9 <u>ENVIRONMENTAL SCHEMES - NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES</u>

Lynn Standen, Tenancy and Estate Manager, introduced the report of the Chief Executive, Nottingham City Homes, requesting approval for 3 environmental schemes.

A councillor highlighted the point that old, established posts and railings in Bestwood Park had never been painted despite assurances that this would take place.

Mr Singh confirmed that LTP funds had been approved for 30 metres of fencing at Bradwell Drive, and that the brief for commencement will be issued.

10 NOTTINGHAMSHIRE POLICE - UPDATE

Inspector Woolley gave an update on crime and anti-social behaviour in Basford and Bestwood wards up to 31 March 2015. The key issues highlighted are:

Basford

- (a) Most crime categories have seen reductions, except for theft-related crimes. Anti-social behaviour levels are also down on the previous quarter;
- (b) The Neighbourhood Police Team has undertaken extensive work on domestic burglary and burglary other (sheds/garages). The new Community Priority is Brooklyn Road and Heathfield Road areas for nuisance vehicles and anti-social behaviour:
- (c) A prolific and persistent offender (burglar) has been given a 3-year sentence.

Bestwood

- (d) There have been reductions in most crime and anti-social behaviour categories except theft-related offences, vehicle crime, violence and sexual offences;
- (e) Neighbourhood Police Team activity has focussed on criminal damage and violencerelated offences. Perpetrators of criminal damage have been identified and dealth with;
- (f) The new Community Priority is Kyle View and surrounding area for anti-social behaviour and drug-related misuse issues.

Councillors noted and welcomed the increased reporting of domestic violence. Inspector Woolley also highlighted the difficulty in dealing with cybercrime – identifying victims, identifying where crimes take place (location of perpetrator or victim) and making judgement call whether to prosecute for low-level crime.

RESOLVED to note the update.

11 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES AREA PERFORMANCE

Lynn Standen, Tenancy and Estate Manager, introduced the report of the Chief Executive, Nottingham City Homes, providing updates on key issues and themes linking back to local priorities and the strategic themes for Nottingham City Homes.

The following issues were raised during discussion and in response to councillor questions:

- (a) The Decent Homes team manage the process of replacing doors, windows and other fittings, and keep a database of the age and condition of fittings. However, there can be complications when tenants refuse upgrades, or do not respond to team requests for information;
- (b) There has been a Day of Action in Leen Valley, focussing on flytipping, repairs and deep cleansing;
- (c) There is a recharge for the replacement of fittings deemed to be as a result of malicious damage, and these are reported to the Patch Manager. However, a balance needs striking when dealing with vulnerable tenants;
- (d) There can be issues where external contractors delivering work do not follow the correct process, and concerns can be raised via the Decent Homes hotline;
- (e) NCH colleagues remind tenants with untidy gardens of their responsibility to maintain them, and if an informal approach is not effective then action can be escalated through a formal letter, loss of £100 good tenancy incentive and final warning/Court action. If due process is not followed, prosecutions/evictions will not be successful;
- (f) Ms Standen suggested carrying out a walk/inspection of green areas of concern to councillors in Top Valley, where inconsiderate parking was causing damage.

RESOLVED to note the report and discussion.

Councillors noted the update and welcomed the high score for cleanliness in both wards.

A councillor highlighted the problem of flytipping on vacant land, and it was pointed out that there is an issue with dumping by those from outside the City boundary. Mr Singh confirmed that there is a need to find a more permanent solution to the issue, including working with landowners and communications with citizens.

Problem parking around David Lane was highlighted as an issue that may require multi-agency work to resolve.

RESOLVED to note the latest position in regard to ward performance against local priorities and strategic themes of the Nottingham Plan 2020.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

The Council's constitution requires Area Committees to formally confirm Community Representatives at the start of the municipal year and encourage citizens living in the ward to become involved in democratic decision making process alongside Councillors.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- Each year the Area Committee invites nominations from relevant groups and organisations and appoints representatives from the wards. Nominations are attracted from groups that are active in the area, but there is also the need to ensure that the Committee reflects the views of all sectors of its community.
- The role of the Community Representatives on an Area Committee has been designed to bring citizens living in the area in question into the democratic decision making process alongside Councillors.
- The revised Terms of Reference for the Role of Area Committee Community Representatives include guidance on the selection and the role of the Community Representative and is designed to help achieve reflective representation of the ward.
- The Council's constitution requires Area Committees to confirm community representatives at the start of each municipal year, normally a meeting in May and the Neighbourhood Development Officers have been liaising with local community groups in advance of this meeting.
- Nomination forms were sent out along with the Terms and References for the Role of Area Committee Representative to groups and organisations on the basis that it provides a geographical representation of the ward.
- Completed nomination forms and expression of interest for Community Representatives onto the Area 2 Committee for the municipal year 2015/16 were received from groups and community organisations and these are listed in Appendix 2.

The Role of Community Representatives

- You will be encouraged to act as an ambassador for the Area Committee to help to raise the profile of the work done by the Area Committee.
- You should attend all Area Committee meetings, events, training etc wherever possible.
- If you cannot attend the meetings try to find someone who will cover for you.
- You should represent the views of residents and of your group or community who live and work in the area.
- All business representatives should have business premises within the area.
- You will be encouraged and entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings.
- Events and training will be held for you to give you the confidence and knowledge to be actively involved within the Area Committee. We will ask you what training and events you would like.
- You will be invited to put forward items for discussion at the Area Committee meetings. You will need to do this at least 3 weeks before the date of the meeting.
- You will be encouraged to tell us when things are not running well.
- You will find it much easier to fulfill your role if you have read the reports before the
 meeting and, if possible, had a chance to discuss the report with your community
 group. Everyone will benefit from this as it allows the community representatives to
 play a much more active role and makes for a more effective and informed
 contribution to discussions and debate.
- Most importantly, any relevant information should be passed back to your community group to any local friends, neighbours or colleagues. None of the information made available during the meetings are secret or confidential.
- One of the biggest challenges for the Area Committee is to keep people informed.
 Your agreement to pass on information, display and distribute any publicity material
 in community venues and promote involvement in the work of the Area Committee
 and to take an active role in local community consultations is appreciated.

NORTH LOCALITY - COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES: THE CRITERIA AND PROCESS FOR SELECTION

INTRODUCTION

- Encouraging greater participation in service delivery and decision making was one of the main reasons for establishing Area Committees in 1995.
- The new terms of reference give Area Committees more responsibilities which in turn will have an impact on the involvement of local representatives.

THE CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

- Community or Voluntary organisations that wish to be represented on Area Committees will be properly constituted (i.e. have a constitution/terms of reference, have regular meetings, and operate an Equal Opportunities Policy)
- All community group representatives (except those representing citywide organisations), should live in the area and seek to represent the views of their group(s) or community organisation and not individual viewpoints.
- Community Group representatives will have established networks/systems for passing information to the Area Committee from groups that they represent, citizens that they aim to serve within their area and likewise feedback information from the Area Committee.
- Representatives will be selected each civic year (normally in May), Only one nomination per group will be accepted by the Area Committee at any given time. Any person from the group can attend Area Committee meetings although only the nominated community representative will be allowed to speak. If the community representative is unable to attend a meeting, the group can nominate an individual to speak on behalf of the community representative for the group.
- Any member of the public may have the right to attend Area Committee meetings as an observer.

POWERS OF COMMUNITY GROUP REPRESENTATIVES

- Community Group Representatives are entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings and can 'influence' the decisions (but cannot vote on any matter) being made by the area committee.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to claim expenses for travelling and care costs related to attending Area Committee meetings.
- Community Group representatives will be able to submit items for inclusion on the Area Committee agenda at least three weeks before the meeting or in advance of the meeting with the agreement of the Chair.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to attend specific events and training across the city in order to carry out their role and responsibilities in relation to Area Committee/Working.
- Community Group Representatives can make formal presentations at Area Committee meetings on community projects/initiatives with the prior agreement of the Chair.

<u>POWERS OF COUNCILLORS IN RELATION TO COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES</u>

- Only Councillors can vote on all matters in respect of the Area Committee
- If a representative fails to attend committee meetings consistently without good reason, the Area Committee may approach their organisation for a replacement.
- If a representative is deemed to persistently not abide by the corporate policies of Nottingham City Council, (e.g. Health & Safety, Equality and Diversity), he/she will

- be required to resign their position as local community group representative on the Area Committee
- Councillors may choose to invite representatives from other organisations outside their geographical area in order to widen participation from under-represented groups.
- Councillors will allocate a small 'rolling budget' for reimbursement of Community Group Representative's expenses.
- If Community Representatives find it beneficial and have made a request, Councillors will provide community group representatives with an opportunity to meet together with the Locality Team prior to each Area Committee meeting, to discuss the agenda or other items of concern.

THE PROCESS

- Each year Councillors must determine the number of Community Representatives
 that they wish to represent the community. This may be based on a set number of
 places per ward or according to specific interests and issues in the area.
 Representation should take account of the population make up of the area. Where
 under-representation exists, city wide groups may be approached for
 representation.
- Once per year (normally in March) the Locality Team will send out nomination forms by post, (together with an Area Committee information pack), to all community organisations in the area, inviting them to nominate a representative from their organisation to be involved in Area Committee meetings
- Locality Managers will assess completed nomination forms to ensure that the selection criteria are met and will produce a report for Area Committee detailing nominations received.
- Councillors will decide which of the nominations should be selected for community group representation at Area Committee meetings, taking into account the population make up of the area or specific issues/interests in the area.
- Those community group organisations selected will be notified in writing of the offer by the Locality team. Details of future dates of committee meetings will be sent out at the same time.
- A review will take place each civic year (by Councillors advised by officers) to determine what groups are the most appropriate to be represented on the area committee
- Where nominations are not accepted, a letter explaining why will be signed by the Chair and sent to the organisation, together with details of other options for involvement in area working.
- Where groups are dissatisfied with the decision, they have the right to appeal to the Area Committee within four months.
- Councillors will then enlist the assistance of other Councillors of the city (Area Chairs Panel), to review the decision and any decision made thereafter, will be final.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

To ensure that appointments to outside bodies are updated to reflect changes in Council membership following the local elections, and that the bodies to which the Council makes appointments remain relevant to its business.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

At its meeting on 16 June, Executive Board reviewed the register of Outside Bodies to which the Council makes appointments. Board agreed to delegate responsibility for making appointments to locality based outside bodies, together with responsibility for adding to or deleting relevant organisations from the register during the current Council term to the relevant Area Committee.

This report invites the Committee to agree the appointments to outside bodies relevant to this area following consultation with the Chair of the Area Committee and an opposition group representative where relevant.  - Improvement of Security for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. door entry, lighting, fencing, garage sites).
 - Improvement of the environment for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. dealing with graffiti reducing anti-social behaviour, parking issues, drying areas resurfacing).
 - Improvement of spaces for Tenants and Leaseholders (e.g. installation of community facilities or areas on land under NCH management).
- 1.3 The report seeks approval of schemes listed in Appendix 1.

2. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

CDP Board Priority Tasking Update

Area Committee will be aware that The Crime and Disorder Act 1998 established a statutory duty on agencies to work together to reduce crime and disorder, this was accommodated through the establishment of Community Safety Partnerships (CSPs). In Nottingham the Crime & Drugs Partnership is the city CSP.

Nottingham has employed several methods since 2005 to deliver partnership problem solving and tasking. In December 2014 the Partnership Board agreed to dissolve Locality Boards and move to a citywide model to deliver interventions focused on people, places and premises and the priorities set out in the Partnership Plan.

The purpose of the CDP Board Priority Tasking is to take an intelligence led and collaborative approach to identify effective interventions to reduce crime, re-offending and anti-social behaviour by focusing on people, places, premises and the priorities set out in the Partnership Plan. The Group will also serve an important function as a forum into which any partner agency can escalate intractable issues and seek help in solving those problems through a partnership problem solving approach.

The following is a brief summary by the respective Ward Neighbourhood Development Officers highlighting key issues:

WARD: BASFORD, (Park Lane, Stockhill and Whitemoor Beats) Neighbourhood Development Officer, Gursharan Singh Nijran

Key Successes

During this quarter (April - June 2015) there have been a number of successes including:

- Covert action against dog fouling operations and ASB. ASB van on regular patrols in Basford.
- Works commenced on the Stockhill Park Children's Play Area.
- Consultations on the Brooklyn Park Children's Play Area
- Design on the Toton Close Environmentals Improvement started
- Community engagement through the local TRA's and community centres
- MyBasford Facebook page continues to grow with internal departments adding regular updates. This can be viewed at www.facebook.com/mybasford
- Nottinghamshire Police launched Basfordcops on Twitter in May. This can be viewed at https://mobile.twitter.com/BasfordCops
- Unemployment has seen an 18% reduction.
- Improving the visual impact of our neighbourhoods, open spaces and highways remain a high priority. A number of schemes are being developed.
- The introduction of the 4 Streets 4 Weeks initiative by the beat teams. This involves meeting every household on the 4 streets over a 4 week period.

What are the emerging issues?

The figures given below show some key statistical points from this quarter and for some of Julys data performance (see appendix A for more detail):

- All Crime: is down by 5% (25 offences) in quarter one compared to April June 2014.
- All ASB: was up by 19% (decrease of 57 calls) compared to the same period in the previous year, but up 8% for the year to date period.
- There are now 632 (8.6%) households in Basford signed up to the **ALERT** system, with many households signing up to get information via Twitter and Facebook.
- Cleanliness Index: The target set for the city centre is 86% and the Basford score for quarter one is 88%.
- **Graffiti Reports:** Show an increase of one compared to the same period in the previous year.
- **Fly Tipping:** Shows an increase of five incidents in December compared to the same period in the previous year.
- **Fire:** Deliberate fires are down 2% compared to the same period in the previous year.

- Duke of Edinburgh volunteers planted trees and shrubs at Townsend Court.
- The Peoples Church pop up youth café bike complete. Will be utilised at Chediston Vale and Southglade parks
- Various Easter events held by Bestwood Estate and Leen Valley Community Centres
- Over 200 children and families celebrated at the Ridge Adventure Playground birthday.
- The Community Protection service issued 23 Fixed Penalty Notices for Littering and Dog Fouling. The 8 for Dog Fouling were from Wyton Close, Stevenholm Cresent and Chippenham Road.
- Operation Twilight, the joint Police and Community Protection ASB car has been running since April has seen a marked decrease in the number of repeat calls for ASB. The car runs 7 days a week and covers the whole of the North Locality until late in the evening.

What are the emerging issues?

- Improving the visual appearance of neighbourhoods continues to be a priority. Community
 Protection continue their efforts to tackle fly tipping but this is to date proving to be one of
 their biggest challenges, with only two cases escalated to the Enforcement Officers for
 further action in the last 3 months. The biggest issue is finding evidence or reliable
 intelligence to support investigation and prosecution.
- Core group of young people being anti-social. Partnership resources are being targeted.

What is the Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) focussing its work on?

The NAT will be continuing to focus its work upon:

- Improving the visual appearance of neighbourhoods
- Reducing crime and anti-social behaviour
- Supporting activity for young people.

The figures given below show some key statistical points from this quarter and for some of Julys data performance (see appendix A for more decay).

- **Crime:** For the period April to July all Crime was down by 1% compared to the same period in the previous year. This equates to five less offences.
- ASB: was down by 24 incidents or 6% for the period April to July.
- **Fire:** The volume of deliberate fires for the period April to July was down 16 incidents or 42%.
- Cleanliness Index: score was at 87 for guarter 1. The target set for the city centre is 86
- **Graffiti Reports:** There was a reduction in the number of incidents with 4 less reactive reports. Overall graffiti was down 44% for quarter 1 compared to the previous year.
- **Fly Tipping:** 80 reactive incidents (increase of 1 incident or 1%) of fly tipping recorded for quarter 1. Overall fly tipping was up 1% for the year to date compared to the previous year.
- **Dog fouling:** Quarter 1 showed a reduction of 9 reactive incidents of dog fouling equivalent to a 38% reduction on the previous year.
- **Unemployment:** in quarter 1 continued to reduce showing a 22% reduction on the previous year.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Neighbourhood Working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement.
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all, and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods'; the Ward Performance Reports help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance Reports capture work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind, the report such as the Ward plans and other partner's implementation plans.
- 2.4 The North Locality Board has been established now since September 2012. It delivers a multi agency/partnership approach to managing the locality, providing an overview of area performance and policing priorities, performance management and

problem solving of key challenges. In the north, this has included a focus on parking issues, cannabis, theft from shops, criminal damage and violent crime, including domestic violence. Area Chairs, or their nominated representatives are invited. Minutes are issued to all Ward Councillors.

2.5 The Ward Performance Reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the Crime and Drugs Partnership.

Police update - Q1, April to June 2015

Basford Ward

During the first three months of the recording year, overall crime has fallen by over 3% compared to the same period last year.

Dwelling house burglary has decreased during this quarter. We have made several positive arrests which have seen persons remanded in custody for several of these offences. We continue to focus on this area to prevent further victims of crime.

Vehicle crime has seen the biggest decrease in this quarter with 38 offences less compared to he same period last year, a 71% reduction.

There have been reductions in criminal damage and drug related offences.

There has been an increase in robbery compared to last year, majority of these relate to a male robbing persons of mobile phones following internet based communications. This person has now been charged with 8 offences.

Burglary Other, more commonly known as shed/garage burglaries have seen an increase with the most popular item stolen being bicycles.

Anti-Social Behaviour (asb) during this period has decreased by 7% compared to the same period last year. We are constantly reviewing our approach to asb utilising criminal and civil powers.

The Community Priority during this period has been asb, nuisance motor bikes around Heathfield and Park Lane areas. During this period we have several Section 59 Notices to the uses of such motorised vehicles and continue to educate people reference the impact of their behaviours.

Bestwood Ward

During the first three months of the recording year overall crime has risen by 7% compared to the same period last year.

Dwelling House burglary during this period has decrease by 32 offences compared to the same period last year. This is a reduction of over 74%. We have prioritised our focus on the individuals who commit these crimes as a result several persons are now serving custodial sentences. We have also improved our crime prevention offer in the area to reduce the risk of being a victim of crime.

Vehicle crime, criminal damage and dug related offences have all decreased during this period.

There had been an increase in robberies on the Bestwood Ward during this period, this was predominantly due to a number of street robberies happening over a 3/4 day period in May, and five persons have been arrested in connection with these offences.

Theft related offences increased during this period compared to the same period last year, a number of these offences were shop thefts from local stores. 3 persons were identified and admitted over 20 offences.

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Anti-Social Behaviour (asb) during this period has decreased by 11% compared to the same period last year. We are constantly reviewing our approach to asb utilising criminal and civil powers and partnership resources.

The Community Priority during this period has been the area of Kyle View, Huggett Gardens. This is in relation to asb, nuisance vehicles and suspected drug misuse in the area. To tackle this issue we have utilised new legislation under Section 34 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 to disperse persons from the area causing issues.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2015 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2015-2016.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme, have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
