3 MINUTES

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 1 September 2014 as a correct record subject to the following amendments:

- a) **Minute 21,** amend the fourth paragraph to read: "The Governance Officer in attendance clarified that resolutions are only made by voting members of the Committee and the views of others recorded in the preamble to the resolution."
- b) **Minute 22,** amend the third paragraph to confirm that there are no policies to sell or decommission properties in Wollaton West Ward.

The amended minutes were signed by the Chair.

4 POLICE AND CRIME UPDATE

Inspector Robert Wilson of Nottinghamshire Police updated the Committee on the following issues:

- a) The Police are in the process of acquiring Byron House on Maid Marian Way and officers currently based at Canning Circus Police Station will be moving there at some stage. This will not affect policing in Wollaton. The Police Response Base, currently at Radford Police Station, will not move.
- b) Across the whole area there has been an 5% increase in crime between April and November when compared to the same period last year. Dwelling burglary has decreased but thefts from sheds and garages, and particularly bike theft, has increased. The Police have been encouraging people to secure their sheds and garages.

- c) There has been a small increase (4%) in crime when compared to last year. Since the last update the Police have made a significant arrest of a resident. No charge was brought but offences reduced significantly. The same individual was then arrested in connection with a burglary in Lenton. He was charged and has been remanded in custody.
- d) Thefts from sheds and garages have decreased but bike thefts have increased. Policing activity has focused on tackling this through catching people in the act, the use of capture bikes, CCTV and challenging people found with tools such as bolt cutters without good reason who can be arrested for the offence of Going Equipped to Steal.

e) Thefts from sheds and garages and theft from vehicles have both increased significantly when compared to last year. This is partly down to the number of bike thefts in the area and work has been done to encourage residents to secure their bikes. More officers have been deployed in Wollaton overnight and those overnight patrols have resulted in some arrests.

- f) A joint initiative between the Police, Police Community Support Officers, Community Protection and Neighbourhood Management has been taken to mail crime prevention leaflets to all other addresses on a street when a theft of a vehicle or burglary occurs.
- g) Home burglaries have decreased by 5 (10%), theft of vehicles has reduced by 8 (60%) and capture cars have been deployed. Crime prevention roadshows have taken place at Bramcote Lane and Middleton Boulevard shops and more dates are planned in the run up to Christmas.

In response to questions from the committee and others present, Inspector Wilson provided the following comments:

- h) Around 50% of thefts from vehicles were from unlocked vehicles while, with the remainder, windows are broken or locks forced to gain access to the vehicle. It is possible that devices have been used to trigger the electronic door unlock signal on car key fobs and Inspector Wilson agreed to find out if measures could be taken to block this. Residents are advised to keep their car in a garage if possible and to hide their car keys to reduce the risk of their vehicles being taken.
- i) Lighting in the area is not of concern to the Police who are happy with the level of street lighting. The new lighting doesn't disperse light in the same way as the replaced lights and residents may need some time to get used to this.
- j) Inspector Wilson agreed to look into reports of a gang of four people causing concern in the area after dark.

RESOLVED to thank Inspector Wilson for his update.

5 URGENT ITEM - COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

The Chair of the meeting was of the opinion that this item, although not included on the agenda, should be considered as a matter of urgency in accordance with Section 100B(4)(b) of the Local Government Act 1972, to enable the new Community Representatives to take a full part in the meeting.

- (3) thank Nina Douglas for her service to the committee as this was to be her last meeting.

6 <u>DIRECTORY OF PUBLIC HEALTH COMMISSIONED SERVICES</u>

Alison Challenger, Public Health Consultant, introduced the item by explaining she hoped this would be a two way conversation and that the Committee would be able to provide her with information about the communities in the area. She provided the following information to the Committee:

- a) Public Health became a responsibility of the Local Authority in 2013 and has the responsibility to integrate with other services across the council and address causes of ill health such as poor housing and transport.
- b) The budget for the services commissioned by Public Health also transferred to the Council and the services delivered within Area 7 are identified in a directory and include services such as Breastfeeding Support, School Nursing and New Leaf stop smoking services. The Services Directory is a moving picture. Services can change or move for example if they are not accessed or are in inappropriate venues.
- As well as commissioning services Public Health also has a Health Protection role in matters such as screening, infection control and preparation for epidemics.
- d) In developing the Ward Health Profiles, Public Health colleagues have tried to tell a story about what health is like in a ward. The profiles reflect the rankings on various health indicators and, for the wards in Area 7, they indicate that health is either better or not significantly different from the rest of the city. However, there are pockets of deprivation where health tends to be poorer.

 e) Particular higher needs groups across the two wards have been identified as older people suffering isolation and loneliness, students requiring sexual health services and children requiring nutrition, immunisation and accident prevention services.

In response to questions from those present Ms Challenger provided the following information:

- f) Public Health colleagues are aware of the impact the large number of students living in Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey has on the ward health profile and the differences between their health needs and permanent residents' health needs. Reports have been produced which exclude the data relating to students giving a health profile of the permanent residents of the ward.
- g) Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services are commissioned by the Clinical Commissioning Group and not Public Health but are experiencing difficulties. Public Health produce a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) which covers a wide range of health needs and analyses whether those needs are being met. The JSNA requires consultation and whilst it uses Public Health data, this is just a starting point. Forums such as Area Committees can help to inform the JSNA.
- h) Loneliness amongst older people and particularly older men is an emerging issue and more data is becoming available. Depression amongst older people has also historically been hidden and it requires a different response to that with younger people. This is a new and emerging area but Public Health are aware of it.
- i) Public Health England are the leads on Health Protection but Public Health has a local role and liaises with local health organisations. Screening is commissioned by NHS England but the Local Authority has a responsibility to ensure needs are being met. Take up of bowel cancer screening for example is very low at 56%, particularly when compared to cervical and breast cancer screening. Screening can make a real difference to outcomes for people and work is being done to encourage people to use the service.

RESOLVED to

- (1) thank Ms Challenger for her informative presentation
- (2) commit to continue the dialogue between Public Health and Area representatives either through future meetings of this committee or through councillors.

7 ITEMS FROM COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

Community Representatives were invited to give updates to the Committee and the following information was provided:

a) Rob Kirkwood – Friends of Wollaton Park

Friends of Wollaton Park had held a well attended initial Annual General Meeting and was now a formally constituted body with a large number of active members. Mr Kirkwood expressed his thanks to all involved with the organisation.

b) Lynne Dilks - North Wollaton Residents Association

There had been an increase in low level antisocial behaviour and petty vandalism, with groups of young people congregating in the old canal basin and local playareas. Plants had been pulled up in people's gardens and for sale boards pulled down. In response the chair suggested developing better links between the Local Action Group and the residents association.

c) Adam McGregor – Lenton Abbey Residents Association

Mr McGregor reported that the Association's focus is currently on recruiting new members as a number of people had moved on and had not been replaced. This is causing difficulties for the association.

d) Antony Swannell - Wollaton Vale Residents Association

Parking on grass verges remains an issue in the area. It is damaging the verges and creating a hazard as it restricts the view motorists and pedestrians have of the road. In response, Lylse Renwick, Neighbourhood Development Officer reported that it is often residents or their visitors that park on the verges. Letters had been sent to residents advising them that the verges would not be able to be repaired if they continued to park there.

e) Gary Beavan – Wollaton Park Residents Association

The entrance gates to Wollaton Park on Middleton Boulevard are in disrepair, in need of painting and held together with strapping. The Derby Road gates are also an issue. Pauline Dorey, Neighbourhood Development Officer responded that colleagues in Parks had advised her that the gates are in good working order and there are no health and safety concerns. They are in need of maintenance but because the gates are listed this cannot be done quickly as specialist work is required. There are currently no resources for this type of work but colleagues will seek up to date quotes for the work.

RESOLVED to thank the Community Representatives for their updates.

8 WARD PERFORMANCE REPORTS

John Marsh, Locality Manager, introduced the report of the Strategic Director of Commercial and Neighbourhood Services which details the performance of the Wollaton West and Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey wards during quarter four 2013/14 against a range of performance indicators. The following points were highlighted in relation to Wollaton West Ward:

Wollaton and Lenton Abbey Area Committee (Area 7) - 10.11.14

- a) The level of performance remained high with the number of incidents of graffiti down from 10 to 2. However, fly tipping and dog fouling incidents had both increased during the same period.
- b) There were 19 reported incidents of dog fouling during October, all of which were cleared within 48 hours of being reported. Across the city there has been an increase in reporting of dog fouling which may be attributable to the See It, Report It campaign.
- c) Key successes relating to the Youth Summer Programme and the designation of 140 hectares of Wollaton Park as a Local Nature Reserve were also reported.
- d) The Wollaton West Christmas Light switch on was to take place on 4 December.

The following information was then provided about the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward:

- e) Levels of cleanliness were slightly lower in Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey than those in Wollaton West and the number of fly tipping incidents had increased slightly to 19 incidents. However, this level of incidents remains much lower than previous reports.
- f) The central reservation along Middleton Boulevard has been re-turfed following the works along the stretch of road and the appearance is much improved.
- g) Key successes were reported including the results of the consultation with residents over the development of Lenton Abbey Park and the Student Week of Action held between 6 and 17 October where students were welcomed to the ward and offered advice on a range of issues including personal safety, security, recycling and anti-social behaviour.
- h) On 24 November the ward will be hosting a Leader Listens event and the ward Christmas light switch on event will be held on 3 December.
- i) In response to a question about the repainting of the Keep Clear wording on Middleton Boulevard at the junction with Scalford Drive, Pauline Dorey, Neighbourhood Development Manager, reported that the Ringroad Improvement Team were scheduling those works.

RESOLVED to thank John Marsh for the update and note the content of the ward reports.

11 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES

Lynn Standen and Paul Howard, Tenancy and Estate Managers, Nottingham City Homes presented the Chief Executive of Nottingham City Homes' report on the organisation's performance in the area. They covered the following points:

- a) The end of the period within which refurbishments under the Decent Homes scheme could be carried out was approaching and, across the city, 167 properties had had no work carried out. Very few of these outstanding properties were located within this area. Patch Managers are contacting tenants in the relevant properties to see if they wanted any work doing.
- b) Tenants and leaseholders of Capitol Court, Wollaton had been consulted over colour schemes for internal decoration of the building but the response was tied between the three options.
- c) The position of Area 7 representative for the Tenant and Leaseholder Congress and Nottingham City Homes Area Committee remains vacant.
- d) A survey had been carried out on the Sheila Roper Centre which had found that the roof was in reasonable condition but that other work was required on the building.
- e) Nottingham City Homes had recently been identified as one of the top 50 social landlords in the country, coming 22nd out of 2000 organisations.

The Committee also considered the proposed Environmental submissions for Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward. There were no submissions for Wollaton West ward this period.

Recommendation(s):

Area Committee note and comment on the Ward Performance reports for quarter 3 2014/15

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Neighbourhood working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods. The Ward performance reports help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance reports capture work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as Neighbourhood Action Team's Action Log, Crime and Drugs Partnership (CDP) plans and partners implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the CDP.
- 2.5 The following brief summary by the respective Ward NDO (Neighbourhood Development Officer) highlights the key issues. The more detailed Ward reports are attached as Appendix A.

Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward: NDO: Pauline Dorey

Crime: During October – December 2014 (compared with October – December 2013) all crime in the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward increased by 5% (increase of 6 crimes to 358 for April- Dec 2014) with an increase in thefts of 13 incidents with the majority being of bikes from the University. Dwelling burglary decreased by 4 incident during October – December 2014 for the same period in 2013. Please see detailed breakdown. The rate for all crime per 1,000 of population in the WELA ward is the lowest across the 20 wards. There is a decrease in ASB for the ward Year to Date.

November 2014 =16 crimes and 9 ASB incidents

December 2014 = 14 crimes and 16 ASB incidents

ASB: During October – December 2014 (compared with October – December 2013) ASB decreased by 39% by 15 incidents. The Ward has the lowest rate per 1,000 of population of the 20 wards across Nottingham.

Domestic Violence Crimes: 12 incidences reported for 2014-2015 YTD with a decrease of -12 (-50%) from previous year to date. However we have been informed that there are a significant number of unreported incidences of Domestic Violence in Lenton Abbey.

Fire: Even though incidents of Fire are low in the ward with 1 Deliberate Secondary and 1 Accidental fire in the quarter. With the Ward Year to Date ranking the lowest for All Fires with 2 (property and secondary) out of 20 wards across Nottingham. Events and Home Fire Safety Checks targeting vulnerable residents and groups and school children continue to take place in the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward.

Community Protection: No Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) or Statutory Notice data was available.

Cleanliness of the Ward has increased from the previous quarter and to a 92 average well above the 'neighbourhood as clean as the city centre' benchmark target of 86%. There has been a decrease across all areas for the same quarter October – December 2014 in comparison with October and December 2013. For the current year **Graffiti** is decreasing across the Ward with 14 incidents in October 2014. **Fly Tipping** across the Ward

in October – December 2014 decreased with 13 incidents. **Dog Fouling** across the Ward in October – December 2014 increased with 59 incidents. However currently there have been no real issues raised with the Students returning to live in the WELA ward since the start of term.

Unemployment: Is increasingly falling for the WELA Ward with a decrease of -51% for the quarter being the lowest in the City. Hope Nottingham are continuing their Employment Pathway for their volunteers and have started the new food growing and environmental maintenance training programme on the Wensor Avenue Allotment space in Lenton Abbey with the Official Key Handover event with WELA Ward Councillors and NCH in December 2014. With NDO support there has been successful ongoing student team challenges, volunteer recruitment, development, training and capacity building at Sheila Roper Community Centre. This is highlighted in the Ward Report under the Ward Priorities for Work.

Housing: The ward has a 3 star rating. There are currently 3 letting voids in 2014/2015 with a decrease to 25 days in void to re-let time achieving current targets. There are no empty properties awaiting de-commissioning in the Ward. 102% of rent charged has been collected which is excellent. 98.1% of repairs have been completed on target with tenant satisfaction of 8.86. 0.61% of tenancies had to be ended by eviction

Health: Health data is currently being updated for the ward. Sheila Roper Community Centre are currently exploring the possibility of offering gentle exercise and healthy eating sessions with various partners.

Key Successes:

Lenton Abbey Park Development Plan and Bid – An exciting Development Plan for Lenton Abbey Park with Ward Councillors, NDO and Parks and Open Spaces was submitted with a Funding Bid to external funders in October. The Park has continued to win Green Flag status again this year.

Highfields Park Heritage Lottery Bid - Through excellent work by Parks and Open Spaces and Highfields User Group £3.2 million Heritage Lottery Bid has been successful. Works will begin in 2015 to restore many of the heritage features and using WELA Area Capital Fund monies to develop a new Dipping Pond which local residents can use for wildlife activities.

Sutton Passeys Crescent Play Area – WELA NDO working with Parks and Open Spaces on ongoing consultation with local residents on current usage and issues to inform a Development Plan for the Play Area.

Spring Clean Up Days of Action in Lenton Abbey – plans are moving forward for a bulky waste collection for priority streets in Lenton Abbey. Additional events and activities to tackle Dog Fouling will be rolled out across the Ward.

Leader Listens event – Politics students and pupils studying Community Engagement gained a real insight into the workings of Nottingham City Council from face to face discussions with Councillor Jon Collins during the WELA ward Leader Listens event on 24th November at Bluecoat Academy Wollaton Park estate campus. Councillors listened to and engaged pupils and residents in discussion and giving answers about local issues, ideas and concerns about the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward and City Wide.

Hawton Spinney Interpretation Panel and Nature Trail – Launch on 12th February with follow up workshops – Following successful public meetings and community consultation which informed the drawing up of the Hawton Spinney Maintenance and Development Plan. Action points have been implemented with a pearly planting and re-development of the wildlife

habitat. As well as the new signage, Interpretation Panel and Nature Trail. "Providing a local resource for generations now and to come", "The Information Board is informative and clear" "I like the A4 photos for the Nature Trail", "It will be really interesting for people in the area, school children, residents and visitors"

Christmas Light Up Events and Lenton Abbey Residents Association – Wednesday 3rd December 5pm The Blossoms - Residents really enjoyed the fireworks, Beeston Fields school carol singing, University of Nottingham Brass Band, activities, stalls and warm up workshops at the Community Centre. Building on the success of last year's event with Locality Management working closely with LARA, Sheila Roper Community Centre, and Afterschool Club, local schools, the, Children's Centre, Scouts and other NCC and VCS partners.

Christmas Fair and Light Up Event With Wollaton Park Residents Association (WPRA)—Saturday 6th December 2014 – a new event with many stalls and community consultation on several Wollaton Park estate projects including the Ring Road Improvement Scheme and Hawton Spinney which was well supported by Wollaton Park estate residents with Locality Management working closely with WPRA, local residents, local creative and small businesses and other NCC colleagues and VCS partners.

Lenton Abbey Fun Day – Saturday 4th July 2015 after the success of the 2014 Fun Day with fantastic support from all the diverse local communities in Lenton Abbey and a wide variety of stalls, children's and young people's play and sports activities, performances, community consultation and information stalls. LAFFDA have already started meeting to plan 2015! If you have any ideas please get in touch. Please look on the WELA facebook page for upcoming news and dates.

Neighbourhood Transformation Plans - detailed Action Plans on alleyways, tree planting and old allotment sites in Lenton Abbey led by NDO are currently being developed and implemented with Ward Councillors, NCH, CPO's, CP Enforcement, City Services and Allotments Service and Community Payback partners. Allotments on Brook Road, off Manton Crescent and off Woodside Road using Ward Cllrs, NCH and Allotments Service budgets have been cleared over the last few months and brought back into use to be let out to new Allotment holders. Building on the 'Grow For It' campaign. Plans are currently being implemented to 'transform' Woodside Road Blossoms including 5 new bins, a refurbished Pagoda etc. As a result of external funding being secured by NCC Allotments Service for Trees For Cities Project WELA NDO working with Tree Services undertook community consultation resulting in overwhelming resident support for 12 fruit trees in 'green spaces in Lenton Abbey. These were planted by local residents, NDO, WELA Councillors, City Services on 20th January 2015. Resident Bee Warren said "it's great to see this excellent project coming to fruition and I look forward to watching the trees mature, eventually to produce a free crop of apples and pears for the community, and perhaps to expand on in the future. These trees will not only provide nutritious fruit but also an opportunity to teach and encourage some gardening skills for those in the neighbourhood who maybe haven't previously had the experience or confidence to try growing their own food. So many ancient orchards have been grubbed up in recent years. This is crazy. Britain has one of the best apple growing climates in the world and yet we have come to rely more and more on apples imported from as far away as New Zealand, Chile and South Africa. Creating such vast, unnecessary food miles makes no economic sense, is ecologically unsound and denies folks the superior taste and quality of fruit picked fresh from the tree. We may not be able to fit large orchards in our urban pockets of green space but even a few trees here and there are better than none. It all adds up to improving the environment and people's quality of life."

These Action Plans and Gateway To Nottingham Plans are monitored through the Neighbourhood Action Team meetings.

Lenton Abbey Residents Association— plans are underway for a Spring event with the theme of 'Grow Your Own', 'Clean' and 'Pride in Neighbourhoods' for local residents working with the Police, VCS partners etc.

Area Capital and Public Realm Funds – since the last Area 7 Committee in November 2014 new gating installed to reduce ASB and fly tipping. Works on Woodside Road planned for April to reduce damage to the verges and help create off road parking. Further phases are currently being planned.

Issues:

Ongoing issues with parking both in Lenton Abbey and Wollaton Park estate due to street design. The first Phase of the Experimental Traffic Restriction Order (TRO) in Lenton Abbey is having an impact with effective enforcement which has stopped people from parking on the grass verges in the restricted zone on Woodside Road. This will stop further damage to the grass verges. Further detailed scoping and development work, review and problem solving has taken place with Locality Management leading discussions with Ward Councillors, Traffic Management and Highway Services consulting with NCH and other partners. Community consultation on proposals have been completed and works are scheduled in. Work is currently being developed for further Phases of the works and a new TRO to support parking for residents outside Woodside Road shops in Lenton Abbey.

Wollaton Park estate New Residential Parking Scheme – this has been up and running for a number of months with really positive feed-back from Wollaton Park residents who have felt the improvements relieving some of the parking issues caused by QMC school and University staff. "It has made a real difference. They have been ticketing a lot of cars." WPRA Chairperson "There have been no problems with the new parking arrangements outside the Farndon Green shops" Monitoring of any parking issues outside local schools is currently underway by Traffic Management, Neighbourhood Police Beat Teams and Enforcement in February across the whole of Area 7.

Burglary and cycle theft have increased over the last 6 months but the Neighbourhood Police Beat Team have responded with swift action and successful local operations resulting in arrests and suspects being charged. In partnership with Nottinghamshire Police and other partners, a Crime Prevention Target Hardening Project is currently being rolled out to WELA's most vulnerable residents.

Events:

During this quarter a range of events and meetings have and are due to take place including TRA's and Local Action Group (LAG) meetings, Sheila Roper Community Centre Management Committee, LAFFDA (planning for Lenton Abbey Fun Day), Community Meetings, Wollaton Park Resident Association local issues meetings. Working in partnership with TRA's and NCH there will be some development work to increase resident and tenant involvement in local groups to enable continued participation and representation following the change in Tenant Panels.

The NAT (Neighbourhood Action Team) which has representation of various key service providers across the Ward are currently delivering on the revised and refreshed Ward Priorities. There has been strong partnership working on the Allotment Action Plan led by Neighbourhood Services, working with Allotment Services, NCH, Community Protection and City Services on patch operations on clearing allotment sites, to reduce ASB and enforcement of Allotment Hiring Agreements which have brought some allotment sites back into use and back into Allotment use. We are still working closely with the HMO Team on the additional HMO registration in Wollaton Park estate which should improve contact with HMO landlords. Partnerships have been further strengthered with Stonewater Housing Association and Sheila

Roper Community Centre and with other Social Landlords through a Task and Finish Group reviewing Resident Welcome Packs.

Crime:

Last year had been a challenging year in terms of overall crime. The main crime types which increased significantly were shed and garage burglaries, often where cycles have been stolen, or unlawful entry to cars. Wollaton West crime is decreasing, the current initiatives appear to be working and the NAT team will continue to monitor the situation and continue to support residents. January 2014 burglary dwelling figure was 7 as compared to January 2015, this year is 0, and burglary other also fell in comparison to January 2014 from 2 to 1. Personal robbery fell from 4 last January 2014 to 0 January 2015, criminal damage and arson also fell from 9 to 7, January 2014 compared to January 2015. Crimes which have increased in comparisons to the same month last year January 2014 and the year to date January 2015 are theft 16 an increase of 9, vehicle offences 10 an increase of 5 and violence 10 and increase of 9. The rates for all crime are per 1,000 of population in the Wollaton West ward. The increased which are crimes indicated are the crimes the NAT team are working diligently to address.

Cleanliness Index: The neighbourhood as clean as the City Centre is the benchmark target on cleanliness is to achieve 86%. Wollaton West Ward cleanliness index score is 97% which is above the average of the City Centre.

Graffiti: Wollaton West graffiti issues have not increased; there were no graffiti incidents in December 2014 a decrease of 4 from the previous month.

Fly Tipping: There were 6 incidents of fly tipping in the period a decrease of 1. The Neighbourhood Operation Manager team together with Locality Management are actively working to address this issue.

Dog Fouling: The Ward has seen an increase in dog fouling, 15 incidents. The NAT team (Neighbourhood Action Team) are planning a programme of activities to address the problem which will include Weeks of Action in the areas identified. Visits to local schools assemble together with leaflet distribution at the upcoming Crime Prevention Road Shows to raise awareness of the problem in the ward.

Unemployment Rate: West employment figures remain the same. The ward is ranked 18 out of the 20 wards for unemployment in the city which is very good for the Ward and the City. Unemployment fell in every ward in the last year, only Wollaton West saw no change the Ward is still ranked 18th.

Fire: There has been no deliberate fire in the Wollaton West Ward this period.

Key Successes:

Wollaton West Christmas Lights Celebration -

Last December saw even more participation at the Bramcote Lane Christmas Lights Switch On, the best ever Wollaton West Christmas Lights Celebration to date, more people attended the event. The Bramcote Lane Retailers contribution this year was exceptional. Coates the butchers again donated free BBQ on the night and Sharps the florist contributed soup, rolls and jacket potatoes. The other retailers and Estate Agents contributed prizes for the tombola. This year we saw the opening of Sainsbury's on Bramcote Lane who also participated in the Christmas spirit by donating all the mince pies for the evening together with Christmas cakes for the tombola. The money raised this year by the charity tombola went to the Wollaton Care Group. Citizens came from as far afield as Browtow, Basford, Beeston and Bulwell to attend the event. The contribution from all our partners, e.g. Police, Fernwood Infant School, Kingswood, St Leonard's and Grangewood Methodist Churches were exemplary.

Thanks to all who contributed which made the event such a success?

Bramcote Lane Traffic Calming Scheme Opening -

The Bramcote Lane Traffic Calming Scheme Opening was well attended by the Wollaton West Ward resident; they reported that the improvements were a great success for the area. There was ribbon cutting at the pump by Councillor Battlemuch to reopen the Lane after which everyone proceeded into St Leonard's Community Centre for a speech by Councillor Battlemuch together with tea, coffee, mince pies and cakes. There were approximately 45 residents in attendance.

The old speed cushions have been replaced with round top road humps, a new zebra crossing has been put in outside the Library and Community Centre, there are two new pedestrian

refuges, and the old raised plateau outside the Library has been removed. All the materials used have been selected to complement the local heritage.

There are new paved parking areas adjacent to the Village Pump and improved footways and crossing facilities for pedestrians around the Village Pump and Wollaton Road. New black cast iron planters have been placed around the Village, new LED uplighters to highlight the Village Pump have been put in and the carriageway has been resurfaced between Dovecote Drive and Wollaton Road. The area is vastly improved and has enhanced the ward tremendously.

Messages received from residents:

'Credit where credit due, in that a superb job has been done on the Square and Pump - a happy combination of heritage and traffic management. The York stone paving with its surface lighting is particularly attractive - well done to all concerned'.

'Just to say that the pump and new layout of the road is looking really good'.

Wollaton West Youth Disco -

On the 14th December the young people of Wollaton got dressed in their finery to attend the first Wollaton West Youth Disco to celebrate the end of term and also the end of the year. There were disco lights and disco music together with food for the attendees, the young people who attended said they had a good time and 'it just topped off the year for us'. The event was a great success with no problems for the volunteers and staff.

Issues: Dog fouling has increased dramatically in the area especially on Fernwood Crescent, Rushford Park, Woodhall Drive and Grangewood Road, the Neighbourhood Action Team are to carry out Week of Action programmes together with a covert operation programme with the CPO's in the worst affected areas.

Antisocial behaviour on the Grangewood Estate and Torvill Drive is a concern at the moment therefore the Neighbourhood Development Officer together with Places for People, Housing Officer and the Police are looking at initiatives to resolve the problems.

Events: A range of meetings and events have taken place this quarter including, Wollaton West Community Meetings, Friends of Wollaton Park Group meeting and the Local Area Group meetings. The Wollaton West Ward Budget Consultation Event is to be held on 29th January 2015, it appears that the Wollaton West Ward residents are very interested in attending the event and have been confirming their attendance.

NAT's (Neighbourhood Action Team): - The team represents various key services provides who meet to look at current issues across the ward. The team are working together on agreed ward priorities set by residents as well as the day to day issues that arise in the ward. The NAT team are at present jointly working to resolve issues across the ward. The key Issues are specific area youth antisocial behaviour and dog fouling.



- The WELA ward has a growing diverse community in Lenton Abbey with 74% white British and 6% other white some of whom have English as another language and others of mixed heritage, Black British and Caribbean and Asian origin. The 2012 Insight and 2010 ONS statistics are slightly skewed by the transient student population mainly studying at University of Nottingham.
 - Wollaton Park estate has a hidden community of disabled children, young people and older adults and due to caring responsibilities have pockets of fuel poverty.
 - In the top 10% nationally of SOA's for Crime and Disorder and Income Deprivation affecting children. However reported crime figures have generally fallen across the ward compared to the previous year.
 - Wollaton Park estate have seen a growing number of HMO's and are experiencing increasing problems with their landlords.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities
- 1.2 As part of the budget approved in March 2011, Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million Citywide between 2011 -2013. As part of the budget approved at Full Council on 4th March 2013 Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million Citywide between 2013 -2015. In addition for 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 a Public Realm General Fund has been approved of £750,000 Citywide.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of "Transforming Neighbourhoods" the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programmed have included footpath, fence, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council General Fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programme of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
