HYSON GREEN YOUTH CLUB

1. Purpose

The purpose of this report is:

- To provide an overview of the services, outputs and outcomes achieved by HGYC and its use by young people in 2014.
- For the committee to discuss the breadth of work that HGYC delivers and consider how best HGYC can continue to contribute to the wider area youth strategy and also Community and Families strategy
- For the committee to consider the role that HGYC can play as a locality hub for children, young people and families (this report is also going to Area 5 committee)
- As well as this report there will be a powerpoint presentation by young people highlighting the issues they face and their ideas for sustainability

2. Background

HGYC is a registered charity (1007675) and is run by a Board of Trustees made up of volunteers.

Our aim is 'helping young people to achieve their full potential through education, sport and leisure'. Which is consistent with the Nottingham City's vision to be a city where every child grows up to achieve their full potential

3. Staffing

The Club employs a Centre Manager, Part time Youth Forum manager, Full time Building supervisor, 3 sessional youth workers and a part time cleaner.

4. NCC Funding

Funding of £10,000 p .a is received from the Lead Organisation for Area 4 – Castle Cavendish to deliver a programme of diversionary activities for young people aged 10-17yrs whose post codes fall within the Area. This has been reduced from £15,910 since it was devolved to the lead organisation

5. Wider Networks

HGYC is a member of Notts Clubs for young people, The Children and Young People's Provider Network and Enable

6. Opening Hours

HGYC is open to the public Monday to Friday 9am – 9pm; Saturdays 10am – 5pm and Sundays 10am-3pm. Most weekends we are open until 2am on Saturdays and 12 midnight on Sundays for hire of the halls for events or meetings. HGYC has an entertainments licence for events at the weekend only which allows the consumption of alcohol and entertainment on the premises.

- ➤ 3 evening a week youth activities open access youth club providing football, table tennis, pool, bar soccer, themed work and 1:1 support 5-8pm for 10-19year olds
- 2 evenings a week youth club (delivered by NCC Youth Service) 7-9pm
- Basketball sessions Monday and Fridays 3-5pm for 14 years +
- Football coaching for under 12s Thursdays 4.30pm-5.30pm
- ➤ Badminton coaching under 16yrs –Wednesdays 6.70-7.30pm
- ➤ Job Club sessions for unemployed Tuesdays 1pm 3pm and Thursdays 11am-1pm (funded by Castle Cavendish) for 16yrs +
- NG7 Youth Forum engaging young people aged 14-24yrs in the NG7 area to have a say Funded by People's Health Trust
- ➤ Carnival Troupe Carnival project (April –September)- annual participation in Nottingham carnival and other carnivals during the summer 3 sessions per week for 6yrs +
- ➤ Aspire High Roma Project 8 week project targeting eastern European young users funded by Arboretum, Berridge and Radford/Lenton ward councilors for 10-17yr olds
- ➤ Healthy Relationships project 4 weeks from 23rd June delivered by NHS Sexual health Services for 12 years +
- Afterschool and Homework club Wednesdays and Thursdays 4-6pm for 5-12 years

- Music instrument tuition 6yrs + Tuesdays 5-7pm
- > C card service to be introduced
- 8. Young People Led projects

We also support a number of youth led groups to establish themselves:

- 4 Flava Dance Group weekly dance classes for under 12yrs and 13 yrs +
- Joining Forces Dance group 14-26 year old dance group meets practices weekly
- Town Media local promotion and marketing -uses space for photoshoots

We work closely with other organizations to deliver the following:

- 3. Deen Club Under 14year olds Education and sports sessions for Pakistani boys Delivered by the Deen Club
- 4. Somali boys sports Saturdays 10-11am -delivered by EAEC
- 5. Hyson Green and Cavaliers Football Club 10 league teams. Under 9s, 10s and 11s coaching 2 evenings a week October May 5-7.30pm
- 6. YMCA exercise sessions were stopped last year
- 10. School Holidays Activities

Section 2 Overview of Participants, Users and Events

2.1 Regular participant's profile


A regular participant is a young person aged 6-30years who attends regularly, has provided their personal information and is known by staff.

From April 1st 2013 to March 31st 2014 we signed up **393** regular participants who regularly use the club. Of these 62% were aged 10-17years and 22% 6-9 years. See table 1 and 1b below.

The figure for 17-25 year olds does not properly reflect those using the club as a number of older users do not give their personal information

2.2 Gender, Ethnicity and Postcode of young people


HGYC participants are drawn from across the City, of the total users 58% are male and 42 % female. Whilst females are under represented over a third of our users are female.

Users come from all ethnic backgrounds with the biggest group being from Black British and Black African backgrounds. A significant percentage of users are from Eastern European and Dual parentage backgrounds. The ethnicity of 25% of members is unknown.

2.3 Where our youth participants aged 6-30yrs live

Table 3 below shows that young people come to HGYC from across the City, with **57%** drawn from NG7 area and 12% from NG5, a significant number come from NG8, and NG6. We believe it is important that HGYC is seen as a place where young people feel safe to come to from across the city. These figures evidence this.






2.7 Overview of HGYC Events and Bookings

The youth club is also used by residents and organisations from across the City to hold meetings, parties, christening, cultural and other events.

From 1st January to December 31st we had **344** bookings, mainly during the weekend. This equates to on average 7 events each weekend over 50 weeks

In addition to the Youth members over **19,600** people have attended events at HGYC in the last year.

Residents from 10 wards have booked the youth club. The majority of bookings come from residents of St Ann's and Berridge wards. 1644 people attended events from the Arboretum ward, 1345 from the Radford and Park ward and 3762 from Berridge ward.

2.8 Number of groups using the Youth Club

Our figures show that **2,874** people attended events booked by a resident/organisation from **Area 4** and **3787** people attended events booked by a resident/organization from Area 5

2.10 Events for young people - Breakdown of events by age

Of the total events booked **97** events were for young people aged 18 years and under eg children's birthday party, music events etc.

2.11 In Summary

- 1. Hyson Green Youth Club has had a successful year working with young people. However, it has seen cuts in youth funding and the reduction from 3 nights to 2nights a week by the NCC run open access youth club sessions.
- 2. The unexpected withdrawal of SSBC from renting a room as a hub location for the Arboretum area does not seem to support a focus on children and families in Area 4
- 3. HGYC directly addresses child poverty by providing free or local cost youth activities and a place to meet
- 4. HGYC directly supports safeguarding by having in place qualified and trusted workers

- 5. HGYC directly promotes the health and well being of young people and families by providing an accessible venue for sports, keep fit, coached sessions and opportunities for young people to discuss issues around risky behaviour
- 6. A diverse range of young people use the club from across the city.
- 7. There is a growing use of the club by new Eastern European migrants. They have specific needs.
- 8. The number of white British users is under represented as many girls float in and out and do not provide their full information.
- 9. Black Caribbean young people continue to use the club and integrate with other users
- 10. The Club serves as a community hub and events location for local groups and residents.

2.12 Conclusion

- 1. Hyson Green Youth club services as a Hub for children, young people and families from across the Central locality and consideration could be given to providing more strategic and infrastructure support to the organization.
- 2. HGYC recommends and is seeking support from Area councilors for a formula to be devised which allows for financial and infrastructure support for HGYC in proportion to where its users are drawn from?
- 3. HGYC has substantial plans for development of the disused sports barn which would provide a further **1000** sq m of space for youth and community regeneration provision
- 4. HGYC is seeking support for the development of a Wood work carpentry social enterprise to support young people and those long term unemployed back into work
- 5. HGYC is seeking support for the continuation of the NG7 Voices Youth forum from March 2016 in order to consolidate the building of an area and locality youth panel
- 6. HGYC is seeking support to repair the squash courts and reopen the boxing gym and a dance studio for local people
- 7. HGYC is seeking support to replace the fibre glass roof on the squash courts
- 8. HGYC is seeking support to replace the existing boiler to reduce our energy costs
- 9. HGYC is seeking support to sound insulate the main hall to recue noise and noise complaints
