Introduction

<u>Clifton North ward</u> incorporates the north part of Glapton Lane of the Clifton Estate to its boundary with Rushcliffe Borough Council and the River Trent. There are four distinct neighbourhoods in the ward Clifton Estate, Clifton Grove Estate, Silverdale and Wilford.

The Ward has a population of 13,066 (2010 and is predominately white - 92.9%. Has a higher proportion of older people (17.34% people aged 65 & over (males) or 60 & over (females) compared to the City (11.32%). Compared to the City, the ward has a lower proportion of student households, just 1.5%, a third of the Nottingham average of 4.1%.

The positives aspects of the ward are:-

- Distinct Community identity for Wilford, Silverdale, Clifton Grove and Clifton Estate.
- Good mixture of housing and new housing development at 'old' Becket School site
- Large open green areas with a number of parks improved over the years (Green Flag status for Clifton Playing Field)
- Second largest Skatepark in England
- 3 Primary schools
- 2 secondary schools
- New Tram Line
- Leisure Centre is well used following recent improvements

The issues and concerns of the ward are:-

- Concerned about Litter and fly tipping
- Car parking around Sunninghill / Rivergreen area
- Displaced parking as result of Workplace Parking Levy in Wilford
- Raise awareness of services available for young people
- Pursue ASB process, ASBO's, housing tenancy action and prosecution
- More patrolling of 'hot spot' areas
- Raise awareness of services available to young people
- Support to local people to get on training courses, in getting into employment and exploring self-employment options
- Scope training needs of local people post or implement programmes to suit
- Raise awareness on smoking, cancer, mental health, physical activity and obesity and encourage local people to make a pledge to take action to improve their health
- Wilford & Silverdale areas access to GP many citizens use GP services in the Rushcliffe Borough area.




Crime






- •The above baseline graph compares the *rolling* 12 month total of crime in Clifton North to a *fixed* 12 month 2010/11 baseline. The current 12 month total is showing a reduction of -9.87% against the baseline.
- •In June 2013 there were 66 crimes which is an increase of 8.2% (5 crimes, see above RAG rating) compared to June 2012. The Division as a whole experienced an increase in all crime of *approximately* +6.4%.
- •Year to date crime in the ward has reduced by -2.8% (4 crimes, April June 2013 compared to April June 2012, see Table 1 of page 5). In the Division as a whole, all crime is up by *approximately* +6.2%.
- •The largest volume increase this month was in damage, which was up 8 crimes (+80%, see Table 1 of page 4).
- •Crimes with a domestic flag assigned to them were up by 1 crime(June 2013 compared to June 2012, see Table 2 of page 5). For June 2013 the ward ranked 16th for this type of crime out of the 20 wards in the Division.
- •The rate (per 1000 of population) of all crime in Clifton North is better than the average rate for the 20 wards (figures are year to date, see Table 3 of page 6).

- •The above baseline graph compares the *rolling* 12 month total of ASB in Clifton North to a *fixed* 12 month 2010/11 baseline. The most recent 12 month total is showing a reduction of 47.55% against the baseline.
- •In June 2013 there were 42 ASB calls in the ward. This is an increase of +31.35% (10 calls, see above RAG rating) compared to June 2012. The Division as a whole experienced a reduction of *approximately* -19% on this measure.
- •Year to date ASB in the ward has reduced by -10% (12 calls, April June 2013 compared to April June 2012, see Table 5 of page 7). In the Division as a whole, ASB is down by *approximately* -25%.
- •The rate (per 1000 of population) of ASB in Clifton North is better than the average rate for the 20 wards (June 2013 figures, see Table 4 of page 6).






Cleanliness Index

This graph shows the position of your ward compared to other Wards



The "neighbourhood as clean as the city centre" benchmark target on cleanliness is to achieve a score of 86% in every ward. The 86% target is shown in red in the above graph.

To calculate the Cleanliness Index (CI) an agreed number of transects are surveyed across an area covering a range of land types. Each site surveyed is awarded a cleanliness grade based on a 7 point scale from A to D where Grade A: – no litter, and Grade D: - heavily littered. The maximum possible score of 100 is achieved when all sites achieve Grade A.

The Code of Practice for Litter and Refuse (COPLAR) requires councils to strive to reach an 'acceptable' standard of cleanliness (grade B or better) across the Council area. Grade A is the ultimate goal and is how a site should be immediately after sweeping but is almost impossible to maintain for any length of time. For example, a grade A site is completely free of litter – one cigarette butt takes it down to B+.


To achieve the manifesto commitment of Neighbourhoods as clean as the City Centre a target of 86 is required as that was the CI for the City Centre in May 2011. To give some context if all areas surveyed achieved a grade 'B' standard, this would equate to a cleanliness index of 67.


Incidents of Graffiti - Clifton North







- •The above table shows volume of deliberate (primary and secondary) fires in the 20 wards. In May 2013 there was 1 fire in Clifton North. This involved a secondary fire in a refuse container. Year to date (compared to the corresponding period last year) fires in the ward are up 100% (2 fires).
- •The graph on the right shows a *rolling* 12 month total of deliberate fires in Clifton North against the *fixed* 2010/11 baseline. The performance of the City Division against *its* baseline has also been shown for comparison purposes.

Methodology

Data has not been audited or verified and therefore must only be used as a reflection of crime.

Crime data and ASB calls have been extracted from the Police systems and mapped to ascertain which Ward they occurred in.

Where a ward boundary overlaps with the City Centre, crime data and ASB calls relating to the City Centre have been removed.

Where possible the most recent data is used, although for some areas this may be a month further in arrears.

Discussions continue with other agencies regarding what further data can be included.
