29 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Councillor Morley was not seeking re-election in May 2015, and the Committee recorded its thanks for her contribution to the work of the Committee, and its best wishes for the future.

30 BRAMCOTE LANE TRAFFIC CALMING SCHEME UPDATE PRESENTATION

Jennifer Williams, Senior Officer in the Accident Investigation and Road Safety Team, gave a presentation, reviewing the Bramcote Lane Traffic Calming Scheme, and highlighting the following points:

- (a) the previous scheme had been in place for 14 years, were severe and uncomfortable. A Have Your Say leaflet proposing alternative traffic calming arrangements was circulated to 1,600 properties and 4 community events were held;
- (b) feedback from residents supported installing Round Top road humps, installing a new zebra crossing, improvements to the Pump area and footway and the removal of raised plateau. Residents were not in favour of chicane/give-way features and a proposed gate-way feature;
- (c) residents' feedback informed the formal consultation process, which involved circulating a letter and detailed plan to 1,600 properties and holding consultation events at Wollaton Library and St Leonard's Community Centre:
- (d) a Notification Letter was circulated before the works commenced, and information updates were provided through Facebook and Twitter;
- (e) there was a good attendance at the scheme's formal opening on 19 December 2014;
- (f) a number of 'before/after' slides showcased the improvements;
- (g) key successes for the scheme included the early and extensive community engagement carried out, the works carried out to improve the quality of the conservation area and the positive feedback received from citizens.

The Committee commended the scheme improvements and put on record its thanks to all colleagues involved in delivering the scheme for their professional and engaging conduct throughout the process.

RESOLVED to note the presentation and to thank all colleagues involved in delivering the Bramcote Lane Traffic Calming Scheme.

32 MINUTES

The Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 10 November 2014 as a correct record subject to the following amendment:

The amended minutes were signed by the Chair.

John Marsh, Locality Manager, undertook to raise a community representative's concerns about dimmed street lighting with relevant Council colleagues.

33 FIT IN THE COMMUNITY

Siobhan Reilly, Project Development Officer, Nottingham City Homes, introduced a presentation on the Fit in the Community initiative, highlighting the following points:

Wollaton and Lenton Abbey Area Committee (Area 7) - 23.02.15

- £500,000 is being made available over 3 years to fund a joint initiative between Nottingham City Council and Nottingham City Homes (NCH) to increase sports participation by NCH tenants and the wider community;
- (b) The initiative will be rolled out on a ward by ward basis to both signpost and deliver physical activity sessions for those not currently active;
- (c) A variety of consultation methods have already been used to inform how the initiative will be delivered, and sports organisations, including Football in the Community, England Athletics and YMCA, have signed up to participate;
- (d) While all citizens were eligible to participate in activities, NCH tenants were eligible for training opportunities as community mentors or 'activators';
- (e) By the end of the 3-year programme it is anticipated that 5,500 social tenants will be more active.

During discussion, the Committee made the following points:

- (f) Councillors suggested an early meeting with Fit in the Community (FitC) co-ordinators to advise on existing groups, particularly for the elderly and for students;
- (g) Ms Reilly advised that consultation has varied depending on the ward. Certain areas were well served by community groups, while in other areas on-street outreach was a more effective approach. She also confirmed that Nottinghamshire County Cricket Club was less involved with this particular initiative, but will be doing significant engagement as part of proposed developments at Victoria Embankment;
- (h) There are local events such as the Family Fun Day where it would be useful to have a FitC presence to increase public awareness:
- (i) The University of Nottingham representative advised that student groups will be undertaking similar activities and co-ordination with FitC activities would be beneficial.

RESOLVED to note the presentation and discussion.

34 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES

Paul Howard, Tenancy and Estate Manager, Nottingham City Homes Ltd (NCH), presented the Chief Executive of Nottingham City Homes' report on performance in the area. Mr Howard made the following points:

- (a) a problem tenant has been evicted from a property on the Lenton Abbey estate after a long court battle. This generated national headlines and represented a positive outcome for local residents:
- (b) tenant turnover in Area 7 is low and both occupancy and sustainability rates were high. NCH colleagues are also working hard to maximise performance in the final quarter of 2014/15:
- (c) Lynn Standen, Tenancy and Estate Manager, is taking up a management role for Bestwood estate.

The Committee welcomed the report and expressed its thanks to Lynn Standen for her contribution to Area 7. During discussion, several issues were raised:

- (d) A councillor thanked Mr Howard and his Team for their help in getting the old allotment site on Wensor Avenue back in use:
- (e) In response to a community representative's comments about end-of-term problem refuse from student accommodation, John Marsh, Locality Manager (Central) explained that there was a detailed Student Action Plan in place. In 2014, the Action Plan led to 17 tons of refuse being removed from just 2 streets;
- (f) A councillor made the point that the City Council's Homes in Multiple Occupancy Licensing scheme was designed in part to hold landlords to account for the condition of their properties;
- (g) It was confirmed that the City Council had no powers to insist that walls in front of private properties be retained.

RESOLVED to note the report.

35 ISSUES FROM COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

Community representatives were invited to give updates to the Committee and provided the following information:

(a) Rob Kirkwood – Friends of Wollaton Park

The Group had arranged a walk around the Walled Garden and was keen to be involved in its development. Alan Hall of the Wollaton Historical and Conservation Society also raised this issue, asking for an update on progress. Lylse-Anne Renwick, Neighbourhood Development Officer, advised that a feasibility report was imminent and that there will be a further meeting of the Steering Group shortly.

(b) Adam McGregor – Lenton Abbey Residents Association

The Association is looking recruit new members and plans to have its AGM around Easter 2015.

(c) Lynne Dilks – North Wollaton Residents Association

The Association's AGM is in May 2015. The Association supported for fitness initiatives to combat obesity and loneliness.

(d) Anthony Swannell – Wollaton Vale Residents Association

An outbreak of Japanese Knotweed has been identified around Tottle Brook. The Committee was concerned about its possible spread, and John Marsh, Locality Manager (Central) undertook to establish where responsibility lay for its disposal.

RESOLVED to thank the community representatives for their updates.

36 WARD PERFORMANCE

John Marsh, Locality Manager, introduced the report of the Strategic Director of Commercial and Neighbourhood Services which details the performance of the Wollaton West and

Wollaton and Lenton Abbey Area Committee (Area 7) - 23.02.15

Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward for Quarter 3 of 2014/15 against a range of performance indicators. Mr Marsh highlighted the following points:

- (a) Incidence of both flytipping and graffiti have reduced. Highly visible flood wall graffiti is being removed, but there is an element of 'cat and mouse' with the perpetrators;
- (b) Dog fouling incidents have risen markedly and the Neighbourhood Action Team is planning a programme of activities to address the issue;
- (c) Christmas Light switch-on events in both wards were successful, and had been well-received by citizens;
- (d) The Ring Road will see a programme of cleansing in the final quarter of 2014/15:
- (e) Nottingham has received the Britain's Cleanest City award;
- (f) Work is already under way to plan the Lenton Abbey Fun Day in July 2015.

During discussion, it was pointed out that a dog club congregated at the bottom end of Arleston Drive, and it would be worth contacting the club to remind members to clean up after their dogs, in case this was contributing to the current increase in dog fouling.

RESOLVED to note the report.

39 POLICE AND CRIME UPDATE

Inspector Wilson of Nottinghamshire Police updated the Committee on the following issues:

Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey

- (a) Overall crime levels are similar to those in 2013/14. There was a spike in bicycle thefts at the University in the Autumn of 2014, but following a number of arrests these thefts had reduced significantly:
- (b) Crime prevention work was ongoing, particularly with overseas students and older residents, to be vigilant about leaving windows open as temperatures increased;
- (c) 2 people have been arrested as a result of a capture-house 'sting' operation, and have been charged with 13 burglaries.

Wollaton West

- (d) While home burglaries have declined, there has been a spike in thefts from sheds, garages and vehicles, as well as an increase in shop theft on Bramcote Lane;
- (e) Crime prevention messages are being reinforced, especially where thefts have occurred from unprotected or unlocked property;
- (f) Several arrests outside the ward have had a positive impact on numbers of thefts from sheds and garages;

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(g) The Inspector has addressed a local school assembly on the issue of anti-social behaviour, theft and achieving personal potential.

During discussion, the following issues were raised:

- (h) Inspector Wilson undertook to speak to PCSO Louise Down about reported smoking of cannabis by young people in Wollaton Park Community Gardens;
- (i) There have been 6 arrests following a recent high-profile stabbing on Wollaton Vale and the crime was being processed through the criminal justice system;
- (j) A new Police Constable, Jeremy Hughes, will be joining the local Neighbourhood Policing team from Canning Circus.

RESOLVED to thank the Inspector for this update.

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Ward: Wollaton West Neighbourhood Development Officer: Lylse-Anne Renwick

Crime: Crime in the Wollaton West Ward has decreased this quarter with an only increase of theft from motor vehicles, with the majority of thefts from unlocked motor vehicles and Antisocial Behaviour in the Grangewood Estate area. Please see detailed breakdown below.

NB: This is the actual Police beats breakdown given to the Neighbourhood Action Team by the Safer Neighbourhood Team in May 2015.

ASB: During January – March ASB has increased by 29 incidents. The antisocial behaviour is predominantly in one area of the ward which is to be addressed by the NAT team.

Cleanliness Index: General cleanliness in the ward is up by 2% overall this year maintaining our continuous high standard. The cleanliness score this quarter is 94, up from 92 last quarters above the 'neighbourhood as clean as the city centre' benchmark target of 86%.

Graffiti: - There has been an increase in reported graffiti incidents this quarter compared to last quarter though there is a reduction by 19% for the entire year.

Dog Fouling is up **by 156% this quarter compared to this quarter last year.** The ward has seen an increase in dog fouling particularly in the Grangewood Estate, Seaford Avenue, and Rushford Park. Wollaton residents have reported that the majority of dog fouling happens at

about 7am, before most people start work, the Neighbourhood Management team and CPO are putting measures in place to deal with this issue.

Fly Tipping: - Across the ward this quarter has decreased by 36% in January – March.

Fire: - Fires are low in the ward with an average quarterly score of 2.

Unemployment Rate: Wollaton West has seen a decrease in employment. The total number of unemployed citizens is 118, 1:3%, -51 in April. The ward is ranked 18 out of the 20 wards for unemployment in the city. The number of all benefits claimants aged 16 -64 by November 2014 for the Wollaton West Ward was 730, 8.2% a decrease by -70 from November 2013.

Key Successes:

Middleton Primary School & Fernwood Infants and Junior Schools: Entered the Nottingham in Bloom Art Competition. Several children from Fernwood Junior also entered the Nottingham in Bloom Photography competition. The competitors are sponsored by Capital One.

The results are yet to be announced, but several of the Wollaton Children have reached the shortlist and their pictures will go on to represent the city in the East Midlands in Bloom competition.

Crime Prevention Road Show - The Ward Crime Prevention Road Shows has continued, the NAT team held a recent Road Show on 14th April at the newly opened Waitrose Supermarket, Trowell Road. The event was supported by the Police, Crime Prevention Team and the NDO, Locality Management. The event was a huge success with several residents attending the road show. Several shed alarms and window alarms were distributed to residents (the alarms were funded by the Ward Councillors). There was also crime prevention advice relayed to residents by the Crime Prevention Team and residents were persuaded to sign up to the Police Alert scheme which would keep them inform of incidents that occur in the ward together with updated crime prevention measures.

Dovecote Museum: - Was formally opened on Sunday 10th May by Maureen Jones. The event was a great success with quite a number of people attending. There was a guided walk around Wollaton Village and a refreshed display of June the Doll's new cloths together with beautiful knitted items by the WI was on display in museum. There was also an exhibition dedicated to the Walled Garden at Wollaton Hall which depicted the garden through the years.

Friends of Wollaton Local Nature Reserves: - Held a guided walk on the reserves on 12th May, Mark Speck led the walk and help residents identify the residents' local birds by their birdsong.

Bramcote Lane Summer Planting: - The 14th May saw the beginning of the Wollaton West Ward summer planting programme, the Neighbourhood Development Officer together with staff from Wollaton Library and residents carried out the planting of the planters outside the library and around the Bramcote Lane Pump area. Resident is very pleased with the results and has asked for Wollaton to be entered in East Midlands in Bloom in its own right next year.

Issues: Dog Fouling has increased in the ward around the Grangewood Estate, Seaford Avenue and Rushford Park. The vast majority of dog owners act in a responsible way, disposing dog waste via existing public litter bins or their domestic refuge bin. The community view dog fouling as antisocial behaviour and have made it a local priority. Enforcement of legislation by uniformed officers had had lignifed effect on this priority. However, a small

proportion of the community persist, therefore a more robust partnership approach is required to address this issue. A range of operational measures are being put in place to address this issue.

Parking around the shops on Wollaton Road and Russell Drive (at the bust stop) are causing problem for citizens using the bus stop. The NAT team together with the Road Safety team are meeting to address this issue.

Wollaton West Ward has recently seen an increase in burglary from cars in Wollaton Park the Neighbourhood Police Beat Team together with the NDO are working hard to resolve the problem, for example, organising Crime Prevention Road Shows in the Ward, deploying the capture car around the ward, meeting with the Parks and Open Space, Horticultural Supervisor to look at measures to reduce the crime.

Events: A range of meetings and events have taken place this quarter including, Wollaton West Community Meetings, Friends of Wollaton Park Group Meeting, Local Area Group meetings and Wollaton West Youth Café continues to be a success.

NAT's (Neighbourhood Action Team): - The team represents various key services provides who meet to look at current issues across the ward. The team are working together on agreed ward priorities set by residents as well as the day to day issues that arise in the ward. The NAT team are at present jointly working to resolve issues across the ward. The key Issues are dog fouling, crime and parking.

Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward: NDO: Pauline Dorey

Crime: During January – March 2015 (compared with January – March 2014) all crime in the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward decreased by -36% (no change in crimes of 508 for April 2014 - March 2015) with an increase in thefts of 7 incidents with the majority being of bikes from the University. Dwelling burglary decreased by 4 incidents during January – March 2015 for the same period in 2014 but increased by 9 for the whole year. Please see detailed breakdown. The rate for all crime per 1,000 of population in the WELA ward is the lowest across the 20 wards. There is an increase of 32 incidences in ASB for the ward Year to Date.

Total number of crimes across both beats: January 2015 = 9 crimes and 20 ASB incidents February 2015 = 13 crimes and 18 ASB incidents

March 2015 = 10 crimes and 25 ASB incidents April 2015 = 12 crimes and 16 ASB incidents Total of above = 44 crimes and 79 ASB incidents

NB: This is the actual Police beats breakdown given to the Neighbourhood Action Team by the Safer Neighbourhood Team In May 2015.

ASB: During January – March 2015 (compared with January – March 2014) ASB increased by 59% by 21 incidents. The Ward has the lowest rate per 1,000 of population of the 20 wards across Nottingham.

Domestic Violence Crimes: 19 incidences reported for 2014-2015 YTD with a decrease of -11 (-37%) from previous year to date. However we have been informed that there are a significant number of unreported incidences of Domestic Violence in Lenton Abbey.

Fire: Even though incidents of Fire are low in the ward with 1 Deliberate Secondary and 1 Accidental fire in the quarter. With the Ward Year to Date ranking the lowest for All Fires with 2 (property and secondary) out of 20 wards across Nottingham. Events and Home Fire Safety Checks targeting vulnerable residents and groups and school children continue to take place in the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward.

Community Protection: No Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) or Statutory Notice data was available.

Cleanliness of the Ward has increased from the previous quarter and to a 92 average well above the 'neighbourhood as clean as the city centre' benchmark target of 86%. There has been a decrease in graffiti and fly tipping for the year April 2014 - March 2015 in comparison with the previous Year To Date. Dog fouling has increased for the same period. For the current year **Graffiti** has slightly increased across the Ward with 18 incidents in March 2015. **Fly Tipping** across the Ward in March 2015 has increased to 32 incidents. **Dog Fouling** across the Ward in March 2015 decreased to 24 incidents. However currently there have been no real issues raised regarding students living in the WELA ward since the start of term.

Unemployment: Is increasingly falling for the WELA Ward with a decrease of 74 -22% for the quarter and decrease of 354 -24% for the Year April 2014 - March 2015. This being the lowest in the City. Hope Nottingham are continuing their Employment Pathway for their volunteers and have started the new food growing and environmental maintenance training programme on the Wensor Avenue Allotment space in Lenton Abbey. With NDO support there has been successful ongoing volunteer team challenges, volunteer recruitment, development, training

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and capacity building at Sheila Roper Community Centre. This is highlighted in the Ward Report under the Ward Priorities for Work.

Health: Health data is currently being updated for the ward. Sheila Roper Community Centre are currently exploring the possibility of offering different health sessions with various partners.

Key Successes:

Lenton Abbey Park Development Plan and Bid – In April 2015 we received the exciting news that NCC has secured an external Funding Bid of nearly £40,000 for new developments on Lenton Abbey Park developed with Ward Councillors, NDO, residents and Parks and Open Spaces. New developments include a football pitch, wildflower meadow, fruit trees, new outdoor gym equipment and under 5's equipment, table tennis tables. This will further enhance the Green Flag status already awarded for the Park.

Sutton Passeys Crescent Play Area – WELA NDO working with Parks and Open Spaces on further consultation with local residents, community groups, schools, on play equipment choices, current usage and issues to inform a Development Plan and future funding bid for the Play Area.

Spring Clean Up Days of Action in Lenton Abbey – following s successful Day Of Action on 19th March 7.5 tonnes of bulky waste was collected for priority streets in Lenton Abbey.

Summer Clean Up Days and Campaigns events and activities to tackle Dog Fouling will be rolled out across the Ward. Planning with partners is underway as part of the City wide Student Waste Management Plan.

Hawton Spinney Interpretation Panel and Nature Trail – Launch on 12th February with follow up workshops during half term – Middleton Primary school children and parents enjoyed further workshops and parents and grandparents are really enjoying learning with their children and grandchildren from the new Nature Trail.

Wollaton Park Residents Association (WPRA) Spring Fair – Saturday 9th May 2015 – a new event organised by WPRA and local residents with many stalls of local creative and small businesses and NDO undertaking community consultation on Sutton Passeys Crescent Play Area which was well supported by Wollaton Park estate residents. Thank you to everyone who helped out. WPRA and residents are already talking about the next event they want to plan!

Lenton Abbey Fun Day – Saturday 4th July 2015 1-5pm after the success of the 2014 Fun Day with fantastic support from all the diverse local communities in Lenton Abbey. LAFFDA who organise the Fun Day have been busy putting plans in place for 2015. There will be an even wider variety of stalls, children's and young people's play and sports activities, performances, community consultation and information stalls. If you have any new activities/ideas please get in touch. Please look on the WELA facebook page for upcoming news and dates.

Neighbourhood Transformation Plans – detailed Action Plans on tree planting and old allotment sites in Lenton Abbey led by NDO are currently being updated and implemented with Allotments Service, Ward Councillors, NCH, CPO's, CP Enforcement, City Services and and Community Payback partners. Allotments on Brook Road, off Manton Crescent and off Woodside Road using Ward Cllrs, NCH and Allotments Service budgets have been cleared over the last few months and brought back into use to be let out to new Allotment holders. Building on the 'Grow For It' campaign. Phyther works on fencing on Woodside Road 'the

Blossoms' will add to enhancements and transformation on this city gateway route. Building on the recent success of the Trees For Cities Project delivered in WELA ward in February 2015 with overwhelming resident support. WELA NDO working with Tree Services have submitted a further application which local residents can vote on. These Action Plans and Gateway To Nottingham Plans are monitored through the Neighbourhood Action Team meetings.

Farndon Green Fun Day – Plans are currently underway working with local residents to organise this popular local event taking place in the summer.

Lenton Abbey Residents Association (LARA) Spring Into Lenton Abbey event on 11th April 2015 – with the themes of 'Grow Your Own', 'Clean' and 'Pride in Neighbourhoods'. The event included: Outdoor planters were filled and planted, children's workshops, games, activities, tombola, advice and information from local Welfare Rights and Drugs and Alcohol Support Advice agencies, NCH and Fit in the Community, supported by Dr Bike to get bikes back on the road and the Police promoting 'Immobilise', Crime Prevention Roadshow and WELA Target Hardening Scheme. New management committee members joined at the AGM. Thank you to LARA, all the partners, volunteers and residents who helped make it happen. It attracted residents who were new to the neighbourhood who commented "this event has made me feel very welcome and I never knew there was so much on offer in Lenton Abbey"

Area Capital and Public Realm Funds – since the last Area 7 Committee in February 2015 new gating has been installed to reduce ASB and fly tipping. Phase 1 of works on Woodside Road to resolve parking issues were completed in April/ May 2015 to reduce damage to the verges and help create off road parking. Further phases are currently being planned which will help to transform this major City Gateway route.

Wollaton Park Estate Residential Parking Scheme - The resident parking issues in Wollaton Park estate have been successfully resolved by the new Residential Parking Scheme installed with Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward Area Capital Fund monies last autumn. This Included public highway enhancements to support parking for customers of local businesses. Enforcement has been ongoing and the impact of the schemes have been closely monitored over the last 6 months by Traffic Management, Enforcement and Community Protection. There have been no issues at local schools with pupil drop off/pick up with positive partnership working.

Issues:

The Experimental Traffic Restriction Order (TRO) in Lenton Abbey has now been fully implemented. We are currently monitoring emerging parking issues in Lenton Abbey. The 1st Phase of works have been completed on Woodside Road. Schemes are currently being developed for further Phases. A new TRO has been developed and is currently being implemented to install timed parking bays to support parking for disabled and elderly customers using the shops on Woodside Road in Lenton Abbey.

Cycle theft has dramatically decreased on the University of Nottingham campuses over the last 6 months with the Police and Sustrans working closely with University security staff. Although dwelling burglary has fallen slightly in the last quarter, there has been an increase over the last year. In response WELA NDO in partnership with Nottinghamshire Police, WELA Ward Councillors and Crime and Drug Partnership have developed a Crime Prevention Target Hardening Project which started being rolled out in March 2015 to WELA's most vulnerable residents. On both issues the Neighbourhood Police Beat Team have responded with swift action and successful local operations resulting in arrests and suspects being charged.

During this quarter a range of events and meetings have and are due to take place including TRA's and Local Action Group (LAG) meetings, Sheila Roper Community Centre Management Committee, LAFFDA (planning for Lenton Abbey Fun Day), Community Meetings, Wollaton Park Resident Association local issues meetings. Working in partnership with TRA's and NCH there will be some development work to increase resident and tenant involvement in local groups to enable continued participation and representation following the change in Tenant Panels.

The NAT (Neighbourhood Action Team) which has representation of various key service providers across the Ward are currently delivering on the revised and refreshed Ward Priorities. There has been strong partnership working on the Allotment Action Plan led by Neighbourhood Services NDO, working with Allotment Services, NCH, Community Protection and City Services on patch operations on clearing allotment sites, to reduce ASB and enforcement of Allotment Hiring Agreements which have brought some allotment sites back into use and back into cultivation. We have extended this positive partnership to bringing other overgrown 'no man's land' green sites into cultivation by local residents. We are still working closely with the HMO Team on the additional HMO registration in Wollaton Park estate which should improve contact with HMO landlords. Partnerships have been further strengthened with Stonewater Housing Association and Sheila Roper Community Centre and with other Registered Social Landlords through a Central Locality Task and Finish Group reviewing Resident Welcome Packs and Waste and Recycling Management. WELA NDO has worked with colleagues enhancing mapping of properties of RSL landlords across the Central Locality which will aid Central Locality wards NAT partner problem solving.





January – March 2015 Data

<u>Wollaton West</u> – Wollaton is a pleasant, residential area located in the suburb of Nottingham. Wollaton West has a total of 14,741 residents, 7,267 are male (49%) and 7,474 are female (50.7%). Within Wollaton West 8.4% of all adults smoke, this is the lowest within Nottingham City, 48% of all adults are estimated to be overweight/obese which is marginally higher than the City average but not significantly so.

Life expectancy for males is 83.1 years which is significantly higher than the national figure and life expectancy for females is 88.6 years which is significantly higher than the national figure. Wollaton West is ranked as the 5,026th most deprived out of England 7,589 wards and the least deprived in the City. It has some of the most desirable housing in the city. Key spots in the area are Wollaton Hall and Park, together with Martin's Pond, Harrison's Plantation and Rageigh Pond (local nature reserves).

<u>Wollaton Village</u> still retains a village type atmosphere, with its tree lined roads and a handful of local shops. Although part of the City of Nottingham, Wollaton Hall and the deer park create the illusion that the village is away from urban living.

BUSINESS ENTERPRISE

There are a small number of small and medium enterprises (SME's), particularly around Bramcote Lane, Crown Island. Bramcote Lane shops offer a reasonable variety whilst Crown Island shops are somewhat more limited.

<u>HOUSING</u> — Wollaton West has higher house prices than other wards within the City. The area is largely owner occupied. Wollaton West has a higher percentage of older people (65+). These residents account for 20.1% of the ward population.








The 2012 Insight and 2010 ONS statistics are slightly skewed by the transient student population mainly studying at University of Nottingham.
 - Wollaton Park estate has a hidden community of disabled children, young people and older adults and due to caring responsibilities have pockets of fuel poverty.
 - In the top 10% nationally of SOA's for Crime and Disorder and Income Deprivation affecting children. However reported crime figures have generally fallen across the ward compared to the previous year.
 - Wollaton Park estate have seen a growing number of HMO's and are experiencing increasing problems with their landlords.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved in March 2015 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2015 2016. In addition for 2015-2016 a Public Realm General Fund has been approved of £750,000 Citywide.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of "Transforming Neighbourhoods" the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programmed have included footpath, fence, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council General Fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programme of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
