#### 4 DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS

#### 5 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 19 February 2015 were confirmed as a true record and signed by the Chair.

#### **6 YOUTH PROVISION**

#### (A) <u>NG7 TEA</u>

Bill Husband, NG7 Training and Employment Advice, delivered a brief presentation, a copy of which was included in the online agenda following the meeting.

The presentation outlined the following points:

- (a) NG7 provides support to existing community associations, including partnership working with city Council Nottingham Community Voluntary Services (NCVS) towards implementing the community centre improvement plan 2013-19;
- (b) the 2014/15 funding allocations were provided as follows:
  of the £103,930.60 area based Grant, community associations were allocated
  £19,243, employment and skills focused work £39,000, youth activity £43,403.22,
  and NG7 management and administration £5196.53. In addition to this other
  funding of £21, £428 was available for digital inclusion, and £140,000 provided
  further step in to work programme;
- (c) the presentation outlined the activities and achievements of the work undertaken by NG7 with regard to employment and skills, and youth activities and provision including diversionary and targeted support, including working with community partners such as KK, AWP Asian Women's Project, Sumac in addition to City Council organised programmes;
- (d) many of the supported and provided projects and services has successfully engaged young people in a range of activities from hair and beauty, to sports and community focused events;
- (e) Daryna Grech of KK Sports and Leisure Centre, outlined how providing a variety of activities for young people, including dance, boxing and football, had positively impacted on the area with a reduction in antisocial nuisance behaviour. In addition, where Project workers, who are often able to build relationships with young people, identify there are issues, guidance and support is available.

#### (B) The Pythian Club

Benjamin Rosser, founder of the Pythian Club, informed the committee that while the Pythian Club was originally an organisation providing diversionary activities, its success has enabled it to now also provide targeted activities, often in partnership with the City Council, Nottinghamshire Police and Lead Organisations.

The majority of activities are based at the New Basford Community Centre and currently includes football sessions hosted by qualified coaches every Thursday from 4 pm to 6 pm, with the young people then taken into other areas of the City to play against other community teams. In addition boxing sessions and American football coaching are also available alongside a mentoring programme for drugs and alcohol support and family support.

While sports teach young people discipline, the club has broader aims to encourage young people's confidence and skills for the best outcomes, including young people to progress and gain support focused accreditations.

The club currently has 250 young people registered, 83 of whom are from the New Basford Area and although the club now operates, or has some involvement in Wollaton, Lenton Abbey, Beeston, Brinsley and Eastwood areas as the success of use engagements is enabling the club to expand.

#### (C) Hyson Green Youth Club

In addition to the report submitted to the Agenda, Maxine Davis, Manager of the Hyson Green Youth Club, along with Shantay, Ezerien and Kamiya, members of the Youth Club, delivered a brief presentation on the success and popularity of the Youth Club and how Hyson Green Youth Club benefited the greater community. The presentation also outlined young people's aspirations for the future of the youth club as the building was in need of updating and modernisation.

#### Members of the committee:

- (i) welcomed the reporting of the ventures and organisations;
- (ii) applauded young people from Hyson Green Community Centre for their professional presentation to the committee and dedication to the youth club;
- (iii) suggested that Maxine Davis liaise with community focused representatives of Castle Cavendish and Experian which has large companies, encouraged and coordinated employee volunteering, such as painting and decorating, for community benefit;
- (iv) suggested that, in addition to the support of the Central Locality Manager, Dorothy Holmes, and with the assistance offered from Bill Husband, a business plan and strategy be developed to support the rejuvenation of the Hyson Green Youth Club, possibly from external funding;
- (v) noted that new and emerging communities, such as the Roma community, were engaging with the local community via the youth club which proved it to be a community asset.

RESOLVED for the appreciation of the committee to the presenting organisations and individuals to be noted.

#### **7 POLICE UPDATE**

Inspector Bruce Clarke, Nottinghamshire police, introduced himself as the new neighbourhood Inspector, reminding the committee that policing beats included Berridge and Sherwood Wards, but also extended beyond these boundaries.

Having briefly outlined the policing statistics from referred to within the water performance report, inspect the clerk highlighted the following points:

- (a) there has been a decrease in serious crime but recorded violent crime has increased however, this may be as a result of different recording procedures were harassment, including text messaging, is now considered within this category;
- (b) Forest Fields is currently a hot spot for burglary and violence;
- (c) there have been several complaints regarding inconsiderate parking and noise around mosques;
- (d) several issues have been raised regarding people launching items into Sherwood Prison from resident's properties. Police are working with the prison authorities to address this;
- (e) anti-social behaviour has been consistently reported that Pirate Park;
- (f) shop theft is high in In the Carrington area but plan is now in place to try and address this;
- (g) a decision has recently made to introduce a 'demand model' of policing. As a result it is considered that there are too many Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs), so across the county there will be a reduction of approximately one quarter of the current PCOs. Consultation is under way but it is predicted that approximately 57 posts will be removed. Due to the comparatively high reported crime rate of the area, it is not proposed that Inspector Bruce Clarke's Policing beats will be affected at this point and all 19 PCSO posts will remain.

The committee's questions and comments were responded to as follows:

- (h) It's important that local users of Pirate Park assert ownership of the park as it is a public space and those causing antisocial behaviour must not be allowed to intimidate users;
- the recent assault of a pensioner is not believed to be part of a pattern but investigations continue;
- (j) at the Malaki murder trial one person was found not guilty but will be deported.

#### 9 WARD PERFORMANCE - QUARTER 4

Debbie Royle, Neighbourhood Development Officer, and Dorothy Holmes, Locality Manager, presented the report which provides ward level statistical information from the City Council and partners, relating to ward priorities and emerging issues, including health and crime, in addition to reporting community events and engagement.

It is noted that there is more happening and can be shown in the format of the report, so a revised format is being considered and will hopefully be in use for the next meeting.

The following points were highlighted:

- (a) The cleanliness index across the Area fluctuated between Wards but cleanliness targets were achieved and citizens were asked to report any cleansing issues;
- (b) flighty tipping in Berridge ward has reduced by half since the same period last year, and fly tipping in Sherwood remains minimal;
- (c) three new appeals is now functioning across the City.

Whilst appreciating that reported 'antisocial behaviour' includes a total of 19 type of incidents including noise, Councillors requested that they be informed of reports in the Sherwood Area as it was apparent that this was becoming a larger problem.

#### 1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget approved in March 2013, Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million Citywide from 2013-2015.

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the LTP and from the Housing Revenue Account.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances, such as economic conditions and change in land values.

#### Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

The ward performance reports provide updates on key issues and themes which link back to local priorities and strategic themes in the Nottingham Plan 2020. The reports provide summary updates on the following key themes:

- ward priorities;

- safer theme crime and anti-social behaviour (ASB);

- health theme local health priorities.

The following is a brief summary by the respective ward Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs):

Ward: Berridge

#### NDOs: Debbie Royle and Beth Hanna

Ward data is given for April – July 2015. Data is compared with the same time frame in 2014.

#### Ward Priorities:

Berridge Ward Priorities for April - June 2015 can be seen on the front page of the appendices. These priorities are reviewed quarterly with key partners via the monthly Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) meetings. We continue to focus on improving parks and open spaces and traffic management and parking issues.

#### Community Engagement:

NDOs have organised monthly Ward Walks in the ward. Local Action Group meetings take place every 6 weeks throughout the ward. We organised an event for local people in Forest Fields at the beginning of the school holidays. This focused on energy saving and recycling, with lots of activities for children, young people and families.

We have organised the Freedom Programme information sessions and awareness raising around Domestic Violence for Central Locality Workers. We continue to work with the Roma Working Group enabling education providers to work together.

We ran a stall at the Hyson Green Cultural Festival and engaged with people from different local communities.

#### Crime:

Crime has increased by 11% (62 crimes) in Berridge for the year to date with a total of 604 incidents being reported during the year.

#### ASB:

Year to date ASB in the ward has increased by 28% with 114 more incidents reported.

#### Criminal Damage

Year to date Criminal Damage in the ward has decreased by 11% with 8 fewer incidents reported.

#### Cleanliness:

The index score is 87% for April – July. This is a decrease of 7% compared to the same time last year.

#### Graffiti Reports:

8 incidents were reported, compared to 7 in the previous year. This is a decrease of 1 (14%) since the previous year.

#### Flytipping:

126 incidents were reported year to date compared to 148 the previous year. This is a decrease of 15%.

#### <u>Unemployment Rate:</u>

Unemployment has fallen year to date by 29% from 3647 to 2582.

#### Ward: Sherwood

#### NDOs Angela Bolton and Leigh White

Ward date is given for the period April-July 2015 and is compared with the same time frame in 2014.

#### Ward Priorities:

Our current priorities for the ward are to continue with the redevelopment of our local parks, work

with partners to improve the areas around Nottingham Prison, to implement a series of area capital schemes to make improvements to the look and feel of the area and to support our local community centres.

#### **Community Engagement:**

NDOs have organised 5 ward walks in this period in different areas of the ward. Consultation events and activities have been held at both Peggy's and Pirate Park. Residents were supported in setting up a new 'Friends of Pirate Park' group and the first, and very successful event was held at the park to grow membership of the group and to engage local residents in the future plans for the park. A fortnight of activities branded as 'Sherwood Story Celebration' took place at various locations in the ward involving local groups, partners, businesses and residents.

#### Crime:

Crime overall has increased by 11% (54 crimes) in Sherwood Ward year to date, with a total of 550 crimes

#### ASB:

Year to date ASB in the ward has seen a 5% increase (12 incidents) – the total for this period being 247 incidents.

#### **Criminal Damage:**

Incidents of criminal damage have seen an increase from 55 incidents to 90, an increase of 35, representing a 64% increase overall.

#### Theft:

Year to date there has been a decrease of 2% (4 crimes)

#### Violence:

Year to date there has been an increase of 27% (27 crimes) from 101 to 128.

#### Burglary (dwelling):

A 41% decrease has been noted – this is 20 crimes compared to 34 for the same period last year – a decrease of 14 crimes.

#### Graffiti Reports:

6 incidents were reported – no change year to date.

#### Fly-tipping:

49 incidents were reported year to date compared to 85 the previous year. This represents a decrease of 42% or 36 incidents.

#### <u>Unemployment:</u>

The unemployment rate has fallen year to date by 25% from 1673 to 1258.

#### Cleanliness:

The cleanliness index score for Sherwood ward is 89 - a 1% decrease on last year. The ward still exceeds the standard expected for the city which is 86% and the month of July saw a cleanliness score of 95%.

#### Recommendation(s):

1 To note the key information from the Ward Performance reports for Quarter 1 for Berridge and Sherwood wards.

- 1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite Councillors and community representatives to comment, debate, challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

- 2.1 Neighbourhood Working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement.
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods'; the Ward Performance report will help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance report captures work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan. It is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as the Ward Action Plan, NAT action log, Crime and Drug Partnership (CDP) plans and other partners' implementation plans.
- 2.4 The Ward Performance reports are co-ordinated by NDOs, with data analysis undertaken by the CDP.

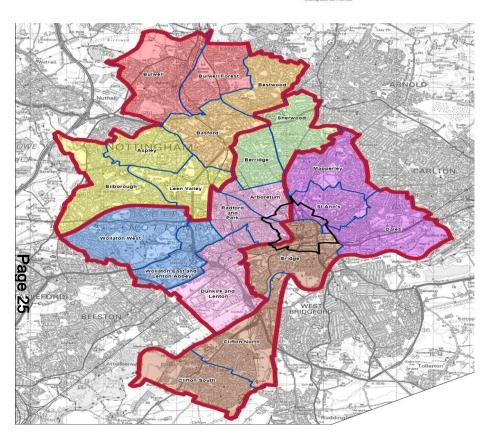

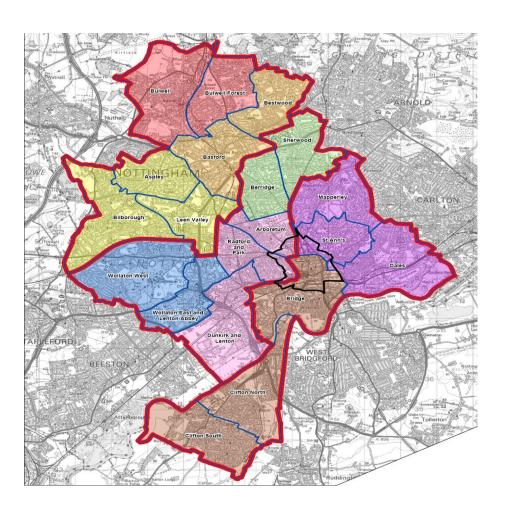

# <u>CENTRAL LOCALITY - COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES: THE CRITERIA AND PROCESS FOR SELECTION</u>

#### **INTRODUCTION**

- Encouraging greater participation in service delivery and decision making was one
  of the main reasons for establishing Area Committees in 1995.
- The new terms of reference give Area Committees more responsibilities which in turn will have an impact on the involvement of local representatives.

#### **THE CRITERIA FOR SELECTION**

- Community or Voluntary organisations that wish to be represented on Area Committees will be properly constituted (i.e. have a constitution/terms of reference, have regular meetings, and operate an Equal Opportunities Policy)
- All community group representatives (except those representing citywide organisations), should live in the area and seek to represent the views of their group(s) or community organisation and not individual viewpoints.
- Community Group representatives will have established networks/systems for passing information to the Area Committee from groups that they represent, citizens that they aim to serve within their area and likewise feedback information from the Area Committee.
- Representatives will be selected each civic year (normally in May), Only one nomination per group will be accepted by the Area Committee at any given time. Any person from the group can attend Area Committee meetings although only the nominated community representative will be allowed to speak. If the community representative is unable to attend a meeting, the group can nominate an individual to speak on behalf of the community representative for the group.
- Any member of the public may have the right to attend Area Committee meetings as an observer.

#### POWERS OF COMMUNITY GROUP REPRESENTATIVES

- Community Group Representatives are entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings and can 'influence' the decisions (but cannot vote on any matter) being made by the area committee.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to claim expenses for travelling and care costs related to attending Area Committee meetings.
- Community Group representatives will be able to submit items for inclusion on the Area Committee agenda at least three weeks before the meeting or in advance of the meeting with the agreement of the Chair.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to attend specific events and training across the city in order to carry out their role and responsibilities in relation to Area Committee/Working.
- Community Group Representatives can make formal presentations at Area Committee meetings on community projects/initiatives with the prior agreement of the Chair.

# <u>POWERS OF COUNCILLORS IN RELATION TO COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES</u>

- Only Councillors can vote on all matters in respect of the Area Committee
- If a representative fails to attend committee meetings consistently without good reason, the Area Committee may approach their organisation for a replacement.
- If a representative is deemed to persistently not abide by the corporate policies of Nottingham City Council, (e.g. Health & Safety, Equality and Diversity), he/she will

- be required to resign their position as local community group representative on the Area Committee
- Councillors may choose to invite representatives from other organisations outside their geographical area in order to widen participation from under-represented groups.
- Councillors will allocate a small 'rolling budget' for reimbursement of Community Group Representative's expenses.
- If Community Representatives find it beneficial and have made a request, Councillors will provide community group representatives with an opportunity to meet together with the Locality Team prior to each Area Committee meeting, to discuss the agenda or other items of concern.

#### THE PROCESS

- Each year Councillors must determine the number of Community Representatives
  that they wish to represent the community. This may be based on a set number of
  places per ward or according to specific interests and issues in the area.
  Representation should take account of the population make up of the area. Where
  under-representation exists, city wide groups may be approached for
  representation.
- Once per year (normally in March) the Locality Team will send out nomination forms by post, (together with an Area Committee information pack), to all community organisations in the area, inviting them to nominate a representative from their organisation to be involved in Area Committee meetings
- Locality Managers will assess completed nomination forms to ensure that the selection criteria are met and will produce a report for Area Committee detailing nominations received.
- Councillors will decide which of the nominations should be selected for community group representation at Area Committee meetings, taking into account the population make up of the area or specific issues/interests in the area.
- Those community group organisations selected will be notified in writing of the offer by the Locality team. Details of future dates of committee meetings will be sent out at the same time.
- A review will take place each civic year (by Councillors advised by officers) to determine what groups are the most appropriate to be represented on the area committee
- Where nominations are not accepted, a letter explaining why will be signed by the Chair and sent to the organisation, together with details of other options for involvement in area working.
- Where groups are dissatisfied with the decision, they have the right to appeal to the Area Committee within four months.
- Councillors will then enlist the assistance of other Councillors of the city (Area Chairs Panel), to review the decision and any decision made thereafter, will be final.
