CHARTERED INSTITUTE OF PUBLIC FINANCE & ACCOUNTANCY (CIPFA) CONFERENCE 2007

1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

To inform Members of the CIPFA 2007 Conference and seek approval for the attendance of the Chair of Finance and Resources.

2 BACKGROUND

CIPFA Conference is the largest event in the area of local government and public sector finance. It presents an opportunity for delegates to hear some of the leading experts in the field of finance speaking on a range of current and emergent issues for the public sector.

3 REPORT

- 3.1 The CIPFA Annual Conference is to be held in Bournemouth on Wednesday 13 June and Thursday 14 June 2007. Speakers include Paul Coen (LGA), Robert Chote (Director of Institute for Fiscal Studies), Prof Tony Travers (Director, Greater London Group, LSE) and Brendan Barber (General Secretary, TUC) amongst others. Subjects to be covered are wide ranging and include meeting the challenges posed by the Comprehensive Spending Review, New Visions for Governance, Modern Regulation and Making the most of Technology.
- 3.2 It is considered particularly important that, in addition to the Head of Resources and Finance who attends as the Authority's Chief Financial Officer, the Chair of Finance and Resources Committee should also attend. This is an opportunity for them to continue their engagement with both specific financial issues affecting the Service and those wider issues affecting Local Government and the public sector as a whole.
- 3.3 The conference programme (see Appendix A) is varied and also contains a series of specific workshops which in previous years have proven to be very useful and challenging.

4 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The anticipated cost of attending the conference, including accommodation for two nights, travel and subsistence is yet to be confirmed, but will be approximately £800. This can be contained within the budgetary provision for Member Conference Expenses.
