## Brief description of proposal / policy / service being assessed:

Laura Chambers Lodge closed in January 2016, the last residents having secured appropriate alternative accommodation.

The proposal is now to refurbish Laura Chambers Lodge, demolish a small part and include the new six bedded unit. Residents from Oakdene Residential Unit would move into the newly refurbished building, capacity for permanent residential care would increase, capacity would be retained for both respite and emergency care, and six Nottingham citizens with Complex Needs would be accommodated in the city – a service which Nottingham City Council does not currently provide. Oakdene Residential Unit would then be demolished and the resultant land sold for development.

## Information used to analyse the effects on equality:

In September 2015 public consultation was held in regard to the proposed closure of Laura Chambers Lodge Elderly Persons Home, subsequent refurbishment and new build to provide residential accommodation for Adults with a Medium to High Learning Disability and a small six bedded unit for Adults with Complex Needs. Initially there was opposition, mitigated by the future proposals which are now in the public domain.

Research had already established that there was sufficient capacity in the city, both in-house and in the private sector, for older people and therefore Laura Chambers Lodge was surplus to requirements. Adults with a Learning Disability in the City of Nottingham are currently receiving a residential service at Oakdene Residential Unit on Woodborough Road – a building which is no longer fit for purpose, and requiring £400K as a minimum to bring up to current acceptable standards. Any amount of spending on the Oakdene building would not result in a manageable building for some of our most vulnerable citizens, it being on several different levels.

The staff previously based at Laura Chambers Lodge have either found alternative employment, have been deployed into existing vacancies across Adult Social Care or have been deployed to Oakdene Residential Unit. These staff are over and above the staffing establishment, however they now have the opportunity to better understand the needs of Learning Disabled Adults and to up skill where appropriate. Over the interim period, staff will inevitably leave the service, vacancies will be held in this instance and an experienced staff group will move in its entirety to the new unit. Currently there are no considerations in regard to possible staff redundancies – this only becomes a potential issue if the Local Authority do not give their backing to the proposal.
