# 36 MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 19 November 2014 as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

## 37 FIT IN THE COMMUNITY

Martin Barradell, Assistant Community Sports Officer, presented the Nottingham City Homes (NCH) 'Fit in the Community' initiative, highlighting the following points:

- (a) the initiative aims to engage with NCH tenants to increase their weekly physical activity. The initiative aims for 10% of tenants to increase their activity from none at all to at least 30 minutes per week. This will be achieved by using the existing networks and tools of NCH, in consultation with the community;
- (b) the delivery of activities is targeted to the following three groups:
  - doorstep clubs for 14-25 year olds including street games and multi-sports sessions in community centres and open spaces;
  - general sessions for 26-59 year olds through activities such as Shape Up sessions, jog groups and netball. The requirements of each individual area will be determined through consultation with local residents;
  - activities within schemes for 60+ year olds, such as chair-based sessions and bowls;
- (c) examples of activities within Area 4 include:
  - Black Families in Education Doorstep Club;
  - Somalian Women's Group Shape Up session;
  - Forest Fields Primary school Zumba/Shape Up session;
- (d) volunteers are used to deliver or promote the sessions. Support and training, including skills and qualifications are provided according to need;
- (e) although the scheme is aimed at over 14s, parallel activities can be provided for children to enable parents to participate without having to find childcare. Activities can be organised in settings where parents already go with their children, such as schools;

(f) the scheme is city-wide but has had pilots in certain areas that have the largest numbers of NCH tenants. Thorough consultation is carried out in each area prior to delivery.

The Committee and others in attendance made the following comments:

- (g) Framework and other local community groups should be engaged to find out if they already run activities which can be promoted through this scheme;
- (h) free activities for both children and adults can be placed together, such as at the Forest Recreation Ground where an adult gym has been constructed beside the children's playground;
- (i) the Lenton Centre has a swimming pool and would like to be involved in the scheme.

# 38 CHANGE OF CHAIR

Councillor Azad Choudhry left the meeting and Councillor Anne Peach to took over as Chair.

# 39 AREA 4 JOBS PLAN

Chris Grocock, Employment and Skills Officer, presented his report on the Area 4 Jobs Plan, highlighting the following points:

- (a) one of the Council Plan priorities is to reduce unemployment in Nottingham by 20%. This has been achieved and the figure for Jobseekers Allowance (JSA) claimants in October was 4.4%. This is due to Council initiatives and the upturn in the economy. There are however still many barriers for those who wish to work;
- (b) the Jobs Plan aims to decentralise the work to reduce employment, and uses trend analysis to identify the top priorities within each ward;
- (c) the key objectives of the Plan for 2014/15 are:
  - increase the employment rate of the working age population;
  - increase the number of adults with skills:
  - lead and deliver a Community Coordination Strategy for employment and training;
  - deliver a programme of community recruitment and information events;
- (d) some of the targets are aspirational and may be carried forward into future years;
- (e) Castle Cavendish has been appointed to be the lead for the Jobs Plan in Area 4, and will:
  - appoint the necessary staff to engage with local communities;
  - develop Community Jobs Plans;
  - support recruitment to job opportunities and pre-recruitment training;

- work with partners to develop and deliver bespoke provision relevant to priority groups for the area
- work with programme providers to engage/develop local solutions.

Van Henry and Blair Lawrence-Broughton, Castle Cavendish, then gave a presentation on the delivery of the Jobs Plan, highlighting the following points:

- (f) the project is aimed at 18-24 year olds who are not in education, employment or training (NEET). It aims to improve the work-readiness and employability of local young people, by increasing employment opportunities, reducing the stresses associated with being young and unemployed, and removing the complex barriers to work;
- (g) there are 3 main ways that the service can be accessed:
  - through the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP), initially as a referral to Futures and then to Step into Work;
  - self-referrals by approaching the offices direct. The accessible location above Kemet FM on Alfreton Road and the open-door policy makes this easier;
  - referrals from other agencies such as local advice centres, the Youth Offending Team or community centres;
- (h) the total number of young people who self-engaged with the programme is 27, compared with 20 who have come via the DWP;
- (i) in Area 4 there have so far been 2 young people who have successfully gone into further training, 3 who have gone into an apprenticeship and 3 who have gone into employment;
- (j) the Step Into Work programme offers 120 hours of support, which can be accessed in small chunks as necessary. It also offers practical support such as transport, clothing or license costs. A robust assessment process is undertaken to establish each young person's needs and to tailor an individual support package with other agencies. The programme is driven by the young person and can be flexible and adaptable. It begins with engagement and action planning and finishes with qualification and transition into employment;
- (k) if young people are interested in self-employment, support can be provided to gain suitable qualifications. Advice can also be provided about support from other agencies such as the Prince's Trust;
- (I) Castle Cavendish runs 5 job clubs in Area 4, supporting people to find and apply for jobs. A 'pop-up jobshop' which can be set up anywhere in the community to engage with local residents, is also popular. A community jobs fair was organised at The Bridge Centre, Hyson Green and another is planned for March 2015. Events in the local area enable local people to access job opportunities easily and remove the barrier of travelling into the city centre;
- (m)Castle Cavendish will be working closely with a range of employers across different sectors to determine a set of benchmarks for the entry-level positions

Arboretum, Dunkirk and Lenton, Radford and Park Area Committee - 18.02.15 within their areas of work. These benchmarks will be the backbone of the training programme.

The Committee and others in attendance made the following comments:

- (n) the programme is supported and it is good to see that it is community based as people often do not wish to travel to the city centre or other areas of the city;
- (o) it would be helpful if more detail could be given of the JSA claimant figures, broken down by age and showing what has been done for each.

RESOLVED to note the actions in the plan, and agree to a six monthly update by Castle Cavendish and Nottingham City Council's Employment and Skills Team.

# **NCH** update report

Capital Programme & major works	Background The Nottingham Decent Homes programme has been running for the past six years aimed at improving more than 18,000 homes across the city. It started in 2009 after it was revealed that more than 40 per cent of council houses in Nottingham did not meet national standards. The programme was funded 80 per cent by central government and 20 per cent by Nottingham City Council. Nottingham City Homes took the opportunity to go beyond the government's decent homes standard with the Nottingham Decent Homes Plus Standard.  What we have achieved Citywide Bathrooms, kitchens, boilers and roofs have been replaced and upgraded at a cost of £200 million in the Secure Warm Modern programme. It means that every Nottingham council home (100%) now meets the government's minimum 'decent homes' specifications compared to just 44 per cent when the project began.	Information

# The future

A planned programme of maintaining decency will continue year after year to continue a level of quality within our housing stock. £13m has been set aside for 2015/6 to uphold this goal. The maintaining decency project will remain under the title of Secure Warm Modern which is, and always has been, based on tenant priorities.

Stock condition data and Energy Performance information collected about our housing stock is helping to produce an additional planned programme of energy efficiency works across the City including insulation work to solid wall, BISF (British Steel Frame) and other hard to treat properties.

1.1 Suggestions for schemes may be from a number of sources including tenants and leaseholders, tenants and residents groups, Ward Councillors, Local Area Group meetings, Ward Walks, Housing Patch Managers and Neighbourhood Development Officers.

To consider the schemes listed in Appendix 1, and decide which schemes to approve.

### 2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 A sum of £20,620 for the Arboretum Ward, £33,433 for the Dunkirk and Lenton Ward and £107,970 for the Radford and Park Ward remains in the housing environmental Page 37

improvements budgets for the respective wards. These figures include any carry over figures from last year.

- 2.2 The proposed schemes must fit at least one of the following criteria:
  - improvement of security for tenants and leaseholders (e.g. door entry, lighting, fencing, garage sites);
  - improvement of the environment for tenants and leaseholders (e.g. dealing with graffiti, reducing anti-social behaviour, parking issues, drying areas, resurfacing);
  - improvement of spaces for tenants and leaseholders (e.g. installation of community facilities, or areas on land under NCH management).

### 3. OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 A number of schemes have been submitted but, if the available Housing Environmental Funding does not cover all of the proposals, those remaining can be submitted to the Committee for consideration in 2015/2016 if further funding is made available. Any surplus left over in the respective budgets should carry over into the next financial year and can be used to fund future schemes.

### 4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS (INCLUDING VALUE FOR MONEY/VAT)

- 4.1 NCH has provided quotations for the proposed works via an agreed competitive tendering process.
- 4.2 Once a City wide programme is agreed, works will be carried out by approved contractors. It is anticipated that further savings may be found and that more schemes may be completed as a result of these savings.

# 5. RISK MANAGEMENT ISSUES (INCLUDING LEGAL IMPLICATIONS AND CRIME AND DISORDER ACT IMPLICATIONS)

- 5.1 To ensure local development in decision-making the Area Panel and Local Area Groups have been actively involved in the process. Local tenant and resident groups have also been consulted, along with local Ward Councillors.
- 5.2 The Housing Environment Fund will enable a series of improvements to take place that will improve security, spaces and the environment for local people.
- 5.3 The funds available are limited and are targeted at the most vulnerable tenants in the area within the criteria set out at section 2.2 of this report.

### 6. EQUALITY IMPACT ASSESSMENT

6.1 As this report does not include proposals for new or changing policies, or services an Equality Impact Assessment has not been carried out. However, these proposals aim to improve the quality of life and wellbeing for residents.

### Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

The ward performance reports provide updates on key issues and themes which link back to local priorities and strategic themes in the Nottingham Plan 2020. The reports provide summary updates on the following key themes:

- safer theme crime and anti-social behaviour (ASB);

- neighbourhood theme environmental issues;
- working theme unemployment rates;

- Community Protection;

- health theme local health priorities.

The following are brief summaries by the respective Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs):

### Ward: Arboretum Ward NDO: Linda Wright

Crime Statistics Quarter 4: Jan - March Data 2015.

All crime is down by 8%, there were actually 394 incidents in 2013/14 compared with 363 in 2014/15 year to date. There was a decrease in violence of 12 % year to date. There were 87 reported incidents compared to 99 in the previous year. Burglary dwelling has seen an improvement with a 30% decrease, meaning there were 13 fewer offences year to date 2013/14 compared with 30 actual offences 2014/15. This improvement must be due to the continuation of various targeted operations being carried out in the ward over past months.

**ASB**: All ASB was up 27%, year to date, with 322 incidents in 2014/15 compared with 254 in 2013/14.

**Cleanliness Index**: Index Score set as a target city wide is 88; we have seen an improvement in this quarter year to date from 94 in 2013/14 to 89 in 2014/15. The Hyson Green Action Plan was developed to combat and directly improve this score factoring in sustainability. This has improved by 5% year to date.

**Graffiti Reports**: There has been a positive increase in the response time to remove graffiti once reported. There were 17 incidents in2014/15 compared to 25 in 2013/14.

Fly Tipping: There has been an increase in incidences to 56 from 65 over the last year.

**Unemployment Rate**: There was a 22% decrease of people on Job Seekers Allowance.

**Community Protection**: Dog fouling - a slight decrease in the number of incidents reported year to date - 14 actual incidents in 2014/15 down by 3 in comparison to last year.

Other data collected relating to the Month of March only are:

Fixed Penalty Notices (for bins on street) 46.

Dog Fouling Operations - 6

Businesses visited to check Trade Waste agreements - 29

Formal letters issues for untidy Gardens (LBA) - 33

Noise Visits - 34

**Fire**: Arboretum Ward has had 40% increase of deliberate fires this quarter compared to the same quarter in the previous year, a rise of 2 actual incidents compared with 7 in 2013/14.

**Key Successes**: The Arboretum "Nice and Clean Hyson Green Plan" had been developed to problem solve a number of issues in the ward. The aim of the plan was to deliver sustainable outcomes in relation to improving street cleansing in the area and decreasing general ASB. To then capture and roll out the learning across the Ward but, more importantly, engage with local people and encourage them on an individual basis to take more pride in the area in which they live.

Another key message was raising their awareness of the potential for fires in the home. The last quarter's statistics and first evaluation of the plan, has shown that the resources invested have had the desired impact. Delivering sustainability as fly tipping; accidental fires and complaints from residents in the targeted Phase 1 and 2 areas have decrease noticeably by all the key stakeholders.

The other social housing providers (RSL) have been contacted and have had a meeting to ensure they buy into the Hyson Green Plan and ensure sustainability. The RSLs are in the process of agreeing a unified welcome pack for their tenants in the ward, which will have a variety of information to promote good neighbourliness and better recycling.

Finally, the learning and good practice from the plan has been written up and shared with other practitioners in order for the ideas to be adapted and developed to resolve similar problems across the City.

The Budget Consultation event was delivered successfully, in partnership with the Radford and Park Ward, and was well attended by local residents.

**Issues:** The outstanding issues for the Ward are related to the number of cars for sale although there does seem to be a decrease on Gregory Boulevard. It was agreed that a delivery plan will be put in place after the elections in May, to increase the cleaning of the Boulevards and Radford Road South.

A variety of issues indicating poor social cohesion have been raised by residents whilst completing the Hyson Green Plan. It was agreed at the Neighbourhood Development Team (NAT) that a subgroup should be gathered to unpick the problem and develop a response. It was agreed that Bridlington Park would be the focus point for any delivery plan worked up by the sub group.

### **Neighbourhood Action Team**

NATs (Neighbourhood Action Team) – All the partners have worked well together on the agreed ward priorities for 2014-2015 as planned. The NAT has delivered well on the issues that have arisen over the last year ending 31<sup>st</sup> March.

The Issues that arose from September's consultation event for 2015/16 NAT plan have been incorporated into this working document. The NAT team is committed to delivering the key actions across the area, as they want to enhance visitors and residents experience of being in the ward.

**Events:** The Roma Community had the start of the new English as a Second Language (ESOL) classes at the Vine Community Centre on the 30/01/15.

The Domestic Violence Forum training programme is on-going, plus an additional targeted planning session for youth workers in February. This session was open to all youth providers in the Locality to encourage and develop good practice from all partners operating in the ward.

### **Ward: Dunkirk and Lenton**

NDO: Iffat Iqbal

All figures for the ward are based on January, February and March 2015 data.

### Crime:

- all crime in the ward has decreased by 33% in this quarter. 101 crimes have been reported compared to 209 in the same period last year;
- there has been a decrease in dwelling burglaries this quarter with 27 incidents reported, compared to 37 in the same period last year, however year to date there has been an 8% increase in dwelling burglary;
- there has been a significant decrease in auto-crime in the residential area across the whole ward.

**ASB**: The largest volume of crime is ASB with 486 incidents reported in 2014/15 compared to 407 in 2013/14 year to date. Noise related ASB accounts for 50% of all incidents for the year to date. From April 2014 to March 2015, there were 94 incidents on Derby Road, 50 incidents on Rolleston Drive, 42 on Alderney St and 29 incidents reported on Harrington Drive.

This quarter 94 ASB incidents have been reported from which noise generated the most incidents totalling 39, the majority relate to loud music/party.

The QMC continues to have the highest level of alcohol related ASB, accounting for around 20% of all calls on the ward.

**Cleanliness Index**: the Cleanliness Index Score for this quarter is 90 compared to a neighbourhood target of 86.

**Graffiti Reports**: there has been a decrease in graffiti with only 3 incidents reported, compared to 6 in 2013/14.

**Fly Tipping**: there has been a slight decrease, 15 incidents compared to 16 in the same period last year.

### **Community Protection:**

- Bins on Street and messy garden notices Jan 25, Feb 14, March 101;
- Letter Before Action Jan 136, Feb 43, March 99;
- Community Protection notices 4;
- Dog Fouling Operations Jan 11, Feb 0, March 0;
- Alcohol Seizures Jan 01, Feb 0, March 0.

**Unemployment Rate**: the number of recorded unemployed people in the ward is 1636 in 14/15 compared to 2289 in 13/14. One of the main reasons for the difference in figures will be the decommissioning of Lenton high-rise flats. Also figures could be skewed by the student population which is 64% of the total ward population.

Fire: This quarter there have been 2 incidents of deliberate (primary and secondary) fires in the ward.

### **Key successes:**

**Lenton Boulevard Waste Action Plan-** a waste Action plan has been developed by Neighbourhood Services to look into the waste and recycling collections on Lenton Boulevard to ascertain whether there were any changes that could be made to improve the use of the waste and recycling collections and tackle issues with excess waste and recycling with incorrect items in bins.

Over a period of time Jan to March the Waste Advisors monitored the bins and waste put out for collection, making note of those putting out incorrect items for recycling and excess side waste. These properties were then revisited to provide them with information on how to recycle correctly. In February a door-to- door survey was completed to find barriers to good waste practices and recycling and encourage students to think about and care for their local environment.

All properties on Lenton Boulevard were then provided with a small internal bin for recycling. The aim of this was as an incentive to encourage the students to recycle as well as to install a long lasting reminder of what can and cannot be recycled. It was also hoped that this would cut down on the use of plastic bags for recycling in the home, which then end up in the bin.

On the 19<sup>th</sup> of March a waste research company was engaged to perform a waste composition analysis on the side waste presented for collection. This has provided information on the makeup of the side waste, which will help to focus Waste education and services.

All the above initiatives have showed significant improvement after return visits and door-knocking. One of the possible solutions to the excess waste would be to locate some large containers on Lenton Boulevard. Research into other local authorities such as Sheffield, Newcastle and Manchester has shown that communal bins are used in areas predominantly occupied by students. Communal bins address the issue of bins being left on the pavements, no access to remove the bins from the pavement and nowhere to store the bins on the property.

The Action Plan is now being reviewed to take into account the results and recommendations from the Lenton Boulevard waste pilot.

### Let's get together, wellbeing in Dunkirk and Lenton

Thomas Helwys Baptist Church and Dunkirk Community Centre in partnership carried out a survey interviewing a sample of 100 older people to find out the needs of older people and how they would want their needs to be met. The results showed 78% of people were unaware of the provision available in the area and there was a need for transportation to and from sessions. The Dunkirk and Lenton Health profile also indicates that older people and those who are isolated make up a significant number of the population once the students have been accounted for. The influx of students threatens the natural permanent community and indirectly contributes to the poor provision for older people.

Both organisations have received funding from local Councillors to set up a wellbeing Project for older people in Dunkirk and Lenton to help to reduce loneliness and isolation through increased involvement, volunteering and active citizenship. The Church is setting up a new Befriending Scheme and in-house activities aimed at the target audience. The Community Centre has set up a Silver Surfer activity, Discovery award and Chair-obics. A transport scheme has also been set up to enable older people to travel across the ward.

**Western Cycle corridor-** Nottingham City Council is investing in and working up plans to improve and expand the City's cycle facilities, to provide a joined up network of cycle corridors throughout the City. The Western Cycle Corridor will run through the Dunkirk and Lenton ward from Castle Road along Castle Boulevard in a westerly direction to Abbey Street and along University Boulevard towards the Broadgate/Woodside Road roundabout.

The initial designs for the route are to the latest cycle design standards, as outlined in the new Transport for London design guidance and the Sustrans Handbook for Cycle Friendly Design and include:

- a cycle super highway that runs along Castle Boulevard to Abbey Street and up towards Gregory Street. This is a two way segregated route that runs alongside the carriageway;
- new side road entry treatments that give priority to cyclists and pedestrians along the route;
- the redesign of the Abbey Street roundabout to a single gyratory;
- the closure of Grove Road / Castle Boulevard Junction to motor vehicles and a no entry at Harley Street from Abbey Bridge roundabout;
- upgrades to most traffic signal locations along the route;
- the route will maximise space and priority for cyclists and pedestrians. Two options are being drawn up. One with greater segregation and one with areas of shared space, both of which will be discussed with Councillors and citizens as part of the consultation process.

Consultation on the initial designs for the scheme has begun and the Traffic Regulation Order consultation is likely to begin in June this year.

**Lenton Boulevard improvements** - A wooden planter made of railway sleepers was built in March funded by the local Councillors to soften the image of the Boulevard which is very concrete and brick orientated. This has made a very positive contribution to the overall appearance and welcomed by local residents. To further enhance the area a flower bed has been planted on Park St near the Castle Boulevard roundabout and a bench installed for residents to enjoy.

Lenton redevelopment - The forecast for Palmer Court is:-

- North Wing expected completion end of June;
- whole building completion end of July;
- Newgate tenants to move into Palmer Court end of August, then Newgate high-rise demolition by March 2016.

As for the rest of the site, construction of the 16 bungalows and 62 (NCH owned) family houses are next on the agenda, programmed around the demolition activities. Whole scheme completion including the two commercial units and 10 general purpose flats by Autumn 2017.

### Issues:

- ongoing issues with cyclist speeding through Friary Court, Abbey Bridge and Beeston Rd.
  The situation has been affected by on-going tram works on Lenton Lane and the removal of
  cycle path markings. A new Cycling sign has been put up on Abbey Bridge which allows
  cyclists to use the footpath, adding more confusion;
- parking issues continue at Friary Court and Gregory St for residents which have been made worse by the tram works. Consultation on a parking scheme will be initiated shortly;
- all kinds of waste including recycling, bins on pavements, over-flowing and contaminated bins, and waste in gardens are still a major concern for residents;
- trade waste bins on pavements;

- student let properties are still a main target for burglaries due to insecurities which include unlocked doors and windows;
- slight increase in dog fouling in the lenton area.

**NAT**: the NAT which has representation of various key service providers across the ward are currently delivering / planning to deliver on the revised ward priorities. Challenges include tackling waste management, noise nuisance, promoting positive mental health and wellbeing and reduction in burglaries.

# Ward: Radford and Park NDO: Rob Gabbitas

All figures shown are the latest available from the Crime and Drugs Partnership (CDP). These figures are based on data for Quarter 4 covering January, February and March 2015 and in most cases comparisons are made with the same period in the previous year.

### Crime:

- across all crimes the Ward has seen an increase from 391 in the same quarter last year to 401 this quarter – a slight increase of 3%;
- crimes relating to criminal damage have increased from 47 in Quarter 4 last year to 62 in Quarter 4 this year an increase of 32%;
- there were 8 fewer instances of theft during this same period;
- crimes relating to violence increased from 50 in Quarter 3 last year to 83 for the same Quarter this year, an increase of 66%;
- there were 4 more dwelling burglaries (from 25 to 29).

**ASB:** 223 incidents – an increase of 33 (representing 17%)

### Cleanliness:

- The Cleanliness Index Score for this Quarter is 94 compared to 95 for the same period last year.
- Graffiti: 5 incidents (reduction of 15);
- Fly tipping: 35 incidents (reduction of 59);
- Dog fouling: 29 incidents (increase of 11);

**Community Protection:** These statistics are for the Radford West and Leen Police Beat areas and relate to March only:-

- Enviro audits 6
- Letters Before Action (LBA's) 14
- Community Protection notices 46
- Fixed Penalty Notices (FPN's) 7

**Fire:** there have been 16 deliberate fires in this quarter compared to 3 in the same quarter last year. Year to date the Ward has suffered 30 deliberate fires compared to 17 year in the previous year, a 76% increase.

**Unemployment Rate**: The number of unemployed persons in this Quarter is 1,583 compared to 2,027 for the same period in the previous year. One of the possible reasons for the reduction may be the decommissioning of Radford High-rise flats which resulted in a large group of residents moving out of this area.

### **Key successes:**

- development of Radford Recreation Ground /Green Flag submission and installation of raised bed areas;
- Glentworth Road, Wordsworth Road, Grimston Road alleyway cleansing and gating repairs to improve levels of cleanliness and waste management and recycling in this area;
- John Carrol open space on going improvements and increased usage;
- progress on new build schemes at Radford Mills and Forest Mills site. Installation of knee high rail fencing at former Club 1 site (Denman Street) to prevent unauthorised parking in this area;
- partner organisation support to local schemes and projects Moorgate environmental scheme (Groundwork Greater Nottingham); Radford Lenton Library community garden llkeston Road memorial gardens (Dunkirk and Lenton Forum); Week of Action (23 - 27 March);
- area based domestic violence and mental health training;
- Radford Boulevard trees scheme / framework pruning which included creating greater all round visibility at the junction at Denman Street Central and Radford Boulevard;
- Globe pub site demolition of garages and continued site security by Nottingham Community Housing Association (NCHA) in respond to Police concerns about intruders;
- councillor funded event at Ilkeston Road memorial gardens supported by PRIMARY, Dunkirk and Lenton Forum and the City Council to raise awareness of play and open space provision in this area and seek fresh input;
- joint meetings with Locality Management and Registered Social Landlords (RSL's) to share knowledge of key issues affecting RSL's in this area and identify where the City Council could offer support;
- Western Cycle corridor to run through from Castle Road along Castle Boulevard in a
  westerly direction to Abbey Street and along University Boulevard towards the Broadgate /
  Woodside Road roundabout. This is a two way segregated route that runs alongside the
  carriageway incorporating upgrades to most traffic signal locations along the route. The route
  will maximise space and priority for cyclists and pedestrians.

### Issues:

- persistent flytipping around known sites including Graham Street, Garfield Road, Clifford Street; Norton Street and the rear of shops at 481 - 505 Alfreton Road;
- derelict sites and open spaces targets for waste materials and fly tipping areas such as Salisbury Street, Alfreton Road/Ilkeston Road corner and the Forest Mills site;
- extensive fire damage to the former John Player site at Player Street, Radford.
- high number of properties in multiple occupation with many instances where occupants have little or no knowledge of current City Council waste management arrangements which leads

- to bins on streets, high levels of side waste and, at times, repeat visits by Waste Management operatives to tackle persistent issues;
- the impact of high student numbers (10,000 plus) and the Park Estate on the overall perception of this ward when analysed through existing ward data which does not show the extent of prevailing issues within the Radford West and Radford and Leen police beat boundaries;
- to work with NCH to ensure a smooth transition for tenants moving into areas of new build and to help increase resident satisfaction levels by regular citizen contact opportunities including local resident groups, Ward Walks and the development on local projects and ward:
- general waste issues across the Ward including fly-tipping, bins on streets, recycling, over flowing and contaminated bins,.

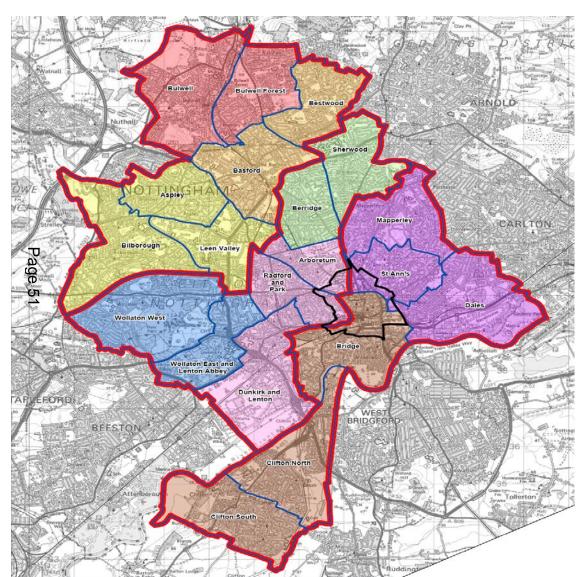

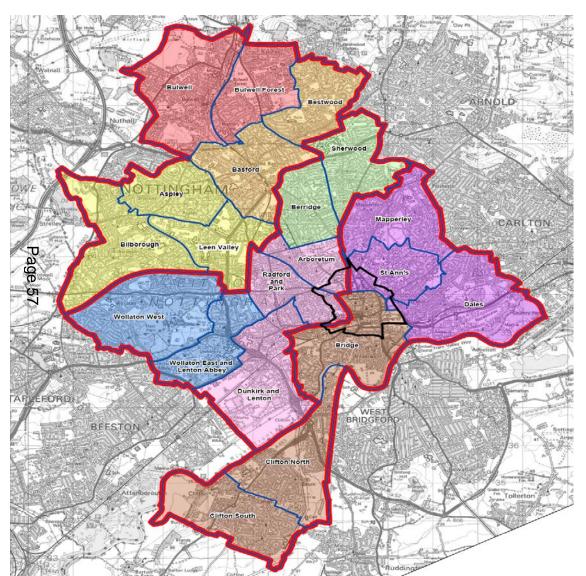

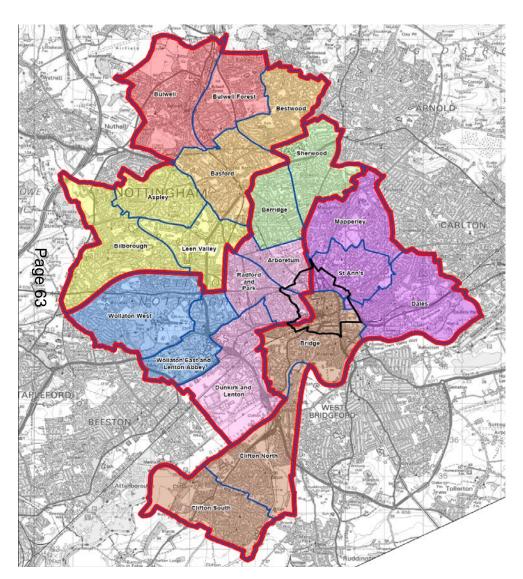

### 1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) strategy 2011 26 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
  - As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2015 an LTP capital allocation for 2015 -16 of £1.25 million citywide.
- 1.2 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of "Transforming Neighbourhoods", the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme have included footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to the public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 1.3 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council General Fund, the LTP and the Housing Revenue Account (HRA). To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 1.4 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances, such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 1.5 The Area Committee is invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

### 2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 2.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million citywide for 2013 2015.
- 2.3 This process provides an opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.
- 2.4 Area Capital Fund schemes, including the LTP element, have been identified through various methods including consultation, citizen feedback via Councillors Casework and partnership working. Discussions on potential schemes take place at monthly Neighbourhood Action Teams (NAT) meetings, regular briefings with Ward Councillors and monthly ward walks across neighbourhood police beats.
