#### 16 <u>MINUTES</u>

The Committee agreed the minutes of the meeting held on 18 June 2015 and they were signed by the Chair.

#### 17 <u>POLICE UPDATE</u>

Sergeant Nick Wealthall of Nottinghamshire Police updated the Committee highlighting the following points:

a) The consultation with Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) over the proposed reduction in their numbers had recently concluded and 2 PCSOs would be lost in this area (due to a wider programme of voluntary and compulsory redundancies) temporarily reducing the number of PCSOs in this area to 9. This will be increased to the full complement of 19 through redeployment.

- b) The Speedwatch community car is now operational and community groups are being trained to run the scheme.
- c) An operation is underway addressing the problem of items being thrown over the wall of the prison which has resulted in a significant decrease in the number of incidents. Trees are to be planted to create an additional barrier and further netting is to be installed to reduce incidents further.
- d) Overall, Sergeant Weathall reported that acquisitive crime was down. The largest increase was a 200% increase in theft of a motor vehicle in Forest Rec beat but this represented an increase of only two crimes. He reported percentage figures for the year 24/09/14 to 24/09/2015 as follows:

e) The new university terms and the return of students posed a challenge but a lot of work was being done with the universities, for example at freshers fairs, to advise students on security.

In addition to the schemes outlined in the report a further approval of a scheme at Nottingham Rd/North Gate area for £2400 for improvements to include re-seeding grassed area, planting bulbs, refurbishment of existing benches and other hardware was sought.

#### 19 WARD PERFORMANCE REPORTS - QUARTER 1

John Marsh, Locality Manager introduced the report which compared performance against key indicators during April – July 2015 with the same period of 2014 to the Committee highlighting the following points in relation to Berridge ward:

- a) The cleanliness index score of 87% for quarter one (Q1) 2015 was 7% lower than in 2014 and 8 incidents of graffiti were reported compared to 7 in this period of 2014. However, incidents of flytipping reduced from 148 in 2014 to 126 this year.
- b) Weedkilling had taken place at the beginning of September and weeds should now visibly be dying back as a result. Councillors were asked to identify any remaining problem areas to Neighbourhood Management colleagues.
- c) Neighbourhood Management ran a stall at the Hyson Green Cultural Festival enabling them to engage with people from different local communities.

He then highlighted the following points in relation to Sherwood ward:

- d) The cleanliness index score for Q1 2015 was 89%, 1% lower than in 2014. However, a recent change to the organisation of neighbourhood colleagues, making them responsible for their own areas of the ward was expected to see performance increase. There was no change in the number of reports of graffiti, remaining at 6, and flytipping incidents had reduced from 85 in 2014 to 49 this year, a decrease of 42%.
- e) Weedkilling had also taken place in Sherwood ward in mid-September and work was underway citywide addressing the problem of Japanese Knotweed.
- f) Consultations events had been held in both Peggy's and Pirate Parks and a Friends of Pirate Park group has been established.

## **RESOLVED** to note the key ward performance information provided for quarter one.

#### 23 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES UPDATE

Chanel Richards, Tenancy and Estate Manager, Nottingham City Homes introduced the report updating the Committee on Nottingham City Homes' performance and asking for approval of £10,856 from the Sherwood Environmental budget to alleviate issues with crime and drugs around HMP Nottingham. During discussions the following points were highlighted:

- a) Edwards Lane estate had successfully applied for equipment for Peggy's Park;
- b) Work had been done with 'Young Inspectors' at Northgate Primary School;
- c) Regarding performance, this was on target for antisocial behaviour cases, below target for repairs and rent collection (but with significant time to improve this performance by year end) and below target for void re-let times.

- (1) Approve the use of £10,856 from the Sherwood Environmental budget to install five new gates around Gunthorpe Drive and around the perimeter of the prison to prevent illegal activity. The funding will also be used to install a roller barrier to the wall on the land next to 2 Gunthorpe Drive to prevent individuals climbing onto the wall.

#### Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

The Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) is in the process of developing its next Health and Wellbeing Strategy. Engagement activities will be taking place in October and November to inform the development of the priorities. This report sets out the engagement strategy and seeks the support of the Area Committees in promoting the engagement events.

#### Recommendation(s):

#### 1. <u>REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS</u>

1.1 The HWB want to engage with as many citizens and interest groups as possible to inform its next strategy. It is hoped that the Area Committees could increase the reach of the engagement activity by supporting and promoting the planned engagement activity.

#### 2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 The HWB is currently developing its next Health and Wellbeing Strategy with the aim that it will be signed off in June 2016. The HWB recently approved the engagement strategy for the development of the next Health and Wellbeing Strategy<sup>1</sup>. In summary, engagement will be wide ranging with the aim of finding what is important to people in relation to health and wellbeing and the approach is broadly divided into two phases:

**Phase 1: Engagement** – the opportunity for everyone to input their thoughts about health and wellbeing. The information from this phase will be analysed and fed into the development of the initial draft of the new Health and Wellbeing Strategy. This will take place during October and November 2015.

Phase 2: Consultation on the draft Health & Wellbeing Strategy.

2.2 The intention is engage with as many citizens, interest groups and front-line workers/ practitioners as possible. The engagement strategy was developed based on the outcomes of a citizen focus group and the approaches to be adopted are outlined below:

It is a comprehensive survey and will gather information to help ensure our properties are maintained through planned programmes of refurbishment, as well as informing the current and future active Asset Management strategy. </li> <li>Solar Photo Voltaic Panels Homes eligible for panels have been written to. Suitability was based on specific criteria like the roof size and the direction houses face. The installation programme is being escalated due to a possible reduction in the feed in tariff in early 2016. Where customers who have expressed an interest, and where the roof is suitable, the aim is for panels will be installed by the end of the year. Ward data is given for 2015. Data is compared with the same time frame in 2014.

Ward Priorities:

The ward priorities for 2015 can be seen on the front page of the appendices. These priorities are reviewed quarterly with key partners via the monthly Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) meetings. There is continued focus on improving parks and open spaces and traffic management and parking issues.

## Community Engagement:

NDOs have organised monthly Ward Walks in the ward.

Local Action Group meetings take place every 6 weeks throughout the ward.

A Leader Listens event has been organised, which includes a ward walk and public meeting with the Leader of the Council to discuss local issues and concerns.

There are Street Champion meetings to engage local residents to get involved as local champions as a focal point for activities and to give key messages to other residents on their street.

There was a Roma Romanian community event with the Central Locality Roma engagement group on 25 October to engage this community and link people to key services, and raise awareness of local issues including the environment, health, education, Welfare Rights, etc.

A bulb planting event has been organised with local school children to improve a local site.

There has been a public meeting regarding local anti-social behaviour (ASB).

In partnership with Community Cohesion, the Children Centre, the Muslim Women's Network and Building Bridges, a Freedom Programme is ongoing for 10 weeks to finish in December. This engages local women to look at aspects of abusive behaviour in relationships.

2 Domestic Violence Drama events have been held at the New Arts Exchange, in partnership with the Community Cohesion team, Central Locality Domestic Abuse Forum, and the Millo Project. The Lord Mayor is opening these events.

A Council Budget Consultation event is planned for January 2016 to engage local residents.

Crime:

Crime has decreased by 2% (20 crimes) in Berridge for the year to date with a total of 998 incidents reported during the year.

<u>ASB:</u>

Year to date ASB in the ward has increased by 27% with 180 more incidents reported.

## Criminal Damage

Year to date Criminal Damage in the ward has decreased by 2% with 3 fewer incidents reported.

### Cleanliness:

The index score is 87%. This is a decrease of 6% compared to the same time last year. The ward still exceeds the standard expected for the city which is 86%.

## Graffiti Reports:

16 incidents were reported, compared to 10 in the previous year. This is an increase of 6 (60%) since the previous year.

Flytipping:

232 incidents were reported year to date compared to 224 the previous year. This is an increase of 4%.

## Ward Priorities

The ward priorities are detailed within the ward summary report and are due to be updated shortly. The current priorities are redeveloping parks in the ward, and an environmental scheme around Nottingham Prison.

## Community Engagement

The NDO has carried out monthly ward walks, as well as issue specific site visits.

Online consultation on Pirate Park was live for a few weeks gathering views of residents on 3 design options for the park, and Peggy's Park consultation was on display.

Social media engagement increased on the Facebook page to over 1,000 likes allowing the Council to engage with a good number of local people online.

A Budget Consultation event has been organised for January 2016.

<u>Crime:</u> Crime overall has decreased by 2% (116 crimes) in Sherwood Ward year to date, with a total of 854 crimes.

<u>ASB:</u> Year to date ASB in the ward has seen a 1% decrease (2 incidents) – the total for this period being 378 incidents.

<u>Criminal Damage:</u> Incidents of criminal damage have seen an increase from 98 incidents to 137, an increase of 39, representing a 40% increase overall.

Theft: Year to date there has been a decrease of 13% (39 crimes)

Violence: Year to date there has been an increase of 28% (47 crimes) from 169 to 216.

<u>Burglary (dwelling)</u>: A 59% decrease has been noted – this is 35 crimes compared to 85 for the same period last year – a decrease of 50 crimes.

<u>Graffiti Reports:</u> 10 incidents were reported – an increase of 2 incidents representing a 25% increase.

<u>Fly-tipping:</u> 77 incidents were reported year to date compared to 110 the previous year. This represents a decrease of 30% or 33 incidents.

<u>Unemployment</u>: The unemployment rate has fallen year to date by 26% from 2468 to 1825.

<u>Cleanliness:</u> The cleanliness index score for Sherwood ward is 91 - a 1% decrease on last year. The ward still exceeds the standard expected for the city which is 86% and last 3 months have seen scores of 94% and 95%.




