

REPORT OF CORPORATE DIRECTOR CITY DEVELOPMENT

**APPLICATION FOR VARIATION OF ENTERTAINMENTS LICENCE
& CONSENT TO STRUCTURAL ALTERATIONS
WALTON'S HOTEL, 2 NORTH ROAD, THE PARK, NOTTINGHAM**

1.0 SUMMARY

1.1 This is an application to vary the hours of entertainments licence to extend the terminal hour on Mondays to Sundays to 1am and for consent to alter the premises to include further areas in the licence and to increase the maximum occupancy.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT the Committee determine the application having regard to requests for a final inspection by the Fire Officer and Health & Safety Officer; objections from local residents, the Nottingham Park Estate Limited, a Councillor and to the City Council's Entertainments Licensing Policy No 1;

- **'matters that might present an adverse impact on the neighbourhood from the licensed activity have been assessed and suitable measures put in place to minimise or prevent the impact';**
- **'that the applicant has taken steps to ensure good order inside and outside the premises';**
- **'the applicant can (or has put) in place such effective measures as given above to the satisfaction of the Council and Police'; and**

2.2 to the City Council's Licensing Policy No 5; 'When considering whether entertainments licence should be granted, the Council will assess the likelihood of the proposal causing an unacceptable adverse impact either by itself or in conjunction with another factor that by itself may have that adverse impact. Particular regard will be had to the impact on local residents'; and;

2.3 to the City Council's Licensing Policy No 8; 'Normally the preferred terminal hour for entertainments licence will be 11 pm. Any later terminal hour applied for will need to be supported and justified as part of the application'; and;

2.4 to the City Council's Policy No 10; 'It is unlikely that a new application for a terminal hour beyond the times stated in Policy 8 will succeed where the area is predominantly residential or has circumstances that are sensitive to the problems associated with licensed premises unless the applicant can demonstrate extenuating reasons why the application should be granted; and;

2.5 to the City Council's Entertainments Licensing Policy No 11; 'For a new application or variation, exceptions may be made to permit a later terminal hour where the Council are satisfied that the applicant has shown that the following circumstances would apply :

at the licensed activity would not be likely to cause adverse impact, especially on local residents, and if there is a potential to cause adverse impact that appropriate measures will be put in place to prevent or minimise the impact; and;

there will not be an adverse impact from the licensed activity, cumulatively or by itself, on local residents’.

2.6 to the standard licence conditions of entertainments no 40:-

• ‘Any noise produced or associated with the entertainments must not be audible at the façade of the nearest residential, commercial or industrial premises;’ and;

3.0 BACKGROUND

3.1 The current entertainments licence provides music and dancing during the following hours:-

Mondays to Saturdays	-	10.30 am to 12.30 am
Sundays	-	noon to midnight

4.0 PROPOSALS

4.1 The new licence holder Alan Hancock has applied for consent to structural alterations and to include other areas of the premises as follows:-

front bar/dining room	-	music & dancing
rear bar	-	music only

which will increase the occupancy from **100 to 210** persons and to extend the terminal hour as follows:-

Mondays to Saturdays	-	10 am to 1 am
Sundays	-	noon to 1 am

4.2 Ward Councillors were consulted and Councillor Bull has objected and a copy is attached

4.3 Local residents have objected and copies are attached

4.4 Three emails in support of the application have been received from local residents and copies are attached

4.4 Young & Pearce solicitors have objected on behalf of local residents and the Nottingham Park Estate Limited and a copy is attached

4.5 The Chief Fire Officer requires a final inspection and has recommended an increase in occupancy to 210 persons.

4.6 The comments of the Noise Pollution Officer will be reported at the meeting

4.7 Building Control, Planning and the Police have no objections.

4.8 Health & Safety Officer has no objection but requires a final inspection.

4.9 The applicant, objectors and supporters have been invited to attend and a map showing the location of the premises is attached.

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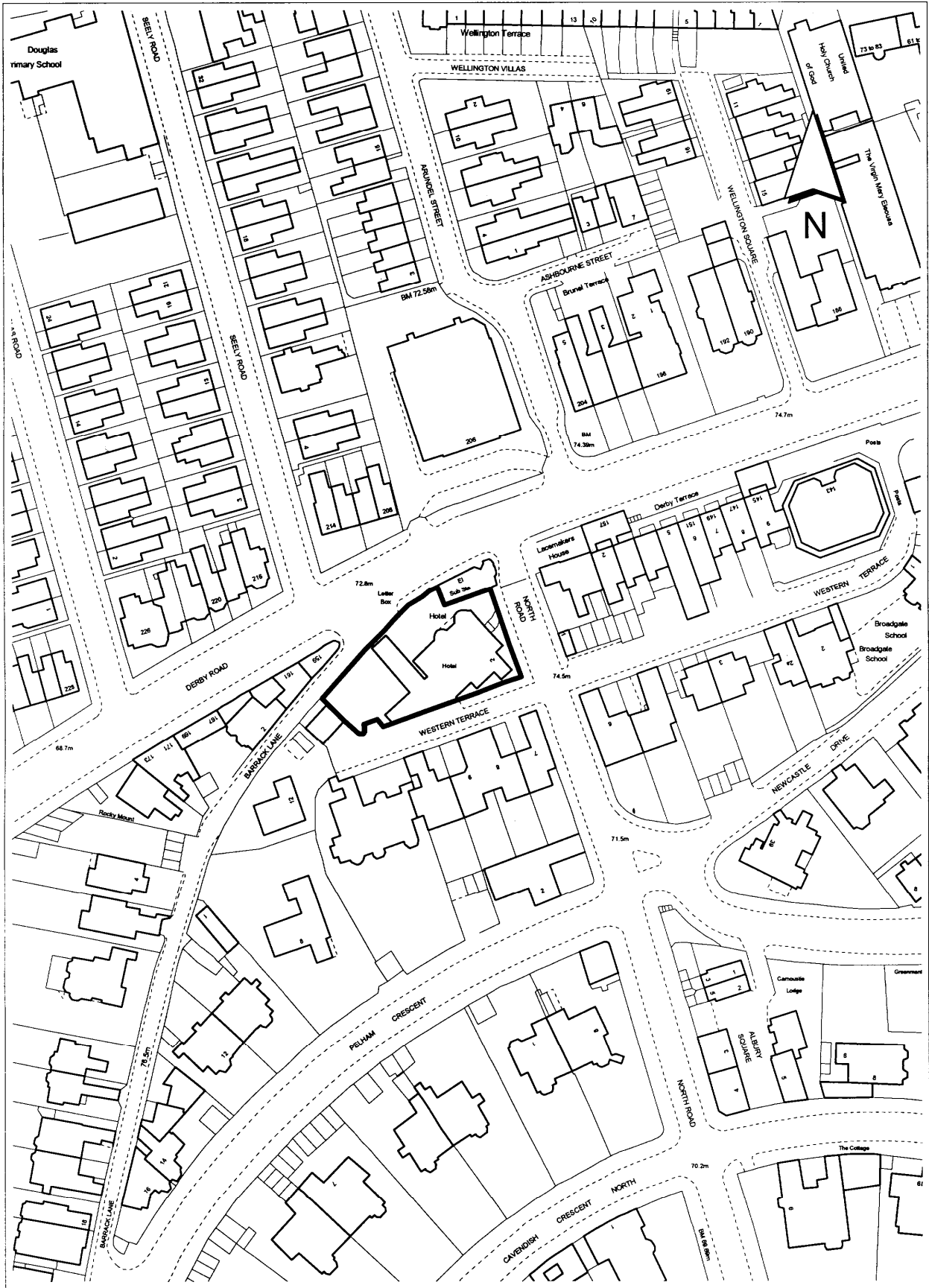

Sue,

I have had a briefing from Janet Swain, who I have to thank for filling me in on some of the facts regarding entertainment licenses as a whole.

I wish to put in an objection to the Entertainments License applied for by Waltons Hotel, Derby Road which I received information about.

I understand there will be large scale objections from the residents and also the Park Estate to this new license.

A petition will arrive with your department from residents within two weeks.

The residents maintain that they have had past and current noise issues with this establishment, until late into the evening. Extending the period of music and dance will mean that many residents will be again subjected to loud music until the early hours of the morning. This hotel is located very near a residential area and the noise will impact on a high number of residents. A late licence to allow music and dancing until 1am may also attract more users to this hotel after other establishments close and therefore we could even consider the extra noise coming from more use, and again in the early hours.

It has been stated that some noise can be heard from this hotel, carried through the estate to the Cathedral.

I have been consistent in objecting the later entertainment and licenses in general within my ward, which are within residential areas. However, this part of the City unfortunately already has many late pubs, as the growing number of students fuels this demand. However, we want to encourage families to remain within this part of the City, and the City as a whole and should therefore take this into account when trying to maintain quality of life for residents and should keep late night establishments to the minimum.

Noise pollution of this sort can be prevented and I hope we will use our powers in this process to consider residents well-being.

I have no objection to some extended licensing for the Hotel, say 7 such permissions per year. But I believe that general practice should be to keep the City Centre alive during late night hours while offering the option to Nottingham citizens of retiring at their chosen time to nearby quiet residential areas. This creates the availability of lifestyle choice for the citizen, who may have both entertainment and control. It also creates an attractive city to live in, with all the consequences of desirability and marketability. I don't think it is an improvement when people must live in the suburbs in order to enjoy Nottingham & have a quiet home to go to - in fact that is the situation in most British cities, & the reverse of what is needed, and does not play to Nottm's strengths.

I believe it is long run more advantageous to preserve the present situation regarding Walton's licensing hours. It should have more the character of a good quiet "local", & the City Centre should be the source of extended nightlife. I oppose any general extension of licensing hours for Walton's.



Being **RIGHT** on Derby Road a late licence would attract the type of people who is **VERY** liable to be noisy as they leave.

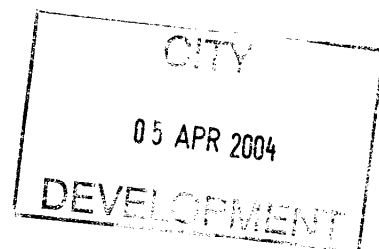

We, the undersigned, being residents of The Park Estate local to the application site wish to register our objections to the above application.

1. The hotel is within a residential estate and only a few metres from a large number of homes. The noise from functions penetrates many of these homes and numerous complaints have already been made. Therefore it would be inappropriate to extend the times of any licence.
2. The noise from groups of people leaving functions, shouting, singing etc. disturbs the peace of the area, again it would be inappropriate to extend the licence.
3. The hotel has insufficient car parking and therefore cars are parked on estate roads adjacent to homes. The noise from car doors slamming, engines starting and cars driving away already causes disturbance and this should not be extended into the early hours.

3) Taxis repeatedly sounding their horns after 11pm


4) The Hotel holds functions where music is played at an intolerable level. The building is not designed to be used in this fashion. It does not have adequate sound proofing.

Clarification is needed on new licensing rules

THE regulatory system whereby the use of premises is classified would now appear to be the subject of change later this year to give a greater clarification in respect of licensed premises.

The growth of the night-time economy and the problems associated with rowdy behaviour and the proliferation of licensed premises in our town centres has been responsible for Government looking at changes to the Use Classes Order 1987 to see if tighter control may be helpful.

This has been the subject of considerable comment and consultation over the past two years. As I have commented before, the system of licensing has been taken from the licensing magistrates and will shortly be in the hands of local authorities.

Although the act has now been passed, at the time of writing the minister responsible, Richard Caborn, has so far failed to publish the full national guidance notes - including the fee structure - for new and existing licensed premises.

I understand, however, that it will be published in the next few weeks and will give more information on how the new system will operate.

In the meantime, later this year and in parallel with the new licensing regulations, the Use Classes Order will be changed to bring a much more restrictive regime into being for the

classification of licensed premises. Currently, restaurants, pubs, snack bars, cafes, wine bars and shops for the sale of food all fall within a class A3 of the order.

If one has an A3 use then that can change into an A1 use (ordinary shop) or an A2 use (financial and professional services shop) without further consent being required.

The proposed regulatory change will more clearly define the actual use as follows:

- A1: Shops
- A2: Financial and professional services
- A3: Restaurants and cafes
- A4: Pubs and bars
- A5: Takeaways
- D2: Assembly and leisure, cinemas and casinos
- D3: Nightclubs

The change highlights the fact that A3 restaurants and cafes cannot allow the sale of hot food to be taken away; it must have an A5 consent.



ALL CHANGE: Licensing will soon come under the jurisdiction of the local authority

If you have an A4 or A5 use then you can go to an A1, A2 or A3 use without further consent, but not come backwards to A4 or A5 without a new permission.

In other words once you have gone down you cannot come back without consent.

The D3 use (nightclubs) distinguishes them from ordinary pubs and there are no permitted changes allowed without express consent.

One would have thought that the changes in the Use Classes Order would result in a clear cut and simple result, but not so.

An A3 consent for a restaurant serving drink which gradually, over the years, sees its food trade decrease and its wet trade increase may well be technically A4 which would require a change of use consent. If that was not forthcoming then one would have to revert to an A3 use.

There will be much scope for

argument at the planning consent stage and later when a licence is applied for.

What will be the distinction between a public house with music closing at 11pm and a pub with a disco closing at 1am at the weekends? Is that a pub or is it a nightclub?

There is no doubt that the changes are designed to bring in tighter control of pubs in our high street and this will have an effect on the value of existing outlets. The licensed trade expect values to increase in respect of premises where there are the least restrictions imposed on their use.

The other interesting point is that D2 use now seems to combine cinemas and casinos in the same use class. As we shall shortly see a major increase in casinos in this country due to the new Gambling Bill, this seems to be surprising as I would have thought that the planners would have preferred a single use class for casinos. This is a point to look out for.

I am writing as the representative of The Canning Circus Residents against Noise group. We have been informed that you would find it preferable to have a representative to deal with rather than an angry mob, we are angry but are not a mob. We are a collection of neighbours who have been forced to act together because of the excessive noise that we have had to suffer the previous few years. We would like to object to the Public Entertainment License for Bar Seven. Presently it has a license to operate until 1am; this has caused so many problems for the residents of this area. They have already been prosecuted for excessive noise pollution caused this summer. This took an enormous amount of effort from the residents to secure, we had to endure live performances from 2pm until 1am for several months, sometimes they would have up to 5 bands playing in an evening. They also broke the conditions of their license by having live performances in their car park all day on a bank holiday.

The main problems we have are:

1, noise leakage from the premises every performance. They have only just had a noise abatement notice dropped because of a couple of months compliance by them, within 2 weeks the suddenly the noise levels have gone straight back up again and we are again seeking prosecution, but this takes literally months to secure. We have had to wait nearly a whole year to amend this because the problems only started to get a lot worse after their license had been granted in 2003. The situation has changed since this license was first issued because of new residents who have moved in to the property next door and also the massive new residential development opposite. The room that they play live music in is the room next door to the resident's bedroom; the noise levels in the resident's bedroom and living room are unacceptable. Can you imagine having a live band and 100 people dancing and shouting in the room joined on to your bedroom?

2, Noise from the car park is excessive. During the summer, they installed some benches in the car park as a "beer garden" this has lead to residents being verbally abused and harassed on their own property and in their own gardens by drunken yobs. In the summer the drinking carries on throughout the day and all evening until they





The prospect of this late night music on a regular basis disturbing the rest of the working population of the area is distressing. We suffer, particularly in summer, from the music, the sounds of inebriated departing guests, the slamming of car doors and the revving of engines. The volume of the music and the hour to which it is proposed it should be continued is quite unacceptable.



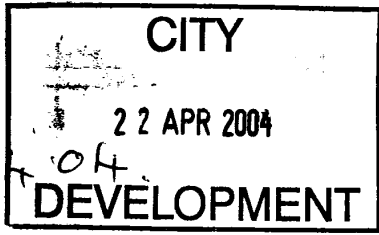
3. Granting an extended licence would inevitably increase the frequency of these disruptive events.
