72 CHAIR

In the temporary absence of Councillor Battlemuch, Vice Chair Councillor Sally Longford Chaired the meeting until Agenda item 4, 'Improving the Health of Citizens' (minute 77), at which point Councillor Battlemuch resumed the Chair.

73 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

74 <u>DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS</u>

None.

75 MINUTES

(a) Confirmation

The minutes of the meeting held on 19 September were confirmed and signed by the presiding Chair.

(b) Progress on Issues

There has not been any further news regarding the movement of allotment plots at Radford Bridge Road Allotments as part of the development of the site but Lylse-Anne Renwick, Neighbourhood Development Officer, offered to invite the officer from Planning to give an update at the next Area Committee meeting.

76 POLICING UPDATE

Police Inspectors Gordon Fenwick and Robert Wilson were present to deliver a Policing update for the area.

It is noted that Policing beats do not align with City Ward Boundaries but that the office near to the Waitrose site has three Police Officers and Community Protection Officers based there to ensure a visible community presence.

For the Wollaton East beat, Inspector Gordon Fenwick updated the committee as follows:

Compared to the same period last year,

- (a) Crime overall is down by 11% (57 incidents);
- (b) Victim based crime is down by 14% (65 incidents);
- (c) Theft is down by 20% (35 fewer incidents);
- (d) Vehicle crime has reduced by 26% (29 incidents);
- (e) Theft from vehicles is down 40%;
- (f) Shop burglary has also reduced;
- (g) Burglary of dwelling and non-dwellings has increased by 14% (6 incidents);
- (h) Antisocial behaviour has increased by 16% (24 incidents) which can be mainly attributed to young people gathering in the Nidderdale and Calderdale areas and around shops. This is something which the Police are trying to address.

The Committee's questions were responded to as follows:

- (i) There is no news to date as to whether a 'City Police Division' will be reintroduced by the new Chief Constable.
- (ii) A more detailed break-down and analysis of crime figures and statistics for the areas, including property status (private, social and private rented) is considered at Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) meetings.
- (iii) With regard to the ASB in the Nidderdale and Calderdale areas, patterns have been sough and it appears that the majority of problems can be attributed to young people from other areas, not locals. Once identified, the Police contact their schools and parents to address the behaviour, with the outcomes reported to the NAT meetings.

Inspector Rob Wilson updated the Committee on crime within the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward and Hillside University park/Lenton Abbey beat, compared to the same period last year, as follows:

- (i) There has been a 25% reduction on ASB (30 fewer reports);
- (j) Criminal damage is down by 33% with 14 fewer incidents;
- (k) There has been an increase in violence (domestic and general) as a new report recording regime is now in place where the report is recorded as an assault and then investigated. This in in response to the volume of reports for which the allegation is later withdrawn by victims. There were 30 more incidents recorded against last year's figures, mostly minor and within the Lenton Abbey Area;
- (I) There has been an increase in dwelling and non-dwelling burglaries of 6 but this mainly relates to sheds:
- (m) thefts from vehicles have increased by two;
- (n) theft of cycles is up by seven which can be attributed to a spate of thefts on the university campus during the summer. Police are accessing University CCTV to try and identify the culprits.

The committee's questions responded to as follows:

- (iv) the reduction in ASB reports can be attributed to specific policing work to reduce noise problems. The majority of new ASB reports are related Street issues, which are also being addressed;
- (v) with regard to the two recent sexual assaults to women in different areas, the person initially arrested was found not to be involved and so released but a second person has been charged, remanded and is awaiting trial.

Members of the Committee welcomed the reduction in dwelling burglaries in Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey as a result of the positive work undertaken by the Police.

The Chair thanked Inspectors Fenwick and Wilson for their attendance and updates.

77 AREA COMMITTEE - IMPROVING THE HEALTH OF CITIZENS

Alison Challenger, Director of Public Health, presented her report which updates the Committee on the progress in identifying specific health and wellbeing and treatment barriers for the population of Nottingham, and to invite members of the Committee and Community to help identify health priorities within the area.

The following points were highlighted:

- (a) to date, training has been provided to ward Councillors to enable a better understanding of the health services commissioning process;
- (b) Councillors have been asked to share their local knowledge of common issues and healthy lifestyle and treatment barriers with the Public Health Team and to encourage community groups to do the same;
- (c) this local intelligence will enable the Public Health Team to 'fine tune' Public Health Services to better meet the needs of the local population;
- (d) the information received so far has resulted in a different approach to commissioning some services which formerly were considered in isolation but have now been commissioned within one package. This includes stopping smoking, weight management and cook and eat sessions;
- (e) the specific questions asked of councillors and communities are listed in the appendix to the report, along with including the next stage of the process to address specific issues and barriers;
- (f) members of the Committee and community Groups are invited to continue to contribute and comment on local health issues and priorities and the proposal resulting from the consultation to date to ensure that models of commissioning become and remain the most effective for the local population.

The Committee's questions were responded to as follows:

- (i) the Public Health Team need to consider the whole issues and influences of social health within its remit prior to any major changes to commissioning. Only health and wellbeing areas for which the Public Health Team are responsible for can be considered and not those which are the responsibility of the NHS;
- (ii) Councillor's concerns that there may be a shortage of GPs will be passed to the Commissioning Group, with which responsibility sits, and a response to the Committee requested;
- (iii) it is recognised that there are significantly varying issues and needs within some wards. Within the boundaries of this Area Committee, a significant proportion of citizens are students and have specific needs including mental health support, suicide prevention and sexual health support. In addition the concerns for older people living in isolation need to be addressed. This is why local intelligence of issues is so valuable;
- (iv) the Environmental Health Team are actively tackling reports of noise which is often an under rated problem which can significantly impact on citizen's health;
- (v) Public Health Team are working to address significant alcohol issues including cultures of pre-loading, binge drinking, chronic drinking and dependant drinking within an Alcohol Strategy Group which includes partner members. The Public Health Team is informed of licensing applications but has limited powers to object

(vi) Physical activity is important but so too is diet. General activity, such as brisk walking, is valuable activity and by leaving their homes, can help citizens combat isolation. Activity doesn't need to be focused on sports facilities and can be enjoyed socially such as by joining local walking groups.

Ward Councillors are aware of some of the ASB issues, including noise and drunken behaviour, caused by sections of the student population and are working with the Universities to try and address them, along with promoting the healthy lifestyles for students.

For physical activity, the Chair recommended groups like 'Friends of Wollaton Park' which offered volunteers the opportunity to participate in light to hard physical work which also befitted the park. Alternatively the group arranged walks around the Park.

- (1) to note the approach and the work undertaken so far identifying specific health and wellbeing and treatment barriers for the population of Nottingham;
- (2) for Councillors and Community Groups to forward any further comments and suggestions on the progress and planned improvements to the Public Health Team or Ward Councillors;
- (3) for Councillors to suggest the Public Health Team, any further knowledge or support they would require to progress their work on the public health and wellbeing agenda within their Area;
- (4) for Alison Challenger, Director of Public Health, to request form the Clinical Commissioning Group an update for the Councillors and Committee on the concerns that there is a shortage of GPs in the City, specifically relating to the closure of the Doctors Corner branch (Linden Medical Group) on Russell Drive.

78 COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES' ISSUES AND FEEDBACK

Community Representatives were invited to update the Committee on any issues relevant to their group.

North Wollaton Resident's Association – There has been little activity of late on the Radford Bridge Road development.

The Chair informed the Committee that he was having on-going discussions with Planning Colleagues and the developers. Councillors have requested a meeting with the developers and allotment holders to progress the relocation of allotments by March when the growing season starts. Clarity will also be sought regarding some potentially incorrect information which has been circulated regarding the development. The outcome of the \planning appeal is not likely to be available until the end of the year.

<u>Friends of Wollaton Park</u> - Are investigating fundraising options and will approach other groups to identify which approaches are most successful.

<u>Wollaton Park Resident's Association</u> – Concern is rising regarding what appears to be a further increase in the number of Houses in Multiple Population (HMOs) in the area.

Wollaton and Lenton Abbey Area Committee (Area 7) - 28.11.16

Councillor Longford responded that the issue was recognised and applications for HMOs were subject to a consultation period as part of the application process. It is noted that the latest application will close at the beginning of December and that to date a lot of concerns have been raised regarding the number of HMOs in such a small area.

Sheila Roper Community Association - The refurbishment of the Centre is nearing completion.

79 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES UPDATE AND APPROVALS

Paul Howard, Tenancy and Estate Manager, presented the report which updated the Committee on Nottingham City Homes (NCH) performance, engagement activity and requested consideration of an environmental project.

The following points were highlighted:

- (a) the refurbishment work of the Sheila Roper Centre is progressing well and a meeting will be held shortly to discuss the re-launch in the New Year. This will include renaming with suggestions to be submitted by 6 January 2017;
- (b) Central Government's proposal of 'Pay to Stay' for Social Housing tenant's earning above £31,000 per annum has been withdrawn;
- (c) Swim or Fit for £1 is open to tenants and leaseholders to access swimming, gym or fitness facilities for a cost of only £1;
- (d) with regard to antisocial behaviour (ASB) noise nuisance, a new mobile phone application is being trialled with NCH tenants which enables the noise nuisance to be recorded and fed to the central data base which is monitored by NCH and can, if necessary, use the recording as evidence to address the problem. So far this has proved very helpful and will be rolled out to more tenants;
- (e) sustainability of NCH properties within the Area is the best within the City at 100%.

85 <u>DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS</u>

Councillor Georgina Culley expressed an interest in item 4 and did not take part in the discussion.

86 PROPOSAL FOR A SCHEME OF SELECTIVE LICENSING FOR PRIVATELY RENTED HOUSES

Graham de Max, Housing Strategy and Partnerships Manager, gave a presentation and introduced a report consulting the Committee on a proposal to introduce a citywide selective licensing scheme for privately rented houses. Graham highlighted the following:

- (a) the scheme forms part of the Council Plan, and is part of a wider housing strategy to improve standards and living conditions, make improvements for residents and communities and reduce crime and antisocial behaviour;
- (b) licensing is already mandatory for larger Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMOs), and there is additional licensing in place for smaller HMOs. This proposal would potentially cover the majority of the remainder of the privately rented houses in the city;
- (c) Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward has a high proportion of privately rented houses, with significant property condition issues and deprivation and large parts of the ward suffering from antisocial behaviour and crime. Wollaton West ward has a smaller proportion of private rental, but has been included for coherence of the scheme;
- (d) further consultation on the scheme and the consultation can be found at www.nottinghamcity.gov.uk/qualityhousingforall with an online survey at www.nottinghamcity.gov.uk/selectivelicensing. The deadline for the consultation is 31st March 2017;

The following points were raised during the discussion which followed:

- (e) the existing licensing scheme for HMOs has improved behaviour. The majority of landlords have good standards, but some don't and this scheme will bring them all up to standard;
- (f) inspection of properties will be done on a reactive basis rather than all properties being routinely inspected. The cost of this will be covered by the license fee.

 Tenants will be encouraged to report any problems that need resolving;
- (g) there is no legal requirement to register rented properties so some may stay under the radar. However, these will be at a disadvantage legally if discovered. If there is blanket coverage of private rented properties across the city, tenants should realise that their homes should be licensed.

RESOLVED to note the contents of the report.

87 POLICING UPDATE

Inspector Robert Wilson, Nottinghamshire Police, gave a verbal update on policing and crime in the area, highlighting the following:

Wollaton West

Wollaton and Lenton Abbey Area Committee (Area 7) - 27.02.17

- there are ongoing parking issues around the ward. Leaflets are placed on inconsiderately parked cars and around schools. Parking outside schools is a citywide problem and there is ongoing work on this;
- (b) since April 2016, overall crime has reduced by 69 offences, burglary from homes has reduced and theft from cars has considerably reduced. However, antisocial behaviour has increased by 12%;
- (c) there are ongoing speeding operations taking place in the Torvill Drive area, with some success in the afternoon, and more work expected in the mornings;

Councillors noted that cameras procured for tackling antisocial behaviour have since been moved to other areas and never returned, and sought assurance that this would not happen again. Inspector Wilson ensured that this would be fed back.

Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey

- (d) there has been a decrease in antisocial behaviour, but an increase in domestic violence. There has been an reduction of home burglaries but an increase of shed or garage burglaries, mostly at the university;
- (e) there has been a large increase in cycle theft since Christmas of 24 offences.

 Operations have taken place to tackle this with a tracker bike and CCTV footage;
- (f) the university does have a security team who can gather intelligence and pass information to the police, but they cannot make arrests.

Paul highlighted the work to improve the Sheila Roper Centre in Lenton Abbey which is almost complete. NCH recorded their gratitude to Councillors Longford and Webster for their support, as well as the contractors who offered their services for free.

89 RADFORD BRIDGE ROAD ALLOTMENTS AND DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Jennifer Cole, Principle Planning Officer, updated the Committee on developments taking place on the Radford Bridge Road allotment site.

Jennifer told the Committee the planning permission has recently been granted for phase 1 which is work on new allotments, and the application for phase 2 has recently been received. The developers have asked for advice on phase 3, the housing element, and will be meeting with the Planning department on Wednesday 1st March.

The following points were raised during the discussion which followed:

- (a) in the Local Plan the allotments were designated as open space. However, they are private allotments so not statutory;
- (b) phase 1 was due to start in February but there has been problems with access and the developers are assessing options. The Highways department turned down permission to access the site from Reynolds Drive, stating that is is unsuitable for heavy vehicles;
- (c) there is likely to be very little reason to refuse permission for the housing, unless the developers stay within their boundaries or they increase the number of houses;
- (d) hedgerows and trees that have been cut down around the site have been agreed by Planning officers. These will be replanted and there will be a fence erected around the site.

North Wollaton Residents' Association are supportive of the reinstatement of the allotments and moving forward, and would like to be informed on progress where possible.

RESOLVED to

(1) thank Jennifer for the verbal update;

(2) approach the Highways department to negotiate about access to the site.


A few words from our Service Manager . . .






photo display, a presentation of the care pathway and a panel who answered questions from the audience.

Trans4Me wins another award




'In Different Shoes'

Well Done Fuzi!

Fuzi Bradshaw has been awarded the MST Sustained Excellence award (an ESSY) in the category of Therapist

Adherence and will be collecting his award at the MST International Conference on March 6-7th in Charleston, South Carolina! The **Therapist** Adherance is based on feedback that families provide regarding their

experience of the therapy and therapist (please see attached what questions families are asked). Families complete this questionnaire monthly throughout the treatment process. All the scores are collated by MST Services and measured against other MST teams worldwide. Fuzi is in the top 1% of highly adherent therapists worldwide.

Fuzi has worked for the Multisystemic Therapy (MST) team for 3 years in June. He is a high dedicated therapist and has been able to engage with families that often face so many complex barriers in their

> capacity to engage with services. Fuzi never gives up and tries to understand what those barriers are and collaboratively finds ways to move beyond or around barriers to

engagement. Many families have fed back that they feel Fuzi understands what difficulties they are facing as a family and he works tirelessly to provide interventions that are cocreated with the family. In times of crisis, Fuzi gives hope and remains strength focused enabling families to rebuild relationships and for young people to re-engage in prosocial activities, school and educational systems and within their communities.

What is MST?

MST is an intensive family and community based intervention that targets the multiple causes of antisocial behaviour in young people. During the assessment and treatment process a therapist works with the young person, their family and all the systems in a young person's ecology such as peers, school and community. MST aims to prevent out of home placements and antisocial behaviour. MST is a regulated licensed evidence based intervention with proven results in numerous studies. Therapists undertake weekly group supervision with both a clinical supervisor and consultant. MST is a home based, goal orientated programmed where therapists are on call 24hours a day, seven days a week. Therapists work intensively with families, approximately 4 sessions a week, length of treatment is typically 3-5months. - We will also be meeting with Dr Nicola Wright from Nottingham University to discuss research in to mental health were we can have our say on potential research proposals in terms of how meaningful they would be to us.

Body Dysmorphic Disorder

What you need to know:

- ❖ Affects 1-2% of the population
- Equally common in men and women
- Estimated to go undiagnosed and untreated for periods of up to 15 years
- ❖ 76% of people with BDD will experience major depressive disorder at some stage in their life
- Approximately 37% of people with BDD will experience Social Anxiety
- Around 32% will experience Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder
- 1 in 4 people affected by BDD attempt suicide
- BDD commonly starts in adolescence

What to look for:

- Preoccupation with a defect in their personal appearance
- Defect is either imagined or, if a slight physical anomaly is present, the concern about it is markedly excessive
- Preoccupation causes significant distress or impairment in daily functioning.
- Excessive time spent looking in mirrors, or avoidance of mirrors, "camouflaging" perceived defect, avoidance, reassurance seeking, cosmetic surgery and/or self-surgery.
- Areas of preoccupation are commonly around the face and head (e.g. size/shape of nose, colour of complexion, acne, facial asymmetry, hair), although concern may focus on other areas of the body.

SHARP 4 Parents

SHARP 4 Parents is a Parent/Carer information and support workshop for parents and carers to gain peer support, gather information from facilitators and build confidence in a safe and friendly environment.



Workshops will cover various focuses such as; a) an overall understanding of self-harm; what we understand by it, methods, potential risk factors and warning signs and how to support young people identifying potential distractions and coping strategies, b) Self-harm and safety in the home; looking at harm minimisation, safe storage, increasing communication and reducing isolation and c) Relationships and self-harm; acknowledging the impact of selfharm on the family, building communication and positive activities.



There are some great apps available for young people and adults, here are some tried and tested . . .

Stem 4

Uses ideas from an evidence-based therapy called DBT. The focus is to help learn to identify and



manage your 'emotional' mind with positive impact. The app enables you to track your progress. Please note that the app is an aid in treatment but does not replace it.

Stop Self-Harm

Stop Self-harm includes sound assets and possibilities of

making your own recording, which reduces the impulses of



inflicting self-harm. The sound files can be connected to a countdown timer to be scheduled at a later point, i.e. in 2 hours when a challenging situation is expected to occur. The app also features an FAQ about Self-harm and relevant links to web resources.

What's Up?

What's Up? is a fantastic free

app utilising some of the best CBT (Cognitive Behavioural Therapy) and



ACT (Acceptance Commitment Therapy) methods to help you

cope with Depression, Anxiety, Anger, Stress and more! With a beautiful, modern design, simple heading and easy-to-follow methods, you can get to what helps you the most in seconds.

Mindshift

Struggling with anxiety? Tired of missing out? There are things you can do to stop anxiety and

fear from controlling your life. MindShift is an app designed to



help teens and young adults cope with anxiety. It can help you change how you think about anxiety. Rather than trying to avoid anxiety, you can make an important shift and face it.

Stay Alive

This app is a pocket suicide prevention resource, packed full of useful information to help



e

you stay safe. You can use it if you are having thoughts of suicide or if

you are concerned about someone else who may be considering suicide. In addition to the resources, the app includes a safety plan, customisable reasons for living, and a life box where you can store photos that are important to you.

Talking Self-harm Safety with Young People

Are you worried about a current injury or harm?

- Find out about current medical needs and see to these first.
- Talk about keeping wounds clean and looked after.
- ❖ Talk about where medical support can be accessed i.e. school nurse, first aider, GP, NHS 111, NHS Walk-In Centre, and Children's Emergency department

How do you cope when you are having a bad day?

- Find out other ways in which the young person copes and build upon these.
- Talk about things that help them feel calm, distracted, happy and connected with others
- Who can the young person go to – give information about support services i.e. Childline: 0800 1111, Kooth.com and CAMHS


But memory serves as an index of identity. Memories legitimate our selfhood and authenticate our relationships to others.

The idea is that schools will then take the mantle and run further groups, with the link worker on hand to provide support if needed.



NGYmyplace Impact Report

History

Background to the Myplace Programme

In 2005, the Labour Government included in their election manifesto a commitment to provide world class youth centres across the country. This became the Myplace Programme delivered by BIG Lottery on behalf of the Dept. of Education. The programme was rolled out from 2007 with the first grants awarded from 2008. The criteria for applications included a partnership between the Local Authority and the Voluntary Sector as well as participation from young people. 63 projects were funded across the country with the Nottingham City Council awarded £4.9 million in March 2009.

Original Partnership

Prior to the bid an open meeting was held for any interested organisations to have an input into what a "World Class" centre would look like and where this should be. Work with young people also fed into this using surveys and participation from the Youth Council.

The final partnership was agreed with the following organisations:

- Nottingham City Council
- Nottinghamshire YMCA
- Connexions
- Nottingham City PCT
- Compass Young Peoples Service
- Nottingham Forest Football in the Community
- Base 51

A partnership agreement was drawn up for the purpose of the application and agreed in principle by the partner organisations.

Base 51 involvement

In 2006 Base 51 (then operating as HINT) was given notice that the building Base 51 occupied on Glasshouse Street was to be sold for development. Nottingham City Council gave an assurance the Base 51 would be supported to relocate and a number of meetings with NCC over the following two years to establish what was needed by Base 51 and to consider the options. Because of the diverse services offered by Base 51 this proved to be a challenge; therefore when the opportunity to become part of the Myplace partnership arose, this presented a solution for NCC to relocate Base 51 within the new centre. Base 51 recognised this as a solution and an opportunity, but also acknowledged the importance in maintaining the independence of the organisation.

Nottingham City Council became the lead organisation in coordinating the bid and being the main contact for BIG. It was always intended that the project would be led by a voluntary sector organisation and rather than set up a new charity, it was agreed by the partners that Base 51 would take the lead as the organisation holding relevant experience to run a Myplace Centre and in March 2009 we were notified the bid was successful.

The Building

The building had been identified and secured before it was known the bid was successful. As Base 51 had found previously (when notice was served on the Glasshouse Street building) finding a suitable city centre building) to host all the requirements of the partners was challenging. Out of three available the Castlegate building seemed to have the most potential (although at that stage we were unaware of the grade11 listing!) and the one preferred by young people. Because of the limited options NCC purchased the building to support the bid.

Governance

The building was signed over to Base 51 as the lead organisation early in 2012 as the building was completed.

The Base 51 Board of trustees was strengthened to reflect the increased responsibilities for NGY with a successful recruitment drive in 2011, bringing in an additional 6 trustees.

Where we are now: NGY opened with a membership programme which enable young people to register as a member and they would be given a membership card which gave them access to the "open access" areas of the building. (See figure 3)The system also provided anonymous data (see below) showing the use, busiest times etc.





Fig. 1 shows the number of members for each year. Over the years we have developed the membership and now the majority of young people using the services become a member. The 2nd year (2013 -14) is the highest but all young people renewed their membership this year. On average 1,200 young people join NGY each year. A total of 6628 young people have become members since 2012.

Over the years the number of individuals have grown and young people are engaging for longer. (see Fig. 2) 2016 – 17 is by far the highest number of individuals using NGY, although the number of new members did fall slightly, demonstrating that young people are coming back to use the centre.




Young people "Swipe" into the building - so a visit may be more than once. The figures in Fig. 3 show the amount of traffic going through reception. In the later years there has been a decrease in visits but an increase in individuals which suggests young people are staying in the building longer. Visits in 2015-16 were unusually high, due to the timetable for this period. A short closure between sessions resulted in young people reentering the building.

As we developed the monitoring using NET2 we could average out the attendance figures for the days of the week. (Fig. 4) Wednesday evening is Outburst for LGBT young people and Thursday evenings we work with The Refugee Forum both our busiest evenings. The changes in the timetable is reflected in both Fig3&4. Our daytime sessions in 2015-16 were open to 16 - 17 year olds, which changed to 19-25yrs in 2016 -17. The ages for daytime sessions will revert back to under 19's in 2017

We report on the first part of the postcode for each person – there are ambiguous areas where city and county postcodes join. Many young people may live in the county but attend city schools and colleges- and of course many young people come into the city. Both Base 51 and YMCA are funded to deliver services in the county which contributes to the county figures. The high numbers of "NFA" (No Fixed Abode) were from the earlier years when Base 51 received funding to work with homeless young people. This ended in 2015.

Our Achievements

- NGY open 6 years; we have maintained our 7 days a week, daytime and evening opening since 2012, despite a reduction in funding
- 6628 members registered since 2013
- YMCA delivering projects and universal provision in the evenings
- YMCA brought their ZONE project to NGY in sept 14, which became an independent organisation in 2015, RISE which continued to deliver learning to young people excluded/at risk of exclusion from school.
- New partnerships have been developed with St Nic's and The Refugee Forum, with joint sessions delivered
- Partnerships developed with Boots, Sainsbury's and Capital One.
- Base 51 has increased the GYM provision, offering sessions after school.
- Base 51 Counselling Service included in the City's Behavioural and Mental Health Pathway and from 2017 working alongside CAMHS colleagues in the Single Point of Access (SPA) - On average 450 young people per year are supported through the counselling service.
- Base 51 with Nightstop actively involved in developing the Nottingham Protocol for Homeless 16&17 year olds.
- A dedicated session, "Outburst" for LGBT young people each week.
- Timetable separated into "targeted" support and "universal" provision enabling:
 - Services to be age appropriate
 - A NGY youth club to run in the evenings
 - Staff appointed for skills to run sessions
- Marketing strategy revised in 2014 and subsequently in 2016 with a focus on outreach
- Senior member programme established
- 3 Development Days held each year for all staff, volunteers, partners and senior members to engage.
- In 2014 a review of the Base 51 Mission, Vision and Values undertaken with clear objectives for NGY.
- Volunteer programme established
- Trustee Board actively involved
- Young people's representative sits on the Marketing Sub Group and Senior Members present at Board meetings; we are working with young people to enable them to be appropriately involved at Board level

Challenges

- The Partnership changed almost before we opened in 2012:
 - Connexions became Futures and remit changed so not able to deliver in NGY
 - Primary Care changed to Sexual Health provided through NUH with clinics reduced over the years.
 - NFFiC due to lack of funding unable to sustain running the gym other that one session a week.
 - Compass; the young people's drug and alcohol service did not include delivery from NGY; therefore when Compass lost the tender they also moved from the building
- Adjusting to the current economic environment
- Running a multi- purpose building 7 days a week, predominately 9am 9pm
- Changes in the partnership
- Funding for partners impacting on their delivery, as Nottingham City Council moved grant aid out to the localities
- Managing the "mix" of young people
- Marketing NGY to all young people

Young People

- Membership currently stands at over 6,000 (This is an accumulative figure from 2013) and from April 1st 2017 all young people will register again.
- Average attendances each day are over 30 young people. The timetable has undergone considerable change to meet the needs of young people, partners and to ensure support and activities are age appropriate. The model has settled to a Targeted Support Service during the day (from 2016 for 18 25 yrs.) and a Universal service "NGY Youth Club" from 3.30 8pm in the evenings for 11 -19s. As the number of over 18's has reduced significantly the daytime sessions will be targeting 16 17 yrs. in 2017 especially those attending local colleges There will still be a service for over 18's, through one-to-one support and the Counselling Service.
- It is worth noting that although a universal service, the evening sessions are supporting vulnerable young people; issues brought by young people include:
 - Mental Health
 - Self-harm and suicidal thoughts
 - Relationships (with family and friendships)
 - Bullying
 - Transgender and gender identity

A senior member's programme has been successfully developed to develop and train young people to take on roles in NGY such as supporting staff to deliver activities, provide regular feedback and sit on recruitment interview panels. It is intended senior members will become part of the Base 51 Board structure (Further detailed information on activities, monitoring and young people is available)

Marketing

Constraints in time and cost coupled with a building which is grade II listed has put barriers against more obvious signage in place for NGY – The current marketing strategy focuses on increasing our reach to young people within our current budget. An Outreach team has been established and started to be operational in February 2015. Schools have been the focus outreach as well as events and youth organisations.

Funding

The original budget was set on the anticipated cost of running the NGY building against anticipated income. Some partners agreed to contribute under their Licence agreement and room usage (Base 51, YMCA and Compass).NFFiC from the beginning of the partnership could only agree to provide GYM staff for limited hours each week. Futures were not able to provide any workers for NGY as their staff are target driven and could not come into NGY without a guarantee that they could meet these - although it had been acknowledged they would bring a limited amount of funding in, this never happened.

The budget was balanced with the fundraising figure and it was not identified that this would have to be donations outside of project funding. Many trust funds will not fund core costs and therefore only sponsorship or donations would fall into this category – a huge task in this current climate and with limited staffing resources.

Base 51 has undergone a staffing restructure to reflect the needs of the organisation. This resulted in a number of posts being reconfigured while ensuring the front line delivery was protected.

To ensure full use of the building, provide sustainability and to broaden the reach to young people, the Nottingham Youth Offending Team will be moving part of their service to NGY from the summer of 2017.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 1.1 The Nottingham City Homes Update provides a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at an area level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, and challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 The update also monitors progress in the wards and acts as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Nottingham City Homes previously reported on performance at local Area Panels that sat below the respective Area Committees. These panels were attended by local residents, local Councillors and partner agencies.
- 2.2 Nottingham City Homes has a goal to 'create homes and places where people want to live' and to give tenants and leaseholders an input in shaping what happens in their area. The Nottingham City Homes Update and Performance Report is one of a number of initiatives that increases the transparency and accountability of the Company's performance.
- 2.3 Following the decision for Nottingham City Homes reps to attend Area Committee, it was decided to provide the Nottingham City Homes Update Report to Area Committee. Appendices 1 and 2 provide the latest performance position for the committee to note and comment on.
- 2.4 Appendix 3 outlines the remaining capital budget for this area for noting and provides detail of any schemes that require approval by the Committee.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Each ward manages a set of priorities and key issues through regular meetings of its Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT). These meetings are led by Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs) and supported by core partners including Nottingham City Homes (NCH), Neighbourhood Policing, Community Protection, Early Help, City Services / Waste Management; Fire and Rescue Services and Health.

- 1.2 Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.
- 1.3 Ward priorities are identified and informed from a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 1.4 The current Ward report incorporates the wider area priorities previously reported to area committee, so that in future there will be only one consistent Ward report (attached as an Appendix) and the Area Priorities Action Plan will be discontinued. Area Committee Chairs will be invited to review this latest report to ensure that its format is accessible and there is sufficient consistency across the areas.
- 1.5 The list of events and activities will take account of the work which all NDOs undertake with partner organisations within their ward and shows the depth of activity in place working alongside neighbourhood management to improve social cohesion and tackle priorities at a ward and area level.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Wollaton West and Wollaton East & Lenton Abbey wards sit within the Wollaton and Lenton Abbey Area 7 Committee which originally adopted four area based priorities at its first Area Cluster meeting Safe and clean neighbourhoods, Young people, Health and Wellbeing for older people and Parks, open spaces, leisure and culture.
- 2.2 These priorities demonstrate a link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015 19. Actions for each priority will be developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships.
- 2.3 The area priorities listed in 2.1 sit within wider pieces of work and broader agendas which are being addressed by multi agency approaches across the City. At a Ward level it is important to identify how some of these more complex priorities can be addressed at a local level, either ward or area, by introducing local solutions. This could, for example, include more targeted use of funding such as Ward Councillor budgets to support targeted youth/ healthy activities initiatives or the use of Area Capital funding to reduce parking issues in the ward.
- 2.4 The current Ward priorities which have been reported previously through the area committee performance reports are shown in the separate appendices for each ward. These priorities will be updated for each area committee, taking into account discussions at NAT meetings and various groups and activities involving Councillors and local residents.
- 2.5 The Ward information is contained in the attached appendices, as follows:-

- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
