#### 37 <u>MINUTES</u>

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 19 November 2013 as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

#### 38 SCHOOL ENFORCEMENT PROGRAMME 2014/15

Susan Thorpe, Senior Traffic Management Officer at Nottingham City Council, delivered a School Enforcement update to the Committee and highlighted the following information:

- (a) colleagues in Traffic Management have joined forces with the Police to improve congestion outside of schools in the city following a high volume of calls from concerned citizens;
- (b) there are a number of causes of congestion but parents have been parking on 'zig-zags' outside of schools which has exacerbated congestion issues;
- the programme of enforcement started last week and colleagues in Traffic Management have been briefed by the Councillor Urquhart, the Portfolio Holder for Planning and Transportation, to brief all councillors via Area Committees;
- (d) every school in the city will be visited by colleagues in Traffic Management every 5 to 6 weeks. A toolkit will be available for Schools including templates

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and useful information for potential targeted intervention strategies such as Travel Plans and road safety measures. The message will go out to all school stakeholders as well as parents.

## RESOLVED to thank Susan Thorpe for her informative update and note the contents.

#### 39 URGENT ITEM - PROPOSED DOG CONTROL ORDER FOR THE DALES WARD

The Chair was of the opinion that this item, although not included on the agenda, should be considered as a matter of urgency in accordance with Section 100(b)(4)(b) of the Local Government Act 1972, in view of the special circumstances that the decision could not wait until the next meeting as it would impact on the consultation of the proposed scheme.

Abu Belim, Principle Enforcement Officer for City South Community Protection, presented the report, informing the Committee of the need to tackle problems associated with the control of dogs across the Dales ward, highlighting the following information:

- (a) numerous streets across the Dales ward feature amongst the top sites for reported dog fouling across where there have been in excess of 20 reports. Granting an order would be a proportionate approach in response;
- (b) under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005, the Council has the power to introduce a dog control order in relation to land open to the public covering the following scenarios: failing to remove dog faeces, not keeping a dog on a lead or not keeping or putting a dog on a lead when requested to do so by an authorised officer;
- the use of an Order will allow the targeting of individuals acting irresponsibly in the control of their dog(s) whilst leaving responsible dog owners undisturbed;
- (d) there have been two nasty incidents in the Dales ward where dogs that were out of control caused harm to local residents, resulting in police action being taken against the owners. Alongside this, civil action has been taken by Community Protection resulting in a court order against the owner;
- (e) before an order can be implemented, partners and third sector organisations across the Dales ward must be consulted to gauge their opinions on the proposals. Research shows that Marmion Road is the top site with in excess of 20 reports of dog fouling;
- (f) it is proposed to obtain further evidence from across the Dales ward and publish an advertisement in the local newspapers. Community Protection will aim to consult with citizens, partners and third sector organisations by the end of March 2014 before coming back to the Committee in May 2014 to seek approval for the Order. The planned Order would then come into force in June 2014;

Following questions and comments from the Committee, the following information was provided:

- (g) the Committee welcomed proposals and a number of signatures support these proposals have been gathered during Week of Action events held in the Dales ward;
- (h) responsible dog owners will remain undisturbed, in particular in public spaces as the proposals are not intended to interfere with responsible dog owners who keep their pets under proper control and clean up after them.

### RESOLVED to note the proposals and agree to consultation taking place on the proposals to introduce a Dog Control Order for the Dales ward.

Michelle Graley, Neighbourhood Development Officer (NDO) presented the report. The following points were highlighted:

#### St Ann's Ward

- (a) the 'Man Enough' project which was delivered in the Summer throughout Area 6 has been nominated by for the National Crimebeat Award and has been selected as a finalist. An awards ceremony is taking place in London on 19 March where Katy Follows, Community Safety Officer, will make a 10 minute presentation about the project before the winners are announced. Following the ceremony Katy and 7 young people will be given an open-top bus tour of London, visit London Eye and have the option to go on a tour of Parliament;
- (b) the ward priorities for St Ann's are currently being reviewed by the St Anns Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT). One of the key actions for the NAT's across Area 6 is to work on ways to improve the unemployment rate in the wards;

- (c) colleagues in the police will be working alongside partners to cover a small area with a high concentration of crime. This will require the police to carry out short term additional patrols / prevention and intelligence which in turn will support the medium term operations – Areas include Lewis, Dane, Truman Close, Alison walk and parts of Abbotsford Drive;
- A Councillors Ward Walk was carried out on Monday 10 March, which involved getting feedback from residents who have reported feeling unsafe in the area. Improvements to the street lighting or the installation of CCTV will be considered as ways to make citizens feel safer in the area;
- (e) citizens are being encouraged to visit and 'like' a designated St Ann's Facebook page which will host information on events in the ward, a forum for ideas and the sharing of information. The page can be located via the following link: <u>www.facebook.com/mystanns</u>.

#### Dales Ward

Following a review of the Dales ward priorities, Greg Foister, Neighbourhood Development Officer (NDO) presented an update and highlighted the following points:

- (f) by identifying local hot spots and patterns in the ward there would be a focus to reduce crime in the area, in particular criminal damage, violence and burglary;
- (g) a reduction in anti-social behaviour will form part of the new ward priorities which will link to the work to promote the responsible dog charter and dog control order. It is hoped that 25 more dog owners will sign up to the responsible dog charter each month;
- (h) by working in cooperation with the Neighbourhood Action Team, the top three locations for drug dealing in the ward will be identified and addressed. In tackling this issue, there will be an integrated Windmill Park management Plan, a consultation plan for Hermitage Caves will be established and an improvement plan for Greenway Park;
- under the 'Families' priority, meaningful engagement with children, young people and families will take place to ensure participation in community services. Further work will take place to identify ward based health priorities and a delivery model to tackle this;
- (j) an area based employment and training programme will be delivered going forward that identifies an employment and skills plan for the ward. Work will take place with the Renewal Trust and local partners to ensure that they contribute to the local employment and skills plan;
- (k) citizens are being encouraged to visit and 'like' a designated Dales ward Facebook page which will host information on events in the ward, a forum

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for ideas and the sharing of information. The page can be located via the following link: <u>www.facebook.com/mydales</u>.

#### Mapperley ward

Fi Cusick, Neighbourhood Development Officer (NDO) presented the report. The following points were highlighted:

- (I) there has been a small spike in the number of burglaries however a number of arrests have also been made;
- (m) there has been a continued reduction in number of women on the street (prostitution) – 82 women over the year and many dealt with by referral to benefit agencies and rehabilitation. Partnership work continues with agencies and 88 men have been arrested for kerb crawling and put through the Change Course;
- (n) citizens are being encouraged to visit and 'like' a designated Mapperley ward Facebook page which will host information on events in the ward, a forum for ideas and the sharing of information. The page can be located via the following link: <a href="http://www.facebook.com/mymapperley">www.facebook.com/mymapperley</a>.

Following questions and comments from the Committee, the additional information was provided:

- a jobs fair for young people will take place on Thursday 13 March 2014 at the Victoria Leisure Centre and will be open to citizens from St Ann's, Mapperley and Dales wards;

#### 43 AREA BASED GRANT - AREA 6

Cherry Underwood, Trust Executive of the Renewal Trust, delivered a presentation to the Committee and highlighted the following information:

- following a bidding process in October 2012 for voluntary and community sector (VCS) organisations to become leads for VCS within the City Council's local funds;
- (b) the Renewal Trust were appointed as the lead organisation in May 2013 for Area 6 to deliver a contract to support the development of VCS in the area;
- (c) of the £335,317.50 available in funding in 2013/14, £185,404 was provided to Children and Young People, £120,000 was granted to Employment and Skills in the area and £29,913 of funding was provided to Community Associations;
- (d) the aims of the Children and Young People priority is to improve collaboration and reduce competition and develop a programme of universal provision from 3.30pm to 9pm every school night;

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- (e) 709 young people have been supported in a range of summer activities and events by a variety of organisations, such as Alpha Education, Brazilian Soccer School, Community Recording Studio, Greenway Centre, Groundwork Greater Nottingham and KK Boxing;
- (f) improvements are needed to improve communication and opportunities between services to reduce duplication of provisions on offer. Further work is needed to gather evidence on which young people are not accessing services so that a different approach is offered;
- (g) all employment and skills providers in Area 6 provide support to residents and produce monthly returns in order to release funding. The Renewal Trust organises quarterly 'Employment Symposiums' to ensure partners are fully aware of new employment or skills opportunities;
- (h) there are 7 community associations in Area 6, which is the greatest number across the city, who are all working with the Renewal Trust and Neighbourhood Development Officers on Area Based Grant.

Following questions and comments from the Committee, the additional information was provided:

- (i) regular meetings take place with a number of stakeholders, such as the Police, to ensure that the right people are being targeted. This links to the Ending Gang and Youth Violence pledge;
- (j) over £120,000 has been spent on targeted provision for children and young people. This enabled intensive work with nearly 30 children and young people. Over 800 children and young people have received support through a universal offer which stops young people moving into the targeted support area;
- (k) further details of who has received funding will be provided with a break-down specific costs. This will provide a better understanding of whether services are cost effective and efficient.

#### Recommendation(s):

1 Area Committee note and comment on the Ward Performance Reports for quarter 4 2013/14.

#### 1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, and challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

#### 2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Neighbourhood Working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement.
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods'; the Ward Performance reports help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance Reports captures work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as the Ward Action Plan, Neighbourhood Action Team's Action Log, Crime Drug Partnership (CDP) plans and other partner's implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the CDP.
- 2.5 The following brief summary by the respective Ward NDO highlights the key issues:

#### Ward: St Ann's – NDO: Michelle Graley

The NAT Team are currently in the process of agreeing future Ward priorities. The team will continue to share and use intelligence to target issues that matter most to our community in St Ann's and agree joint responses with partner agencies to resolve problems. The Team will continue to identify and align prioritises for the ward via continued Local Consultation, Locality Board, Ward Councillors, Partners, and Officers. #### Safer Theme – Criminal Damage, Violence & Dwelling Burglary

 St Anns as a High Impact Ward has a target to reduce Criminal Damage (CD), Personal Robbery and Violence. St Anns is currently meeting targets in Criminal Damage, but not in the other two areas. St Anns has experienced an All Crime increase of 18% in March 2014

#### **Personal Robbery**

• St Anns has seen a 30% increase (14 additional offences) in 2013/14 compared to year

to date. In March 2014, Sneinton Elements Beat was responsible for 50% of the reported Personal Robbery offences; however, this only equates to 2 offences. This beat along with St Anns Well Road account for 66% of offences (19 and 21 offences respectively). Robin Hood Chase and Campbell Grove were the only two Crime addresses to feature in 2013/14 figures more than once (5 offences in Robin Hood Chase and 2 in Campbell Grove). 64% of offences were committed in Open Spaces (30 offences).

#### **Burglary Other**

- 2013/14 saw a 23% increase in Burglary Other offences in St Anns (9 additional offences) and a 200% increase in March 2014(4 additional offences). The figure of offences in St Anns has varied month on month in the year to date; such that the volume of offences has ranged from no offences (in May 2013) to 11 offences (in June 2013).
- Sneinton Element beat in both year to date and March 2014(15 offences YTD, 5 offences March 2014). In March 2014, and where recorded, Burglary Other offences involved the removal of metal items, cash and hair styling products from business premises(3 offences)
- Of the remaining 17 Burglary Other offences in 2013/14 in the Ward, 3 was classed as attempted burglary and the rest were shed Burglaries (14 offences). 50% of shed burglary offences in the year to date occurred in St Anns Wells Rd Beat (7 offences) from which items such as garden equipment, bicycles and office equipment has been taken

#### **Violence and Domestic Violence**

The level of violence in the St Anns Ward has seen a 17% increase in the year to date (54 additional offences). In March Domestic Violence Crime saw a 7% reduction (1 fewer offence) and Domestic Violence Incidents also saw a 22% reduction (8 fewer incidents). Therefore, the increases seen in Other violence (12 additional offences) have solely contributed towards the increase in Violence experienced by the Ward. In a stark contrast to previous months. Other Violence accounts for the greatest volume of Violence offences in St Ann's in the year to date (201 offences) and in March (21 offences). So although there has been a decrease in Domestic Violence Crimes and Incidences over the last 2 months, so this could suggest that the campaign and action of the NAT team have in the Ward could have had an impact. However, the increase in Other Violence and the Hate Crime levels are concerning, 42% increase in the year to date (8 additional offences).

#### **Micro Beat**

- There were 11 offences committed within the Micro beat area in March 2014. This is the second highest monthly volume in 2013/14 and a dramatic increase on last month; such that the Micro beat saw only 1 offence in Feb 2014.
- In 2013/14, the Micro beat has suffered 74 offences (April 2013 to March 2014). Violent offences continued to account for the greatest volume of crime (33%, 25 offences).
- The Micro beat has experienced a significant amount of Drug offences(9 offences)

#### Neighbourhood theme – Cleansing and Environmental issues

- The overall Cleanliness Index score for St Anns Ward is currently at 92% which is currently achieving the Council's commitment, which is set by Neighbourhoods as clean as the City Centre
- Dog Fouling issues across the Ward Task Group to develop and implement a plan for 2014.
- NDO and Councillors have progressed an Area Capital scheme of works across the area
- Continue to work on the Robbery Hotspots and Needle use areas with St Ann's Ward to tackle as part of the Nat's Task & Finish Group

#### **Community engagement**

- Following the last Local Issues meeting in March 2013. There was a local commitment to
  request the police to prioritise the Micro beat area over the next three months. Other
  issues Commuter Parking in and around St Anns is a real problem, as is speeding cars
  on Beacon Hill Rise and the installation of bicycle racks to be installed in Parks and
  other public areas(areas and amount need to be agreed and confirmed by Councillors)
- Police received a mandate from the community, to give Anti Social behaviour around The Chase more attention and therefore will be supported by giving additional patrols in the areas.
- NAT Team to continue pressing forward with the Domestic Violence and Awareness Campaign

#### 2.6 Ward: Dales - NDO: Greg Foister

#### Safer Theme - Crime and anti social behaviour (ASB)

- The current NAT priorities reflect the Locality Board focus on Damage, Violence and Burglary.
- Dales Ward has seen a year to date increase of 14% in Criminal Damage when compared to the same period the previous year (25 additional offences). The Ward has experienced a 29% reduction in March 2014 when compared to March 2013 (4 fewer offences) and 5 fewer offences compared to the previous month (February 2014). As such, March has seen the lowest monthly volume of Criminal Damage since October 2012.
- Of the 10 Criminal Damage offences to have taken place in Dales in March 2014, 40% were classed as Criminal Damage to a Dwelling (4 offences), the majority of which occurred in the Bendigo Beat (3 offences). A further 3 offences were classed as Criminal Damage to a Vehicle, all of which were committed in the Sneinton Hermitage Beat. 80% of all Criminal Damage, regardless of type of damage, took place in this Beat and in Bendigo (4 offences per Beat). This was not consistent with the year to date trends; such that the Bakersfield Beat has experienced the greatest volume of Criminal Damage in 2013/14 (45%, 91 offences).
- There has been a 12% increase in Theft Offences in the Dales Ward in the year to date (28 additional offences, 2013/14 compared to 2012/13). Nonetheless, March 2014 saw a reduction of 26% in Theft when compared to March 2013, which equated to 6 fewer offences offences. In addition, Dales Ward also saw 2 fewer offences compared to the previous month (February 2014).
- In March 2014, the majority of Thefts in the Bakersfield and Sneinton Hermitage Beats were classed as Theft Other (50% in Bakersfield and 63% in Sneinton Hermitage). These offences involved the theft of a garden gate, mobile phone theft, theft of cash from a staff collection and refusal to pay a taxi fare. There were 3 recorded Theft offences in the Bendigo Beat, all of wPrige were Shop Theft from the Cooperative

Supermarket on Sneinton Dale.

- Dales has experienced poor performance in relation to Violence in March 2014; such that there has been a 45% increase when compared to March 2013 (13 additional offences) and an additional 15 offences on last month (February 2014). This has contributed to a 14% increase in the year to date (37 additional offences). March 2014 saw a 25% increase in Domestic Violence Crimes (3 additional offences), and therefore, the majority of the increase seen this month can be attributed to Other Violence which saw an increase of 100% (13 additional offences).
- Assault with Injury accounts for 48% of all Violence offences (150 offences) and Common Assault is the second highest category accounting for 32% in the year to date (101 offences).
- Other Violence in March 2014 was fairly evenly spread amongst the Bakersfield, Bendigo and Sneinton Hermitage Beats (7,8 and 11 offences respectively). 12 offences took place on residential premises, while 12 occurred in open space and 2 in retail business. In addition, the majority of Other Violence offences in March 2014 were subcategorised as 'Random Attacks' (14 offences), while 3 were classed as Hate Crime and 3 were Neighbourly Disputes.
- The All Crime rate per 1000 of the population in Dales ward is below that of the average for the division. Positively, the ward is performing below the division average for all types of crime with the exception of Damage, which is slightly above average and for ASB.
- The NAT priorities reflect a commitment by all partners to proactively work together to address the Locality Boards focus. For example, where a crime takes place and there are environmental issues to deal with we deal with them as a priority. Where fly tipping, dog fouling, bins on street, lighting etc are issues we have a agreed to identify hot spot streets and deal with them and where Parks are an issue (with drugs, vandalism and street drinking) we have agreed to work together to solve the problems.

#### Neighbourhood theme – Cleansing and Environmental issues

- The Dales Ward compares well generally in the area of cleanliness, with the average year to date score reaching just below the cleanliness bench mark. The data supports local concerns regarding the problems of Dog Fouling, fly tipping and perception of general cleanliness. The NAT priorities reflect these concerns. Hot Spots for Dog Fouling, which have increased dramatically in this period, have been identified and both CPO operations and proactive work around responsible dog ownership and a dog control order are being pursued.
- The Neighbourhood Operations Manager and his team (Street Scene) are working to improve the average bench mark and address seasonal issues. Hotspot streets for bins on street, bin contamination and fly tipping have been identified. Work with waste management, CP and STARA is currently being undertaken/planned to addresses recent issues of fly tipping in the Ward, including the piloting of a new sticker and leaflet to warn fly tippers.
- The standard of our playgrounds and parks, along with the safety on our roads remains a concern for local people and local ClIrs. A number of schemes have been funded out of Area Capital monies to improve road users and pedestrian safety. ClIrs have worked to improve Parkdale and Colwick Woods Park. A second meeting with residents concerning the development of the Greenway Park was held March.
- The windmill park has been identified by resident and Cllr, supported by CP and the Police as an area of concern for drug usage and vandalism. Parks are working with the users of the windmill park to write a new management plan. The pre crime team are being asked to input into this plan re designing out crime as part of the NAT priorities.

#### **Community engagement**

• Local Cllrs have a series of Ward Walks and Local Issues meeting planned for the coming period. The detail of this carPlageol@id in the appendix to this report. The

Neighbourhood action team are seeking two joint patch walks with NCH as part of this activity.

- The local police are starting a new initiative called 'street by street' this is an opportunity for the police and community protection staff to meet local people.
- Family & Community Team. Greenway Centre. Sneinton Tenants and residents Association. SEND project and Renewal Trust Detached Youth Team have worked successfully with young people including the Roma Community.
- The NAT priorities reflect the need to deal with a number of local problems raised by residents beyond the focus on crime at the Locality Board. The priorities have been drawn together as a result of listening to local people in a number of forums and looking at the data available. As a result the new priorities whilst broadly set out under themes, seek to identify specific locations that need prioritising where it can or specific cohorts of residents that need focusing on. The NAT has now moved its meetings to 144 Sneinton Dale and will take to the street 3 times a year; to both increase its engagement activity and check its assumptions.

#### Working theme – Unemployment

- In discussion with the Economic Development Team the Neighbourhood Management Team has agreed the production of an employment and skills/training plan for the Ward. This will be lead by the lead body – Renewal Trust.
- Data suggests that young people, 50+ and long term unemployed are our priority groups to focus on; the plan will reflect delivery elements to focus on these groups.
- Evidence suggests that we have a very diverse make up of unemployed people and so attention will be paid to how this is reflected in deliver.
- Economic Development delivered a Jobs Fair on the 13<sup>th</sup> March targeting people with real jobs. A number of organisations attended the day providing training, advice and jobs. 65 residents attended on the day. We are currently waiting for outcomes of this day to be provided
- Building the relationship with local businesses as to access employment opportunities for local people and encourage relationships with the various schemes that NCC offer will also form part of the NAT priorities.

#### Family and Community Team

• The new NAT priorities reflect not only the universal provision provided by the Family and Community Teams, but also the contribution of these teams to the wider priorities of the Area. For example there contribution to work on DV, there contribution to work with young people around pre employment activity and ensuring that identified young people in relationship to targeted provision are taken to the VPP.

#### Health

• The Health team are currently identifying Ward based health priorities and have now provided the LM team with localised data. Further discussion with the Health Team are being planned to look at the day to day business of tackling health in the Ward.. This will be included in the NAT priorities.

#### 2.7 <u>Ward: Mapperley</u> – NDO: Fi Cusick

#### Safer Theme - Crime and anti social behaviour (ASB)

- All crime is showing a further reduction of 0.3% and ASB is down by 2.3% against the 12 month baseline figures.
- Autocrime remains a priority policing issue. Several van break-ins at Park Inn and Best Western. Separate bays to be allocated to vans at Park Inn in direct sightline of CCTV. The vast majority of Autocrime offences take place in the Mapperley Beat, however there has been an increase of theft or unauthorised taking of a vehicle in the Wells Road Beat all of which involved motorcycles.
- Burglaries an increase of 2 offences (YTD). Figures have remained relatively stable since August 2013. The majority of dwelling burglary offences took place in the Mapperley Beat, all on a weekday. No offences in March 2014 took place on the same street or on the same date.
- Criminal Damage 24% reduction in March 2014 (MTD). Offences predominantly based in the Wells Road Beat area. Most offences involve damage to vehicles.

#### Parking

• H-bars have now been installed at identified vehicle access points on Mapperley Road, Chestnut Grove and Villa Road.

#### Neighbourhood theme – Cleansing and Environmental issues

- City Services continue to respond to litter and fly-tipping issues raised by residents and Councillors.
- March saw an increase of 18 incidents of graffiti and an increase of 41 incidences of fly tipping. Hot spots have been identified and action is being taken to reduce these numbers.
- There was an increase of 46 reported incidences of dog fouling in February. However, this is probably due to FIDO being deployed in the area during that particular month.
- Work is taking place to progress Area Capital Schemes and NCH environmental schemes including traffic management issues around schools.

1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities

As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2011 an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million citywide between 2011-2013.

To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress

#### 2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of "Transforming Neighbourhoods" the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme have included footpath, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
