and various groups and activities involving local residents.
