37 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 10 December 2014, were confirmed and signed by the Chair.

38 COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

Celia Knight, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented the report which outlines the role and selection of Community Representatives to the Committee and informed the Committee of two new representatives.

RESOLVED to note the appointment of Robin Goodwin, representing Top Valley Tenant's and Resident's Association, and Michelle Cooke representing Bestwood Partnership.

39 REQUEST FOR AUTHORISATION TO STOP UP PART OF A FOOTPATH AT BEAUCLERK DRIVE, TOP VALLEY

John Lee, Rights of Way Officer, presented the report which, following requests from residents in the area and consultations with local citizens, sought authorisation to enable a dead-end foot path to be permanently closed.

RESOLVED to authorise the Corporate Director for Growth and Development to:

- a) make a Public Footpath Extinguishment Order under Section 118 of the Highways Act 1980 in respect of the parts of the path shown marked 'AB' on Appendix 1 to the report;
- b) to confirm the above Order if unopposed;
- c) to refer the above Order to the Secretary of State for confirmation if opposed.

40 AREA JOBS PLAN

Danny Goodwin, Employment and Skills Officer, presented the report which has the Area 1 and 2 Jobs Plan attached.

The following points were highlighted in addition to the report:

- (a) Right Track, which is also the Lead Organisation for Area 1, is funded to co-ordinate employment and skills activity in the Bulwell and Bulwell Forest wards. Activity includes:
 - o developing community jobs plans,
 - support recruitment job opportunities;
 - pre-recruitment training;
 - and developing work with partners to create bespoke provision relevant to priority groups;
 - developing local solutions for clients;
- (b) activity and achievements will be co-ordinated through the employer hub to prevent duplication with other organisations and ensure monitoring of performance and quality;
- (c) Right Track will involve schools in helping to support employability;

- (d) 'Step into Work' is the program designed to support citizens into employment by identifying barriers to employment within neighbourhoods, such barriers can then be addressed;
- (e) after 2 years of 'signing on' the Bulwell Job Centre, a person becomes the responsibility of an external organisation which will aim to find work training or education (WTE) for that person;
- (f) if the external organisation cannot support a person into WTE, after 3 years in of being unemployed, that person is required to sign on at the job centre in Bulwell every day and a further, more detailed support and investment package is made available to identified barriers which are preventing people becoming job ready';
- (g) barriers to WTE may include self-confidence and lack of identification, including a birth certificate or a bank account. support is provided to overcome such barriers;

Comments from the Committee included:

- (h) the drop in the numbers of people claiming benefits is welcomed but this may not necessarily be due to people finding WTE. It is possible that a significant number of young people may not be signing on but are working unofficially within the casual economy. Many of these young people will not attend the job centres but do have an income and they may not realise the longer benefits and facilities available to them by registering at the job centre;
- (i) apprenticeships are an ideal route for many young people to gain experience of work and in a trade. Work references from an apprenticeship can prove valuable in securing further work;
- (j) it is a concern that some apprenticeships paid the national minimum apprenticeship wage of £2.73 per hour. It is that Nottingham City Council apprentices are paid the minimum wage.

In conclusion, Danny Goodwin urged members of the Committee to encourage people to register and engage with Bulwell Job Centre, even if they were not formally signing on, as the programmes available are open to everyone and can prove beneficial in the long term to gaining stable employment that offers training and the opportunity to progress.

RESOLVED to note the report and Jobs Plan and receive an update in six months time.

41 PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES AND HEALTH PROFILES OF AREA 1

Allison Challenger, Consultant in Public Health, presented the 'Directory of Public Health Commissioning Services' document which provides detailed information on the wide range of services provided by Public Health and the statistical health information relating to the population of the Bulwell and Bulwell Forest Wards.

The following points were highlighted during the meeting:

- (a) since April 2014, Public Health has been the responsibility of the City Council;
- (b) the document, which has been compiled with input from NHS and other partners, enables a 'population approach' by highlighting health issues within specific areas;
- (c) the analysis of the population's health enables specific issues and risks to be targeted and ensures that the best possible value and benefit can be provided;
- (d) it is widely acknowledged that the level of deprivation impacts on the health and life expectancy of a population and that Area 1 has high levels of deprivation;
- (e) the key points from the analysis are as follows:

- (i) smoking prevalence is high with 28% of the adult population in Area 1 smoking (nationally 20%) but within Bulwell, 36% of adults smoke;
- (ii) obesity is high which impacts on other illnesses;
- (iii) life expectancy within the area is lower than the national and city average with people in Bulwell Ward expected to live 5 years less than those in Bulwell Forest, where life expectancy is in line with the national average;
- (f) now that this comprehensive information is available, the next step is to identify the behavioural and health attitudes of local people and, on some issues, the City wide population and seek to change people's behaviours to address and prevent poor health patterns;
- (g) some diseases can be linked to known issues, such as diabetes which is often linked to obesity, it is likely that a proportion of sufferers have not yet been identified/diagnosed. Work will be planned to address this;
- (h) telephone counselling to improve health will be considered for the next round of health service commissioning;
- (i) it is acknowledged that Health and Social Care do need to better integrate to ensure that they can work together effectively for communities;
- (j) health needs to be considered at within all community focused services.

Alison asked that members of the Committee comment on whether they believed that the information provided was, with their knowledge of the local area and local people, is accurate, and how best Public Health could work towards changing the behaviours and attitudes which brought about poor health:

Comments from the Committee included:

- (k) another layer of data analysis is required to provide more accurate information as although one GP surgery may reports a high level onset diabetes', it is possible that this is not peculiar to this area if there is a larger than average population of older people;
- (I) the root causes of poor health need to be identified and information provided is accessible and attractive format with advice and support available to ensure that people can make informed choices;
- (m) with an estimated 1 in 3 cigarettes believed to be counterfeit, there is an added danger that their contents are not regulated but also that the cost makes them easily affordable to all ages, including younger people;
- some of today's younger generations don't know how to cook and rely on fast, convenience food which is cheap and easily available. It's a concern that some children don't know where vegetables come from;
- (o) on an individual level, more infant and child funerals are taking place than should be expected and have a devastating effect on families, especially in cases of violent death. Such trauma can then impact on the health of families, not just psychologically but also physically with increased smoking and drinking;
- (p) smoking during pregnancy is a significant issue within the area even though it has a known profound impact on the babies concern;

- (q) patients of Highbury Hospital have not been included within the area statistics as all information was gathered on home post codes;
- (r) mixed and changing messages from Central Government on what we should and shouldn't eat are not helpful and lead to apathy;
- (s) Public Health need to ask communities what they want to help them promote and address health issues, not just tell them;
- (t) self help groups are very effective and ensure that people are responsible for themselves but with the encouragement of peer support.

In conclusion of the item, the Chair stated that Public Health and partners needed to work with communities to help them take local level responsibility for health.

RESOLVED to note the report.

42 **AREA POLICING UPDATE**

Acting Inspector Christine Busuttil delivered a brief update on the reported crime, issues raised through the on-line consultation system, the Local Action Groups and Tenant and Resident meetings.

Bulwell Ward

- (a) there have been several distraction burglaries of elderly people's homes, including repeat victims. It is harder to change the behaviour and habits of some older people but information on how better to protect themselves is being distributed. A female has been arrested;
- (b) the number of shop thefts has risen and shop keepers are asking for the return of 'shop watch' but funding has to be found to support the scheme;
- (c) reported numbers of violent crimes and domestic violence have risen but this is believed to be partly to heightened awareness and encouraging people to report such crimes.

Bulwell Forest Ward

- (d) there have been several break-ins of sheds and garages, as is to be seasonally predicted;
- (e) theft of motor bikes and bicycles has risen as these are easy targets. Criminal damage is down against the same period last year.

The number of recorded offences will rise as stronger action is taken against offences following the new powers of the Ant-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.

RESOLVED to note the update.

43 <u>INCREASING SPORTS AND ACTIVITY</u>

Siobhan Reilly, from Nottingham City Homes Tenant and Leaseholder Involvement Team, informed the Committee of the 'Fit-In' scheme which is hosted by Nottingham City Homes for the benefit of its tenants and also the wider community.

The scheme aims to encourage citizens to engage in low cost or free exercise and activities with local people being trained to deliver sport activities within their local area.

Consultations on lifestyles help citizens identify the barriers which are preventing them from accessing fitness activities and help them overcome those barriers and engage in appropriate fitness, some of which may include subsidised activities such as swimming or exercise classes. Cost is not necessarily the largest barrier as even when activities are provided free of charge, engaging citizens can be a challenge.

Partnership working is important to prevent duplication but also to ensure the greatest benefit with referrals are received from partner agencies.

The scheme has operated effectively in the Aspley, St Ann's and Hyson Green areas of the City, engaging the often difficult to reach groups of society, and will be available to citizens within the Bulwell area during this summer.

The Committee's questions were responded to as follows:

- (a) all community deliverers of the scheme are trained and DBS checked (formerly CRB) prior to working in the community;
- (b) citizens taking part in the scheme are asked if they have any health issues and measures are taken to adapt exercise appropriately;
- (c) the scheme is promoted by Housing Mangers linking with community and tenant and resident groups. In addition a news letter is distributed. Further work is to be done to identify how best to spread the message and engage the wider community beyond tenants although it is recognised that the majority of community group members are residents and not tenants;
- (d) volunteer providers do need to be NCH tenants due to finding stipulation but the activities are open to everyone. There other routes for training via partners but that is on an individual basis.

Members of the Committee have been impressed by the use of the 'out door gym' on Southglade Park' and suggested that it may be a good contact point to engage the community.

RESOLVED to note the presentation.

44 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES - PROPOSED ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENTS AND AREA UPDATE

Nicky Jarvis, Tenancy and Estates Manger, introduced Toni Smithurst who will be taking over from Nicky as part of the Estates Managers re-organisation.

Toni presented the report of the Chief Executive of Nottingham City Homes which included a scheme for the consideration of the Committee and outlining key performance updates on programme and activity within the area.

Right Track Area 1 Annual Report 2014 - 2015



Introduction

This annual report covers the year from April 2014 to March 2015.

We have now completed our 2nd year as an Area Lead organisation covering Bulwell & Bulwell Forest.

We have seen some great steps taken across this second year:

- Improved community cohesion
- Forums set up to support the vision moving forward
- Ongoing support from local councillors
- Ongoing support from the local police
- We have widened our youth delivery across the area
- Developing an area offer and vision alongside NCC Youth & Play



Together with local stakeholder organisations and partners we are going into year 3 stronger than ever.

Community Associations

All Community Associations in Area 1 are working with Right Track in a positive manner. There are currently no issues to report.

There have been a number of changes over the year within some Associations, in terms of sustainability there has been support from NCVS and the City.

We are holding quarterly meetings with Neighbourhood Development Officers to ensure a consistent message and that we are clear that we have one voice of support.

Throughout the year we have held quarterly meetings with the Community Associations, a real benefit of this is sharing good practice, identifying what has been working.

These meetings have additionally been able to spread information about groups which have the potential to risk associations sustainability either by non-payment or by causing other issues such as damage. By sharing information across the patch, the community associations now feel better protected.

Safeguarding now a regular item at the meetings so we can raise awareness and further protect centres.

All Associations have met their targets, the level of funding has not, and will not change next year, and we will be mirroring the targets for 13/14.

As an organisation we will still not charge a management fee to the associations.

A number of Right Track delivered activities have been moved into the community, especially in terms of additional sessions at Bulwell Healthy Living Centre, Bulwell Riverside also supporting their bid to become a hub for Small Steps, Big Changes.

In terms of numbers the Community Associations in Bulwell over the year have averaged 300 users per week, there is a real drive from the centres to become sustainable.

Community Association Development

We identified that there was little cohesion in the message or support given to Community Associations, driven by a lack of communication.

In order to address this we have implemented quarterly meetings with Steve Parkinson, local NDO's and NCVS, this has been to identify a clear package of support, and this has been more successful with the NDO's who already offered fantastic support to the centres, above and beyond their role.

We continued our quarterly meetings and as detailed above this is starting to have a real positive journey.

Youth Activity

We have expanded our delivery across the area, we have removed PAYP (pay as you play) as we strongly feel that services should be accessible to all, we do not want a young person not attending a session through circumstances outside of their control, such as paying to attend a session.

Our work in Bulwell is run by 1 Right Track Funded project lead and 2 apprentices funded directly by Bulwell Councillors. This funding has supported Right Track to offer a wider range of services in the Bulwell area both independently and in partnership with Nottingham City Council's Youth and Play team. As will be seen throughout this report, the funding provided jointly by Cllrs Hartshorn, Klein and Morris has prevented the closure of sessions which were under threat and has allowed some new sessions to open.

Our work within the community focusses on the Bulwell Healthy Living Centre offering sessions to young people around cooking, bike repair and raising aspirations. Of the 100 young people attending the bike sessions, over 20 young people received a bike that they were able to take away with them.

We also support sessions at the United Reform Church, Riverside and Snapewood alongside the Nottingham City Play and Youth Team. Due to the staffing shortage a number of these sessions were at risk of closure had the councillors not been able to support Right Track's drive to employ more apprentices.

Following reports from NDO's of anti-social behaviour on Merchant Street, we carried out detached youth work.

In 2014 we also had a full turn out of Right Track staff in supporting the Fun on the Forest event in Bulwell Forest.

The Apprentices

We have in total had 4 apprentices, 2 of those funded by the councillors. The initial 2 recruits have since moved on to new ventures and have both stated their gratitude to Right Track and the Councillors for allowing them to get a start in working life and to identify where their career path lay. Both these apprentices live within the Bulwell area. Apprentice 1 has since moved into a role in manufacturing and Apprentice 2 progressed into Youth Work for Nottinghamshire County Council.

Moving into 2015 we have recruited a further 2 apprentices and are growing our delivery to include:

- Football at Bulwell Academy on a Friday evening with the police
- a further football project together with Bulwell Academy on a Tuesday evening
- Developing sessions at Crabtree and Snapewood
- Continuing with our current delivery plan in the area

Outreach work on identified locations of ASB

With the team that we have had in place since January 2014 there have been a number of the outcomes:

Bulwell Riverside

Right Track work in partnership with Nottingham City Youth and Play at the Bulwell Riverside. This support ensures that these sessions can continue. These sessions have seen over 2000 young people engaging in the Youth sessions, with over 500 engaging in the Play sessions. The play sessions support the early development and communication through group activities and our evening sessions focus on a wide range of interventions, through sports to crafts and information sessions on drugs, sexual health and aspirations.

Bulwell Healthy Living Centre

- Our cookery sessions have attracted over 100 young people
- The play sessions were attended by over 80 young people.
- The Bike Project we ran with Travel Right benefited over 100 young people

Bulwell Academy School Fun Day

The Fun Day on Saturday 5th July 2014 was free to all young people and was attended by over 350 people. We provided and staffed a Bouncy free of charge.

Bulwell Academy Enterprise Week

On the Enterprise week at Bulwell Academy we ran events aimed at year 7 students looking at entrepreneurial skills, 120 young people participated in the event ran by Right Track

Snapewood Community Sessions

We engaged with 200 young people over 2 months at Saturday Play sessions which were run in partnership with NCC and in order to prevent closure of the sessions.

United Reform Church

We supported Thursday Play Sessions to enable sessions to stay open, and together with NCC we worked with over 200 young people

National Play Day (Bulwell Toy Library) 6th August 2014.

The team of apprentices went along to support the event and in excess of 400+ people throughout the day attended the event.

Both the apprentices are learning quickly and are harnessing the challenges set for them. This enables us to be more creative in the development of our provision and will allow us to use them to their full potential in the very near future. Our vision for the year was to identify all provision across Area 1 and then provide outreach work that would signpost young people to activity, also identifying gaps and to commence sessions within these areas.

We are still working towards this as we have been underpinning the City Youth & Play Delivery, through cuts we have supported the city in keeping sessions open, we are working very closely with Youth & Play to develop with other organisations a forum that looks at the local offer and how as a partnership we can improve the local provision.

We are continually mapping and assessing our delivery to provide impact and ensure provision is across the area.

On top of our grant funding we have provided additional resources, this has enabled us to exceed our targets, these resources are funding from contracts we have been awarded focused on supporting young people, for example the sexual health sessions.

Youth Contract

This is the end of the first year of delivery for the Step Into Work Programme, there have been a number of impacting factors in this contract getting off the ground.

Over the year we introduced a referral gateway open to community organisations, we offered £50 a referral to the organisation for every eligible young person referred onto the programme. This was then introduced citywide and raised to £100.

In order to better support the provision we brought in additional staff, so supporting the programme now are mentors, engagement staff and employer focused staff.

This is ward performance in terms of our performance 70% of leavers are progressing, and we are over 50% of our start target.

The starts have been directly impacted by low referrals from the Job Centre.

Our local Job Club runs from Bulwell Riverside on a Tuesday and at our site in Top Valley this is an open drop in centre.

In driving self-referrals we handed leaflets out within the Bulwell and Top Valley area, and given posters to local businesses and we have engaged with the Probation service.

As part of our community activity we have attended a number of events such as running sessions at Bulwell Academy, this was for new pupils to look at entrepreneurial activities and engage with the school prior to commencing their first year

We attended the Bulwell Academy Fun Day on the 5th July, we provided our Bouncy Castle free of charge, fully staffed and with no charge for the community. This was the same for the event at Southglade on the 31st July, both fantastic days with great feedback from the community.

We were in full attendance at Fun on the Forest, we had 30 staff in attendance over the day, having both our Bouncy Castles and games for people with prizes, all at no cost to the community or the event. We provided the speaker system for the community to use at the event. Over all our area based grant funding in regards to Community and Youth Engagement we include no costs for our administration, I believe we offer an outstanding service and excellent value for money, this is clearly evidenced in zero management fee charged to Community Associations and the performance against targets in our youth delivery.

Thomas Bow won the contract for ground / general building work and Rushcliffe Fencing won the contract for fencing and gating works. These are both local contractors employing local people; including apprentices.

Where NCH are unable to use one of their procured contractors they will obtain 3 quotations to ensure they get value for money. All schemes have to adhere to financial regulations and this requires NCH to obtain 3 quotations for any schemes with a value over £500.00.

- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

- 1.1 This report outlines the community engagement which has taken place and is planned in Bulwell and Bulwell Forest Wards. It also outlines the ward priorities for both wards and the actions which have been undertaken to address those priorities. The reports provide summary updates on the key themes including:
 - Ward priorities
 - Community engagement
 - Finance
 - Safer theme Crime and anti social behaviour (ASB)
 - Neighbourhood theme Cleansing and Environmental issues
 - Working theme Unemployment rates

The following brief summary by the respective Ward NDO highlights the key issues:

Bulwell Ward - Suki Shergill Neighbourhood Development Officer

Recent successes include :-

1. A successful informative and interactive Well Women's event was held providing a wide range of information on health issues. The events focus was to informally raise awareness on Domestic Violence issues and how and puppers to get support, positive relationships and safety.

- Outreach on the Crabtree Estate conducted with Peoples Choice to reduce Dog Fouling, Littering and dumping.
- 3. Fences have been repaired on the River Leen reducing the safety risk in partnership with a local business.

Emerging issues include;-.

- There has been a rise in Domestic Violence in the ward. This is a ward priority and key actions have been agreed.
- Lung cancer is an issue in the ward

The issues which the neighbourhood Action team is focusing on include;-

- Rising child obesity is a concern in the ward. Activities such as work in schools promoting healthy eating grow your own are being encouraged in schools.
- Anti Social, behaviour in relation to ball games is consistently raised as a concern. The
 provision of safe areas for ball games is being explored via meetings reviewing football
 provision across the ward.

The figures given below show some key statistical points for this quarter

- All crime in Bulwell has risen from 1860 (13/14) to 1956 resulting in a rise of 96.
- Burglary Dwellings has dropped from 9 (March 14) to 7 (March 15), resulting in a drop of minus 2.
- Hate Crime has risen from 13 (March 14) to 28 (March 15) resulting in a rise of 15.

Bulwell Forest Ward – Celia Knight Neighbourhood Development Officer

Recent successes include;-

- Following complaints from residents regarding an increase in dog fouling in a particular area, a
 day of action was arranged involving neighbourhood management, City Services and
 Community Protection. This appears to have had an impact as City Services has noticed that
 the incidents of dog fouling has decreased recently.
- Large, nuisance trees have been cut down in some parts of the ward and two new trees are being planted to replace these.
- A long standing flytipping issue on a particular site appears to have been resolved through partnership working at the Neighbourhood Action Team meeting.

Emerging issues include;-

• There has been an increase in the number of shed and garage burglaries from the previous year.

The issues which the Neighbourhood Action Team is focussing on include;

- Ensuring that information is shared between all agencies regarding deliberate fires in the ward.
- Managing issues as they emerge on the few remaining vacant development sites within Bulwell Forest.
- Enabling partners to find out about new services which could benefit residents.

The figures given below show some key statistical points for this quarter;-

There has been a slight decrease in the number of deliberate fires this quarter but the figures show an increase of 205% over the whole year. The NAT has worked hard on this issue and the young people who were largely responsible for the increase have been referred to the Firesetters programme. The NAT continues to monitor the number of deliberate fires in the ward.

- There has been another decrease in the incidents of graffiti in the last quarter (down from 8 to 4 reported incidents). Over the whole year, there has been a decrease of 75% ie down from 64 reported incidents in 2013/14 to 16 in 2014/15.
- There has been a fall in the number of reports of dog fouling in the last quarter from 33 to 17 with an overall drop for the year by 29% ie from 97 to 69 reports.

1.REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, and challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.

Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Neighbourhood Working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement.
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods'; the Ward Performance reports help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance Reports captures work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as the Ward Action Plan, Neighbourhood Action Team's Action Log, Crime Drug Partnership (CDP) plans and other partner's implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the CDP.
- 2.5 The Locality Boards were disbanded at the end of 2014 and a city wide meeting has now been established to replace this.
