#### 43 ISSUES FROM COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

Issues raised were grime hotspots and fly-tipping and whether enough was being done to reduce both, such as fines being given to offenders.

#### 44 POLICE UPDATE

Inspector Fenwick, Notts Police, and SCPO Burns, Community Protection, updated the Committee on policing matters in the wards, including crime and arrest figures, local initiatives to address crime and anti-social behaviour and current police / Community Protection areas of focus.

#### **RESOLVED** to note the update.

#### 45 ROAD SAFETY WARD REPORTS 2016

Chris Berry, Road Safety Project Officer, presented the report, which detailed accident trends and 'clusters' (four or more accidents at the same spot) within the wards over the last 5 years. The report highlighted problem areas as follows:

#### **Basford**

B682 Nottingham Road junction with Western Boulevard: 15 accidents / 21 casualties.

- This cluster spreads west to include the junction with Scotland Road;
- 3 casualties sustained serious injuries;
- At this site there has been 1 accident involving a pedestrian, 6 accidents involving pedal cycles, 1 involving a child and 1 involving a powered two-wheeler.

B6004 Southwark Street/David Lane junction with the B682 Vernon Road: 14 accidents / 23 casualties.

- 1 casualty sustained serious injuries;
- At this site there has been 1 accident involving a pedestrian, 4 accidents involving pedal cycles, 5 involving a child and 2 involving a powered two-wheeler.

B6004 Stockhill Lane junction with the A610 Nuthall Road: 12 accidents / 13 casualties.

• 1 casualty sustained serious injuries;

• At this site there have been 2 accidents involving a pedestrian, 2 accidents involving pedal cycles, 2 involving a child and 2 involving a powered two-wheeler.

A611 Hucknall Road junction with Arnold Road: 11 accidents / 13 casualties.

• At this site there have been 4 accidents involving a pedestrian, 1 accident involving pedal cycles and 1 involving a child.

B682 Vernon Road junction with Nottingham Road (mini roundabout): 12 accidents / 13 casualties.

- 1 casualty sustained serious injuries;
- At this site there have been 2 accidents involving a pedestrian and 2 involving a child.

#### <u>Bestwood</u>

A611 Hucknall Road junction with Kersall Drive: 6 accidents / 9 casualties.

- This cluster is on the boundary of the adjacent Basford and Bulwell Forest Wards;
- 1 casualty sustained serious injuries;
- At this site there have been 1 accident involving pedal cycles and 2 involving a powered two-wheeler.

A611 Hucknall Road junction with Arnold Road: 6 accidents / 15 casualties.

• At this site there have been 2 accidents involving a child, 3 involving OAPs and 2 involving a powered two-wheeler.

Bestwood Park Drive junction with Deer Park Drive: 5 accidents / 5 casualties.

- 2 casualty sustained serious injuries;
- At this site there have been 4 accidents involving pedal cycles.

Beckhampton Road junction with Bestwood Park Drive: 4 accidents / 4 casualties.

• At this site there have been 2 accidents involving pedestrians and 1 involving a child.

#### **RESOLVED** to note the report.

#### 46 <u>PROPOSAL FOR A SCHEME OF SELECTIVE LICENSING FOR</u> <u>PRIVATELY RENTED HOUSES</u>

Lisa Ball, Strategic Planning and Performance Consultant, delivered a presentation to accompany the joint report of the Corporate Directors of Development and Growth, and Commercial and Operations, on a proposal to introduce a scheme of selective licensing for privately rented houses within the City to meet the commitment for quality housing for all.

#### Basford and Bestwood Area Committee - 29.03.17

The aim of the scheme is to ensure that privately rented accommodation meets a minimum standard and to reduce anti-social behaviour. The City Council's Executive Board have approved that public consultation is undertaken between January 16 and 31 March 2017, the outcome of which will determine if the scheme will be submitted to the Secretary of State for final approval.

The following points were highlighted and questions responded to:

- a) there will be a charge of £600 every five years to private rented landlords, reduced to £460 for accredited landlords. This will contribute to the cost of operating the scheme and will be used to support the aims of the scheme;
- b) if implemented, the scheme will operate alongside existing housing schemes such as that for Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMOs);
- although some wards within the City have relatively few private rented properties, such as Bulwell Forest, the whole City will be included within the scheme to ensure coherence;
- d) the proposed licensing scheme is part of an overall housing strategy which also includes a homelessness strategy. Homelessness organisations including the City Council Homelessness Team and Framework have been invited to take part in the consultation;
- e) in addition to ensuring that landlords are fully informed and aware of any new and emerging legislation, if landlords are having problems with tenants, the scheme will provide advice, support and training, support and advice will also be available for tenants having problems with their landlords;
- f) if agreed, the scheme will become compulsory and all private rented landlords who are not included in any other schemes, such as HMO's, will need to apply for a licence or be fined;
- g) if the standards of the scheme are not complied to, enforcement action will be taken;
- h) if agreed, the scheme could be in place by Spring 2018;
- i) details of how the accreditation panels will assess landlords are within the consultation document;
- j) random checks will be undertaken by Environmental Health colleagues on a variety of properties to ensure eligible landlords are registered;
- k) there are several similar schemes already operating throughout the country, but if agreed, few will be as large as the Nottingham model.

RESOLVED to note the proposed scheme and consultation process detailed within the report, and to encourage partners to actively contribute to the consultation process.

Wade Adams, Area Housing Manager, Nottingham City Homes, updated the Committee on performance against key issues and themes linked to local priorities and strategic themes for NCH, including the capital programme / major works, area regeneration / environmental issues, key messages from the Tenant and Leaseholder Congress, Tenant and Resident Association updates, area performance and positive publicity.

#### **RESOLVED** to note the update.

RESOLVED to note that there are no schemes for approval at this meeting and, as such, the remaining available balances are £95,055.70 (Basford) and £56,241.33 (Bestwood).

The opportunity was given for feedback from elected members and others present so that future activity may be adjusted to reflect the observations of Area Committee. This open approach was once again welcomes, with agreement by ward members to assist in any way they can, together or separately by ward or interest in particular priority. Reports to all Area Committee meetings were offered and welcomed.

#### **1.3 General overview**

As will be seen in the report, almost without exception all outputs and outcomes have been achieved or exceeded in qu 2. In the few instances where anticipated activity has not taken place, this is noted under Emerging Issues for each priority or in qu. 4 activity. It is at this stage confidently expected that all outputs and outcomes for the year will be met or exceeded.

It remains, of course, the policy of The Bestwood Partnership, in line with the requirements of the SLA, to check that the principle of counting individuals once in each year, and not multiple attendances, is operative. Partners now understand this well, and co-operation in this is good. Templates for monitoring by partners have been amended again to pick up more clearly on one-off events and distinguish repeat events (such as clubs, groups meeting weekly or at a fixed frequency). Final annual adjustments adjustments will be made in the qu. 4 monitoring in order to catch an accurate picture of the full year, as explained in qu. 2 monitoring.

Priority 4 (Community Associations) and 5 (Voluntary and Community Sector Support in many instances continue to overlap, so outputs and outcomes in one are often addressed by organisations operating under the other. This is inevitable, and good, showing the close working between partners in these two strands of the funding. But, once again, the same outputs and outcomes are not duplicated across priorities, counted only once across the total.

There has been some partner change, in that the Partnership-Council has ceased to exist and Heathfield Community Association is non-functioning, other partners taking on the responsibilities originally allocated: this has had ge state impact on overall performance.

Partnerships have been developed with Tenants and Residents Associations in Basford and increase in sports sessions as a consequence of such consultation.

New key outreach areas (hotspots) are Riber, the tram stop, Heathfield, Highbury Vale, Bramble Close and Rosegay in Basford, and continuing with five in Bestwood.

Representation from the Partnership at the YPP panel for the area, in line with NCC requirements in the ABG SLA and NCC Early Years expectations. This is proving effective in beginning to generate referrals to our activity.

CBF/AAF worked with both Basford and Bestwood NDOs on shaping the young peopls's offer in the area.

CBF/AAF worked with the local football reams on signposting young people into organised sport.

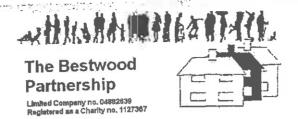

#### 1.3 General overview

As will be seen in the report, almost without exception all outputs and outcomes have been achieved or exceeded in qu 4. In the few instances where anticipated activity has not taken place, this is noted under Emerging Issues for each priority or in activity for 2017-18. Slight revisions to outputs and outcomes for 2017-18 will reflect actual performance.

It remains, of course, the policy of The Bestwood Partnership, in line with the requirements of the SLA, to check that the principle of counting individuals once in each year, and not multiple attendances, is operative, with good Partner compliance. Templates for monitoring by partners now pick up clearly one-off events and distinguish repeat events (such as clubs, groups meeting weekly or at a fixed frequency). Qu. 4 monitoring is adjutsed to catch an accurate picture of the full year.

Priority 4 (Community Associations) and 5 (Voluntary and Community Sector Support) in many instances continue to overlap, so outputs and outcomes in one are often addressed by organisations operating under the other. This is inevitable, and good, showing the close working between partners in these two strands of the funding. But, once again, the same outputs and outcomes are not duplicated across priorities, counted only once across the total.

New Partner activity has been identified in this quarter and will take effect in 2017-18. Additionally, changed to outputs and outcomes have been agreed by the Partners, who met together at the Conference on 11<sup>th</sup> March and new Partners at a subsequent consultation and signing of agreements etc. This means that despite a reduction in funding in 2017-18 (albeit small) our delivery in 2017-18 will increase in breadth and quantitatively.

#### 1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Each Area Committee has agreed priorities which link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015 - 19. - 2.2 Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.
- 2.3 Ward priorities are identified and informed from a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 2.4 Ward reports also reflect some of the wider area concerns and priorities which have been either addressed previously through area committee or have been developed as part of the Area Cluster reviews. Some of these wider priorities such as youth provision will be taken forward through appropriate area focussed meetings.
- 2.5 The intention is to work towards a Ward Report which is consistent across all City wards. It will provide details of the pledges which Councillors have prioritised for their respective wards.
- 2.6 The previous Area Committee Priorities Action Plan will be incorporated within the ward plans to avoid any duplication.
- 2.7 Area Committee Chairs will be invited to review the latest Ward Reports to ensure that the format is accessible for Councillors and community representatives and there is sufficient consistency across all areas.
- 2.8 The current individual Ward priorities for Basford and Bestwood are shown in Appendix 1 and 2 respectively and will be updated for each Area Committee.
- 2.9 The ward priorities also make reference to a number of development sites which are listed within the Neighbourhood Regeneration Strategy document Building a Better Nottingham.

### 1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importapgetosbocal communities.

- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved at the Executive Board meeting on 21 February 2017 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2017-18. At the same meeting a citywide allocation of General Fund Element (public realm) of £750,000 was agreed.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress

### 2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme, have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund and the Local Transport Plan (LTP). To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
