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Results

Some great successes

- Early Years foundation profile 1,780 (57%) pupils achieving a 'Good Level of Development', up 3 percentage points from 2010, matching the national improvement.
- Key Stage 1 at least 2,280 pupils (76%) achieving Level 2, up 2 percentage points from 2010, exceeding the national improvement.
- Key Stage 2 1,970 pupils (71%) achieving Level 4 in both English and Maths, up 4 percentage points from 2010, four times the national improvement.
- Key Stage 4 1,190 pupils (46.3%) achieving Level 2 (5+ A*-C) including English and Maths, up 2.1 percentage points from 2010, less than the national improvement of 4.8 percentage points.




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
- We have around 34,250 children in Nottingham City schools (around 2,800 per cohort).
 - Around 30% of our children (800) are leaving primary school each year below the Expected National Curriculum level and therefore may not have the appropriate literacy/numeracy skills to successfully access the Secondary curriculum.
 - 250 children progressed to secondary school in 2011 with literacy skills at or below the level expected at infant / junior phase transfer (i.e. at least 4 years behind age related expectations)



Key Stage 2 – Subject Combinations 2011

- Over 400 pupils achieved Level 4 in either English or Maths, but not both
- 450 pupils did not achieve Level 4 in either English or Maths







Overview of Attainment outcomes in Nottingham Schools 2011.

Scope of Data

This briefing is based upon public domain information.

National / England outcomes apply to all pupils for all school types (both maintained (including academies and special schools) and independent)

Nottingham outcomes are for maintained state funded schools only. This includes Primary, Secondary and special schools, City Technology Colleges and Academies but excludes hospital schools and pupil referral units.

Key messages

Educational Attainment outcomes for Children in Nottingham schools continue to rise across all key stages, but in 2011, whilst improvements at key stage 2 improved by more than those nationally, across the other key stages improvements were generally in line with or below the national improvements.

At least 20% of Nottingham school pupils are below the government expected levels at the end of key stage 1 and key stage 2 (around 5 percentage points more than the national proportions). Whilst some of these pupils make good progress through subsequent key stages, the underlying evidence is that less than one in three children below the expected 'Level 2' at KS1 reach the expected level 4 at KS2 and less than one in 20 children below the expected 'Level 4' at KS2 obtain 5+ A*-C passes including English and Maths at KS4. Tackling this tail of low achieving pupils and raising outcomes across all key stages must therefore remain a key priority.

Early Years and Foundation Stage

Outcomes are up across most of the foundation stage curriculum with the percentage of pupils achieving a good level of development increasing for all broad groupings of pupils, regardless of gender, ethnicity, FSM eligibility, SEN stage or first language.

Increases in Nottingham were generally less than the increases nationally and 2011 outcomes for all pupil groups are within 3 percentage points¹ of those for their national peers

Over 1,350 of 3,175 Nottingham school pupils had not achieved a 'Good Level of [early years] Development' by the end of reception year, including around 350 with special needs and 550 eligible for Free School Meals.

 57% of pupils in Nottingham City primary schools were assessed at having reached a 'Good Level of Development²' in Early Years Foundation Stage Profile (EYFSP) in 2011. This is up 3 percentage points from 2010 (up 3 points nationally) but 2 points below the national outcome of 59%.

• The gap between Nottingham and England has closed over the last 5 years but was unchanged annually.

• The **gap between the mean score of lowest attaining 20% of pupils** and the median of all pupils in Nottingham City primary schools **is 34.8**. This is 1.1 percentage points wider than in 2010 (gap closed nationally by 1.4 points) and wider than the national gap of 31.3.

Attainment gaps and Vulnerable Groups

Outcomes for boys in Nottingham are up by 2 percentage points annually and 13 percentage points over 5 years to 47% in 2011, 3 percentage points below those for boys nationally. Outcomes for girls in Nottingham are up by 2 percentage points annually and 17 percentage points over 5 years to 66% in 2011, 2 percentage points below for girls nationally The gender gap in Nottingham has widened over time to 19 percentage points in 2011 but is just one point wider than the gap nationally.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) are up by 3 percentage points annually to 46% in 2011, 2 percentage points above those for FSM pupils nationally. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils not FSM eligible are up 1 percentage points annually to 61% in 2011, 1 percentage point below those for non-FSM nationally. The FSM gap in Nottingham has closed since 2010 to15 percentage points, less than the 18 point gap nationally.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils with Special Educational Needs (SEN) identified are up by 1 percentage point annually and 10 percentage points over 5 years to 21% in 2011, 2 percentage points below those for similar SEN pupils³ nationally. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils without SEN are up by 3 percentage points annually and 17 percentage points over 5 years to 64% in 2011, 1 percentage point above those for pupils without SEN nationally. The SEN gap in Nottingham has widened over time to 43 percentage points in 2011 3 points wider than the gap nationally.

Outcomes for all four main broad ethnic groups⁴ in Nottingham were the same (58%) in 2011, with all groups showing improvements annually and over the last 5 years. Outcomes for Asian and Black pupils were above the national average for those groups.

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Annual improvements in Nottingham match or exceed the national changes, with outcomes at level 2 (the 'expected level' of 7 year olds) up across most of the key stage one curriculum. Improvements in boys reading and for pupils of Black heritage are particularly noteworthy. Outcomes for those pupils eligible for free School meals are not improving as quickly as those not eligible, widening the gaps between 'deprived' and 'other' pupils. Outcomes for many pupil groups are more than 3 percentage points⁵ below those of their national peers, particularly in literacy.

Nearly 600 of 2,970 Nottingham school pupils were below the 'expected' national Curriculum level 2 in reading at the end of infant phase, including around 380 with special needs identified and around 300 eligible for Free School Meals.

• 80% of pupils were assessed at level 2+ in Reading in 2011. This is up 3 percentage points from 2010 (no change nationally) but 5 points below the national outcome of 85%.

• **76% of pupils were assessed at level 2+ in Writing** in 2011. This is up 2 percentage points from 2010 (no change nationally).but 5 points below the national outcome of 81%.

• **86% of pupils were assessed at level 2+ in Maths** in 2011. This is up 2 percentage points from 2010 (up 1 point nationally) but 4 points below the national outcome of 90%.

Attainment gaps and Vulnerable Groups

Outcomes for boys in Nottingham are up by 5 percentage points annually in Reading, and two percentage points in each of Writing and Maths. Outcomes for girls in Nottingham are up by 1 percentage point annually in each of Reading & Writing and unchanged in Maths. The gender gap in Nottingham has closed over time for Reading but is not showing significant change for Writing or Maths. Outcomes for both boys and girls in Nottingham are around 5 percentage points below those for their national peers.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) are up by 2 percentage points annually in Reading, are unchanged in Writing and up by 1 point in Maths. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils not FSM eligible are up by more than this. The gaps between FSM and non-FSM pupils have widened in Nottingham, although they are similar to the gaps nationally with outcomes for both groups around 2 percentage points below those for their national peers.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils with Special Educational Needs (SEN) identified are up by 5 percentage points annually in Reading, 3 points in Writing and 5 points in Maths. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils without SEN are up by 1 percentage point in Reading and Writing and are unchanged in Maths. The SEN gap in Nottingham has closed annually and is narrower than the gap nationally. Literacy outcomes for SEN pupils in Nottingham are better than those for similar SEN pupils⁷ nationally, but outcomes in mathematics and fro non-SEN pupils are below those of similar pupils nationally

Outcomes for all four main broad ethnic groups⁸ in Nottingham have improved annually and over the last 5 years, particularly amongst those pupils from Black heritage groups. Outcomes for White (including White British and White European) and Mixed heritage pupils are lower than the national average for those groups.

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Test outcomes at level 4 (the 'expected level' of 11 year olds) or above have increased by more than the national rate in all subjects except reading where the national improvement has been matched. Improvements for pupils eligible for Free School meals and pupils with Special Educational Needs identified are particularly noteworthy. Outcomes for these two pupil groups are more than 3 percentage points above those of their national peers, but White heritage pupils are 6 points below their national peers across the curriculum and mixed heritage pupils in English

Although there are more 'disadvantaged'⁹ and 'low prior attaining'¹⁰ children in Nottingham schools than the national averages, a greater proportion of these children go achieve Level 4 or above at the end of KS2 than their national peers.

Outcomes for individual schools range between 36% and 100% of pupils achieving level 4 or above in both English and maths with 9 of 71 schools below the government floor standard.¹¹

Over 800 of 2,777 Nottingham school pupils were below the 'expected' national Curriculum level 4 in both English and Maths at the end of key stage 2, including over 500 with special needs identified and around 240 eligible for Free School Meals.

Over 150 pupils achieved Level 4+ in English but not maths and around 220 in maths but not English

Key Indicators

- **71% of pupils were assessed at level 4+ in both English and Maths** in 2011. This is up 4 percentage points from 2010 (up 1 points nationally) but 3 points below the national outcome of 74%.
- 77% of pupils were assessed at level 4+ in English in 2011. This is up 4 percentage points from 2010 (up 1 point nationally) but 5 points below the national outcome of 82%.
 - In **reading** 80% of pupils attained level 4+, up 2 percentage point from 2010 (up 2 points nationally) but 4 points below the national outcome of 84%.
 - 10% of pupils in Nottingham City primary schools were recorded as level 2 or below (the level expected at the end of key stage 1) in Reading key stage 2 tests in 2011. This compares with 7% of pupils nationally and is the second highest rate across all authorities (shared with 8 other authorities and better only than Wakefield)
 - In writing 70% of pupils attained level 4+, up 8 percentage points from 2010 (up 4 points nationally) but 5 points below the national outcome of 75%.
- **79% of pupils were assessed at level 4+ in Maths** in 2011. This is up 3 percentages from 2010 (up 1 point nationally).and 2 points below the national outcome of 81%.
- The proportion of pupils making 'expected' progress from KS1 (age 7) to KS2 (age 11) in Nottingham in 2011 was higher than in 2010 and better than the national rates for both English and maths.
 - **85% of pupils made 'expected progress' in English** in 2011. This is up 5 percentage points from 2010 (up 1 point nationally).and 1 point above the national outcome of 84%.
 - **84% of pupils made 'expected progress' in Maths** in 2011. This is up 3 percentage points on 2010 (up 1 point nationally).and 1 points above the national outcome of 83%.

Attainment gaps and Vulnerable Groups¹³

Outcomes for boys in Nottingham are up by 2 percentage points annually and 4 percentage points over 5 years to 67% in 2011, 5 percentage points below those for boys nationally. Outcomes for girls in Nottingham are up by 5 percentage points annually and 9 percentage points over 5 years to 75% in 2011, 2 percentage points below girls nationally The gender gap in Nottingham has widened over time to 8 percentage points in 2011 and is three points wider than the gap nationally.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) are up by 8 percentage points annually to 63% in 2011, 5 percentage points above those for FSM pupils nationally. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils not FSM eligible are up 2 percentage points annually to 75% in 2011, 3 percentage points below those for non-FSM nationally. The FSM gap in Nottingham has closed since 2010 to 8 percentage points, less than the 20 point gap nationally.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils with Special Educational Needs (SEN) identified are up by 9 percentage point annually and 14 percentage points over 5 years to 45% in 2011, 7 percentage points above those for similar SEN pupils¹⁴ nationally. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils without SEN are up by 2 percentage points annually and 5 percentage points over 5 years to 86% in 2011, 2 percentage points below those for pupils without SEN nationally. The SEN gap in Nottingham has closed over time to 41 percentage points in 2011 9 points narrower than the gap nationally.

Outcomes for all four main broad ethnic groups¹⁵ in Nottingham ranged between 69% (White (including White British and White European)) and 76% (Asian) in 2011, with all groups showing improvements annually and over the last 5 years. Outcomes for White heritage pupils were 6 percentage points below those nationally.

Key Stage 3

Outcomes at level 5 (pupils are expected to be at level 5 or 6 at age 14) have increased in all subjects and by more than the national average in each of English and Maths, but outcomes in Nottingham remain well below the national average and are the lowest in the country for English.

• **69% of pupils were assessed at level 5+ in English** in 2011. This is up 4 percentage points from 2010 (up 3 points nationally) but 13 points below the national outcome of 82%.

• **72% of pupils were assessed at level 5+ in Maths** in 2011. This is up 4 percentage points on 2010 (up 1 points nationally).but 9 points below the national outcome of 81%.

• **71% of pupils were assessed at level 5+ in Science** in 2011. This is up 2 percentage points from 2010 (up 3 points nationally) but 12 points below the national outcome of 83%.

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Key stage 4

Outcomes for pupils completing key stage 4 in Nottingham in 2011 were higher across most measures than in 2010, but the majority of improvements were less than those seen nationally, especially in the 'Level 2 including GCSE English and Maths' indicator. Outcomes are in the bottom 10 authorities nationally for the majority of KS4 outcome indicators.

Outcomes for all pupil groups are more than 3 percentage points below those of their national peers for the Level 2 including GCSE English and Maths' outcome, but only Boys and Pupils from White (including White British and White European) and mixed heritage groups are more than 3 percentage points below those of their national peers for the Level 2 measure, suggesting that literacy and numeracy outcomes are not improving as guickly as other areas of the curriculum.

Outcomes for individual schools range between 25% and 79% of pupils achieving level 2 including English and maths (between 56% and 93% for pupils achieving Level 2) with 3 of 14 schools below the government's floor standard.1

Over 1,370 of 2,573 Nottingham school pupils did not achieve level 2 including English and maths in 2011, including over 750 with special needs identified and around 550 eligible for Free School Meals. Over 750 pupils achieved Level 2, but without a GCSE in English or Maths or both of these subjects.

- 46.7% of pupils achieved Level 2 including English and Maths in 2011. This is up 2.5 percentage points from 2010 (up 5.4 points nationally) and 12.2 points below the national outcome of 58.9%.
- 76.6% of pupils achieved Level 2 in 2011. This is up 4.3 percentage points from 2010 (up 4.1 points . nationally) and 2.9 points below the national outcome of 79.5%.
- 11.0% of pupils achieved all elements of the English Baccalaureate. This is up 2.1 percentage points from . 2010 (up 2.0 points nationally) and 6.6 points below the national outcome of 17.6%.
- 64.2% of pupils made expected progress in English. This is up 2.3 percentage points from 2010 but below the national average of 73.1%.
- 52.9% of pupils made expected progress in maths. This is down 0.7 points from 2010 and below the national average of 65.9%.

Attainment gaps and Vulnerable Groups¹⁹

Outcomes for boys in Nottingham are up by 2.5 percentage points annually and 13.6 percentage points over 5 years to 40.9% in 2011, 13.7 percentage points below those for boys nationally. Outcomes for girls in Nottingham are up by 2.9 percentage points annually and 15.9 percentage points over 5 years to 52.7% in 2011, 9.2 percentage points below girls nationally The gender gap in Nottingham has widened over time to 11.8 percentage points in 2011 and is over 4 points wider than the gap nationally.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) are up by 1.1 percentage points annually and 10.8 percentage points over 5 years to 28.2% in 2011, 6.4 percentage points below those for FSM pupils nationally. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils not FSM eligible are up 3.4 percentage points annually and 16.0

percentage points over 5 years to 54.4% in 2011, 7.6 percentage points below those for non-FSM nationally. The FSM gap in Nottingham has widened over time to 26.2 percentage points, similar to the 27.4 point gap nationally.

Outcomes for Nottingham pupils with Special Educational Needs (SEN) identified are up by 1.5 percentage point annually and 8.4 percentage points over 5 years to 19% in 2011, 5.7 percentage points below those for similar SEN pupils²⁰ nationally. Outcomes for Nottingham pupils without SEN are up by 0.9 percentage points annually and 20.8 percentage points over 5 years to 65.0% in 2011, 4.5 percentage points below those for pupils without SEN nationally. The SEN gap in Nottingham has widened over time to 46 percentage points in 2011, one point wider than the gap nationally.

Outcomes for the four main broad ethnic groups²¹ in Nottingham ranged between 43.3% (Black Heritage) and 50.8% (Asian Heritage) in 2011, with all groups showing improvements annually and over the last 5 years.

Key stage 5:

Outcomes for pupils completing key stage 5 in Nottingham schools and colleges in 2011 were higher than in 2010 and per candidate measures are better than the national averages.

Key Indicators

- 97.5% of candidates attained Level 3 (2 or more A Level passes or equivalent) in 2011. This is up 0.4 percentage points from the 2010 result (down 0.8 points nationally) and 3.5 percentage points above national outcome of 94.0%
- The Average Point Score per Candidate is 762.2 in 2011. This is up 12.4 points from the 2010 result (up 1.1 points nationally) and 16.3 points above the national outcome of 745.9 QCA points.
- The Average Point Score per Entry is 205.2 in 2011. This is up 0.9 points from the 2010 result but below the national increase of 6.7 points to 216.2 QCA points
