School Place Pressures In Nottingham

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
Demographic Context

- The UK population is projected to increase by 9.6 million between 2012 and 2037.
- Projections produced by NCC indicate likelihood of continued population growth in the City being very high for the coming decade.
- Population growth and increased inward migration has resulted in significant rises in the number of women of child bearing age in the City – the key factor underpinning exponential growth.
- Current projections reveal an expected demand of 282 additional Reception school places by 2016/17. This represents an additional 9.4 forms of entry.
- According to the LGA's 2012 analysis, almost half of England's school districts will have more primary pupils than places within 2 years

Impact on Schools and Communities

- **Distribution of Places -** The distribution of surplus places is not necessarily in neighbourhoods where the demand is highest
- Sibling Connections Not always possible to offer places in the same school – leading to additional difficulties for family life, and negative impacts on attendance and punctuality
- Pressure on non teaching space within schools community rooms, "breakout" or "chill out" rooms being utilised for teaching space – can impact upon pastoral or behavioural support





Response in Nottingham

- 2010 -2012 £16m Primary Place Expansion Programme added 1600 additional places (equiv/of 7 new schools)
- 2012 -2015 Second phase being rolled out adding, initially, a further 1230 places
- Need to identify long term position to meet continued growth in primary sector beyond current planning phase.
- Have begun work with secondary schools to identify projections and impact as the increase in numbers works through.
