44 <u>MINUTES</u>

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 20 November 2013 as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

45 SCHOOL TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT PROGRAMME

Sue Thorpe, Senior Traffic Management Officer, provided the Committee with the following information in relation to the new School Enforcement Programme:

- (a) a steering group has been set up between the County Council, the City Council and the Police, due to the growing number of complaints from residents about parking during school drop off and pick up times;
- (b) as a result of the steering group a pilot week of action was held outside Ellis Guildford, which has led to the development of a proactive programme for enforcement when parents are parking on zigzag markings, blocking drives, crossings, etc;
- (c) a toolkit has been designed and sent to all 110 maintained schools within the City Boundary which contains a guide to writing a School Travel Plan, Walking Bus guidelines, a parking support leaflet, a 'keep me safe' poster, a full Road Safety Education delivery toolkit, a home to school template letter and information on parking responsibly;
- (d) the Parking Enforcement Team will be visiting each school in the area for a Week of Action and their presence alone may deter some people from parking in the way they usually would;
- (e) the work will also involve educating people on driving and parking safely outside schools;
- (f) all schools in the City are in favour of the Enforcement Programme;
- (g) the programme will run for 8 weeks across the City and will then be assessed to see what has worked well and what can be improved.

During discussion the Committee and others in attendance made the following comments:

- some teachers are parking on streets to avoid paying the Workplace Parking Levy;
- (i) where there are parking issues the Council has introduced parking restrictions if supported by the majority of local residents;

(j) parking irresponsibly causes safety issues and enforcement action is vital to discourage it.

RESOLVED to thank Ms Thorpe for her presentation and note the information provided.

46 SSE LIGHTING CONSULTATION

Clare Sutton, SSE Contracting, gave a presentation on the consultation process within the street lighting private finance initiative (PFI).

During discussion the Committee and others in attendance made the following comments:

- (a) old metal lighting columns that are removed are recycled but sometimes it is just the lamp that is replaced;
- (b) festive lights around the lighting columns are being taken down before the old columns are removed;
- (c) the length of time festive lights are left up causes concern because of wear and tear;
- (d) some areas now have fewer lighting columns but the actual lights are more efficient. Some residents feel that some areas are not as well lit as they were before the lights were replaced;
- (e) the new lighting is timed more specifically and will change with daylight hours;
- (f) levels of lighting are checked if concerns are reported by residents. Concerned residents can call 0800 0966217.

RESOLVED to thank Ms Sutton for her presentation and note the information provided.

47 POLICING UPDATE

Acting Inspector Christine Busuttil delivered a brief update on the area Policing priorities which were identified following consideration of reported crime, issues raised through the on-line consultation system, the Local Action Groups and Tenant and Resident meetings. Further consultation and monitoring will take place and revised priorities will be set for the next three month period.

Policing priorities remained largely similar to those of the previous period as they are considered long term issues which require a sustained period of policing to address:

<u>Bulwell Ward</u> - Anti-social Behaviour (ASB) mainly in the area of Merchant Street; <u>Bulwell Forest Ward</u> - ASB including drugs related crime in the Deptford Crescent and Highbury Vale areas.

Bulwell Ward

- (a) several forms of action have been taken to address the issues raised on Merchant Street with warning and eviction notices issued and dispersal orders put in place. Since the end of January many of the original issues have been resolved;
- (b) following an awareness campaign the number of burglaries had significantly reduced (by 25) compared with the same period as last year but Policing had been increased in burglary hot spots;
- (c) drug related incidents are up by 16 against the same period as last year but warrants and arrests are to be sought;
- (d) fraud is down by 22 cases and theft is down by 42 cases but there have been specific issues in the town centre focusing on a range of goods from Tesco.

Bulwell Forest

- (e) criminal damage on Latimer Close and antisocial behaviour on Deptford Crescent have been an issue. Both areas are to receive Policing focus;
- (f) burglaries are up by 6 compared with the same period last year and are up by 55 over the year to date.

Acting Inspector Christine Busuttil responded to the Committee's questions as follows;

- (g) the citizens evicted from Merchant Street may still be living in the area but partners of the Police are working with them;
- (h) the number and rate of burglaries in the Rise Park area has steadied but is still acknowledged;

Attendees made the following points:

- there is a scam running across the country where people with a transit van are offering mattresses for sale at very reasonable prices. The mattresses are wrapped in plastic and appear to be new but aren't. Some of these mattresses have been picked up off the roadside where residents have left them for collection by the City Council bulky waste team;
- (j) overall fly tipping is down but the City Council has met with the County Council as it is believed that some fly tips are imported from outside of the City. White goods are becoming an issue again as the scrap metal collectors will only take the parts they want and leave the remainder for the City Council to clear.

RESOLVED to thank Acting Inspector Christine Busuttil for her contribution and attendance.

49 <u>RIGHT TRACK (LEAD ORGANISATION) QUARTER 2 AND QUARTER 3</u> <u>REPORT</u>

Stuart Bell, Right Track, introduced his report which summarises work of the community associations and details youth work provision in quarter 2 and quarter 3 2013/14.

Mr Bell made the following points and responded to the Committee's questions as follows:

- (a) Right Track are linking with the Police to provide diversionary activities for young people. In some cases, where young people had joined activities in the first term, they are now mentoring new members;
- (b) the youth provision in Areas 1 and 2 have been merged, creating a wider scope of provision and better value for money for both Areas;
- (c) there is not a lot of funding available to Area 1 so external funding has been sought and achieved to boost the provision available;
- (d) youth provision in Area 1 is a quality service which provides structured activities including those which build life skills;
- (e) there are 4 full time workers dedicated to youth engagement across Area 1 and Area 2 and it is intended to recruit 2 apprentices to assist;
- (f) Area 2 has more funding and better facilities but Area 1 has higher quality provision;
- (g) Right Track are bidding to raise funds so that more activities can be provided;
- (h) There is youth provision on the Bulwell Riverside Joint Service Centre (BRJSC) site but it is not funded through Right Track and caters for different needs;
- (i) a lot has been achieved with the funding available but suggestions are welcome as to how further improvements can be made.

Committee members commented as follows:

- (j) the breaking down of territorialism within the area is welcomed as very valuable for communities;
- (k) Stuart and the Right Track Team have successfully supported community groups to source funding for youth engagement, even at alternative venues. This will be of great benefit for the communities concerned;
- (I) the food bank could not operate without the generous donation of the building use by Right Track;
- (m) It is a concern that citizens are unable to access the youth facilities at BRJSC if they are not connected to one of the existing organisations in the Centre.

Irene Andrews, Market Development Programme Manger, praised Right Track for the value for money which is achieved and informed the Committee that Right Track are held up as good a good example to the other Lead Organisations, some of which comparatively achieve far less.

(1) to note the progress of Right Track as the Lead Organisation in Area 1;

- (2) for Stuart Bell of Right Track to provide a further detailed breakdown to ward members regarding the numbers of young people engaged;
- (3) for a report to be submitted or a presentation made to a future meeting, outlining how, as a company, Bulwell Riverside Joint Service Centre operates.

Respect for Nottingham Survey Results at Area Committee

The Respect for Nottingham Survey is undertaken annually to explore the views and opinions of local residents about anti-social behaviour, crime, community safety and the strategic partnership between the Police and Council. The findings are used to show how we are performing against a range of indicators and also provide valuable information for the Nottingham Crime & Drugs Partnership Strategic Assessment and Partnership Plan. It also informs the service planning and commissioning of Nottingham crime & Drugs Partnership, the Council and other CDP partners.

The results were presented to Corporate Leadership Team on 1^{st} April and it was recommended that the results be presented to Area Committee for further dissemination. Appendix A provides the full CLT paper.

Headline findings

Perceptions of ASB continue to improve and the overall level of ASB is at an all time low with 7% of people citywide highlighting ASB as a problem in their area¹. Similarly, almost all individual types of ASB (litter, dog fouling etc) are all seeing continued reductions with the exception of begging in the city centre which saw a significant increase over the last 12 months.

Satisfaction levels with the Police and Council remain high (63%) but the proportion of respondents who felt there was a good sense of community where they live is reducing. This is of interest as those areas with a lower sense of community tend to have high levels of ASB.

Respect Survey 2013

Report Purpose

This report presents the findings from the 2013 Respect Survey. It comprises:

- A summary of the findings to some of the key questions; and
- Appended is the full report of the Respect Survey 2013.

Recommendations

CLT are recommended to:

- 1. Note the findings.
- 2. Approve the proposals for the communication and dissemination of the findings.
- 3. Consider and approve the use of these findings and further analysis within departments.
- 4. Prioritise tackling litter, dog fouling, parenting and drug dealing/use with relevant council services

Context

The survey is undertaken annually to explore the views and opinions of local residents about antisocial behaviour, crime, community safety and the strategic partnership between the Police and Council. The findings are used to show how we are performing against a range of indicators and also provide valuable information for the Nottingham Crime & Drugs Partnership Strategic Assessment and Partnership Plan. It also informs the service planning and commissioning of Nottingham crime & Drugs Partnership, the Council and other CDP partners.

Background and Methodology

The Respect Survey 2013 was undertaken using the same approach as in 2011 and 2012. The survey was conducted through face-to-face interviews with a random sample of 2,773 city residents. The fieldwork and analysis was commissioned externally with the fieldwork taking place during November and December 2013.

The sample was representative of all wards and deprivation levels in the city and the final data set from the survey was weighted to the Census. Generally, confidence is quoted in this report at the 95% level. When looking at the results by ward, it should be noted that the confidence interval² is +/-10%, apart from Arboretum and Dunkirk & Lenton, which are +/- 4%. The improved confidence intervals in those two wards is a result of a booster sample of 372 interviews, which was undertaken to verify the results of the Respect Survey 2012 which highlighted ASB levels significantly higher than the city average.

Summary Results

² A confidence interval gives an estimated range of values which is likely to include an unknown population value. If independent samples are taken repeatedly from the same population, and a confidence interval calculated for each sample, then a certain percentage (confidence level) of the intervals will include the unknown population value. Confidence intervals are usually calculated so that this percentage is 95%, but we can alternatively produce 90% or 99% confidence intervals for the unknown value. In simple terms, a 95% confidence interval is usually interpreted as meaning that when a significant difference is stated, this will be the right decision 95% of the time. In this report, a 90% level is sometimes quoted, which is a lower level of confidence in differences reported.

As highlighted previously, ASB overall is decreasing and almost all categories (e.g. litter, dog fouling etc) are seeing statistically significant reductions. Perhaps unsurprisingly the categories of ASB that were identified as problems by respondents differed between the City centre and local neighbourhoods.

In the City centre

- ASB issues relating to alcohol appear to be the greatest concern for respondents.
- Perception of begging increased by 8% points to 39% over the last 12 months.

The majority of issues continue to see a statistically significant reduction. Over the last two years:

- Intimidation as a result of groups/ gangs of young people hanging around on the street reduced -12% points (now 17%).
- Vandalism/ Criminal damage by -10% points (now 10%).
- For each issue, at least 14% said 'Don't know', which suggests a significant proportion do not visit the city centre.
- The percentage of residents who feel very or fairly safe walking alone in the city centre when it is dark has increased by 3% points since 2011 to 48%.

In Local Neighbourhoods

- Dog fouling (33.7%) and rubbish and litter lying around (31%) were the issues most commonly identified as being problems but both issues are improving.
- Other problems cited were: parents not taking responsibility for the behaviour of their children (18%), people using or dealing drugs (18%) and people being drunk or rowdy in public spaces (17%).
- 17% of respondents thought that there were specific groups or individuals who cause antisocial behavior in their area. The top two groups identified were teenagers and youths/youngsters/young people.
- Only 9% of all respondents reported being personally targeted by ASB over the last 6 months such as repeated verbal abuse, damage to properties or throwing of stones and this marks a continued reduction. Of this, 65% reported it. The main reason for not reporting was that 'there is no point nothing ever gets done' (27%), 5% were due to a fear of reprisals.
- The percentage of residents who feel very or fairly safe walking alone in your local neighbourhood when it is dark has increased by 4% points to 69%.

Ward Level Results

Despite the reductions generally, there are still wards in the city with high levels of ASB. Due to the small sample size, analysis at ward level should be treated with some caution as the confidence intervals are approximately (+/-10% as opposed to +/-3% city-wide). Nonetheless, there were some wards significantly above the city-wide average (i.e. more than 10% points above the city average).

In the 2012 survey, Arboretum and Dunkirk & Lenton were highlighted as having levels of ASB significantly higher than the city average. In response, the 2013 survey included a booster sample in order to provide more confidence in the ward level results in those areas. The increased sample size within those areas reduced the confidence interval to +/-4%. The 2013 results showed that Dunkirk and Lenton had returned to levels consistent with the city average but Arboretum continued to have levels significantly out of kilter. The high level of ASB in Arboretum is being driven by:

- Litter (with 44% of respondents highlighting it has problem compared to 31% city-wide)
- People being drunk or rowdy in public (36% compared to 17% city-wide)
- Drug use/ dealing (29% compared to 18%)

The issues within Arboretum will be referred to the Central Locality Board.

The 2013 survey highlighted two additional areas of concern. Aspley was found to have the highest level of ASB and this was largely being driven by:

- Dog fouling (with 64% of respondents highlighting it has problem compared to 34% citywide)
- Litter (46% compared to 31%)
- Parents not taking responsibility for their children (46% compared to 18%)
- Motorbikes/ mini motos etc (43% compared to 16%)

The other area with significant levels of ASB was Berridge, which had the following issues:

- Dog fouling (with 46% of respondents highlighting it has problem compared to 34% citywide)
- Litter (44% compared to 31%)

The 2014 survey will switch the booster sample from Dunkirk & Lenton to Aspley in order to provide a greater level of confidence in the results.

Other city-wide measures

- Five out of 10 (51%) respondents said they tend to agree or strongly agree that there is a sense of community where they live. This, however, marks a reduction over 2011 (59%).
- Those involved in formal volunteering fell from 13% in 2011 to 10% in 2013.
- Those helping out (less formal volunteering) fell from 18% in 2011 to 11% in 2013.
- Communities with a lower sense of community tend to have higher levels of ASB suggesting community cohesion to be an important factor.
- 48% of people felt the police and council sought their views and 63% of people felt the police and council were dealing with the crime and ASB issues that mattered. These figures are stable when compared to the previous two years.
- It is intimidation and drugs that are driving dissatisfaction with the police and council in tackling crime and ASB.

Impact

Service Impact

The survey results provide insight which will be used by Locality Boards and service areas to feed into service decisions.

Council Impact

The results from the survey will be used to prioritise investment and services to address the drivers of ASB in the city centre and in local neighbourhoods. In the city centre these issues relating to alcohol. In local neighbourhoods these are: dog fouling (33.7%), rubbish and litter lying around (31%), parents not taking responsibility for the behaviour of their children (18%), people using or dealing drugs (18%) and people being drunk or rowdy in public spaces (17%).

The results from the survey will be used to inform the CDP Strategic Assessment, the CDP Partnership Plan and Locality Boards.

Citizen Impact

The aim of the Respect Survey is to gain a better understanding of our citizens so that we can make more informed decisions. By continuing to undertake this survey we are demonstrating the importance of the views and priorities of our citizens in our decision-making processes.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2011 an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million citywide between 2011-2013. In addition, on March 4th 2013, an additional allocation of £2.5million was allocated for 2013-2015.
- 1.3To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of "Transforming Neighbourhoods" the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million.
- **2.2** Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

1. BACKGROUND

1.1 The funds available for Area Committee are outlined in the table below

- 1.2 The proposed schemes must fit at least one of the following criteria;
 - Improve Security of Tenants & Leaseholders (eg door entry, lighting, fencing, garage sites).
 - Improve the Environment for Tenants & Leaseholders (eg dealing with graffiti, reducing anti-social behaviour, parking issues, drying area resurfacing).
 - Improve Spaces for Tenants & Leaseholders (eg installation of community facilities or areas on land under NCH management).

2. <u>REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF</u> <u>CONSULTATION)</u>

2.1 Suggestions for schemes have come from a number of sources including tenants, leaseholders, tenants and residents groups, elected Members, Local Area Group meetings, Ward walks, Housing Patch Managers and Neighbourhood Development Officers

3. OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 A number of schemes have been submitted; however the available funding does not cover all of the proposals in all wards. The Housing environmental schemes not proposed will be carried forward for 2014-15 for consideration.

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS (INCLUDING VALUE FOR MONEY/VAT)

- 4.1 Nottingham City Homes has provided quotations for the proposed works via an agreed competitive tendering process.
- 4.2 Our contractors are procured based on value for money, quality of works and health & safety. The process of procurement, which was completed earlier, last year for the next few years has been completed for the delivery of environmental schemes throughout the city.
- 4.3 Thomas Bow won the contract for ground / general building work and Rushcliffe Fencing won the contract for fencing and gating works. These are both local contractors employing local people; including apprentices.
- 4.4 Where we are unable to use one of our procured contractors we will obtain 3 quotations to ensure we get value for money. All our schemes have to adhere to financial regulations and this requires us to obtain 3 quotations for any schemes with a value over £500.00.

5. <u>RISK MANAGEMENT ISSUES (INCLUDING LEGAL IMPLICATIONS AND CRIME</u> <u>AND DISORDER ACT IMPLICATIONS)</u>

5.1 To ensure local development in decision-making the Area Panel has been actively involved in the process. Ward members and local tenant and resident groups have also been consulted.

- 5.2 The programme will enable a series of improvements to take place that will improve security, spaces and the environment for local people.
- 5.3 The funds available are limited and are targeted at the most vulnerable tenants in the area within the criteria set out at section 1 of this report.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

1.1 This report outlines the community engagement which has taken place and is planned in Bulwell and Bulwell Forest Wards. It also outlines the ward priorities for both wards and the actions which have been undertaken to address those priorities. The reports provide summary updates on the key themes including:

- Ward priorities
- Community engagement
- Finance
- Safer theme Crime and anti social behaviour (ASB)
- Neighbourhood theme Cleansing and Environmental issues
- Working theme Unemployment rates

The following brief summary by the respective Ward NDO highlights the key issues:

Bulwell Ward – Suki Shergill Temporary Neighbourhood Development Officer Recent successes include ;-

- Promotion of the "Man enough Campaign" and raising awareness of Domestic Violence and support for victims event held at Bulwell market.

together to address issues in the area, encourage resident involvement in local issues and engage with a range of partners.

• A Networking event attended by a range of partners from schools to the police was held to reduce school Absence in the area.

Emerging issues include ;-.

- Relocation of the Credit Union remains an issue.
- Properties being unlawfully entered and items stolen in various locations. Police patrols are in practice and shed alarms have been provided.
- There has been a 50% increase in deliberately set fires (Hoewood area and around BMX track). These are being addressed via referrals to the fire service and fire awareness raising are to be planned.

The issues which the neighbourhood Action team is focusing on include;-

- Increasing the take up of nursery provision in Snapewood.
- Reducing Mental Health stigmas and signposting support.
- Reducing litter and dog fouling.

The figures given below show some key statistical points for this quarter

- Shop Theft decreased by 14% (3 less offences) compared to March 2013. 2013/14 finished with an increase of 45% (78 more offences) compared to 2012/13.
- Burwell's crime statistics decreased by 8% (12 less offences) compared to March 2013. In 2013/14 Bulwell experienced reduction of 2% (34 less offences) compared to 2012/13.
- Bulwell is a High Impact Ward with a monthly target of 28 violence offences per month. This target was failed in March with 31 offences recorded.
- Violence decreased by 16% (6 less offences) compared to March 2013. 2013/14 finished with an increase of 18% (65 more offences when compared to 2012/13).

Bulwell Forest Ward – Celia Knight Neighbourhood Development Officer

Recent successes include;-

- Officers who attended the networking event on school absence have used the central telephone number (0115 9158900) to report young people who are not at school during term time
- Various local community groups and partner organisations have booked to have free stalls at the Employment Advice Fair and Southglade ParkLive

Emerging issues include;-

• A particular graffitti tag has been occurring in various locations across the ward and has resulted in an increase in the number of graffiti reports being received.

The issues which the Neighbourhood Action Team is focussing on include;-

- Increasing community engagement from areas not currently represented in community meetings
- The planning of a week of action in September
- New developments within the ward

The figures given below show some key statistical points for this quarter

- There has been a 50% increase in the number of violent crimes reported over the year compared to last year (67 more reports). In most of these instances the offender has been known to the victim. All agencies through the Neighbourhood Action Team have promoted the importance of reporting domestic abuse incidents and it is believed that this increase partly reflects the success of that work.
- There has been a 50% decrease in the pumpler of dog fouling reports received compared to

the previous year (a reduction of 159 reports)

• There has been an increase of 35% on the number of flytips compared to the previous year (39 more flytips)

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, and challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Neighbourhood Working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement.
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods'; the Ward Performance reports help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance Reports captures work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as the Ward Action Plan, Neighbourhood Action Team's Action Log, Crime Drug Partnership (CDP) plans and other partner's implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the CDP.
- 2.5 All three Locality boards now have Nottingham City Council Directors as Chairs. The chair for the North Locality is Mark Gannon, Director of Information Technology

The focus for all the Locality Boards will be on Crime and for the north, in particular Theft from Shops, Violence including domestic violence, and Criminal Damage.

The Locality Board will focus on reducing crime and together with partners will take a proactive approach. The board will be reviewing evidence including statistics every month to ensure good progress.
