5 <u>MINUTES</u>

Subject to removing the repetition of Councillor Glyn Jenkins name from the attendance list, the minutes of the last meeting were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

6 WARD REPORTS

Rob Gabbitas, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented an update on performance, events, priorities and activities within each ward. There were a number of questions and comments from the Committee:

- Groundworks have won the contract for the lead organisation for the area. There will be an insistence that they analyse where the gaps are, how those gaps can be filled effectively, and how they can do better at getting people into work;
- (b) there is insufficient accountability for lead organisations at the moment. Ward Councillors and Area Committees have a role to play in holding lead organisations to account. Lead organisations should be required to report to Area Committees on a regular basis;
- (c) there was a request from Councillors for the new format of ward reports to contain more detailed information on those activities which fit with previously agreed ward priorities, including a work plan and monitoring of progress towards achieving ward objectives;
- (d) the Dementia Awareness day on page 26 of the agenda will be taking place on 19 May, from 9am till 12 noon at the Co-op, in conjunction with Sharan Jones (Health and Wellbeing Manager, Public Health, Nottingham City Council) and Age UK;
- (e) Southwold Primary school's community day on page 34 of the agenda will be held on 29 June, with the aim of engaging more widely with the community. It will have a food festival format.

- (2) add a standing item to future West Area Committee agendas to receive performance updates from the lead organisation;
- (3) add further information to future ward reports regarding progress against ward priorities.

7 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES REPORT

Elira Mano, Tenancy and Estate Manager at Nottingham City Homes, presented an update on Nottingham City Homes performance and environmental schemes. There were a number of comments and queries from the Committee:

- (a) some work has been done on the external finish to "Whimpey no-fine" properties in Bilborough and other areas. Some BISF (British Iron and Steel Federation) style homes still require cladding, and discussion regarding the most cost-effective solutions. Elira will ask Capital programmes and Major Works to look into this and provide more information to Councillors;
- (b) in some areas of the City private home owners have been offered the cladding at a discount. Councillors and citizens have been asking for this offer to be extended to Bilborough for some time. Unfortunately, the scheme was on a phased rollout to different areas of the city at different times, and central government funding for the scheme has now been cut, so the scheme has been frozen. A letter has been circulated advising affected private home owners and apologising, Councillor Chapman will provide a copy of this letter to all West Area Councillors. There is a worry that there will be resentment that Council tenants are receiving this offer, so it needs to be made clear wherever possible that the scheme is being funded from Council tenants' rents;
- (c) a mediation service was introduced last year to try to help tackle anti-social behaviour. This has been very positively received so far;
- (d) tenancy visits take place every 3 years, to help to identify vulnerable tenants who may have fallen through the cracks of the support network. Other events which trigger a tenancy visit include high rent arrears, and high cost of repairs or recharges;
- (e) the Joint Service Centre in Strelley has experienced significant delays, and a construction firm has now been appointed;
- (f) Councillors requested updates on Leen Valley insulation schemes and wall schemes in Aspley. Updates will be provided to Councillors.

Appendix 1

The Selection of Representatives and Committee Working

Introduction

Area Committees were introduced with the aim of encouraging greater participation by local people in decision-making and improving service delivery.

The terms of reference for Area Committees gives them important responsibilities which impact on the involvement of Area Committee Community Representatives. This document outlines these terms of reference and sets out the criteria for the selection of Community Representatives and the process for their selection. The Area Committee generally meets bi-monthly although meeting may be called at other times as the need arises.

The Criteria and Process for Selection of Area Committee Community Representatives

An Area Committee Community Representative must be a member of an active community group that currently operates in the area in question.

Organisations that wish to be appointed to an Area Committee must be properly constituted (i.e. have a constitution/terms of reference, have regular meetings, and operate an Equal Opportunities Policy) and actively engaged in working with and for the community.

Community Group Representatives <u>should</u> live in the area in question and agree to abide by the criteria set out in the document "The Role of an Area Committee Community Representative". Those representing citywide organisations are not required to meet the area residency test.

The Community Group that nominates a representative to the Area Committee should have a defined area in which they operate, a purpose and established networks and appropriate processes for passing information between the Committee and the population that they represent.

Representatives will be <u>selected and appointed each civic year in May</u> and will have the opportunity to remain as representatives for successive years without having to seek renomination subject to confirmation that they meet the criteria set out in the document "The Role of an Area Committee Community Representative".

One nomination per group will be accepted for a Committee at any given time. Any person from that group may attend a Committee meeting as a temporary substitute for the appointed representative <u>providing they meet the above requirements.</u>

Any member of the public or another member(s) of a group may attend the Committee meeting as an observer but will not have a right to speak at the Committee

Committee Working

This part explains the role of the persons at the Committee.

The Chairman of the Committee controls the meeting and will be supported by other Committee Members, the Neighbourhood Manager, the Committee Administrator and Appointed Community Representatives or their substitutes. Only City Councillors and Appointed Community Representatives or their substitutes may vote at the Committee but only councillors may vote on financial items.

Other persons at the meeting will normally include City Council Officers who have reports before the Committee and invited guests or members of the public. Persons who have right to speak at the Committee by invitation of the Chairman include other Councillors, Appointed Community Representatives or their substitutes, the Area Manager, the Committee Administrator and Officers of the City Council who have a report on the agenda before the Committee. The public do not normally have a right to speak at the Committee but may be invited to speak by the Chairman.

Area Committee Community Representatives

- 1. Community Representatives are entitled to speak on any item on the agenda or any matter put forward by the Group they represent at the Committee Chairman's invitation.
- 2. Normally the Area Committee agenda will contain an item for Community Representatives to highlight issues affecting the community their organisation represents.
- 3. Community Representatives will be entitled to claim reasonable expenses for travelling and care costs related to attending Committee meetings subject to making receipts available.
- 4. Community Representatives may submit items for inclusion on the Area Committee agenda and should do so through the Neighbourhood Management Team at least two weeks before the meeting, or at the meeting with the agreement of the Chairman.
- 5. Community Representatives will be offered City Council training and development relevant to their role and responsibilities in relation to Area Committee and Community Representative working.
- 6. By prior agreement with the Committee Chairman, Community Representatives may make formal presentations to the Committee on community projects or initiatives relevant to the Area that their Group is sponsoring.
- 7. If a Representative is deemed to persistently not abide with the role of an Area Committee Community Representative or with the Corporate Policies of Nottingham City Council, or they leave the organisation that nominated them or the nominating organisation ceases to operate, s/he will be required to resign their position as Community Representative on the Area Committee. If the Group is still active it may nominate another Representative from its membership to the Committee.

- 8. Councillors may choose to invite representatives from other organisations outside their geographical area in order to widen participation from under-represented groups.
- Councillors will allocate a budget for the reimbursement of expenses incurred by Community Representatives in attending Committee-related business. Reimbursements are administered by the Neighbourhood Management Team.
- 10. Community Representatives may by prior appointment meet with the Area Manager prior to a Committee meeting to discuss the agenda or other items of concern.
- 11. Whilst the Council has an expectation that a Community Representative will regularly attend Committee meetings it equally recognises that representatives may have to miss occasional meetings and will allowed for a nominated proxy from the nominating Group to cover periods of absence.
- 12. Community Representatives must carry out their role with respect and tolerance to the views of others expressed at the Area Committee. If the Community Representative is found to bring the Area Committee or the Community Representative role into disrepute, s/he may be removed from membership of the Area Committee.

The Recruitment and Selection Process

- Each year Councillors must determine the number of Community Representatives that they wish to represent the community on the Area Committee. This may be based on a set number of places per ward or according to specific priorities or issues in the area. Representation should take account of the diversity of the population resident in the area. Where under-representation exists, city wide groups may be approached for representation on the Committee.
- Each year the Neighbourhood Management team will issue nomination forms to known community organisations operating in the area, inviting them to nominate a representative from their organisation to be an Area Committee Community Representative.
- <u>Area Co-ordinators will assess completed nomination forms to ensure that the selection criteria is met and will produce a report for area committee detailing nominations received.</u>
- Councillors will decide which of the nominations should be selected for community group representation at area committee meetings, taking into account the population make up of the area or specific issues/priorities in the area.
- Newly appointed Community Representatives will be invited to participate in Induction training as well as occasional area tours/ward walks.
- A review will take place each civic year (by Councillors advised by officers) to determine what groups are the most appropriate to be represented on the Area Committee
- Where Community Representative Nominations are not accepted, a letter explaining why will be signed by the Chair and sent to the nominating organisation, together with details of other opportunities for getting involved in area working.

The Council subsequently became responsible for improving the health of their local population including health improvement, health protection and the commissioning of public health services.
- 1.2 Councillors are directly involved with their local communities and able to understand and identify the needs for health and wellbeing services specific to the local population.

- 1.3 Over the past 18 months, Councillors have had a series of meetings with public health and commissioning colleagues to consider local health data and experiences of local residents in order to support the planning and provision for local health and wellbeing services commissioned by the Council.
- 1.4 This report is an update of the work to date, including the engagement and information provided by Area Committee members on the remodelling of the healthy lifestyles public health services. Committee members are invited to consider the work so far and advise on next steps.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Local health profiles were developed by the Public Health team using nationally available data to better understand the health and wellbeing needs of local residents. The data was arranged at Nottingham Ward level to enable commissioners and Councillors to have a clearer picture of the health and wellbeing needs for their ward compared to Nottingham overall and to wards across England. Councillors from each of the Nottingham City wards met to discuss the data profiles and to add further insight that would enable a greater understanding of local need.
- 2.2 School health and area committee level health profiles were also produced to aid local understanding and planning. Public health services were mapped and included within directories for each area; these were presented to Area Committees during 2015.
- 2.3 Area Chairs as part of their Area Cluster Review process invited Public Health to present the health profiles and local health priorities. It was identified that further awareness and understanding of the commissioning process for public health and health services would be useful in a separate session.

- 2.5 The commissioning awareness session was well attended by Area Chairs and Councillors and received good feedback and requests for further sessions that were more topic focused such as teenage pregnancy, smoking and mental health in young people. Part of the session included an overview of the modelling and engagement of a live commissioning review. Councillors agreed to contribute to the live review through a series of questions discussed with their respective Area Committees. The responses to the consultation and an overview of how the results from the consultation have been considered are included in the appendices to this report.

- 2.7 Some of the key benefits for engaging with Area Committees becoming involved in this way include:
 - Increasing efficiency, saved officer time in undertaking community based questions with citizens
 - Improved quality, hearing from a wide and diverse range of stakeholders

- Increased effectiveness, supporting evidence of services being developed to meet the needs of citizens
- 2.8 The feedback from the Area Committees has informed the development of the service specifications. The new model will be going out to tender in the autumn with the new model and services to be in place by April 2017.
- 2.9 Possible Next Steps
 - Possibility of linking Area Committee priorities with up and coming strategic commissioning reviews, e.g. List of Area Committee priorities to aid commissioner to make the link to up and coming commissioning reviews.
 - Consider what would be the most effective and efficient way of communicating to Area Committees Public Health updates and key information.

Area Cluster Feedback, Adults Healthy Lifestyles New Model.

July, 2016.

From April 2017 a new Adults Healthy Lifestyles model will be in operation in Nottingham City, below are the responses from Area Clusters gathered to help inform and shape the specification of the new model.

• Ensure services are targeted at those who need them, delivering the right services to the right people that are culturally appropriate, are inclusive and bespoke to meet community needs.

The new behaviour change and weight management service will sit within a newly created pathway, this will allow for citizens to benefit from universally available services, targeted services and higher more intense services for those with more complex needs, allowing citizens to flex between the different interventions to meet their needs through the process of change. The smoking cessation service will require the new provider to deliver a creative and innovative approach to addressing community needs. See appendix two.

• We need to deliver services in places people feel comfortable going such as community centres and be delivered at time that suit citizens.

The new services will be required to be accessible out of core office times to meet the needs for those with work and childcare commitments. We will stipulate in the contracts the need for the new provider to deliver services (where financially viable) in community centres and leisure centres.

• We should consider utilising GP and prescribing services to offer services on prescription and joint working with other agencies to tackle health concerns.

GPs can already refer into Adults Healthy Lifestyles services and this will continue with the new provider, the new services will be commissioned as part of a pathway with the Clinical Commissioning Group to more intense services and with Sport and Leisure for more universal services. The social prescription pilot in Bulwell, Bulwell Forest and Clifton will continue to prescribe to healthy lifestyles services and if scaled up across the city, this will continue to feature.

Communications methods to utilise and make best possible use of digital media, health
message should be promoted where people go for example supermarkets. We should
consider the role of the workforce as agents of change in promoting health messages and
consider getting health messages directly in to citizens and community groups through
accessible and inclusive communications about what's available locally.

A new integrated Health and Social Care directory of services will be available by the end of the year; this will enable easier access to all services available to Nottingham Citizens and help support the workforce in signposting citizens. The new provider will be expected to maximise the use of digital technologies where appropriate. • Delivery of preventative services such as Health, and these to be promoted to increase uptake of early intervention opportunities.

We will be pilot third party health checks as part of the new Adults Healthy Lifestyles model.

• Services need to be affordable activities and we need to maximise the use of leisure centre access and use of public open spaces – parks.

NCC Sport and Leisure management are part of the steering group for the development of the new model, and we are working collaboratively to deliver and inform citizens of free activity services in the City. All the targeted and specialist Adults Healthy Lifestyles activities will be free at the point of access.

• Consider how we can get the` conversation going` about health in the community and look at how we can maximise community capacity in communities to help each other.

This is a priority action in the Draft Health and Well Being Strategy for Nottingham City (Outcome 4: Nottingham's environment will be sustainable - supporting and enabling its citizens to have good health and wellbeing).ⁱ

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) Strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 The Area Capital Fund allocation was approved at the Executive Board on 23 February 2016 which confirmed the following sums:-
 - Local Transport Plan element: £1,250,000.
 - General Fund element (Public Realm): £750,000

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment around local neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve their quality of life. Since established in 2006 this fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Each ward manages a set of priorities and key issues through regular meetings of its Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT). These meetings are led by Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs) and supported by core partners including Nottingham City Homes (NCH), Neighbourhood Policing, Community Protection, Early Help, City Services / Waste Management; Fire and Rescue Services and Health.
- 1.2 Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.

- 1.3 Ward priorities are identified and informed from a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 1.4 The list of events and activities will take account of the work which all NDOs undertake with partner organisations within their ward and shows the depth of activity in place working alongside neighbourhood management to improve social cohesion and tackle priorities at a ward and area level.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Aspley, Bilborough and Leen Valley Wards sit within the West Area Committee which initially adopted three area based priorities jobs and training, Glaisdale Industrial Park and Health. A fourth priority, Community Safety, has now been included.
- 2.2 These priorities demonstrate a link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015 - 19. Actions for each priority will be developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships. The Area priorities were reported to the last West Area Committee on 2 March 2016 and will be updated at each area committee.
- 2.3 The area priorities listed in 2.1 sit within wider pieces of work which are addressed by a multi agency approach across the City. At a Ward level it is important to identify how some of these more complex priorities can be developed locally level, either ward or area, by introducing local solutions. This could, for example, include more targeted use of funding such as Ward Councillor budgets to support healthy eating initiatives or the use of Area Capital funding to develop an outdoor gym facility.
- 2.4 The current Ward priorities which have been reported previously through the area committee performance reports are shown in the separate appendices for each ward. These priorities will be updated for each area committee, taking into account discussions at NAT meetings and various groups and activities involving Councillors and local residents.
