#### 35 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 15 November 2016 were confirmed as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

#### 36 POLICE UPDATE

Inspector Donna Busuttil gave an update from Nottinghamshire Police on current issues relevant to the Dales, St Anns and Mapperley wards. She highlighted the following information:

- (a) on Friday 10 February through to Sunday 12 February 2017 a joint operation was run along with Nottingham City Homes and the Community Protection officers on the streets of the wards. The operation was not a secret and people within the community were aware that it would be taking place, despite this a number of knives were recovered from individuals;
- (b) a passive drugs dog was used and a number of seizures of controlled substances were made:
- (c) in coordination with Nottingham City Homes and with a housing officer present 2 warrants were executed;
- (d) Nottinghamshire police plan on running similar operations in the future and feedback or questions from those in the community are welcomed;
- (e) nationally Police forces have changed the way that crimes are recorded. Many incidents that would previously not have been recorded as a crime and given a crime number now class as a formal incident and Nottinghamshire Police are in the process of reassessing a number of incidents and having to assign crime numbers to old cases. As a result the crime figures for the last quarter are not reflective of the crime that has been committed.

Following questions and comments from the Committee the following further points were made:

- (f) in the Dales ward vehicle crime is up 12%, up from 9. There is no pattern to the crime and patrols have been increased. Shoplifting is up 24% and police are working with shop owners to reduce this. 3 burglaries took place which appeared to target Asian families, in particularly their jewellery. This fits with a pattern of crime seen in the neighbouring Carlton area where a person was apprehended on suspicion of burglary. Public Order crime is up by 54%, up by 24 incidents. This is attributed to old incidents being reopened as a result of the new reporting criteria;
- (g) frustration was expressed that the new crime reporting legislation has led to very minor incidents and mischief calls being included in the crime statistics diverting time and resources away from more serious incidents;
- (h) neither of the 2 recent murders in the Sneinton area could have been predicted or prevented. They were two separate incidents and there is no need for the community to feel unsafe. It was not possible for Inspector Busuttil to comment further due to ongoing investigation;
- despite residents commenting that they had not seen the Community Protection officers in the Dales ward the CPO's have been working jointly with Nottinghamshire Police throughout the wards;
- (j) Inspector Donna Busuttil offered to bring comparative figures to the next meeting to allow the Committee to see crime figures over a 6 month period which should give a clear picture following the changes in reporting legislation;

RESOLVED to thank Inspector Donna Busuttil for her attendance, note the content of her update and accept her offer of comparative figures at the next meeting.

#### 37 CONWAY CLOSE: STOPPING UP FOOTPATH

David Baille, Regeneration Officer, introduced a report outlining the decision to stop up of a footpath on Conway Close in order to allow the construction of housing. The Delegated Decision was taken in exercise of Area Committee Executive Powers under delegation 82(b). No objections were received during the consultation process and the Stopping Up Order was confirmed on 12.10.2016. Construction work started the same month and is scheduled to finish in July 2017.

#### **RESOLVED** to

- (1) note the decision of the Head of Neighbourhood Management in Delegated Decision 2582 in exercise of her executive powers on behalf of the committee;
- (2) note the steps that have been taken since the approval of Delegated Decision 2582 to implement that decision.

#### 38 FINANCIAL VULNERABILITY AND RESILIENCE

Peter Morley, Commissioning Manager, gave a presentation on Financial Vulnerability and Resilience highlighting the following points:

- (a) Nottingham City has the second highest level of population unable to manage debt of all locality areas at over 41%. Groups more likely to be affected include:
  - citizens with mental health issues;
  - families:
  - citizens with physical or mental disabilities, learning disabilities or long term health problems;
  - refugees or asylum seekers;
  - elderly citizens;
  - citizens with drug or alcohol misuse issues;
  - young people;
  - care leavers;
  - citizens claiming Job Seekers Allowance or citizens who work in in insecure employment/low wage work;
  - ex-offenders.
- (b) historically there have been different services citywide with differing quality that citizens did not know how to access and a shortage of early intervention work to prevent vulnerability;
- (c) to rectify this the Council recommissioned all of the advice services that it funds through a "hub and spoke" model which was completed in September 2015. The second stage is to implement change in the services to address the historical issues including;
  - move facilities to an early intervention approach;
  - standardise advice and assessment across the city:
  - standardise access arrangement;
  - ensure citizens and professionals know what services are available.
- (d) the council applied for and received £300,000 of Transformation Challenge Award funding. The process is underway to identify appropriate ways to spend the funds, ideas include:
  - shared free phone number and shared appointment booking system for advice services
  - trainer/development worker to act as a link between advice services and employment support
  - virtual chatroom (skype)
  - specialist immigration advisor
  - training for Advice Nottingham staff on standardised access to assessment/ referral to other services.
- (e) the services will be evaluated on outcomes that show impact, improve access between services, fit with the financial resilience action plan and reduce citizens vulnerability;

- (f) further consultation will be done in localities, and support groups will be set up as appropriate. This work will be overseen by the Health and Wellbeing Board;
- (g) the team welcome feedback from the community and can be sent to <a href="mailto:peter.morley@nottinghamcity.gov.uk">peter.morley@nottinghamcity.gov.uk</a>

Following questions and comments from the Committee the further points were made:

(h) out of standard hours (not 9am – 5pm) for the advice services in localities would be helpful for those citizens who do work, foodbanks are open outside of normal working hours and could be an appropriate place to offer other services or advertise other services, this idea will be feedback to the steering group for consideration;

**RESOLVED** to thank Peter Morley for his presentation and note the content.

#### 39 EMPLOYMENT AND SKILLS PLAN

Matt Alvey, Community Employment and Skills Officer gave a presentation on the Employment and Skills plan highlighting the following points:

- (a) On average the Dales, Mapperley and St Anns wards have a slightly higher than city average of citizens on out of work benefits but the overall figures up to October 2016 are showing a reduction;
- (b) current priorities of the Employment and Skills Area Partnership are:
  - to engage with residents who are currently economically inactive, including those not claiming benefits;
  - increase the number of job opportunities, including entry level jobs, for Dales, Mapperley and St Anns wards;
  - raise awareness and increase access to local support groups;
  - reduce the numbers of long term unemployed job seekers.
- (c) the Partnership aims to promote Nottingham Jobs opportunities to employment advisors and local residents. Following feedback from both advisors and residents the hub has been restructured to allow better joint working when using job searching tools;
- (d) The Partnership also works to:
  - promote vacancies to local advisors the Partnership email local vacancies to advisors on a regular basis
  - promote vacancies to local jobs fairs the next one is due to take place on 28 March 2017 between 12pm - 3pm at City College Nottingham, Carlton Road, NG3 2NR;
  - match client caseloads to vacancies and promote Nottingham Jobs Hub activities;
  - · monitor claimant figures;
  - review referrals and performance of local employment programmes.

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- (e) The Partnership has recently commissioned a research project to look at the barriers to local employment. This will run alongside a review of local employability services offered in Dales, Mapperley and St Anns to produce details of local employability provision;
- (f) the Step into Work programme has been recognised nationally and offers good quality programmes across the city. The Partnership is currently looking at ring-fence some local opportunities for local residents through this programme;

Following questions and comments from the committee the following points were made:

- (g) work is being done to improve access for those citizens who use English as an additional language, there is a good presence of advice and support services in localities to reach those who do not use the internet and local libraries offer free internet access to citizens which allows them to access the online services. There is still work to be done around literacy but there are programmes in place to increase literacy levels city wide;
- (h) the draft report from a community research paper shows that 0 hours contracts are damaging. It also shows that access to child care is a limiting factor and this report is due to be shared at an upcoming Partnership meeting and its finding will help to shape future action plans.

RESOLVED to thank Matt Alvey for his attendance and note the content of his presentation.

# 40 PROPOSAL FOR A SCHEME OF SELECTIVE LICENSING FOR PRIVATELY RENTED HOUSES

Lorraine Raynor, Chief Environmental Health and Safer Housing Officer, gave a presentation and introduced a report on the Proposal for a Scheme of Selective Licensing for Privately Rented Houses and highlighted the following points:

- (a) the Council currently runs a mandatory licensing scheme for Houses of Multiple Occupancy (HMO) with three or more storeys or, 5 or more occupiers, and a discretionary scheme of additional licencing which covers HMO's of 2 storeys or more, or, 3 or more occupiers;
- (b) the Council is currently consulting on a proposal to introduce a citywide selective licensing scheme that will cover all of the Private Rented Sector (PRS), it is thought that this will bring over 40,000 properties into the licensing scheme within Nottingham City. The consultation runs until the end of March and feedback can be given here: <a href="http://www.nottinghamcity.gov.uk/consultation-engagement-and-surveys/#housing">http://www.nottinghamcity.gov.uk/consultation-engagement-and-surveys/#housing</a>;
- (c) this scheme aims to drive up standards of homes, improve living conditions and reduce levels of deprivation for residents and contribute to reducing levels

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- of antisocial and criminal behaviour by tackling Rogue Landlords and working with landlords and tenants to provide advice and assistance;
- (d) the Dales, Mapperley and St Anns have a high proportion of PRS properties which falls short of acceptable standards.

Following questions and comments from the Committee the following points were made:

- (e) Should the consultation be a success and the Council agree with the proposal and agree to a selective licencing scheme for all PRS properties in the city, the decision would then need to be approved by the Department of Communities and Local Government. If permission is then granted for a citywide scheme would likely start in early 2018;
- (f) the fee for a 5 year license will be £600 per property. If the landlord is accredited through Decent and Safe Homes (DASH) or Unipol then there will be a £140 discount;
- (g) the same standards will apply to properties and to fees if a lettings agent is involved, properties will have to meet certain standards and the same fee of £600 per property will be charged and it will be the duty of the landlord to sign up to the scheme;
- (h) the proposed selective licensing scheme would run the same model of enforcements as currently runs for the mandatory and additional licencing. Advice will be offered to landlords and instructions on what needs to be done to improve the property, if no action is taken this will then lead to enforcement and ultimately to prosecution. If there is a pattern of poor behaviour then licenses will not be granted or will be granted only if a suitable management agent is put in place;
- (i) a high proportion of properties within the private rented sector will require improvement if this scheme is approved. It will ensure a basic minimum of standard for all housing and will improve outcomes for tenants;
- (j) the scheme will offer advice and support to landlords who are having issues with tenants such as housing benefits not being used to pay for rent.

#### **RESOLVED** to

- (1) thank Lorraine Raynor for her attendance and for her presentation and note the content;
- (2) encourage community reps to feed this back into the community and engage with the consultation process.

#### 41 WARD PERFORMANCE REPORT

Michelle Graley, Neighbourhood development Officer for St Anns presented the St Anns part of the Ward Performance report, she highlighted the following points:

- (a) 10 Tea and Cake public meeting have taken place across the ward to date. They have been well attended and have led to a list of issues affecting the ward to be complied. Common problems across the ward include commuter/nuisance parking, street furniture repairs and fly tipping. These issues will be taken back to Neighbourhood Action Team to address;
- (b) phase 1 of the Skate Plaza has been completed. There are a number of young people including those from the Skating Community already using the Plaza regularly;
- (c) Mr Tony Miller has approached the Neighbourhood Development Officer about a plaque he salvaged from the now disused Cannon Lewis Memorial Hall. It commemorates the lives of local young men who fought and lost their lives in World War I. He has made a number of attempts to have one of the local churches give the plaque a home but has not been successful. St Anns Councillors have agreed to look at sitting the plaque in a display case somewhere within St Anns with a view to carrying out a special event as part of the centenary commemorations.

Fi Cusick, Neighbourhood Development Officer for Mapperley Ward presented the Mapperley part of the report. She highlighted the following points:

- (d) January saw an increase in prostitution in the Mapperley Road Area. The Police Task Force are aware of that some of the workers who used to use the area are returning as their situations change. The Task Force are working with those who are known to the team. The numbers are still very low, and significantly lower than they were historically;
- (e) fly tipping continues to be an issue around Brewsters Recycling Centre on Brewsters Road. The 3G camera will be deployed there with a view to gathering information;
- (f) 20 November 2016 was the day of a "one off" leaf only collection in the Mapperley Park area. It was very successful and an extra 30 tonnes of leaves were collected, the total collected exceeds 230 tonnes from routine leaf clearance through the autumn and winter months;
- (g) in January Community Protection teams delivered letters to all households on Blue Bell Hill Road as a result of continued dog fouling, community support operations are being planned in the Mapperley ward to address this issue;
- (h) funds have been allocated to improvement plans for Astely Drive Park. Plans will go out to consultation with residents, and they will also be consulted on whether the path between Pendle Crescent and the park is reopened in the summer months, as it has been closed off for many years due to unsafe footing in bad weather;
- (i) the Big Push will be launched on 8 March 2017 between 12pm and 2pm at The Wells Community Centre to get local residents involved in the refurbishment and rebuild of the centre. Discussion will take place with

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residents about the activities they would like to see available, what the centre should look like and the layout. This will also be an opportunity to begin to recruit extra members to the community association;

- (j) a series of surveys will take place to look at traffic issues in the Ransom Road, Quernaby Road and Blyth Street area and how these can be addressed;
- (k) Cats Protection have caught and returned 14 healthy, neutered cats to the Woodlane Garden/Pippin Close area. The issue will continue to be monitored by the Neighbourhood Action Team;
- (I) an environmental Week of Action is being planned for August in the Warton Avenue area off The Wells Road. Hedges will be lowered to improve lighting and make the area feel safer, and gardens will be cleared of rubbish/unwanted items improving the look of the area. Parking will also be considered as this is another concern raised by residents.

Greg Foister, Neighbourhood Development Officer for the Dales presented the Dales part of the report. He highlighted the following points:

- (m)the Neighbourhood Action Team has been very busy doing a lot of work around fly tipping around the Whittle Road and Rossington Road;
- (n) a parking feasibility study has been commissioned for Sneinton Dale and Oakdale Road;
- (o) there has been investment in the Lord Street and Robert Street area as well as Windmill Park area:
- (p) a Ward Walk took place on 25 January 2017and the football pitch at Candle Meadow has now been mown;
- (q) the area is looking forward to some further investment in early spring and work continues to take place in order to engage the emerging communities;
- (r) Weeks of Action have been planned for 12 June and 9 October.

Resolved to note the priorities, current issues and supporting information for the Dales, Mapperley and St Anns Wards.

#### 42 AREA CAPITAL FUND – 2016/17 PROGRAMME

Greg Foister, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented a report on the Area Capital Fund – 2016/17 Programme providing the latest spend proposals under the Area Capital Fund. In an amendment to the original report circulated with the agenda the Committee was asked to approve funding for the 15 schemes noted in the appendix of the circulated report.

#### 43 <u>DELEGATED AUTHORITY PROJECTS</u>

Fi Cusick, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented the report on the use of delegated authority by the Corporate Director for Commercial and Operations.

RESOLVED to note the actions agreed by the Corporate Director for Commercial and Operations in respect of projects and schemes within the Dales, Mapperley and St Anns Wards.

#### 44 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES UPDATE

Toni Smithurst, Tenancy and Estate Manager for Nottingham City Homes, presented a report providing summary updates on Capital Programme and major work, area regeneration and environmental issues, key messages from the Tenant and Leasehold Congress, Tenant and Residents Associations updates, area performance and good news stories and positive publicity. She highlighted the following information:

- (a) the newly formed residents group at Victoria Centre Tenant and Resident Group is working hard with the Housing Patch Manager to establish itself as a community group;
- (b) costs for the roof garden at the Victoria Centre Flats are being finalised though no start date for the construction work has been confirmed. Materials will need to be hoisted to the roof and a full health and safety assessment is due to take place;
- (c) phase one of the door entry and intercom upgrade has been completed in Victoria Centre flats. Work has been commenced on phase two and phase three;
- (d) work is due to start this month on the external cladding of Newark Crescent, this is partly funded by the RemoUrban Funding. The low rise blocks of Byron, Haywood, Morley and Keswick will also be upgraded through this project with external wall insulation and new heating;
- (e) Homes in the Windmill Lane area have also benefited from external wall insulation through the RemoUrban project. Residents have also been offered the opportunity for free lighting upgrade to LED and update has been very high;
- (f) Jointly with Nottinghamshire, Police Nottingham City Homes successfully too possession of a property in the St Anns ward following numerous reports regarding antisocial behaviour;
- (g) the annual Tenant and Leaseholder Awards 2017 are now open for nominations. The awards are looking for the best individuals, groups or initiative that are improving the life of residents and neighbourhoods;

#### **RESOLVED** to

#### 1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The 2014 Act gives local authorities the power to introduce PSPO's in respect of any land to which the public or any section of the public has access, on payment or otherwise, as of right or by virtue of express or implied permission.
- 1.2 Local authorities may make a PSPO, pursuant to Section 59 of the 2014 Act, if satisfied on reasonable grounds that activities in a public place have had a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality, and that the effect is persistent in nature and unreasonable and justifies any restrictions imposed by the PSPO.
- 1.3 The 2014 Act replaced Gating Orders pursuant to the Highways Act 1980 with PSPOs as the appropriate means of the gating of alleyways over which there are public rights of way.
- 1.4 Under Section 72 of the 2014 Act, before a local authority may make a PSPO it is required to carry out necessary consultation with the Police, such community representatives as it thinks appropriate and, so far as is reasonably practicable, the owner and occupier of land within the restricted area. A local authority must also have particular regard to the rights of freedom of expression and freedom of assembly set out in Articles 10 and 11 of the Humans Rights Convention.
- 1.5 Section 64 of the 2014 Act places additional requirements upon a local authority that is considering making a PSPO that restricts the right of way over a highway. In particular, the local authority may not make an order that restricts the public right of way over a highway without considering—
  - (a) the likely effect of making the order on the occupiers of premises adjoining or adjacent to the highway;
  - (b) the likely effect of making the order on other persons in the locality;
  - (c) in a case where the highway constitutes a through route, the availability of a reasonably convenient alternative route

It also requires occupiers of premises adjacent to or adjoining the highway, and any other persons in the locality who are likely to be affected by the proposed order to be consulted about it.

- 1.6 Under Nottingham City Council's Constitution the authority to authorise the commencement of formal consultation in respect of a proposed PSPO which impacts only on part of the city covered by one Area Committee (and is not deemed by the relevant Director to be politically contentious or sensitive) is given to the Director of Community Protection. However, the relevant Area Committee is responsible for deciding whether to approve the making of the order following consultation.
- 1.7 With regards the on-going anti-social behaviour on Beverley Square referred to below, the intention is to seek the authorisation of the Director of Community Protection to commence formal consultation in respect of the introduction of PSPOs.
- 1.8 Following consultation, if it is felt that the introduction of PSPOs is an appropriate means of tackling the on-going anti-social behaviour, the intention would be to

proceed to implementation of the PSPOs as soon as is practicable as a means of providing respite to those in the locality whose lives are being adversely affected by the behaviours.

1.9 Area Committee is not due to meet again until a provisional date of 12 September 2017 and it is highly likely that the formal consultation process for the proposed PSPOs will be concluded well in advance of that meeting. Accordingly, to allow any PSPO that may be considered appropriate to be introduced as soon as is practicable Area Committee is asked to approve Recommendation 2 above.

#### 2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Concerns have been raised regarding persistent and on-going anti-social behaviour caused by youths congregating on Beverley Square which has had, and continues to have, a detrimental effect on the quality of life of local residents.
- 2.2 The anti-social behaviour appears to have been concentrated in and around two alleyways which run between numbers 11 and 12 Beverley Square and numbers 14 and 15 Beverley Square.
- 2.3 Residents have reported that youths often shout verbal abuse at each other and have seen them fighting amongst themselves. On occasions there have been as many six youths congregating in the alleyways causing a disturbance, nuisance and an annoyance to residents until 11pm. In addition residents have alleged that people have been engaged in drug dealing in the vicinity of the alleyway. This consists of people meeting up exchanging packages with money changing hands.
- 2.4 The behaviour of the youths congregating has also had a negative impact on the environment. Residents have reported that on many occasions human urine and excrement, as well as dog excrement, have been discovered in the two alleyways and that damage has been caused to the fabric of their properties.
- 2.5 Residents have expressed their concerns and feel that it is pointless to keep reporting the behaviour as they can see no end to the issues highlighted above as this matter has been on-going for a number of years.
- 2.6 Initial evidence gathered by officers within Community Protection and Neighbourhood Development suggests that the threshold for the introduction of PSPOs to gate off the alleyways between numbers 11 and 12 and numbers 14 and 15 Beverley Square may be met. The two alleyways are shown on the plan at Appendix 1 along with the alternative routes available to the public in the event that the alleyways are gated. However, as stated above, a formal consultation process, authorised by the Director of Community Protection, will be initiated to ascertain whether PSPOs are justified and are the most appropriate means of dealing with any on-going anti-social behaviour.

#### 3 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 A report to the next meeting of the full Area Committee is an option to Recommendation 2 above. However, as stated above, this may result in a delay in providing respite to residents suffering the impact of on-going anti-social behaviour. 3.2 If Recommendation 2 is accepted, a report will be prepared for the consideration of the Director of Community Protection and the Chair of Area Committee and the St Ann's Ward Councillors when formal consultation has been concluded and this report will set out options other than a PSPO that may have been considered or which may be more appropriate.

# 4 FINANCE COLLEAGUE COMMENTS (INCLUDING IMPLICATIONS AND VALUE FOR MONEY/VAT)

- 4.1 The cost of undertaking the consultation process will be met by Community Protection's existing budgets.
- 4.2 If Recommendation 2 above is accepted, the report prepared for the consideration of the Director of Community Protection and others referred to at 3.2 above will include full financial implications of the introduction of any PSPOs including the erection and maintenance of any gates that may be deemed appropriate.
- 5 LEGAL AND PROCUREMENT COLLEAGUE COMMENTS (INCLUDING RISK MANAGEMENT ISSUES, AND LEGAL, CRIME AND DISORDER ACT AND PROCUREMENT IMPLICATIONS)
- 5.1 The statutory powers in respect of the making of PSPOs are set out above. Gating Orders were previously used to close access to certain public rights of way where there was anti-social behaviour however PSPOs are more flexible and, if felt appropriate, can also be used to restrict access to a public right of way and/or restrict the activities causing the anti-social behaviour rather than restricting access in its totality. Those ultimately authorising the making of the Order should consider the various options balanced against the rights of the public to use the way to ensure a proportionate response to the problems.

Under the Council's Constitution the final decision as to whether an Order should be made would ordinarily come to this Committee. Should the Committee determine that there is a genuine urgency in dealing with this matter before its next meeting then it has the power to delegate the function of authorising the making of the Orders to an officer, and in this case it is recommended that takes place in consultation with the Chair and Ward Councillors.

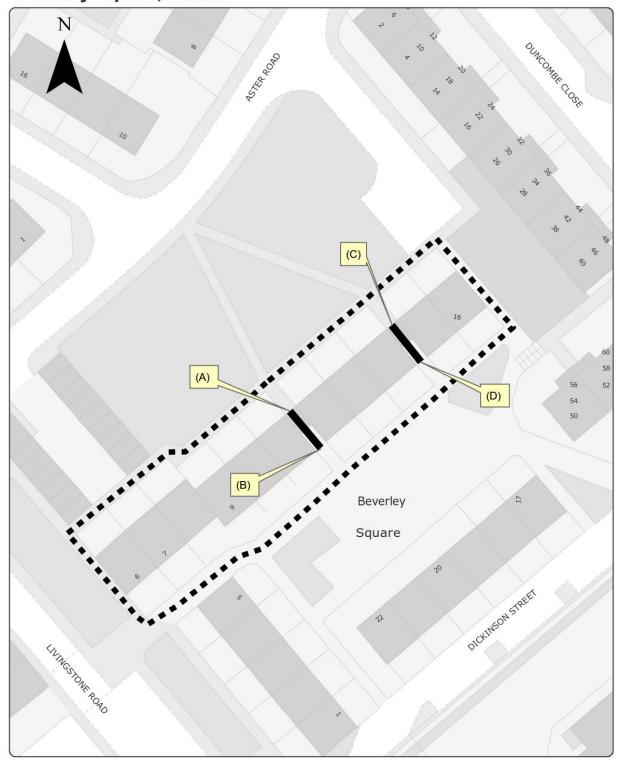

	Capital Programme & major works	Morley School 39 new homes. The first phase of 6 bungalows are due to complete at the end of May, with the family homes following in October.  External Wall Insulation Newark Crescent is progressing despite a slight delay for the manufacture of windows. Resident feedback so far has been positive and the first block is due to be completed by the end of May.  Customer consultation has been held with residents of Byron, Haywood, Keswick and Morley advising them about the works and how it should improve energy efficiency, reduce heat loss and help lower fuel bills. The external wall insulation will enhance the appearance of the blocks. Work to extend the district heating pipework to the Courts is due to commence in June with a traffic	

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		management light system being implemented during the work as the road will need to be dug up. It is anticipated that the work to the Courts will start during the summer with an anticipated December completion.  For the West Walk properties residents have been involved with the tender process meeting potential contractors. At the beginning of May residents were invited to see presentations delivered by the contractors outlining their vision for the properties. These were well received by residents who interacted with contractors asking many questions. The contract should be awarded very soon.  Passenger lift replacement  Work was due to start replacing the passenger lifts In Autumn 2017 however, as this is the start of the annual peak retail period work will commence in January 2018. Procurement is due to start in June including section 20 for Leaseholders, it will be awarded during the autumn.	
2		<u>Dales</u>	Information
	Area Regeneration and Environmental Issues	We have progressed with a design and initial costs for the Findern Green parking project. We are just waiting for the feedback from Elected Members following a period of consultation in the area and then we can agree a way forward.	
		BMK – We have now finished the external works to the 3 blocks and they are looking extremely good as the flowers and plants are now fully in bloom.	
		Newark Crescent – the Decent Neighbourhoods Team are looking to enhance the works being undertaken by our energy team with some landscaping features, new signage and painting the railings to compliment this major project we are undertaking in this area.	
		Mapperley We are currently costing options to improve the major wall on Dooland Drive as it is significantly damaged and decaying. This has been referred to our internal Construction Repairs and Maintenance team for a quote.	

We are also looking to reconfigure some of the gardens within Dooland Drive to make some additional parking to solve a problem where disabled residents cannot park near their houses. This project will also be costed up and presented to a later Area Committee for approval. At this Area Committee, we are seeking the approval of some kerbside fencing near the Nottingham Academy to help keep the pupils from straying across the road and presenting a hazard to themselves. Fencing to be approved at this area committee and installed ASAP. St Ann's In 2016 we sought approval for a large number of environmental schemes and these have now been delivered successfully across the ward. We have also made some improvements to the Beverley Square area in relation to parking and this seems to have been well received. We are exploring the options for new parking within the Sargent Gardens area and this is currently with NCC Highways for feasibility and costing. Victoria Centre Roof Garden is to be installed over the spring/summer of 2017 and we are very much looking forward to delivering this project for the benefit of tenants and residents to this complex. We feel the garden will have huge health and wellbeing benefits and we will keep the area committee updated of our progress. This has been passed to NCC highways and energy infrastructure team to progress with a construction cost and mobilisation plan. Massey Gardens/ Melville - At the time of Area Committee, NCH will have delivered boundary and landscaping works to this area. This is in line with the works started last year and saw a significant improvement to this part of the ward. The NCH Decent Neighbourhoods Manager is now working with Housing Teams and NDO to highlight further projects to be considered from this year's ward budget, with a likely approval of September 2017.

#### 1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Each Ward manages a set of priorities and key issues through regular meetings of its Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT). These meetings are led by Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs) and supported by core partners including Nottingham City Homes (NCH), Neighbourhood Policing, Community Protection, Children and Early Help, City Services / Waste Management; Fire and Rescue Services and Health.
- 1.2 Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.
- 1.3 Ward priorities are identified and informed from a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 1.4 The list of events and activities will take account of the work which all NDOs undertake with partner organisations within their Ward and shows the depth of activity in place working alongside neighbourhood management to improve social cohesion and tackle priorities at a ward and area level.

#### 2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Dales, Mapperley and St Ann's Wards sits within Area 6 Committee which adopted four area based priorities at its first Area Cluster meeting jobs and training, Health, Domestic Violence and Financial Resilience.
- 2.2 These priorities demonstrate a link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015 19. Actions for each priority will be developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships. The Area priorities were reported to the last Area 6 Committee on 14<sup>th</sup> February 2017 and will be updated at each Area Committee.
- 2.3 The area priorities listed in 2.1 sit within wider pieces of work and broader agendas which are being addressed by multi agency approaches across the City. At a Ward level it is important to identify how some of these more complex priorities can be worked on at local levels either ward or area by introducing local solutions. This could, for example, include more targeted use of funding such as Ward Councillor budgets to support healthy eating initiatives or the use of Area Capital to develop an outdoor gym facility.
- 2.4 The current Ward priorities, the current key issues and the forthcoming opportunities for citizens to engage in events and activities in their neighbourhoods are set out in Appendix 1-3 for each Ward. These have been reported previously through the area committee performance reports. These priorities will be updated for each area committee, taking into account discussions at NAT meetings and various groups and activities involving local residents.

#### 1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

The Nottingham LTP strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.

1.1 As part of the budget process, Nottingham City Council approved in March 2017 an LTP capital allocation of £2.6 million citywide between 2017/18.

#### 2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using the programme have included footpath construction and repairs, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes od work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
