5 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 18 February 2015, were confirmed and signed by the Chair.

6 DEMENTIA FRIENDS

Teresa Allen, Alzheimer's Society Dementia Support Manager, and Kate Fisher, Nottingham City Council Dementia Practice Development Specialist, delivered a verbal presentation on dementia, recognising symptoms, and understanding the condition.

The following points were highlighted:

- (a) dementia is not a natural part of ageing but is a symptom of disease or damage to the brain:
- (b) at times everybody can be forgetful or confused but when someone can't live their day-to-day lives, this can be an indication of dementia;
- (c) 850,000 people, mostly female, have dementia 1/14 are over 65 and 1/6 are over 80 years of age. More than 40,000 people of working age have dementia;
- (d) if people are worried about themselves or someone else, they should refer to the 'worried about your memory' leaflet which can help identify early diagnosis of dementia which means that help and support can be provided to help people function in society and their own homes;
- (e) dementia is specific to each individual who will have individual needs and deterioration speeds vary for each individual;

- (f) Alzheimer's starts very slowly, but vascular dementia follows a stroke and has a staged progression;
- (g) Alzheimer's is not about losing memory, it starts with short-term memory loss, sufferers retain their long-term memory but they can find it difficult to concentrate and to recall and undertake normal day-to-day activities;
- (h) currently two thirds of people with dementia live in the community. It is important to ensure they can live independently as it is possible to live well with dementia but communities need to support and keep dementia sufferers engaged as isolation is very destructive;
- (i) there are a few drug treatments for people with Alzheimer's although these are more to slow the deterioration process as there is no cure. Vascular dementia cannot be treated with medication;
- (j) when people are diagnosed with dementia, plans for the future need to be drafted, sometimes with suggested changes to how they do things now, in preparation for the future;
- (k) it is estimated that there are approximately just under 3,000 people in Nottingham with dementia. As our society becomes more aware of the condition, early and appropriate diagnosis is increasing;
- by 2050 it is estimated there will be 2 million people with dementia in England and by 2040 is estimated that there will not be enough care home facilities for people with dementia;
- (m) there are several projects for people in Nottingham with dementia including 'arts into care homes', swimming sessions specifically for dementia sufferers, a reading group and a dementia cafe with discussion underway to introduce a further cafe at Woodfield industries:

7 RIGHT TRACK ANNUAL REPORT

Nick Parr, Right Track Social Enterprise Head of Employability and Communities, presented the Right Track Annual Report 2014/15, which provides an outline of the work and activities undertaken within the community during the past year. Some of the young people who initially had taken part in activities and are now involved in leading activities were also in attendance and at the invitation of the Chair briefly outlined their roles activity and achievements as follows:

- (a) session workers are fully trained with regard to safeguarding, help produce session plans and facilitate community activities;
- (b) events and activities are provided for a range of age groups, with different backgrounds and issues across the whole community;

(c) session workers are able to work towards a qualification in Achieving Leadership, but by taking part in facilitating activities this also builds their confidence and increases their skills base, which can in turn enable them to encourage help support other members of the community to further develop their skills and confidence.

Nick Parr also commented:

- (d) recently, in acknowledgement of their achievements and out of 9,000 nominations, two Right Track session workers were invited to receive an award at the House of Lords:
- (e) with approximately 300 users per week and a contract value of £7 pounds per hour, Right Track have delivered provision at a cost of 4p per hour which has resulted in the ability to expand and attend and provide more events to benefit the community;
- (f) whilst the funding for Jobs Clubs has stopped, Right Track continue to provide the service at Bulwell Riverside and the Job Centre;
- (g) further bids are proposed to provide projects focusing on heritage, sport, and life skills;
- (h) itis important that young people are aware of what is available to them.

Having encountered Right Track session workers and participants at events and working within the community, members of the committee were very impressed with young people's attitude and abilities and were grateful for their assistance, stating that the young people are a credit to themselves and Right Track.

The Chair commended the achievements of Right Track and the young people involved, and, to better understand how they had benefited, requested further information on the progress of young people who had completed sessions and training with right track.

8 POLICING AREA UPDATE

Police Inspector Christine Busuttil verbally updated the Committee on policing priorities in the area.

Police were repeating the seasonal campaign to remind citizens to secure their homes, ensuring that the windows and doors were closed or secured during the warm weather. Burglars are becoming more creative so citizens are urged to ensure that their house and car keys are kept out of sight and away from doors and windows. Although burglars are rarely violent, if are aware that burglary is in progress people should call '999'.

Vulnerable and elderly people are often popular burglary targets so it is suggested that they use restrictors on windows and doors, especially as there have been repeat burglaries of some elderly people in the area.

There have been several reports of damage and antisocial behaviour by young people in the Bulwell area. It's important that parents are aware of who their children are hanging around with and what they are doing.

Violence has increased by 68 offences so far this year, but is this may be a reflection of the category now including malicious communications such as social media and texting abuse.

The majority of reported domestic violence incidents relate to known offenders.

In Bulwell, antisocial behaviour and grass fires are the main areas of concern. Dispersal orders are now easy to put in place and provide a 'quick fix' while further courses of action can be considered.

In Bulwell Forest Ward, nuisance behaviour relating to motorbikes has increased but as a result 4 Section 59 Orders have been issued and if the riders are caught again on the same issue, the vehicle will be seized and crushed. Police are aware that some nuisance motorcyclists are not from the Bulwell Forest area but are coming from the Broxtowe area. If a motorcyclist is found to be riding dangerously on the roads without tax and insurance, the bike can be seized, however some types of bikes are not designed for the road and therefore don't require tax and insurance. It's important that citizens report nuisance motorbikes to ensure the Police can focus on problem areas. In addition, it's incredibly helpful if the Police are made aware of the addresses of culprits as this has proved very successful in the past.

9 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENTS, PERFORMANCE AND TENANT/LEASEHOLDER UPDATE

Toni Smithurst, Nottingham City Homes (NCH) Tenancy and Estates Manager, presented the report which identifies schemes requested by the NCH residents, residents living within the environment of NCH properties, and NCH staff.

While financial and project breakdown details were verbally presented at the meeting, Councillors and community representatives requested that all future reports provide a breakdown of what the final costs consisted of, along with more detailed information on what the improvements actually involved.

12 WARD PERFORMANCE REPORTS

Celia Knight, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented the Ward Performance Report which provides ward level statistical information from the City Council and partners, relating to ward priorities and emerging issues, including health and crime, in addition to reporting community events and engagement.

The following points were highlighted within the Bulwell Ward:

- (a) A 'Well Woman' event included information and awareness raising with regard to domestic violence for which reports are rising in the Ward;
- (b) anti-dog fouling, littering and dumping activity has taken place on the Crabtree Estate;
- (c) lung cancer has been identified as a significant issue in Bulwell Ward;

- (d) Neighbourhood Action Teams are to focus on addressing an increase in child obesity and ball games which are causing antisocial behaviour;
- (e) across the Ward, overall crime levels are rising, including hate crime.

Within the Bulwell Forest Ward, the following points were highlighted:

- (f) a 'day of action' has had a positive impact on dog fouling which has now significantly decreased;
- (g) large nuisance trees have been felled with new, more suitable trees being planted to replace them;
- (h) a long-standing fly-tip issue appears to have been resolved;
- (i) shed and garage burglaries have increased;
- (j) there is an increased emphasis on sharing information and communication between partners with regard to raising issues and promoting beneficial services and events;
- (k) the number of deliberate fires has decreased from the last quarter although the total to date is still a significant concern;
- (I) instances of graffiti have reduced by 75% compared to the same period last year;
- (m) overall dog fouling is reduced.

- You will be encouraged to tell us when things are not running well.
- You will find it much easier to fulfil your role if you have read the reports before the
 meeting and, if possible, had a chance to discuss the report with your community group.
 Everyone will benefit from this as it allows the community representatives to play a much
 more active role and makes for a more effective and informed contribution to discussions
 and debate.
- Most importantly, any relevant information should be passed back to your community group to any local friends, neighbours or colleagues. None of the information made available during the meetings are secret or confidential.
- One of the biggest challenges for the Area Committee is to keep people informed. Your
 agreement to pass on information, display and distribute any publicity material in
 community venues and promote involvement in the work of the Area Committee and to
 take an active role in local community consultations is appreciated.

NORTH LOCALITY - COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES: THE CRITERIA AND PROCESS FOR SELECTION

INTRODUCTION

- Encouraging greater participation in service delivery and decision making was one of the main reasons for establishing Area Committees in 1995.
- The new terms of reference give Area Committees more responsibilities which in turn will have an impact on the involvement of local representatives.

- All community group representatives (except those representing citywide organisations), should live in the area and seek to represent the views of their group(s) or community organisation and not individual viewpoints.
- Community Group representatives will have established networks/systems for passing
 information to the Area Committee from groups that they represent, citizens that they aim
 to serve within their area and likewise feedback information from the Area Committee.
- Representatives will be selected each civic year (normally in May), Only one nomination
 per group will be accepted by the Area Committee at any given time. Any person from
 the group can attend Area Committee meetings although only the nominated community
 representative will be allowed to speak. If the community representative is unable to
 attend a meeting, the group can nominate an individual to speak on behalf of the
 community representative for the group.
- Any member of the public may have the right to attend Area Committee meetings as an observer.

POWERS OF COMMUNITY GROUP REPRESENTATIVES

- Community Group Representatives are entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings and can 'influence' the decisions (but cannot vote on any matter) being made by the area committee.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to claim expenses for travelling and care costs related to attending Area Committee meetings.
- Community Group representatives will be able to submit items for inclusion on the Area Committee agenda at least three weeks before the meeting or in advance of the meeting with the agreement of the Chair.

- Community Group representatives will be entitled to attend specific events and training across the city in order to carry out their role and responsibilities in relation to Area Committee/Working.
- Community Group Representatives can make formal presentations at Area Committee meetings on community projects/initiatives with the prior agreement of the Chair.

<u>POWERS OF COUNCILLORS IN RELATION TO COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA</u> COMMITTEES

- Only Councillors can vote on all matters in respect of the Area Committee
- If a representative fails to attend committee meetings consistently without good reason, the Area Committee may approach their organisation for a replacement.
- If a representative is deemed to persistently not abide by the corporate policies of Nottingham City Council, (e.g. Health & Safety, Equality and Diversity), he/she will be required to resign their position as local community group representative on the Area Committee
- Councillors may choose to invite representatives from other organisations outside their geographical area in order to widen participation from under-represented groups.
- Councillors will allocate a small 'rolling budget' for reimbursement of Community Group Representative's expenses.
- If Community Representatives find it beneficial and have made a request, Councillors will
 provide community group representatives with an opportunity to meet together with the
 Locality Team prior to each Area Committee meeting, to discuss the agenda or other
 items of concern.

THE PROCESS

- Each year Councillors must determine the number of Community Representatives that
 they wish to represent the community. This may be based on a set number of places per
 ward or according to specific interests and issues in the area. Representation should
 take account of the population make up of the area. Where under-representation exists,
 city wide groups may be approached for representation.
- Once per year (normally in March) the Locality Team will send out nomination forms by post, (together with an Area Committee information pack), to all community organisations in the area, inviting them to nominate a representative from their organisation to be involved in Area Committee meetings
- Locality Managers will assess completed nomination forms to ensure that the selection criteria are met and will produce a report for Area Committee detailing nominations received.
- Councillors will decide which of the nominations should be selected for community group representation at Area Committee meetings, taking into account the population make up of the area or specific issues/interests in the area.

- Those community group organisations selected will be notified in writing of the offer by the Locality team. Details of future dates of committee meetings will be sent out at the same time.
- A review will take place each civic year (by Councillors advised by officers) to determine what groups are the most appropriate to be represented on the area committee
- Where nominations are not accepted, a letter explaining why will be signed by the Chair and sent to the organisation, together with details of other options for involvement in area working.
- Where groups are dissatisfied with the decision, they have the right to appeal to the Area Committee within four months.
- Councillors will then enlist the assistance of other Councillors of the city (Area Chairs Panel), to review the decision and any decision made thereafter, will be final.

Better Connecting Need to Support

- People have high levels of need and significant levels of support in place (although there are gaps)
- The problem is that lots of people who are in need don't know about what is available – or aren't directed towards it by professionals
- This pilot is a set of interconnected projects aimed at:
 - better connecting what people need to the support which is available, and
 - promoting and encouraging self help
- Focus on Bulwell and Bulwell Forest initially as Bulwell has highest % of referrals through the Health and Care Point which can't be met under existing social or health care thresholds






What things are like at the moment

- "System" fragmented
- People don't know where best to go for help
- Lots of information but its confusing and in lots of different places
- People sent to the wrong place
- The time of key professionals isn't always spent helping
- the people in most need
- Demand for help is increasing

- Over-reliance on health and social care systems








Self-Care Training and Development Giving professionals and organisations training and information on self-care to pass onto people who need help

- Self-care training for the health and care workforce
- Half-day training sessions started on 26th June and will continue to run until Jan 16 – open to voluntary organisations too
- Work also underway to way to develop the role of care co-ordinators specifically so they better join things up





Community Navigators

Helping people to find the support they need

- Pilot project based on successful model running throughout Cambridgeshire
- Volunteers literally help people navigate their way through the system - Hand-holding role
- Being led by the Bestwood Partnership
- Started in July 17 volunteers recruited and 65 people already have been supported by Community Navigators





<u>Click Nottingham – Social Inclusion pilot</u>

Supporting people to become better socially connected to other people and to their local community

- Community Pioneers
- Supporting people to become more independent
- Directly promoting less reliance on NHS services

(Click Nottingham previously known as Nottingham Circle)





Social Prescribing

A new model of identifying and responding to social and health needs

- GPs identify people would benefit from some form of personal/social support (beyond medical needs)
- This could be support and advice on weight management, carrying out physical exercise or linking in to a peer support group to help with certain conditions or overcome social isolation.
- GPs will use a simple tick box form to notify the Care Coordinator who will sort out the support required
- Starts within all GP practices in Area 1 during Sept 2015





RallyRound

Creating lasting support networks through the use of a simple mobile/web-based app

- A brand new product designed to make it easy to create and maintain support networks
- Enables someone to really easily organise help for people who need it from families, friends and neighbours
- We are also looking at ways to use this to help people who haven't a support network available to them
- Being implemented during September aim is to have at least 50 accounts opened by end Oct





Integrated on-line directory of services – linked to self-care hubs

A comprehensive, joined-up and up to date information directory about services available

- Health and social care information in the same place
- Hard copies can be printed off
- Self Care Hubs/Kiosks located in community venues (like Bulwell Library, a Community Pharmacist, Morrison's)
- will provide the opportunity to access the website
- Support to use Hubs will be provided by volunteers
- Fully directory will be ready in late 2016, interim solution from October 15. Date for hubs to be confirmed





Locally-based Community Clinics

Locally based multi-purpose clinics where people can drop-in for support and advice

- To offer assessment by social care staff for low level equipment
- To provide advice/info about social inclusion support
- To provide information about assistive technology services and opportunities to trial equipment
- Opportunities to develop social links
- Locations still being sorted but hope is to go live with first of these in Oct 15





So what will things look like if all this works as planned

- Joined-up "system" of care
- Much clearer where best to go for help with more support available
- Information in one place easy to understand and access
- People more empowered to manage their own conditions
- Time of key professionals freed-up to spend helping the people in most need
- Demand for help more manageable more time available to focus on heading-off problems before they occur
- Much less reliance on health and social care





Key next steps

- "Launch" on 1st October in Bulwell Riverside spreading the word about what the pilot is about
- Moving all projects into implementation as soon as possible
- Evaluating the impact of the pilot
- Looking at ways we can identify and reach people who don't access services – and aren't on our radar – the most socially isolated and lonely

To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

This report outlines the community engagement, which has taken place and is planned in Bulwell and Bulwell Forest Wards. It also outlines the ward priorities for both wards and the actions, which have been undertaken to address those priorities. The reports provide summary updates on the key themes including:

- Ward priorities
- Community engagement
- Finance
- Safer theme Crime and anti social behaviour (ASB)
- Neighbourhood theme Cleansing and Environmental issues
- Working theme Unemployment rates

The following brief summary by the respective Ward NDO highlights the key issues:

Bulwell Ward – Suki Shergill Neighbourhood Development Officer

Recent successes include ;-

- 1. River Leen Clean Up (Days of Action event) A successful partnership event led by Neighbourhood Management was held to clean the River Leen. Partners involved included Community Protection, Bestwood Partnership, Schools, Councillors, Bulwell Bogs group volunteers and We Love Bulwell Town team. A new bin was installed to prevent future littering. This event received positive feedback from residents and its success lay in how well the partners worked together to improve Bulwell.
- 2. In response to the rise of Domestic Abuse in the ward, Bulwell is setting up a group to respond to the issues and the first planning meeting has been held to establish aims and objectives for the group.
- 3. Bulwell has employed a town Centre coordinator who will focus on regeneration and improvements to the town centre.
- 4. Bulwelll held a successful Arts Festival from the 4th July to the 18th July which offered a variety of activities and activities for all ages.

Emerging issues include;-.

1. Fly Tipping has continued to be a problem and is being addresses through neighbourhood initiatives.

The issues which the neighbourhood Action team is focusing on include;-

- 1. Reducing fly tipping and littering.
- 2. Improve Youth provision in the Bulwell Riverside.
- 3. Addressing domestic violence issues.

The figures given below show some key statistical points for this quarter;-

- 1. All crime year to date 14/15 at 460 has risen by 109 to 569. This is at 23.7%.
- 2. Anti Social Behaviour year to date 14/15 at 375 has dropped by 19 to 356. This is at 5.1%.

Bulwell Forest Ward – Celia Knight Neighbourhood Development Officer

Recent successes include:-

- Southglade ParkLive was a large event on Southglade Park on July 30th funded jointly by Bulwell Forest and Bestwood councillors. Over 60 organisations were involved on the day with activities including a climbing wall, have a go tennis and golf, fun bikes, bouncy castle, face painting, skatejam etc. Amongst the activities, various organisations promoted their services e.g. Women's Aid, Economic Development Team, some community centres, children's centre.
- The new moss machine purchased with funding approved by Area Committee is having a positive effect on areas which have had a slippery surface for a long time eg the sheltered housing complex at Chatham Court was one of the first areas to benefit during a clean up of the area recently.

Emerging issues include;-.

 Reports of commercial and domestic flytips with no evidence to be able to prosecute the offenders so far has been an issue in recent weeks

The issues which the Neighbourhood Action Team is focusing on include;-

 All the agencies involved with the Neighbourhood Action Team are working together to tackle the issues of both flytipping and nuisance bikes. This resolve was strengthened by two recent incidents – one involving a flytip containing asbestos by the children's playground on Bulwell Forest and the other during Southglade ParkLive when a motorbike riding around the event where there were large numbers of children running around nearly caused an accident.

The figures given below show some key statistical points for this quarter

- The total for all crime in Bulwell Forest Ward has fallen from 357 to 311 compared to the same period last year.
- There has been an increase in the number of violent crimes from 79 to 106 during this same period
- There has been a decrease in the number of burglaries to dwellings, theft and anti social behaviour compared to last year.

The number of deliberate fires has dropped significantly from the high number this time last year – a reduction from 28 to 10.

Recommendation(s):

- 2.3 The Ward Performance Reports captures work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as the Ward Action Plan, Neighbourhood Action Team's Action Log, Crime Drug Partnership (CDP) plans and other partner's implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the CDP.
- 2.5 The Locality Boards were disbanded at the end of 2014 and a city wide meeting has now been established to replace this.
