28 MINUTES

Subject to amending resolution 24(2) to refer to 'decommissioned schemes' rather than 'withdrawn schemes', the Committee confirmed the minutes of the meeting held on 21 September 2015 as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

29 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES

The Committee received a brief presentation from Dan Lucas, Research and Strategy Manager, Nottingham City Homes, and Chris Matthews, local historian and author, on the publication of a history of council housing in Nottingham, titled 'Homes and Places'. The book is available from the Five Leaves Bookshop and copies can be ordered from the bookshop on 0115 8373097.

During a brief Question and Answer session, Mr Mathews explained that the generous plots provided for Clifton housing stock were a response to the extreme density of housing stock being replaced. There was also a 'Garden City' mentality prevalent at the time, with land considered a cheap and plentiful resource.

Paul Howard, Tenancy and Estates Manager, introduced a report of the Chief Executive, Nottingham City Homes, updating the Committee on key issues and themes linking back to local priorities and strategic themes for Nottingham City Homes.

Mr Howard explained that there were no requests for funding on this occasion. The main issue to note was that work has started on external wall insulation under the Nottingham Green HousiNG scheme is starting in Lenton Abbey.

The Chair expressed the view that the short amount of time between the September and November Area Committee meetings meant that there was little progress to report on this and on other standing items, and undertook to raise the issue of scheduling Area Committee meetings at Area Chair's Panel.

RESOLVED to note the report, and to thank Mr Mathews and Mr Lucas for their presentation.

30 <u>HEALTH AND WELLBEING STRATEGY ENGAGEMENT: HEALTHIER,</u> HAPPIER LIVES

James Rhodes, Strategic Insight Manager, introduced a report of the Corporate Director for Children and Adults on engagement activities to inform the development of the next Health and Wellbeing Strategy.

Mr Rhodes advised that 3 key public events had already taken place, provided information on a toolkit to permit community groups to run their own engagement sessions, and distributed survey details to inform the process.

The following points were made in the discussion which followed:

- (a) compiling information on activities already available to citizens in a single accessible community resource was seen as vital, and several Committee members highlighted consistent use of Facebook as a way forward;
- (b) a community representative recommended providing gentle exercise activities for senior citizens in community centres rather than in leisure centres;
- (c) as well as physical activity, 'silver surfer' training to help senior citizens become more IT-literate was seen as an important intervention to prevent social isolation;
- (d) outdoor developments in the Area at Sutton Passeys Crescent and in Lenton Abbey will help contribute to the Strategy.

RESOLVED to thank Mr Rhodes for his presentation, and to note the report.

31 NOTTINGHAM WESTERN CYCLE CORRIDOR

The Committee received a presentation from Keith Morgan, Transport Strategy Planner, and Thomas Humphries, Transport Planner, on the Nottingham Western Cycle Corridor, highlighting the following points:

- (a) The cycling and roadspace transformation initiative formed part of an integrated programme of transport infrastructure investment in Nottingham, including the Nottingham Express Transit lines 2 and 3 extension, improvements to the A453, the Nottingham station hub and the electrification of the bus fleet;
- (b) Nottingham's Cycle City Vision had as its key target having 10% of all trips to work taken by bicycle by 2025 the current figure was 3%;
- (c) Significant funding was being available via the 'D2N2' Local Enterprise Partnership, and construction on a series of upgrading, widening, resurfacing and creating of shared space was expected in 2016 formal consultation, with details of changes 'on the ground', will take place in early 2016;
- (d) Work on the Western Cycle corridor element of Nottingham's cycle network will focus on University Boulevard, Woodside Road and the Ring Road;
- (e) It was not proposed to remove any tree, and every effort will be made to minimise root damage to trees lining the cycle corridor.

The following points were made during discussion:

- (f) Mr Humphries and Mr Morgan confirmed that there were no plans to put in additional bus stops or road crossings as part of the scheme. A councillor commented that the placement of bus stops near to road crossings/refuges can cause difficulties for road users and pedestrians, and Mr Morgan and Mr Humphries asked for further details about where this is currently a problem;
- (g) A councillor expressed concern at the proposal to create a shared space for pedestrians and cyclists, while a community representative expressed concern about the effect on emergency services' response times of reducing the number of lanes on Woodside Road from 2 to 1. In response, Mr Morgan and Mr Humphries explained that

- all emergency services will be fully consulted, and expressed the view that similar space sharing schemes had worked well elsewhere;
- (h) A councillor commended the proposed changes, expressing the view that they will create a safe, attractive road environment for cyclists, car drivers and pedestrians. The councillor also pointed out that the changes will help reduce speeding, and prevent parking on grass verges, which is a significant problem along the proposed route;
- (i) A resident advised Mr Morgan and Mr Humphries to be mindful about the placing of street furniture when planning improvements to the cycle corridor.

RESOLVED to thank Mr Morgan and Mr Humphries for their presentation, and to note that formal consultation for the Western Cycle Corridor will commence in early 2016.

33 <u>ITEMS FROM COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES</u>

Dorothy Holmes undertook to explore further the issue of using 'vacuum/blowing' street cleansing equipment where cars were parked, in response to a query from Pauline Peck.

Councillor Sam Webster explained that there was no funding currently available to clean the exterior of the Council House, given the pressures on local government budgets, in response to a query from Pauline Peck. Councillor Webster also explained that the City Council had already spent significant resources on the internal infrastructure of the building.

Kevin Beswick, Friends of Wollaton Park, reported that the group was currently thriving, with volunteering sessions going well.

34 WARD PERFORMANCE REPORTS – QUARTER 4

Lylse-Anne Renwick and Pauline Dorey, Neighbourhood Development Officers, introduced the Corporate Director for Commercial and Operations' report providing ward performance updates on key issues and themes which link back to local priorities and the strategic themes in the Nottingham Plan to 2020.

Ms Renwick highlighted the following points:

(a) A series of Deep Cleans around key hotspots and Days of Action have taken place across both wards to address a range of community issues and concerns. A student

Week of Action also took place in October 2015 to coincide with the arrival of University students for the Autumn term, addressing personal safety, anti-social behaviour and waste management issues;

- (b) The number of dog-fouling incidents had reduced greatly in both wards, and levels of fouling were the lowest of all Nottingham city wards;
- (c) Youth teams are engaging with young people and looking to provide diversionary activity to address issues of disturbance on Torvill Drive following complaints by residents. Actions are also being taken at Manton Crescent to address recent localised increases in anti-social behaviour;
- (d) A decision on securing the required funding for the Sutton Passeys Crescent Play Area is expected in December 2015;
- (e) An innovative local Loyalty Card has been launched to support businesses on Bramcote Lane.
- (f) The Neighbourhood Action Team has been active in helping co-ordinate a number of key actions, including clearing allotment sites and overgrown 'no man's land' sites, and improving joint working with landlords of Houses in Multiple Occupancy (HMOs);
- (g) Plans for Christmas light switch-on celebrations were well advanced.

The Committee welcomed the positive report. In the brief discussion which followed, a resident highlighted the need to ensure that gully and drain cleansing on Middleton Boulevard was properly carried out.

RESOLVED to note the report.

Pauline Dorey, Neighbourhood Development Officer, introduced the Corporate Director for Commercial and Operations' report requesting approval for Area Capital Fund schemes.

36 NOTTINGHAMSHIRE POLICE UPDATE

Inspector Wilson of Nottinghamshire Police circulated a newsletter and provided a verbal update on crime and anti-social issues, making the following points:

- (a) There has been a significant reduction in the levels of burglary in both wards, as a result of successful crime prevention and detection work. However, in October and November 2015 there has been a spike in burglaries, coinciding with the return of university students to Nottingham, and Nottinghamshire Police urge citizens to remain vigilant;
- (b) There has been a massive reduction in the number of burglaries from sheds and garages from 2014, following the arrest of several persistent and prolific offenders;
- (c) Nottinghamshire Police have investigated complaints about anti-social behaviour on Harrow Road, and continue to work with the Co-op supermarket, which remains a hotspot for shop theft in the Area.

The Committee welcomed the update and the following issues were raised during discussion:

- (d) There was consensus that greater engagement with the community was needed, as recent Local Action Group meetings had not been well attended. It was suggested that coinciding future meetings with other community engagement and outreach events involving residents groups;
- (e) Inspector Wilson advised that officers regularly patrolled around the Community Centre, and, while young people did congregate there, they weren't necessarily doing anything wrong or illegal. A Community representative responded that young people did trespass by clambering over locked gates, and there were reports of drinking and cannabis-smoking taking place. Inspector Wilson undertook to pass comments to front line colleagues.

RESOLVED to note the update.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Physical inactivity is a significant problem in Great Britain with 29% of people in England failing to achieve 1x30 minutes of sport or physical activity per week. The ParkLives programme aims to activate the community and provide a programme of free to attend healthy lifestyle activities, sports and events delivered in Local Parks all around the City throughout 2016. The programme also aims to mobilise a network of local people who can all help promote and help to lead the sessions. It is hoped that these people will also help to sustain the programme beyond 2016.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 ParkLives Programme

ParkLives is a sport, health and physical activity project funded by Coca Cola GB as part of their £20m investment to get 1 million people active by 2020. The project forms a partnership between Coca Cola GB and the local authority who project manage ParkLives in their area.

On 17th December 2015, the Government launched its new Strategy for Sport, 'Sporting Future: A new Strategy for an Active Nation'. This new strategy will see a shift away from traditional sports to a broader definition of what constitutes physical activity and this change aligns nicely to this Park Lives Programme of activities and the City's own Sport & Physical Activity Strategy 2015-2019.

ParkLives started in 2014 in three areas; Birmingham, Newcastle and the London borough of Newham. The emphasis of the project is about having fun on a park in an active way. It doesn't have to be a high intensity fitness class or a sports coaching session, it is an informal activity that promotes being active on a regular basis in a fun and social way. Cost and inconvenience are the two main barriers that people face in becoming more active and ParkLives overcomes these by providing free activity across the city in peak and off-peak times. The ParkLives initiative started in Nottingham in May 2015.

2.2 Nottingham ParkLives Vision

To get more families, friends and communities actively participating in a broad range of park based fun recreational and sporting activities.

2.3 Nottingham ParkLives Outcomes and Outputs plan

- 1. To formally designate 20 parks and green spaces as Activity Parks
- 2. To reach those who are most unlikely to participate from IMD areas and activate 60,000 people during the two year programme.
- 3. To provide weekly activities in all primary parks and an intensive programme of activity for families over the school holidays
- 4. To support the development of Friends Groups in each Active parks and recruit and train volunteers to build capacity and support future delivery of the Active Parks project.
- To generate interest and support with the community in order to drive forward a wide range of parks improvements and help improve the parks to Green Flag Standards.
- 6. To look to existing delivery partners to establish and run the parks sessions across the city.

2.4 Headline Statistics from the 2015 Nottingham ParkLives Programme.

- Over 450 physical activity sessions between June and October in 19 parks across Nottingham city
- 2 mass-participation events
- Supporting 6 community events
- Over 15,000 attendances

2.5 ParkLives Programme 2016

In 2016 the ParkLives Team will again run a free to attend programme of weekly healthy lifestyle, sports, activities and events in local parks all over the City.

The key emphasis this year will be about activating the entire community, training and developing a local network of people who can get involved and *help sustain* the programme in future years.

Appendix 1 contains a draft 2016 ParkLives programme.

To help deliver the 2016 programme the ParkLives Team is now looking to identify and recruit local people who can who can volunteer to help promote and run the ParkLives sessions.

ParkLives Ambassadors.

Key Responsibilities: - To help promote the ParkLives sessions and be a local champion who can encourage local groups and individuals to get involved and be active in their local park.

• ParkLives Activators

Key Responsibilities: - To actively get involved in assisting / leading local ParkLives sessions. This could be as a walk leader, organising a weekly game of rounder's or running a weekly Zumba class in the park.

Training and Support

As part of this programme the ParkLives Team will help provide support and training on all aspects relating to the ParkLives programme and how to promote and deliver the sessions.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 To note the progress made on the development of a new children's play area at the Sutton Passeys Crescent end of Wollaton Park.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 There has been political and local demand to have a new play area at the Sutton Passeys Crescent end of Wollaton Park for some time. The people living in the boundaries of Middleton Boulevard / Sutton Passeys Crescent (young children, parents, carers and grandparents) and the pupils of Bluecoat school and a local childminders group who access this playground mentioned that the old play equipment was tired, out of date, dark and un-inviting.
- 2.2 There were concerns from residents and local Councillors over the impact on residents living within the Sutton Papsays Grescent and Middleton Boulevard estate

should this play area be removed and not replaced. Therefore, it was proposed to refurbish the new play area and cater for children ranging from toddler to teenage years with a focus for disabled children and with better access, bearing in mind that many of the local residents are elderly or disabled or have disabled children.

- 2.3 Wollaton East & Lenton Abbey Councillors provided £16,805 towards the scheme with a further £50,000 came from Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd.
- 2.4 Following the initial public consultation, the following play elements were highlighted as being a priority for the new design:
 - 1. Natural elements theme
 - 2. Wheelchair access and activities

- 2.5 After designs were received, further public consultation took place online and at 15 venues, with 238 people consulted. 89% of people voted in favour of Design B and 61% voted in favour of the play area remaining in its existing location.
- 2.6 The winning design can be seen in the attached Appendix, with minor changes to this made before the final order was placed.
- 2.7 Work began on site during the week commencing 4th January 2016 and will be complete by the end of February 2016.



Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

Once adopted, the Land and Planning Policies Document will form the second part of the City Council's Local Plan for Nottingham City, alongside the Nottingham City Aligned Core Strategy (Local Plan Part 1), which was adopted in September 2014.

The Land and Planning Policies Document has been published for a six week period ending 11th March 2016 to allow formal representations. This follows several consultation stages including Issues and Options consultation and a Preferred Options consultation.

Following this Publication stage, the Land and Planning Policies Document will undergo independent examination. If found sound, the document will be adopted and, alongside the Core Strategy, will replace the current Local Plan (2005).

The Land and Planning Policies Document contains planning policies to guide decision making on planning applications. Some policies have been carried forward from the last Local Plan (adopted in 2005) but there are also new policy areas.

The Land and Planning Policies Document also includes 85 specific sites which are allocated for particular uses, such as housing, employment or retail.

Site allocations and policy designations are set out on a map known as the Policies Map, which is published alongside the Land and Planning Policies Document.

Recommendation(s):

1 That the committee notes that the Local Plan Part 2: Land and Planning Policies document (Publication Version) and accompanying Policies Map has been published for representations, and the period for making representations ends on 11 March 2016.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Production of a Local Plan is a Statutory requirement.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Once adopted, the Local Plan Part 2: Land and Planning Policies Document (Local Plan) will form part of the statutory planning framework for Nottingham, alongside the Core Strategy. Before the Local Plan can be adopted, it must go through several stages of formal and informal consultation. To date, the Local Plan has been through three informal stages of consultation the Issues and Options consultation stage, the Additional Sites consultation stage and the Preferred Option consultation stage.
- 2.2 The previous consultations have informed the development of the Local Plan, which the Council now considers is ready for independent examination by a Government appointed planning inspector. The Local Plan has therefore been published for representations. This provides a formal opportunity for the local community and other interested parties to consider the Local Plan. Government regulations require that representations should relate to whether the Local Plan is legally compliant and is "sound" (ie whether the Plan has been positively prepared, is justified, effective and consistent with national policy).
- 2.3 All documents can be viewed at www.nottinghamcity.gov.uk/localplan.
- 2.4 The policies in the Local Plan address the following matters:

- 2.5 This area committee may have particular interest in those policies on family housing and student accommodation. The Plan seeks to balance needs for student housing; with those of existing companyities and actively promotes the expansion of

appropriately located and designed Purpose Built Student Accommodation to help rebalance the proportion of students within affected communities.

- 2.6 The relevant policies are:

CONSULTATION

- 2.10 370 individual people and organisations responded to the Preferred Option consultation and there were approximately 1,370 individual responses.
- 2.11 A Report of Consultation has been produced setting out the measures undertaken at previous consultation stages. This has been published alongside the Local Plan.

SUSTAINABILITY APPRAISAL

2.12 Under the requirements of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act (2004), a Sustainability Appraisal (SA) (which incorporates the EU requirement for Strategic Environmental Assessment) has been produced. The SA has 14 objectives relating to economic, social and environmental issues in Nottingham. The SA assesses the potential impacts of each of the policies and site allocations against the 14 objectives, and has been published alongside the Local Plan.

OTHER BACKGROUND ASSESSMENTS

2.13 In addition to analysing the consultation responses and undertaking the SA, a number of other background assessments have been undertaken to inform the Local Plan. Each of the sites put forward for allocation has undergone a detailed assessment. The assessment involved collecting information regarding planning history, land use, constraints, transport and accessibility, wider regeneration benefits, infrastructure and energy and heat networks and previous work, including Development Briefs. Site visits were also undertaken for each site.

- 2.14 Background Papers have also been produced to inform the Local Plan policies. These are titled as follows:
 - Climate Change
 - Employment and Economy
 - Infrastructure Delivery Plan
 - Green Belt
 - Minerals
 - Retail
 - Sustainable, Inclusive and Mixed Communities
 - Transport
 - Equalities Impact Assessment

NEXT STEPS

- 2.15 Any representations received will be considered and technical drafting changes may be proposed if any factual or minor inaccuracies emerge. These will not be consulted upon. However, if the City Council wishes to make any further substantial changes to the draft Local Plan in response to the representations or other key factors, then it is likely that these will need to be subject to further consultation.
- 2.16 The Council will summarise the main issues raised by representations, and submit the summary together with the Local Plan and all the representations to the Secretary of State for independent examination by an Inspector. The examination is likely to include a public hearing session, when parties making representations may, at the Inspector's discretion, present their views in person. The examination is expected to be in the Autumn of 2016, and if the Local Plan is found sound it is anticipated that it will be adopted in 2017.

- As indicated in the main body of the report, the Council is under a statutory duty to produce a Local Plan of which the LAPP is part. Requirements relating to the production and adoption of the local plan are prescribed by regulations. Any representations received as a result of the current public consultation will need to be considered and, (assuming that no substantial changes are required,) the LAPP, it's supporting documentation and the representations will then be the subject of a report to Council to approve its submission for independent examination. Whilst there are risks that the Policy could be found to be unsound or challenged on adoption the LAPP has been the subject of legal advice during its preparation to seek to ensure its compliance with the law and planning policy.





Area Committee note and comment on the Ward Performance reports for quarter 4 2015/16

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Ward performance reports provide a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at a ward level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.
- 1.2 Ward performance reports also monitor progress in the wards and act as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Neighbourhood working has been important for a number of years in Nottingham as a means of engaging better with citizens and to drive forward service improvement
- 2.2 The Nottingham Plan has a goal that 'public service delivery will be better integrated and appropriately devolved, ensuring more accessible and responsive services for all and giving residents more control over what happens in their neighbourhoods. The Ward performance reports help to support this.
- 2.3 The Ward Performance reports capture work at a local level to support the Nottingham Plan; it is a short summary of key updates on priorities and issues in the ward. More detailed implementation plans sit behind the report such as Neighbourhood Action Team's Action Log, Crime and Drugs Partnership (CDP) plans and partners implementation plans
- 2.4 The Ward Performance reports are co-ordinated by Neighbourhood Development Officers every quarter, with the data analysis undertaken by the CDP.
- 2.5 The following brief summary by the respective Ward NDO (Neighbourhood Development Officer) highlights the key issues. The more detailed Ward reports are attached as Appendix A.

Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward: NDO: Pauline Dorey

Crime: During April – December 2015 (compared with April – December 2015) all crime in the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey Ward decreased by -11% (by -44 crimes, with an decrease in victim based crime of -59 crimes) no change in criminal damage incidents. Thefts decreased by -27 incidents with the majority being of bikes from the University and dwelling burglary decreased by -33 incidents during April – December 2015 for the same period in 2014. Please see detailed breakdown. The rate for all crime per 1,000 of population in the WELA ward is the lowest across the 20 wards. There is an increase of 12 incidences in ASB for the ward Year to Date.

Total number of crimes across both beats:

October 2015 = 8 crimes and 20 ASB incidents November2015 = 17 crimes and 8 ASB incidents December 2015 = 13 crimes and 11 ASB incidents

ASB: During April – December 2015 (compared with April – December 2014) ASB increased by 9% by 12 incidents. There has been a decrease in the last quarter. The Ward has the lowest rate per 1,000 of population of the 20 wards across Nottingham.

Domestic Violence Crimes: 25 incidences reported for April – December 2015 YTD with an increase of 12 (92%) from previous year to date. However we have been informed that there are a significant number of unreported incidences of Domestic Violence in Lenton Abbey.

Fire: Even though incidents of Fire are low in the ward with 1 Deliberate Secondary and 1 Accidental fire in the quarter. With the Ward Year to Date ranking the lowest for All Fires with 2 (property and secondary) out of 20 wards across Nottingham. Events and Home Fire Safety Checks targeting vulnerable residents and groups and school children continue to take place in the Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward.

Cleanliness of the Ward has decreased from the previous quarter and to an 87 average above the 'neighbourhood as clean as the city centre' benchmark target of 86%. There has been a slight increase in graffiti, fly tipping and dog fouling for the period April – November 2015 in comparison with the previous Year. For April – November 2015 Graffiti has increased slightly across the Ward by 3 to 21 reactive incidents. Fly Tipping across the Ward in April – November 2015 has increased by 6 to 31 reactive incidents. Dog Fouling across the Ward in April – November 2015 has increased by 2 to 19 reactive incidents. However currently there have been no real issues raised regarding empty student properties and waste in the WELA ward.

Unemployment: Is increasingly falling for the WELA Ward with a decrease of -206 (-26%) for the period April – December 2015. This being the lowest in the City. With NDO support there has been successful ongoing volunteer team challenges, volunteer recruitment, development, training and capacity building at Sheila Roper Community Centre. This is highlighted in the Ward Report under the Ward Priorities for Work.

Health: Health data is currently being updated for the ward. Sheila Roper Community Centre are currently exploring the possibility of offering different health sessions with various partners.

Key Successes:

Sutton Passeys Crescent Play Area –Excellent news in early December as the external funding bid submitted by Nottingham City Council (NCC) for £50,000 for the construction of the new Play Area and outdoor gym has been successful. This is in addition to the £16,805.00 match funding already committed by Wollaton East and Lenton Abbey ward Councillors from their WELA ward budgets through Area Committee in November 2013. Work has already started at the beginning of January2016. We hope to have a launch in late Spring/ early Summer 2016.

Lenton Abbey Park Development Plan and Bid – In April 2015 we received the exciting news that NCC has secured an external Funding Bid of nearly £40,000 for new developments on Lenton Abbey Park developed with Ward Councillors, NDO, residents and Parks and Open Spaces. Work is underway commissioning the contractors to undertake and install the new developments of a football pitch, wildflower meadow, fruit trees, new outdoor gym equipment and under 5's equipment, table tennis tables. This will further enhance the Green Flag status already awarded for the Park. We hope to have a launch in Summer 2016.

NCC Budget Consultation event – Wednesday 27th January, 6.30pm at upstairs Function Room, Rose and Crown, 500 Derby Road. Presentation and Question and Answer (Q&A) session. Jointly hosted as part of Nottingham Action Group on HMO's meeting. Online consultation questionnaire distributed through Nottingham Arrow in November and publicity online, through Notational Notation and WELA Facebook.

Lenton Abbey Residents Association (LARA) Spring Into Lenton Abbey Community Cohesion event and AGM – Saturday 16th April 2016 at Sheila Roper Community Centre. Plans are underway with local residents. Please look on WELA facebook page for details.

'Take A Seat' City Wide Campaign - was launched by Cllr Longford with Cllr Webster and Cllr Battlemuch on Wednesday 6th January 2016 at Nottingham Building Society and Crown Island shops. Farndon Green Post Office shops have already signed up to provide a seat for older people if they need to take a rest on their premises. Other shops on Bramcote Lane and in Lenton Abbey are being approached. The Campaign will be widened to the city centre and city wide. Please share to your resident networks and feed any local contacts and suggestions through your NDO to the relevant NCC Officer.

Winter Deep Cleans across the ward – City Services have been busy undertaking Deep Cleans in key hotspots around the ward identified by WELA Ward Councillors, Neighbourhood Development Officer and Neighbourhood Operations Manager and WELA residents. Focussing on alleyways, off road areas and twitchels.

External Wall Insulation Scheme in Lenton Abbey – In order to address the High Fuel Poverty in the WELA ward a specific External Wall Insulation Scheme for Lenton Abbey was launched on 26th October with an Information event by NCH and contractors SBS and Permarock with support from NEP and other VCS partners. Works have been underway since November with 2 show houses completed for residents and home owners to view and regular coffee mornings on Wednesdays 9.30 -11.30am at Sheila Roper Community Centre. Please look on WELA facebook page for dates. The scheme is open for NCH and private properties. 90 private properties have joined the scheme to date. After the works were completed one resident on Baslow Drive "noticed the difference immediately. I had to turn my thermostat down a few degrees and have taken off the layers. I am so glad I have had it done and am sure I will notice a big difference in my fuel bills". Another resident has signed up "after researching other houses who have had the works completed have seen an increase in their property prices".

Lenton Abbey Fun Day – Saturday 2nd July 2016 after the success of the 2015 Fun Day with fantastic support from all the diverse local communities in Lenton Abbey and a wide variety of stalls, children's and young people's play and sports activities, performances, community consultation and information stalls. LAFFDA have already started meeting to plan 2016! If you have any ideas please get in touch. Please look on the WELA facebook page for upcoming news and dates.

Wollaton Park Residents Association (WPRA) Christmas Fair – Saturday 5th December 2015 Despite the high winds, residents came out to support this event with a colourful range of stalls by local creatives and other NCC and VCS partners organised with WELA NDO working closely with WPRA. If you have any ideas for this year please get in touch. Please look on the WELA facebook page for upcoming news and dates.

Christmas Light Up Events and Lenton Abbey Residents Association – Wednesday 2nd December 2015 5pm The Blossoms Residents were amazed by the fireworks, enjoying carols from Beeston Fields Primary school choir, University of Nottingham Brass Band, activities, stalls and warm up workshops at the Community Centre. Community engagement and consultation on local transport plans, new welfare advice surgeries and the Lenton Abbey External Wall Insulation Scheme. There were very generous raffle prize donations from SBS and Permarock EWI contractors. "fantastic community atmosphere", "Really good to engage with the community", "Really helped with signing up new people to the EWI scheme". Building on the succeps of last year's event with Locality Management

working closely with LARA, Sheila Roper Community Centre, local schools, NCH and other NCC and VCS partners. Please look on the WELA facebook page for photos and other upcoming news and dates.

Neighbourhood Transformation Plans – detailed Action Plans on tree planting and old allotment sites in Lenton Abbey led by NDO are currently being updated and implemented with the Allotments Service, Tree Services, Ward Councillors, NCH, CPO's, CP Enforcement, City Services and Community Payback partners. Allotments on Brook Road, off Manton Crescent and off Woodside Road using Ward Cllrs, NCH and Allotments Service budgets have been cleared over the last few months and brought back into use have been let out to new Allotment holders. Building on the 'Grow For It' campaign. New planting schemes are being developed on Woodside Road 'the Blossoms' to add to previous enhancements and transformation on this city gateway route. Building on the success of the 'Trees For Cities' Project delivered in WELA ward in February 2015 with overwhelming resident support. Allotments Service working with WELA NDO have engaged new residents to take on waste/ 'no man's' land on the corners of Enderby and Bosley Squares for cultivation. Other Allotment sites in Lenton Abbey are also being brought back into use. These Action Plans and Gateway To Nottingham Plans are monitored through the Neighbourhood Action Team meetings.

Area Capital and Public Realm Funds – since the last Area 7 Committee in November 2015 a new TRO and timed parking zone has been implemented opposite the shops on Woodside Road to resolve parking issues and improve parking and access for disabled and elderly customers. Enforcement is in operation. Phases 2 is currently under consultation & Phase 3 of Woodside Road Parking scheme is being developed to reduce damage to the verges and help create off road parking which will help to transform this major City Gateway route. A survey completed by residents and a large turnout to the community consultation event on 17th November has informed decisions about a pilot Residential Parking Zone schemes in the Charles Avenue area. This and other Traffic Safety measures are currently being considered.

Issues:

The Experimental Traffic Restriction Order (TRO) in Lenton Abbey has now been fully implemented. We are currently monitoring emerging parking issues in Lenton Abbey. The 1st Phase of works have been completed on Woodside Road. Phases 2 & 3 of Woodside Road Parking scheme have been developed influencing and complementing designs and plans for the Cycle Ambition Western Cycle Corridor on Woodside Road. Formal Consultation of the University Boulevard and Woodside Road Phases of the Western Cycle Corridor was undertaken online between 23rd November and 13th December with 2 Community Consultation events on Monday 30th November 2015 at Sheila Roper Community Centre.

Cycle theft has decreased on the University of Nottingham campuses over the last 6 months with the Police and Sustrans working closely with University security staff. Although dwelling burglary has increased in August and December, there has been a decrease from April 2015 in comparison to 2014 Year to Date. In response WELA NDO in partnership with Nottinghamshire Police, WELA Ward Councillors and Crime and Drug Partnership have developed a Crime Prevention Target Hardening Project which has continued to be rolled out from March 2015 to WELA's most vulnerable residents. On both issues the Neighbourhood Police Beat Team have responded with swift action and successful local operations resulting in arrests and suspects being charged.

Events:

During this quarter a range of events and meetings have and are due to take place including TRA's and Local Action Group (LAG) meetings, Sheila Roper Community Centre Management Committee, LAFFDA (planning for Lenton Abbey Fun Day), Community Meetings, Wollaton Park Resident Association local issues meetings. Working in partnership with TRA's and NCH there will be some development work to increase resident and tenant involvement in local groups to enable continued participation and representation following the change in Tenant Panels.

The NAT (Neighbourhood Action Team) which has representation of various key service providers across the Ward are currently delivering on the revised and refreshed Ward Priorities. There has been strong partnership working on the Allotment Action Plan led by Neighbourhood Services NDO, working with Allotment Services, NCH, Community Protection and City Services on patch operations on clearing allotment sites, to reduce ASB and enforcement of Allotment Hiring Agreements which have brought some allotment sites back into use and back into cultivation. We have extended this positive partnership to bring other overgrown 'no man's land' green sites into cultivation by local residents. We are still working closely with the HMO Team on the additional HMO registration in Wollaton Park estate which should improve contact with HMO landlords. Partnerships have been further strengthened with Stonewater Housing Association, addressing resident issues and ASB impacts and Sheila Roper Community Centre.

Ward: Wollaton West NDO: Lylse-Anne Renwick

Crime: Crime in the Wollaton West Ward is continuing to fall. Antisocial behaviour and criminal damage are causing some concern. The NAT team are working diligently to resolve these issues, e.g. Police car patrol in the area, CPO vigilance in the area, NAT team delivering letters to residents, visual Police Beat Officer patrol, and Councillors Ward Walks in the identified areas.

Cleanliness -in the ward has decreased slightly in November to 86% which is same as the 'neighbourhood as clean as the city centre' benchmark target of 86%. Graffiti with has increased 7 incidents compared to 2 incidents in October and 0 in both August and September. We have been encountering a rise in graffiti in the last two months on the Grangewood Estate. Dog fouling – we continue to see a decrease in dog fouling in the ward, no reported incidents in September, October and November 2015.

Fire: - The ward continues to see a decrease in deliberate fires, there was no deliberate fires reported since May 2015.

ASB: - ASB incidents in the ward are beginning to rise again, 13 reported incidents in November and 14 reported incidents in December 2015. The NAT team are working on solutions to combat this issue.

Fly-tipping: - There were only three separate reported fly-tipping incidents in the ward in the last four months a total of 12 incidents which is a decrease from the previous months. The NAT team have been diligent and are monitoring and taking action when necessary.

Unemployment Rate: The ward continues to see a decrease of unemployment. There were 107 unemployed citizens in September, a slight increase of 115 in October and 105 in November.

Key Successes:

Wollaton West Christmas Lights Celebration -

Last December saw even more participation at the Bramcote Lane Christmas Lights Switch On, one of the best Wollaton West Christmas Light Celebrations to date, more people attended the event and thoroughly enjoyed themselves. We even had requests to close the street for the celebration which is not feasible. This just highlights citizen opinion of their delight with the celebration event. The Bramcote Lane Retailers contribution this year was exceptional. Coates the butchers again donated free BBQ on the night and Sharps the florist contributed soup, rolls and jacket potatoes. The Nottingham Building Society donated a pair of tickets for a Nottingham Forest home game, Sainsbury's on Bramcote Lane again donated the mince pies together with Christmas cakes for the tombola, Marks & Spencer, Wollaton Vale the new shop in the ward donated a lovely bottle of wine and a tin of shortbread. All the other retailers contributed generously to the event. The money raised this year by the charity tombola went to the Wollaton Youth Cafe.

Citizens again came from as far afield as Browtow, Basford, Beeston and Bulwell to attend the event. The contribution from all our partners, e.g. Police, Parking Enforcement, Fernwood Primary & Nursery School, Kingswood Church, St Leonard's and Grangewood Methodist Churches were exemplary. A young Wollaton West resident also volunteered her time at the event, her support with the event was greatly appreciate by the team. The children and the churches choirs together with the public voices were in lovely harmony and the Christmas songs made the event magical.

Wollaton West Youth Café Christmas Party – On Saturday 19th December 45 young people and their families attended the Wollaton Youth Café Christmas Party and enjoying hot dogs, pizza and other festive food. In addition to the regular Youth Club activities such as table tennis, pool and Wii games there were also quizzes to keep the adults interested.

Although an admission charge was not requested, donations were invited. The donations raised were £37.50 on the night which was added to the £53.00 raised from admissions during the second half of the Autumn Term of the Youth Cafe. This enabled the volunteers and young people to make a donation of £90.50 on behalf of Wollaton Youth Café to Samaritan's Purse Christmas Child Appeal.

The event was a great success for the young people, their families and the volunteers.

Issues:

Antisocial behaviour on the Grangewood Estate and Torvill Drive is a concern at the moment therefore the Neighbourhood Development Officer together with Places for People, Housing Officer and the Police are looking at initiatives to resolve the problems.

The untidy shop front (The Little Carpet Shop) on Wollaton Road had continued to cause a problem for other businesses and citizens. The Enforcement team had written to the company requesting the clearance of the rubbish but the company did not adhere to the request. The Enforcement team took action and issued a warning to the company, stating that failure to adhere to the warning would result in a fine. The company have now cleared the area and the NAT team are continuing to monitor the situation.

Events: A range of meetings and events have taken place this quarter including, Wollaton West Community Association Meetings, Friends of Wollaton Park Group Meeting, Local Area Group meetings, NAT meetings and Wollaton West Youth Café. The NAT group also carried out a few targeted themed works in the ward.

NAT's(Neighbourhood Action Team): - The team represents various key services provides who meet to look at current issues across the ward. The team are working together on agreed ward priorities set by residents as well as the day to day issues that arise in the ward. The NAT team are at present jointly working to resolve issues across the ward. The key Issues are antisocial behaviour issues, inconsiderate parking on the grass verges on Wollaton Vale and criminal damage.



Introduction

- The WELA ward has a growing diverse community in Lenton Abbey with 74% white British and 6% other white some of whom have English as another language and others of mixed heritage, Black British and Caribbean and Asian origin. The 2012 Insight and 2010 ONS statistics are slightly skewed by the transient student population mainly studying at University of Nottingham.
 - Wollaton Park estate has a hidden community of disabled children, young people and older adults and due to caring responsibilities have pockets of fuel poverty.
 - In the top 10% nationally of SOA's for Crime and Disorder and Income Deprivation affecting children. However reported crime figures have generally fallen across the ward compared to the previous year.
 - Wollaton Park estate have seen a growing number of HMO's and are experiencing increasing problems with their landlords.
 - Ongoing car parking and traffic issues across the Ward





<u>Wollaton West</u> – Wollaton is a pleasant, residential area located in the suburb of Nottingham. Wollaton West has a total of 14,741 residents, 7,267 are male (49%) and 7,474 are female (50.7%). Within Wollaton West 8.4% of all adults smoke, this is the lowest within Nottingham City, 48% of all adults are estimated to be overweight/obese which is marginally higher than the City average but not significantly so.

Life expectancy for males is 83.1 years which is significantly higher than the national figure and life expectancy for females is 88.6 years which is significantly higher than the national figure. Wollaton West is ranked as the 5,026th most deprived out of England 7,589 wards and the least deprived in the City. It has some of the most desirable housing in the city. Key spots in the area are Wollaton Hall and Park, together with Martin's Pond, Harrison's Plantation and Rageigh Pond (local nature reserves).

<u>Wollaton Village</u> still retains a village type atmosphere, with its tree lined roads and a handful of local shops. Although part of the City of Nottingham, Wollaton Hall and the deer park create the illusion that the village is away from urban living.

BUSINESS ENTERPRISE

There are a small number of small and medium enterprises (SME's), particularly around Bramcote Lane, Crown Island. Bramcote Lane shops offer a reasonable variety whilst Crown Island shops are somewhat more limited.

<u>HOUSING</u> – Wollaton West has higher house prices than other wards within the City. The area is largely owner occupied. Wollaton West has a higher percentage of older people (65+). These residents account for 20.1% of the ward population.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities
- 1.2 As part of the budget approved in March 2011, Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million Citywide between 2011 -2013. As part of the budget approved at Full Council on 4th March 2013 Nottingham City Council approved an LTP capital allocation of £2.5 million Citywide between 2013 -2015. In addition for 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 a Public Realm General Fund has been approved of £750,000 Citywide.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of "Transforming Neighbourhoods" the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programmed have included footpath, fence, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council General Fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programme of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
