Following a stage 1 application, Nottingham City Council has been invited to submit a final application for three projects under European Social Fund calls. The table below sets out the projects that officers are recommending Nottingham City Council submit a final application for, which if successful will secure an additional £2,028,000 to support unemployed residents into work and provide in-work training to increase productivity and address skills gaps in the local economy.

MATCH DETAIL*

Enterprise, Innovation and Pathways

To provide 50% match (£953,000) of the total project value £1.905m. It is proposed that the principal sources for this match are:

- £305,000 from NCC funds (including Nottingham Jobs Fund, Procurement Levy and other sources) and the salary costs of the Nottingham City Council officers working on the project.
- £180,000 from the Nottingham City Council Economic Development Department salary budget to meet the costs of the Nottingham City Council staff working on the project. (Including £17,000 from Section 106 employer contributions)
- £129,000 from the Area Based Grant (ABG) allocations over the duration of the project. This will allow 4 ABG providers to draw down the equivalent in ESF to deliver skills and employment support in their areas. A small proportion of this would be required in the 2019-20 Financial Year (i.e. after the proposed end date for the current ABG scheme).
- £338,000 from Futures to employ the Futures staff working on the project.

Developing Sector Growth 1.1 (Inclusive Labour Markets)

To provide 50% match (£458,000) of the total project value £916,000. It is proposed that the principal sources for this match are:

- £73,000 from the NCC funds (including Nottingham Jobs Fund, Procurement Levy and other sources) and the salary costs of the Nottingham City Council officers working on the project.
- £93,000 from the Nottingham City Council Economic Development Department salary budget to meet the costs of the NCC staff working on the project. (Including £17,000 from Section 106 employer contributions)
- £154,000 from Futures to employ the Futures staff working on the project.
- £142,000 from Partners including Rushcliffe Borough Council, Notts County Cricket and Derby College to employ the staff required to deliver the project outside of Nottingham City.

3.2.2 Developing Sector Growth 2.1 (Skills for Growth)

- To provide the 50% match (£617,000) of the total project value £1,233,000. It is proposed that the principal sources for this match are:£107,000 from the Nottingham City Council Economic Development Department's salary budget to meet the costs of the NCC staff working on the project.
- £98,000 from Futures to employ 3.1FTE to support project delivery.
- £110,000 from Employer contribution to the fund the up-skilling of their staff.
- £296,000 from District Councils and Derby College to employ the staff required to deliver the project outside of Nottingham City.
- £5,000 Project Marketing from City Council Funds

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
