22 MINUTES

RESOLVED to note the appointments of community representatives to the Berridge and Sherwood Area Committee as detailed above.

24 LEAD ORGANISATION UPDATE - NG7

Bill Husband, Project manager at NG7 TEA, gave a verbal update to the Committee, highlighting the following points:

- (a) the new premises on Berridge Road have been refurbished and should be in use soon;
- (b) NG7 TEA is forming relationships with the community and youth providers such as the Asian Women's Project and KK Support;
- (c) there is a need to keep identifying issues and where they are to ensure that detached youth workers can become more effective;
- (d) work is being done with the Council's employer hub and local BME employers to encourage the take up of apprenticeships;
- (e) developing an income stream is being investigated so that more work can be done in the area.

During discussion the Committee and others in attendance made the following comment:

(f) KK Support worked with hard to reach young people but more work is needed.

RESOLVED to note the information provided by Bill Husband, and thank him for his update.

25 <u>DISCUSSION ITEM – NCH ISSUES</u>

This item was withdrawn as the Nottingham City Homes representative has not been appointed.

26 <u>LAND AND PLANNING POLICIES DOCUMENT – PREFERRED OPTION</u> <u>CONSULTATION</u>

Sarah Watson, Senior Planning Officer, introduced the Director of Planning and Transport's report detailing the Preferred Option of the Land and Planning Policies Document which is being consulted on until 2 December 2013.

During discussion the Committee and others in attendance made the following comment:

- (a) this will become part of planning policy and will be used to judge planning proposals against;
- (b) the land uses proposed in the document are not definite plans for the site, they are the Council's proposed use;
- (c) land on Lortas Road is causing problems and residents want it to be developed for residential use;
- (d) Haywood School site is ideal for social housing.

RESOLVED to note the ongoing consultation and the opportunity to respond before 2 December 2013.

27 WARD PERFORMANCE REPORTS – QUARTER 2

John Marsh, Central Locality Manager, introduced the Director of Neighbourhood Services' report detailing ward performance for quarter 2.

Inspector Annie Yates highlighted the following points in relation to the Berridge ward:

- (a) crime rates are a big concern as they are increasing. There has been a 28% increase year to date, but this has recently reduced to a 16.9% increase;
- (b) autocrime, burglary, robbery and theft incidents are all reducing due to police initiatives;
- (c) there is a lot of focus on shop theft as this has increased by 82 offences year to date;
- (d) arrests have been made for the arson attack on Sherwood Rise;
- (e) 70% of violence incidents related to domestic violence or familiar violence, rather than random attacks.

Inspector Annie Yates also highlighted the following points in relation to the Sherwood ward:

- (f) there has been an increase in crime across the ward and the police are working hard to combat this. Volunteers are working with the police to distribute leaflets on crime prevention;
- (g) the police are trying to get a team of Special Constables together to work on Mansfield Road at night up until Christmas to reduce the number of thefts and robberies;
- (h) there is a dedicated Police Community Support Officer for the town centre, Edwards Lane and 2 Beat Managers so there is a police presence in the ward;
- (i) police won't be prosecuting offenders travelling at more than 20mph in restricted zones as there isn't a speed awareness cause for the 20mph speed limit until the new year.

John Marsh highlighted the following points:

- (j) cleanliness is being maintained and is on target in both wards. The 2 problem areas are graffiti and flytipping as they are above the levels of previous years;
- (k) the Council are advertising/promoting the free bulky waste collection service to try and combat flytipping;
- (I) there has been a focus on clearing leaf fall within the last few weeks;
- (m) there is now a third Fido machine in the area to clear up dog fouling.

During discussion the Committee and others in attendance made the following comments:

- (n) work is being done with partners on domestic violence to try and find more appropriate means of intervention;
- (o) speed warning signs are appropriate in some locations, but they are expensive and they work because they are unusual so it is not appropriate to install them on every road:
- (p) speed awareness courses needs to include awareness of cyclists;
- street cleaners come before the refuse collectors and this needs to be the other way round so that the street cleaners can pick up any litter left after the bins have been collected;
- (r) there is a large amount of debris which needs to be removed on Kneaton Road from when Nottingham City Homes refurbished a property;
- (s) the gritting programme is up and running and grit bins have been filled. If any bins are empty each bin has a label on it with a telephone number and reference number so that it can be refilled.

RESOLVED to note the key information from the Ward Performance reports for quarter 2 2013/14.

1 BACKGROUND

- 1.1 Sums of £7,235.91 for the Berridge Ward and £96,605.23 for the Sherwood Ward have been set aside for housing environmental improvements for the year 2013/2014.
- 1.2 The proposed schemes must fit at least one of the following criteria:
 - Improvement of Security for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. door entry, lighting, fencing, garage sites).
 - Improvement of the environment for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. dealing with graffiti reducing anti-social behaviour, parking issues, drying areas resurfacing).
 - Improvement of spaces for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. installation of community facilities or areas on land under NCH management).

1.3 The report seeks approval of schemes for the Sherwood Ward.

2 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 Suggestions for schemes may be from a number of sources including tenants & leaseholders, tenants and residents groups, Elected Members, Local Area Group meetings, Ward Walks, Area Panel, Housing Patch Managers and Neighbourhood Action Officers.

3 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 Any amount left in the Housing Environmental funding budget will carry over into the new financial year and can be allocated for schemes identified in the year 2014-15.

4 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS (INCLUDING VALUE FOR MONEY)

- 4.1 Nottingham City Homes has provided a quotation for the proposed work via an agreed competitive tendering process.
- 4.2 Once a City wide programme is agreed, works will be carried out by approved contractors and it is anticipated that further savings may be found. It is anticipated that more schemes may be completed as a result of these savings.
- 5 RISK MANAGEMENT ISSUES (INCLUDING LEGAL IMPLICATIONS, CRIME AND DISORDER ACT IMPLICATIONS AND EQUALITY AND DIVERSITY IMPLICATIONS)
- 5.1 To ensure local development in decision-making the Area Panel and Local Area Groups have been actively involved in the process. Local tenant and resident groups have also been consulted and a full consultation of residents has taken place in the affected blocks.
- 5.2 The Housing Environment Fund will enable a series of improvements to take place that will improve security, spaces and the environment for local people.
- 5.3 The funds available are limited and are targeted at the most vulnerable tenants in the area within the criteria set out at section 1.2 of this report.

6.1 As this report does not include proposals for new or changing policies, or services an Equality Impact Assessment has not been carried out. However these proposals aim to improve the quality of life and wellbeing for residents.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

The ward performance reports provide updates on key issues and themes which link back to local priorities and strategic themes in the Nottingham Plan 2020. The reports provide summary updates on the following key themes:

- Ward Priorities
- Community Engagement
- Finance
- Safer theme Crime and Anti-Social behaviour (ASB)
- Neighbourhood theme Environmental issues and Housing
- Working theme Unemployment rates
- Housing
- Community Protection
- Fire
- Health Theme local health priorities

The following is a brief summary by the respective Ward Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDO):

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Ward: Berridge

NDOs: Debbie Royle and Beth Hanna

Some of the data in the ward report attached now refers only to a month not a quarter. It covers the month of December 2013. It is important to note that as the figures are only for a month and not averaged out over three months, some of the increases/decreases seem quite high/low compared to those reported in previous meetings.

<u>Ward Priorities:</u> Berridge Ward Priorities for January – April 2014 can be seen on the front page of the appendices. These priorities will be reviewed quarterly.

Community Engagement:

NDOs have organised monthly Ward Walks in the ward. Local Action Group meetings take place, every 6 weeks, throughout the ward. A second budget consultation was held giving citizens the opportunity to give us their views. A successful Week of Action took place during the week beginning the 3rd December with a variety of activities taking place including the Christmas Lights switch on event which involved a market with local groups and organisations giving out advice and information and carol singing by local school children. There was also a presentation to the winners of a Pre-crime poster competition. These posters have been distributed throughout the ward.

Crime:

Crime overall is up 2% in Berridge for the year to date (YTD), however comparing the month of December 2012 to December 2013 it is up by 17%. The Central Locality has targets to reduce Dwelling Burglary, Shop Theft and Violence. The target is being met for Dwelling Burglary, but not for Shop Theft or Violent Crime. Dwelling burglary remains stable. Theft offences account for the greatest volume of crime during December, showing an increase on the same month last year and an increase year to date. Violence is one the of the main volume crime categories on the ward and is showing an increase when compared to the same month last year and the year to date. December saw a higher percentage than usual in the level of domestic violence. (See page 12)

Anti Social Behaviour (ASB):

Year to date ASB in the ward has reduced by 10.2% with 84 fewer ASB incidents reported YTD. However in terms of incidents per 1000 of the population, Berridge is under the ward average (2.92%) at 2.36%.

Cleanliness:

The index score for Berridge for September 2013 is 85% compared to a Neighbourhood Target of 86%.

Graffiti Reports:

36 incidents were reported in September 2013. This is an increase of 23 compared to September 2012.

Fly tipping:

80 incidents were reported in September 2013. This is an increase of 27 compared to September 2012.

Unemployment Rate:

Unemployment is 6.9 % (or 1008) in September 2013 and is ranked 6 out of 20 wards. This is an decrease of 0.7% since the previous month.

Community Protection:

In June 2013, 2 statutory notices for the environment

Fire:

In November 2012 there were 7 fires. In November 2013 there were 3. YTD there has also been a reduction of 17%.

Cleanliness:

The index score for Berridge for November 2013 is 90 which means that the Neighbourhood Target is being surpassed.

Graffiti Reports:

There has been 17 incidents of graffiti in November 2013 which is a decrease of 12 compared to the November 2012.

Fly tipping:

There have been 64 incidents of flytipping in November 2013 which is an increase of 13 compared to November 2012.

Community Protection:

In December 2013, 2 Statutory Notices for the Environment were issued/.

Ward: Sherwood

NDOs: Leigh White and Angela Bolton

Some of the data in the ward report attached now refers only to a month not a quarter. It covers the month of December 2013. It is important to note that as the figures are only for a month and not averaged out over three months, some of the increases/decreases seem quite high/low compared to those reported in previous meetings.

Ward Priorities:

We are in the process of reviewing and updating the Ward Priorities for 2013/2014 with the Councillors, Citizens and our Partners.

Community Engagement:

NDOs have organised 4 ward walks in different parts of the ward. A Christmas Light switch on was arranged for the town centre which was very well attended. The lights were switched on by a local school pupil who won the competition. A second budget consultation was held giving citizens the opportunity to give us their views.

Crime:

Crime overall is up 26% in Sherwood for the year to date, however comparing the month of December 2012 to December 2013 it is down by 4%. Priorities for Sherwood have been set as Dwelling Burglary, Shop Theft and Violence. The target is being met for Dwelling burglary, but shop theft and violence are still higher than the target. Steps are being taken to try and achieve these targets.

ASB:

Year to date (compared to the corresponding period last year) ASB has increased by 10.5%. In terms of incidents per 1000 of the population, Sherwood is under the ward average (2.92) at 1.62.

Cleanliness:

The index score for Sherwood for November 2013 is 86 which means that the Neighbourhood Target is being met.

Graffiti Reports:

There has been 1 incident of graffiti which is a decrease of 1 compared to the previous month when there were 2.

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Fly Tipping:

There have been 30 incidents of flytipping during November in Sherwood which is an increase of 19. This will be tackled during the Week of Action in March.

Housing:

Edwards Lane and Sherwood housing estates have both maintained their 3 star statuses. (Further detail to be provided at Chairs brief)

Fire:

There were 3 deliberate fires in November 2013 compared to none in November 2012.

Recommendation(s):

To note the key information from the Ward Performance Reports for December 2013.

- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods'; the Ward Performance report will help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance report captures work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as the Ward Action Plan, Neighbourhood Action Team's (NAT) action log, Crime and Drug (CDP) plans and other partners' implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers, with data analysis undertaken by the CDP.

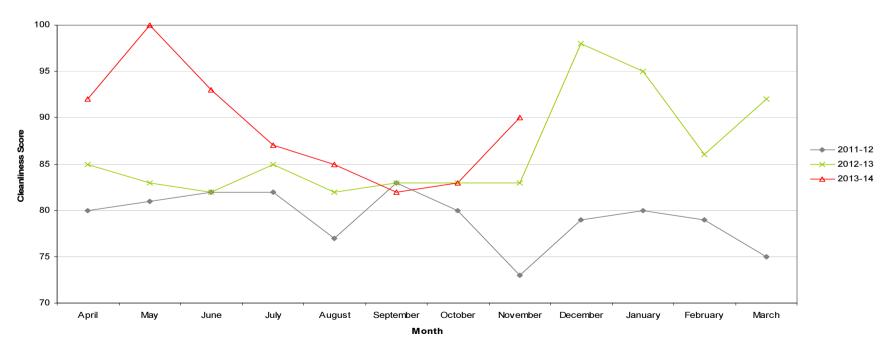

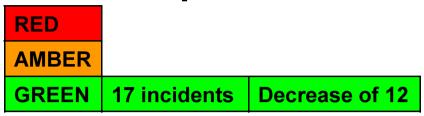

Cleanliness Index - Berridge

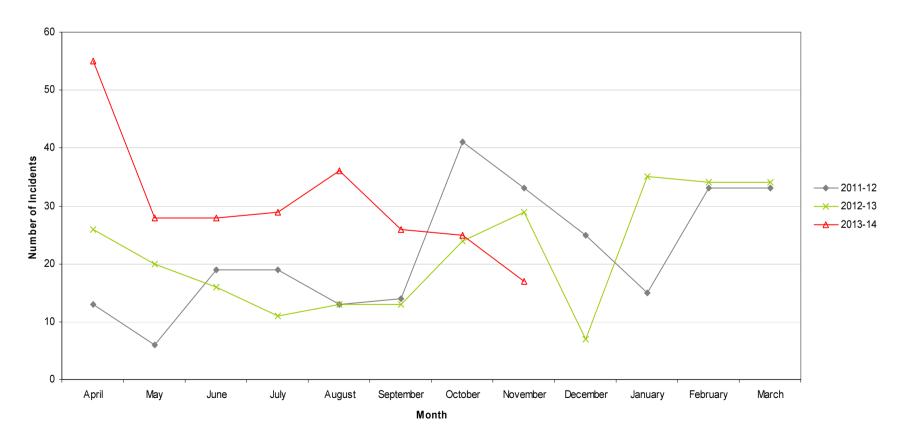

Incidents of Graffiti - Berridge

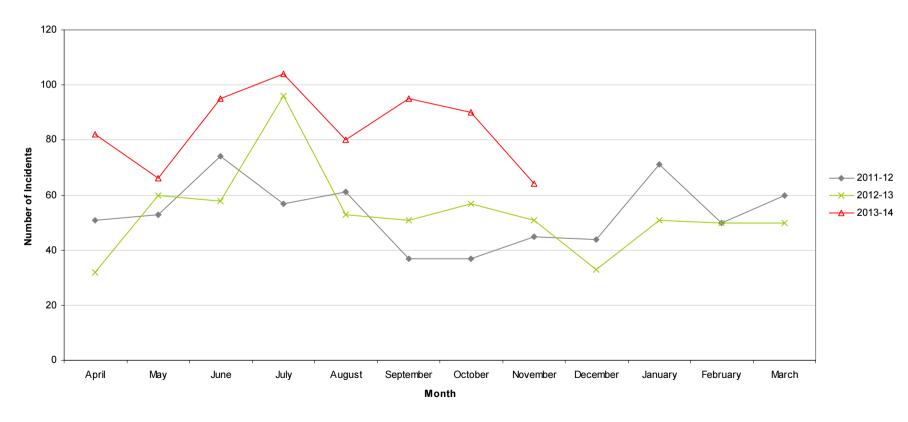


Fly Tipping

Discussions continue with other agencies regarding what further data can be included.



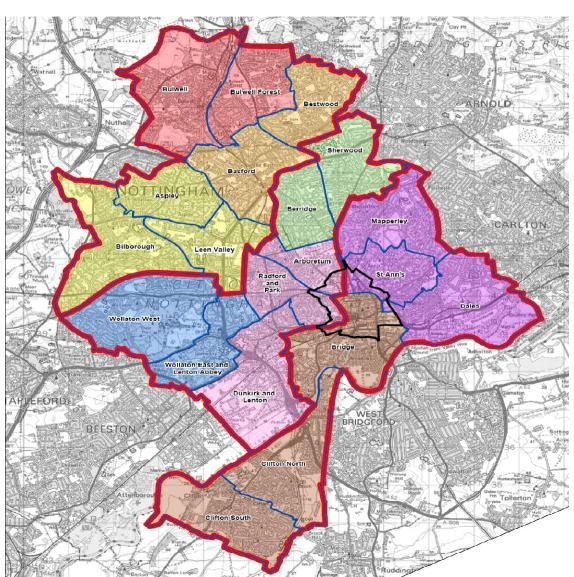

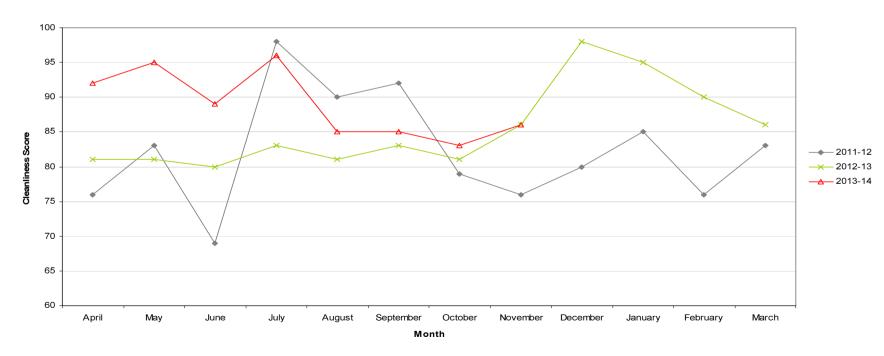

Cleanliness Index - Sherwood

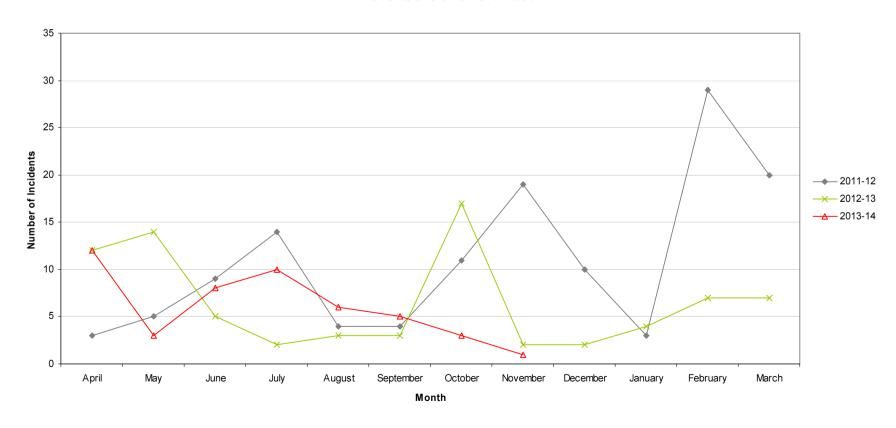

Incidents of Graffiti - Sherwood

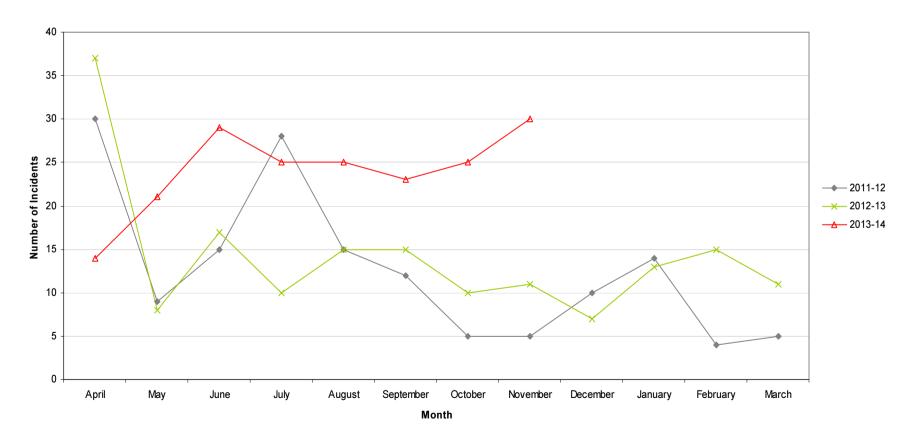

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget approved in March 2013, Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million Citywide from 2013-2015.

- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances, such as economic conditions and change in land values.
