North Locality Board Update

It was agreed at the North Locality Board meeting in June 2014, that the focus for the board moving forward would be employability, domestic violence and violence, public realm and anti social behaviour. The board will maintain a focus on crime, but the targets have been broadened out to reflect the local needs and priorities of the north.

The Locality Board together with partners will take a proactive approach. The board will be reviewing evidence including statistics every month to ensure good progress.

Key Successes

During this quarter (July - September 2014) there have been a number of successes including:

- Management of Henry Mellish Sports Centre taken on by CBF(Highbury) Gym
- Lifelong Learning Task & Finish group established for Area 2
- Covert action against dog fouling operations
- Completion the Whitemoor section of the River Leen Cycle Route
- Junction protection at a number of junctions in the Basford area
- Community engagement through the local TRA's and community centres
- MyBasford Facebook page continues to grow with internal departments adding regular updates. This can be viewed at <u>www.facebook.com/mybasford</u>
- Nottinghamshire Police launched Basfordcops on Twitter in May. This can be viewed at <u>https://mobile.twitter.com/BasfordCops</u>
- Consultations around bringing the Toton Close waste ground back into use by local residents for allotments
- Cleanliness score continues to improve for Basford currently at 86%.
- Unemployment has seen a 19% reduction.

What are the emerging issues?

- An increase in the number of walls have been reported as being in dangerous by citizens and partners.
- Overall crime for the year to date are up 5%
- Alleyways continue to be problem for the clean teams
- Budget savings further savings requirement may lead to reduction in service

What is the Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) focussing its work on?

- Improving the environment and around the estates and a regular rota of anti dog fouling patrols around streets which continue to cause problems. A number of clean up events are being planned through the summer.

The figures given below relate to the period April and June 2014 – see Appendix A for more detail.

- All Crime: is down by 8% (27 offences) in quarter two compared to July-September 2013.
- All ASB: was up by 4% (increase of 8 calls) compared to the same period in the previous year, up 19% for the year to date period.
- There are now 632 (8.6%) households in Basford signed up to the **ALERT** system.
- **Cleanliness Index:** The target set for the city centre is 86% and the Basford score for quarter two is 86%.
- Graffiti Reports: Show a 72% reduction compared to the same period in the previous year.
- Fly Tipping: Shows a decrease of 5% compared to the same period in the previous year.
- Fire: Deliberate fires are significantly up compared to the same period in the previous year.

WARD: Bestwood (Bestwood Estate, Bestwood Park and Top Valley Beats) Neighbourhood Development Officer - Dale Griffin

Key Successes

During this quarter (July – September 2014) there have been a number of successes including:

- Lifelong Learning Task & Finish group established for Area 2
- Big Wood School have now programmed in Equate to deliver domestic violence programme to yrs. 7, 8 & 9.
- Domestic violence Freedom Programme delivery at Southglade Access Centre commenced in September.
- Southglade Park Live (July) in its third year running was a success with its highest attendance participating in a wide variety of family activities.
- Further successful community run summer events by Leen Valley Community Centre, Bestwood Estate Community Centre and Bestwood Park Church.
- Beckhampton Road Safety Scheme improvements commenced in August.
- Proactive awareness raising of courteous parking with residents near St Margaret Clitherow
- Bestwood Estate Job Club commenced Thursdays 2.00-4.30pm
- Free micro-chipping event for dogs on Southglade Park resulted in 74 dogs being microchipped.
- Partners supported awareness raising of Bowel Cancer Screening

What are the emerging issues?

- The total all crime for this period saw a 23% increase (59 more crimes) compared to the previous year.
- ASB has reduced in this quarter compared to the previous year with a 2% reduction (7 less offences).
- Improving the visual appearance of neighbourhoods continues to be a priority. In August Bestwood ward was just short of the neighbourhood target with a score of 85. During the same period reports of both graffiti and fly tipping fell. Part of Top Valley identified for subsequent day of action to take place in October.
- Criminal damage and arson offences have increased over the summer months. A partnership approach is being undertaken to apprehend offenders.

What is the Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) focussing its work on?

The NAT will be focussing its work upon:

- Improving the visual appearance of neighbourhoods
- Reducing crime and anti-social behaviour
- Supporting activity for young people.

The figures given below show some key statistical points from this quarter (see appendix A for more detail) Please note that Quarter 2 data is only available for Crime and Fire data:

- Crime: was up by 59 offences in quarter two compared to July-September 2013
- **ASB:** was down by 7 incidents in quarter two compared to July-September 2013
- Cleanliness Index: score was at 85 in August. The target set for the city centre is 86
- **Graffiti Reports:** 11 less incidents in August (total 8) compared to the same period in the previous year
- Fly Tipping: 54 incidents (decrease of 14) in August compared to the same period in the

previous year

• **Fire:** The number of deliberate fires in this quarter shows an increase of 29 offences (total 47) compared to the same period in the previous year.

1. <u>REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS</u>

- 1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Neighbourhood Working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement.
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all, and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods'; the Ward Performance Reports help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance Reports capture work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind, the report such as the Ward plans and other partner's implementation plans.
- 2.4 The North Locality Board has been established now since September 2012. It delivers a multi agency/partnership approach to managing the locality, providing an overview of area performance and policing priorities, performance management and problem solving of key challenges. In the north, this has included a focus on parking issues, cannabis, theft from shops, criminal damage and violent crime, including domestic violence. Area Chairs, or their nominated representatives are invited. Minutes are issued to all Ward Councillors.
- 2.5 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the Crime and Drugs Partnership.
