5 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 13 February 2018 were confirmed as a true record and were signed by the chair.

6 AREA 6 COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

Michelle Graley, Neighbourhood Development Office, introduced the report on Area 6 Community Representatives to the Committee. She advised the Committee that there had been a lower than usual number of representatives nominated.

RESOLVED to:

- (1) Note the formal appointment of Community Representatives from the Dales, Mapperley and St Ann's wards as detailed in appendix 2 of the report, published with the agenda, for the municipal year 2018/19; and
- (2) Receive a further report at the September Committee with a view to noting the formal appointment of any additional community representatives.

7 ISSUES AND GOOD NEWS STORIES

Community Representatives took the opportunity to update the committee on their group's activities since the last meeting:

(a) Prettier Whittier have placed a further 10 planters on the street and have spent the money granted by Nottingham in Bloom. Work is now focusing near the Greenwood Centre:

- (b) Friends of Colwick Woods advised that all footpaths had been mown and were now accessible for the public to enjoy. There is a summer gala event on 1st July between 12 -4pm for everyone to come along and enjoy. Friends of Colwick Wood also advised the committee that they had very much enjoyed hosting Framework organisation and working to help improve the mental health of their service users:
- (c) Sneinton Tenants Outreach Programme (STOP) advised the committee that Kind Edwards Park continues to be used well. There has been 4 keep fit sessions this year so far with a further 4 planned going forward. The Skate park remains popular with a number of specific training events taking place throughout the year;
- (d) The Afro-Caribbean National Artistic Centre are celebrating their 40th birthday this year. There is a celebration event on 29 September open to the whole community, all are welcome to attend.

RESOLVED to thank the Community Representatives for their attendance and for the content of their updates to the Committee.

8 AREA POLICING UPDATE

Inspector James Walker, Nottinghamshire Police introduced his verbal Area Policing Update to the committee highlighting the following points:

- (a) Generally speaking crime figures for the year to date are comparable to those from the same period last year;
- (b) Nationally there has been a 22% increase in violent crimes;
- (c) There have been three reported stabbings since the beginning of April in the area. In all cases the victim required hospital treatment and 3 different offenders have been arrested and charged with various offences. Nottinghamshire Police are very keen to reassure the public that the offenders were known to the victims and that these were not seemingly random attacks;
- (d) There was also a shooting involving two young people and a number of adults. 2 people were taken to hospital with injuries that were not life threatening. A number of arrests have been made. Incidents such as these are relatively rare and Nottinghamshire Police are keen to stress that there was no risk to the general public as a result of these incidents;
- (e) Extra resources have been allocated to the area to help offer reassurance to the public and to deter further incidents from happening. The 3G camera will also be set up as a deterrent and to help reassure the public;
- (f) In addition to these extra resources there are 2 new officers who have been allocated to the area who will be patrolling with more experienced officers and completing their probationary period;

Following discussion and questions from the Committee and Community Representatives the following additional information was given:

- (g) There are work programmes taking place to tackle the transport of firearms into Nottinghamshire at a higher level within Nottinghamshire Police. There is also a team specifically looking at firearms within the City boundary;
- (h) Gangs that historically existed within Nottingham are no longer as prevalent. There are generalised postcode rivalries but not as embedded as the 1990's;
- (i) Communication from the Police to Councillors was not as timely as it could have been and this will be improved going forward. All a the meeting agreed that communication and being able to reassure the public was important;
- (j) There is work in the early stages that will focus on provision to work with young people who do not wish to engage in existing services and will provide a safe space;
- (k) The Youth Offending Team are working closely with Schools in the area at a level appropriate for all ages. There are workers that are also going into youth clubs and youth groups to discuss knife crime;

RESOLVED to that Inspector James Walker for his attendance at the Committee and to note the content of his verbal update.

9 PROPOSED PUBLIC SPACES PROTECTION ORDER (PSPO):
NOTTINGHAM CITY COUNCIL RESTRICTION OF PUBLIC RIGHT OF WAY
(DANE COURT, DANE CLOSE, ST ANNS) PUBLIC SPACES
PROTECTION ORDER

Abu Belim, Principal Enforcement Officer introduced the report on a Proposed Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO): Nottingham City Council Restriction of Public Right of Way (Dane Court, Dane Close, St Ann's) Public Spaces Protection Order. He highlighted the following points:

- (a) Dane Court, Dane Close is access to an independent living accommodation block. There is a history of numerous complaints about antisocial behaviour, and alleged drug dealing which is having a detrimental effect on residents:
- (b) Public consultation took place between 19 March 2018 through to 23 April 2018. Notices were posted online, and directly by hand to properties on Dane Court, Dane Close, Abbotsford Drive, Trueman Close and Alison walk;
- (c) No responses have been received from members of the public but supportive responses have been received from Nottinghamshire Police and the Police and Crime Commissioner;

RESOLVED:

(1) To note the evidence gathered and the results of the consultation on the proposal to introduce a PSPO as indicated in the draft, in Appendix 1 of the report published with the agenda, for the area shown with a solid red line on the plan (the proposed PSPO).

- (2) That, being satisfied that the test in section 59 of the 2014 Act is met, having considered the likely effect of making the proposed PSPO and the availability of an alternative route, and having regard to the rights of freedom of expression and freedom of assembly, Area Committee authorise the Director of Legal and Democratic Services and or the Head of Legal Services to make a PSPO in the form indicated in the proposed PSPO attached at Appendix 1 over the land shown with a solid red line on the plan attached to the proposed PSPO to last for a period of three years from the date that it comes into force.
- (3) To authorise the Director of Community Protection to carry out the necessary publication and arrange for appropriate signage to be erected in accordance with the legislative requirements.

10 PROPOSAL FOR SCHEME OF ADDITIONAL LICENSING FOR HOUSES IN MULTIPLE OCCUPATION

Ceri Davies, Housing Strategy Specialist, presented the report on the Proposal for a Scheme of Additional Licensing for Houses in Multiple Occupation, She highlighting the following points:

- (a) This new scheme of additional licencing incorporates further areas where a significant proportion of Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMO's) are deemed to be ineffectively managed. This are 2 new areas in St Ann's ward – the city centre around Bath Street and Brook Street and a small area around Ransom Road and Hungerhill Road;
- (b) There is a proposed increase to the fee from the existing scheme. The fees are used in the administration of the scheme and the Council is not allowed to profit from the fee's charged. The fee system is graded with accredited landlords paying less than landlords who require intensive input for services;
- (c) Public consultation is running from May to July this year and the final report will then go for consideration by the executive in September which will allow it to be put in place by the beginning of January 2019 which will ensure a continuation of regulation;

Following questions and comments from the Committee the following points were made:

- (d) Consultation is also taking place with other affected Area Committees, community groups, landlords, community protection and a number of other stakeholders:
- (e) On average the fee amounts to less than 5% of expected return and is for the 5 years of the licencing scheme.
- (f) The licencing team rely on intelligence from a range of sources to gain knowledge of properties that need to be licenced. CPO colleagues feedback a lot of information;
- (g) Failure to enter into the scheme can result in civil penalties of up to £30,000;

- (h) This scheme of additional licencing runs alongside the other licencing schemes in Nottingham City;
- Agents for landlords have been advised of the schemes and involved in the consultation process;
- (j) This additional licencing scheme does not include Air BnB properties. There are other aspects of law that deals with their short term rents;

RESOLVED to:

- (1) Note the content of the report
- (2) Encourage partners to actively contribute to the consultation process;

11 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES UPDATE

Luke Walters, Area Housing Manager Nottingham City Homes introduced the update from Nottingham City Homes and he highlighted the following points:

- (a) The Victoria Centre residents lift replacement programme will start shortly. Information events are being held to ensure residents are aware of the schedule of work and any disruption this may cause;
- (b) Work to the Victoria Centre Roof garden has been delayed due to accessibility for lifting materials on to site;
- (c) Work will start shortly at Haywood Court on improvement works. Keswick Court will be the second block to receive works. Regular events are being held to ensure residents are kept updated;
- (d) There have been major improvement works to Radbourne Road Estate and this will include resurfacing work to provide frontages to properties that can be used and kept tidy, planters will also be upgraded and work to tackle flytipping in the area is also taking place. All schemes taking place relating to Radbourne Road are subject to consultation with residents and ward councillors:
- (e) Works are planned in the West Walk area looking at external improvements alongside external wall insulation and the decent neighbourhood team are working with residents of independent living schemes regarding external grounds improvements;
- (f) There will be a number of environmental improvement works in the Stonebridge area including metal rails, gates to some properties and wooden fencing;
- (g) Nottingham City Homes won 3 awards at the UK housing awards recently, including the prestigious Landlord of the Year award;

The Committee offered their congratulations to Nottingham City Homes for their award winning work.

1	Capital Programme & major works	Improvement works continue across the City replacing kitchens, bathrooms, windows and doors when they are due for renewal through a planned programme of works. Surveys for stock condition, structural and energy performance are continuing across the City. Dane Court scooter store work is on-going and works at Woodview Court have now started. Low rise - Morley, Haywood, Byron, Keswick (The Courts) Byron Court is a little behind schedule but work is going well with the external wall insulation on the building due to complete by October. Works to Haywood and Morley will be brought forward to try and finish ahead of the March deadline. The show flat at Keswick has been a success to help tenants & residents understand the make-up of the flats and as a learning curve to understand	Information

the impact on residents. The internal remodelling works will be intrusive for residents so we are exploring options to offer respite.

A message survey was sent asking Byron residents if they used the bin chutes, more than half of those who responded do not use them and would prefer an option to recycle. More engagement and consultation is to be arranged.

2050 Properties

Battery storage has been installed, but is yet to be commissioned. Hopefully further funding will be agreed in a couple of weeks to roll out the project to other properties.

The Decent Neighbourhoods Team is also working with the NCH Energy Team to consider options for the boundary and external improvements to the West Walk area of the ward. NCH are amidst delivering their 2050 homes programme to this area and new boundaries would increase the overall finish to this project.

Victoria Centre

Lifts- the passenger lift replacement programme is progressing well.

Ventilation - Tender has been awarded to DC-UK for roof top fans - works will include replacement of fans, clean and replace vents. A programme of works is being collated for agreement and sign off.

Roof Garden- Victoria Centre roof garden has been delayed due to

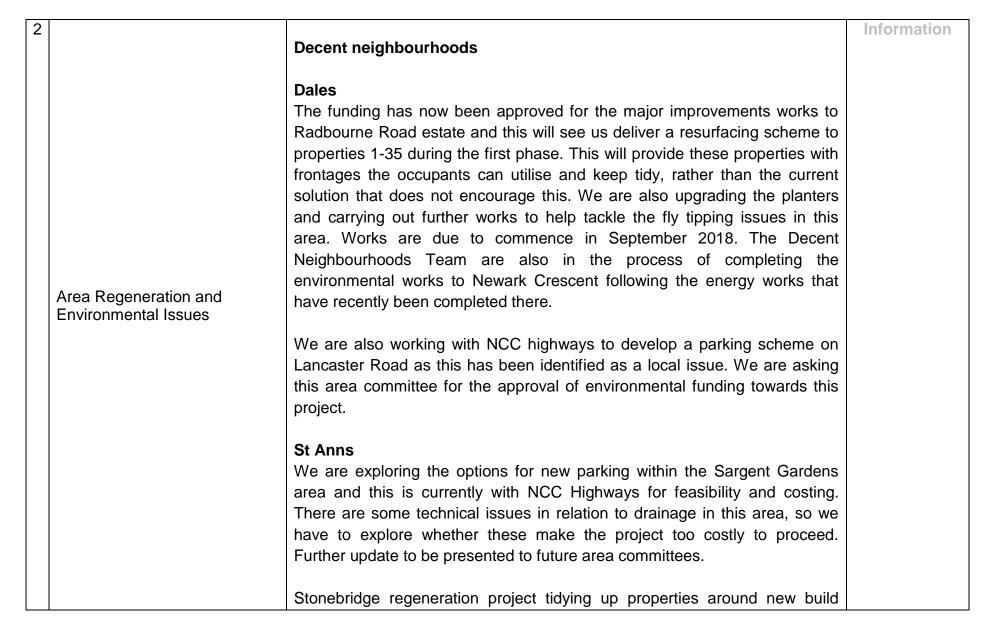
agreements needed by Intu which had originally been given but then rescinded. We are now in a position where all licence agreements have been concluded and works are due to commence on site week commencing 8 October 2018.

Programme is 18 weeks to be completed this financial year, 12 week lead in from Highways.

Bin Chute-The bin chute near passenger lifts 4 and 5 remains out of order. A specialised company have conducted more in depth surveys, which identify the chute lining is damaged in an area maintained by INTU. With the specialised company, we have looked at various ways to complete the repair with the only option being to remove the lower ground floor wall to access the chute. As this is an INTU managed area, we are working with them to progress the repair.

Sprinkler System Victoria Centre

Work has commenced on the design of the fire sprinkler system to be installed at Victoria Centre flats. This is a key activity to progress prior to commencing on site in 2019 as design and delivery discussions need to be agreed in advance with Intu to prevent any delays to the works programme. NCH Construction, Repairs and Maintenance team will be undertaking the installation of the Sprinklers at Victoria Centre.

We are continuing to contact customers by telephone and this has continued to give better quality information about the service provided. 62 surveys were completed during Q1; this is a return rate of 43%. It is pleasing to see that 90.3% of respondents were either fairly or very satisfied with being kept up to date with what was happening throughout their anti-social behaviour case. Satisfaction with the speed of interview scored the highest at 95.2%. It is pleasing to see that satisfaction with the outcome of the case has improved during Q1 and has exceeded the 87% target at 90.3% Satisfaction with support provided by staff is the lowest scoring area 88.7%, however this still exceeds the target of 87% Area Housing Managers will continue to drive high quality case management through case supervision, with an additional focus on victim support during Q2. 1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 As a Council Plan priority 'Tackle fuel poverty by setting up a not-for-profit energy company to sell energy at the lowest possible price to Nottingham people', Robin Hood Energy seeks to update the Area Committee on recent performance and report the activity being taken to tackle fuel poverty and environmental issues.
- 1.2 The Area Committee is asked to note the information, discuss its relevance for the Dales, Mapperley and St Anns and to offer Robin Hood Energy its comments or feedback.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Robin Hood Energy was established as a result of the Council Plan priority to:
 - "Tackle fuel poverty by setting up a not-for-profit energy company to sell energy at the lowest possible price to Nottingham people".
- 2.2 First launched in 2015 Robin Hood Energy was the UK's first publicly owned, not-for-profit energy company set up since 1948.
- 2.3 After three years of trading the company now has 115,000 customers from across England, Scotland and Wales.
- 2.4 Part of the reason for Robin Hood Energy's rapid growth has been its strategy of growing through 'white-label' partnerships; 'white label' is a service produced by one company (the producer) that other companies rebrand. Robin Hood Energy delivers the energy services for nine white label partners, including:
 - EBICO (National)
 - Angelic (Islington)
 - Great North Energy (Doncaster)
 - The LECCY (Liverpool)
 - RAM energy (Derby)
 - White Rose Energy (Leeds)
 - Your Energy Sussex (Sussex)
 - CitizEn Energy (Southampton)
 - Fosse (Leicester)
- 2.5 The company accounts for 2017/18 have been independently audited and show that Robin Hood Energy has made an operating surplus of £202,000. It's a big achievement given that most energy companies take at least 5 years to get to this stage.
- 2.6 The company will use their strengthened trading position to develop three initiatives:
 - 1. To voluntarily enter arrangements to offer the Warm Home Discount for older people and people on low incomes.
 - 2. To offer new green tariffs using renewable electricity certified as being provided by UK based Wind and Solar projects.
 - 3. To protect prices for Nottingham residents on prepayment meters and introduce further discounts for Nottingham citizens to help tackle fuel poverty.
- 2.7 Supporting prepayment customers remains a company priority because prepayment customers are most likely to experience fuel poverty. The independent Institute of Public Policy Research (IPPR) stated that Robin Hood Energy's socially conscious pricing structure has enabled Nottingham prepayment customers to save £87 per year.
- 2.8 By introducing lower pricing for prepayment customers Robin Hood Energy has revolutionised the whole UK energy market driving down prices, benefitting millions

- of people and prompting Ofgem (Office for Gas and Energy Markets) to introduce a price cap across the whole sector to keep prepayment tariffs consistently low.
- 2.9 To help tackle fuel poverty in Nottingham, Robin Hood Energy offers customers the chance to get £20 off their bill. The company also works with a Nottingham food bank to provide emergency fuel vouchers for vulnerable people in crisis situations people in real hardship who are often forced to choose between food and fuel.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- £27,281.40 of Section 106 open space funding was received in August 2018 from two linked neighbouring developments at Albert Road development, Mapperley. (Planning refs: 13/01946/PFUL3 and 13/01909/PFUL3). (An earlier payment of £8,109.98 was received in 2016 and its use endorsed by Area Committee on 13th February 2018.)
- 1.2 Under the Section 106 agreement relating to these developments, the Council must use it "towards the provision and/or enhancement of open space within the boundaries of the Council's Area Committee East comprising the Dales, St Ann's and Mapperley wards and within which the Site is located."

1.3 A bid to Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd (WREN) for Coppice Recreation Ground is also planned for December 2018 with a decision expected in Spring 2019.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 The Parks and Open Spaces Investment Plans for each area of the City were endorsed by Area Committees in March 2018 and the following projects from those plans have been selected for use of the Section 106 funding detailed above.

3 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 To not carry out the improvement works detailed above this would delay the Manifesto proposal to improve children's play areas across the City and the Coppice Recreation Ground play area would continue to decline in quality.
- 3.2 To use the Section 106 funding for other purposes however, it must be used on open space provision or enhancement in line with the wording in the legal agreement, as detailed above.

4 FINANCE COLLEAGUE COMMENTS (INCLUDING IMPLICATIONS AND VALUE FOR MONEY/VAT)

- 4.1 Section 106 agreement reference 13/01946/PFUL3 (former Lorna Court, Mary Court, the Croft and Mayholme, Albert Road, Alexandra Park), specified that the open space contribution should be used:
 - "towards the provision and / or enhancement of open space within the boundaries of the Council's Area Committee East comprosing the Dales, St Ann's and Mapperley wards and within which the Site is located".
- 4.2 The original agreed sum was £32,543.14 with the payments due in instalments uplifted for inflation. The full contribution has now been received, totalling £35,391.38.

This is comprised of £8,109.98 received in May 2016 and £27,281.40 received in August 2018 These sums must be spent by 11/05/2021 (£8,109.98) and 13/07/2023 (£27,281.40) respectively. The agreement contains a clause allowing for 3% of the contribution, not exceeding £4,000, to be 'top-sliced' from the receipt for the administration and monitoring of the agreement. This clause has been applied to the sum received in August, therefore £818.40 will be put towards the costs of monitoring and £26,463 is available to commit to the two projects identified.

- 4.3 The meeting of Area Committee East on 13th February 2018 endorsed the allocation of the first instalment (£8,109.98) to Colwick Country Park. This report proposes to allocate the final payment of £26,463 as follows:
 - £15,000 part-funding of Caunton Avenue Playground (improvements & other site works to be finalised via public consultation), together with £50k anticipated from a WREN bid to be made in December 2018;
 - £11,463 Improvements and works to trees on parks and open spaces across Area 6.

When formally agreed, the Capital Programme will be amended to reflect these projects and funding packages.

5 <u>LEGAL AND PROCUREMENT COLLEAGUE COMMENTS (INCLUDING RISK MANAGEMENT ISSUES, AND LEGAL, CRIME AND DISORDER ACT AND PROCUREMENT IMPLICATIONS)</u>

- 5.1 The Section 106 agreement detailed at paragraph 9.1 of this report related to two residential developments at Albert Road, Alexandra Park. The agreement obliged the developer to pay open space monies totalling £32,544.14 (index linked) in two unequal instalments, due on or before first occupation of the respective developments under planning references 13/01909/PFUL3 and 13/01946/PFUL.
- 5.2 As stated above, the agreement obliged the Council to apply the open space contribution "towards the provision and/or enhancement of open space within the boundaries of the Council's Area Committee East comprising the Dales, St Ann's and Mapperley wards and within which the Site is located." The purposes set out at paragraph 2.1 are consistent with this obligation.
- 5.3 If the open space contribution is not applied in accordance with the agreement, or if it remains unspent or uncommitted for expenditure in accordance with the agreement five years after receipt, on demand by the developer the Council will become liable to repay it.
- 5.4 Under the terms of the Council's Constitution, Area Committee has a consultative role in relation to the spending of section 106 monies in its local area, with the decision as to authorisation of funds being for the relevant Portfolio Holder (PH for Culture and Leisure in the case of open space monies).
- 5.5 The decision also seeks support for the allocation of anticipated grant monies from a WREN application due to be made in December 2018. Grants may be made by WREN from its Community Fund for amenity projects within 10 miles of a GCC Environment landfill site in WREN's operating area. In the case of Coppice Recreation Ground, that site is Eastcroft. The primary intent of the project must be the protection of the environment, and provision, maintenance or improvement of a public park, or another public amenity.
- 5.6 In the case of all grant applications approved by WREN, the Council will be required to enter into an agreement restricting the purpose to which the monies are put, delivery of progress reports, mainterpages records of income derived and provision

of documentation and expenditure details to WREN as the project is implemented. The agreement will also typically contain obligations relating to the project being accessible to the public for a minimum period, and in the event that the project is not ultimately implemented, the return of the funding to WREN.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

The Nottingham LTP strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's neighbourhoods and prioritises small-scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.

1.1 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved at the Executive Board meeting on 20 February 2018 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2018 -19 was approved. At the same meeting a citywide allocation of General Fund Element (public realm) of £480,000 was agreed

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since its establishment in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using the programme have included footpath construction and repairs, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
