14 DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS

Councillors Edwards and Heaton declared an interest in agenda item 9 (note 2 below), 'Streamlining Investment to the Voluntary and Community Sector: Financial Allocations in Area 8', as council-appointed members of Meadows Partnership Trust Board, and withdrew from the meeting prior to discussion of the item.

Councillor Gibson declared an interest in agenda item 9 (note 2 below), 'Streamlining Investment to the Voluntary and Community Sector: Financial Allocations in Area 8', as a council-appointed member of High Bank Community Centre, which did not preclude him from speaking or voting on the item.

15 MINUTES

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 23 May 2013 as a correct record, subject to adding 'Nichola Judd – resident' to the attendance list, and they were signed by the Chair.

16 LOCAL NATURE RESERVE DESIGNATIONS

The Committee considered a report of the Director of Sport, Culture and Parks, asking the Committee's support for proposals to designate Breck's Plantation and Glapton Woods as Local Nature Reserves (LNRs).

Emily Aron and Felicity Atkin, Biodiversity and Greenspace Policy Officers, introduced the report, making the following points:

- (a) LNRs are statutorily protected open spaces for both wildlife to thrive and people to enjoy;
- (b) Nottingham's population currently has access to half the Natural England recommendation of 1 hectare of LNR land per 1,000 population. The LNR designation of the mixed urban woodland at Breck's Plantation and mixed deciduous woodland at Glapton Woods would provide protection to 7.9 hectares of land;
- (c) Nottingham City Council owns the land, while both sites are currently managed by the Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust. The sites meet Natural England's LNR criteria, and there are no covenants on the land preventing or conflicting with the LNR designation;
- (d) a formal consultation involving local residents, the City Council and partner organisations has taken place, with 3 expressions of support and 1 letter of objection received. The consultation outcomes and the outcome of this meeting will inform an Executive Delegated Decision by the City Council's Portfolio Holder for Leisure and Culture.

During discussion, a number of points were raised:

(e) Ms Aron and Ms Atkin explained that the LNR designation would not change the dayto-day access to and management of the sites. However, it would help protect the sites' biodiversity and access against possible future development. They also stressed the dual wildlife conservation and community access role of the LNR designation;

- (f) Ms Aron and Ms Atkin confirmed that the consultation undertaken went further than Natural England requirements. Local residents were not leafleted, partly because of cost, but also because the consultation was publicised at the sites. They also said that the low consultation response rates were because this was an uncontroversial 'good news' story that did no more than put existing arrangements on a more formal footing;
- (g) in response to a councillor's question, it was explained that the management plans for the sites were constantly-changing operational documents, and were not on the agenda for discussion at this meeting. However, councillors and community representatives could raise issues of concern with the Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust or directly with Ms Aron or Ms Atkin;

At this point, two citizens not given permission to speak by the Chair attempted to make several points about the management of sites by the Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust, and following a call for order by the Chair, the citizens left and the meeting resumed.

(h) several councillors spoke, supporting the proposals and agreeing that LNR designation and day-to-day site wildlife and access management were separate issues.

RESOLVED to support the proposals to designate Breck's Plantation and Glapton Woods as Local Nature Reserves, and to note the process involved.

17 AREA 8 PERFORMANCE

The Committee considered a report of the Director of Neighbourhood Services, presented by the relevant Neighbourhood Development Officer (NDO) for each individual ward, detailing performance against strategic themes in the Nottingham Plan 2020 and against local priorities. The main points were as follows:

(1) Bridge – Abdul Ghaffar (NDO)

- (a) crime is down 19.2% against the 12 month 2010/11 baseline figure, although there is a slight increase in reported domestic-related crime on the previous year;
- (b) anti-social behaviour is down 25.4% on the previous year to date, although June 2013 down rates are up by 9.8% from June 2012;
- (c) the Cleanliness Index score of 83 is down on the previous year, and also down against the neighbourhood target of 86;
- (d) reports of graffiti and fly tipping for March 2013 were 63 and 79, increases of 28 and 57 on March 2012 respectively;
- (e) unemployment is at 6.4%, down 0.3% on August, but down 13% over the last year, putting the ward 10th in the City;
- (f) there were 3 deliberate fires in the ward in the year to date;

(2) Clifton North – Parbinder Singh (NDO)

(a) crime is down 9.9% against the 12 month 2010/11 baseline figure;

- (b) anti-social behaviour for June 2013 is up 31.2% (42 calls) on the June 2012 figure, but year-to-date figures are down 10%;
- (c) the Cleanliness Index score of 90 is down on the previous year, but up against the neighbourhood target of 86;
- (d) reports of graffiti and fly tipping for March 2013 were 6 and , a decrease of 26 and 3 on 2012 figures respectively;
- (e) unemployment is at 4.7%, down 0.3%% on the previous month, but down 1.2% over the last year, putting the ward 16th in the City;
- (f) there was 1 deliberate fire in the ward in May, and the year to date figure is 2 (up 100%);

(3) Clifton South – Prairie Bryant (NDO)

- (a) crime is down 10.8% on the previous year, with an 18.4% decrease in June 2013 when compared to June 2012;
- (b) anti-social behaviour is down 19% on the previous year, with June 2013 down 39.44% on June 2012:
- (c) the Cleanliness Index score of 71 is down on the previous year, and down against the neighbourhood target of 86;
- (d) reports of graffiti and fly tipping for March 2013 were 5 and 15, a decrease of 17 and increase of 6 on June 2012 respectively;
- (e) unemployment is at 5.7%, down 3.3% on the previous month and down 5.3% over the last year, putting the ward 12th in the City;
- (f) there were 4 deliberate fires in the ward in May, with 5 in the year to date.

(4) Discussion

- (a) in response to a query about recurring graffiti at Clifton Bridge and the Flood Wall, Dorothy Holmes, Locality Manager South, reported that working relations between Neighbourhood Services and colleagues and partners such as the Highways Agency were much improved in terms of addressing issues such as graffiti. Graffiti is a community protection issue but it is difficult to catch perpetrators if recognised tagging isn't used;
- (b) Dorothy Holmes advised that it is difficult to measure accurately education attainment at ward level because children do not always attend school in the same are where they live, but she would discuss with colleagues how information might be compiled. She also advised that information on qualifications should be provided in each ward summary report;
- (c) while the information on health issues at ward level was dealt with via Family Community Teams rather than Neighbourhood services, health issues by ward could be a potential item to take to a future meeting;
- (d) Inspector Waldren advised that spikes in specific crimes such as drug dealing are sometimes a result of targeted activity by the Police, which in turn has a positive impact on other crimes;

(e) Wade Adams, Tenancy and Estate Manager, advised that Nottingham City Homes' decommissioning team conducted regular patrols of empty properties to check on damage and litter/tipping issues.

RESOLVED to note the report and the Committee's comments.

18 ENVIRONMENTAL SUBMISSIONS FROM NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES (NCH)

The Committee considered a report of the Chief Executive, Nottingham City Homes, proposing for approval a number of improvement schemes for funding under the Housing Revenue Fund. The costings for several schemes were not yet finalised.
