41 OAKFORD CLOSE: STOPPING UP FOOTPATH

David Baillie, Regeneration Officer, introduced the report detailing the extinguishment of highway rights over carriageway, footway and footpaths at Oakford Close to enable the development of new Council housing to go ahead.

- (2) that the proposed order was published by the Secretary of State, the public consultation began on 6 October 2016 and ended on 2 November 2016, with no objections received. The order was made on 16 November 2016 and the High Court challenge period ended on 28 December 2016, with no challenges submitted.

42 NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING: CURRENT PRIORITIES

No representatives from the Police were in attendance so this item could not be considered.

43 COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES UPDATE

Christine Willetts, Nottingham Tartanaires/Aspley Partnership, informed the Committee that the refurbishment of the Minver Crescent Sports Centre is underway, and that the Centre is now being used to capacity. A Tea Dance was held on Friday 10 February and the pupils from Ambleside Primary School visited to read with those that attended, and presented each of them with a rose and Valentine's Day card.

Nigel Brice, New Whitemoor Tenants and Residents Association, informed the Committee that Naburn Court social club is very successful and has nearly 40 members. Each member pays a subscription which goes towards events such as afternoon tea and day trips.

44 PROPOSAL FOR A SCHEME OF SELECTIVE LICENSING FOR PRIVATELY RENTED HOUSES

Ceri Davies, Housing Strategy Specialist, and Aran Hennessy, Principal Environmental Health Officer, introduced the report detailing the proposal to introduce a selective licensing scheme for privately rented houses, for the purpose of gaining the views of the Committee as part of the consultation, which runs from January to March 2017.

Ceri presented the Committee with the following information:

- it is a key priority to introduce a city wide selective licensing scheme to improve the private rented sector;
- (b) there are strict criteria to comply with and conditions needed for a scheme to be implemented, and now that a firm proposal has been developed, consultation is taking place before the scheme is submitted to the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) for approval later in the year;
- (c) the Housing Act 2004 introduced mandatory and discretionary licensing. Mandatory licensing covers large houses in multiple occupation (HMOs), and discretionary licensing covers additional licensing of smaller HMOs, and selective licensing. An additional licensing scheme for smaller HMOs was adopted in January 2014 and covers 3,000 properties. The proposal for the selective licensing scheme will potentially cover the majority of the remainder of the private rented sector not covered by the other schemes;
- (d) the aim of selective licensing is to:
 - help tackle problems identified in the private rented sector such as antisocial behaviour, crime, deprivation and poor property conditions;
 - improve living conditions for tenants and the surrounding community;
 - drive up standards amongst landlords and tackle rogue landlords;
 - work with landlords and tenants to provide positive advice and assistance;

- (e) if the selective licensing proposal is successful, it will apply to the vast majority of Nottingham's 43,000 private rented sector properties, and will run in parallel with the existing additional licensing scheme which covers HMOs or shared properties;
- (f) the wards covered by the West Area Committee do not currently have a high concentration of private rented sector properties, but there is potential for more properties to move into the private rented sector, and the areas are included in the whole city designation as they meet the criteria relating to anti-social behaviour.

In response to questions from the Committee, Ceri and Aran provided the following additional information:

- (g) if the scheme is approved and landlords don't sign up it will be classed as a criminal offence. Non-compliance will be dealt with through civil enforcement, but the Government are currently consulting on whether it could result in imprisonment;
- (h) the resources needed to manage the scheme are part of the decision that will need to be taken if it is approved, but it should pay for itself;
- (i) the scheme will apply to all landlords, regardless of how many houses they have, and they will be required to have a licence per house;
- (j) the Environmental Health and Community Protection teams already have powers in place to protect tenants from eviction if they complain about their landlords, as if a landlord is served with an improvement notice they can't end the tenancy for at least 6 months;
- (k) the indicative fee for a licence is £600 for 5 years to be paid upfront, but there will be a discount for those landlords that are signed up to the accreditation scheme;
- (I) it is likely that the Government will introduce Fixed Penalty Notices for noncompliance, which the Community Protection Team already have the power to issue:
- (m) there is a danger that landlords will pass the charges to tenants, but it is important to improve standards and most tenants are supportive of the scheme. £600 for 5 years isn't considered a large fee and there is no evidence to show that the introduction of additional licensing for HMOs has increased rents;
- it is unlikely that the scheme will increase homelessness as the likelihood of non-compliance is low;
- (o) training and advice will be offered to landlords to help them achieve the required standards;
- (p) the scheme will be heavily scrutinised by the DCLG and can be rejected;

(q) marketing will ensure that tenants are aware of the scheme, and will help ensure compliance.

The Committee made the following comments:

- (r) the concept is welcomed, provided the Council has the resources to deliver the scheme;
- it is important to ensure the scheme doesn't have a detrimental impact on vulnerable adults;
- (t) it is also important to ensure that tenants are aware of the scheme and are given an information pack on what standards should be in their property, and how to complain if there are problems;
- (u) the scheme will help protect tenants and improve standards.

RESOLVED to

- note the contents of the report;
- (2) request that the views of the Committee expressed above are taken into account in the consultation process;
- (3) ask partners to actively contribute to the consultation process.

James Tilford, Park Development Officer, introduced the report outlining the proposals for the spend of the following Section 106 funding:

46 <u>UPDATE FROM LEAD ORGANISATION</u>

Steve Burch, Groundwork Greater Nottingham, introduced his report, an updated copy of which was circulated before the meeting, detailing the performance of the Lead Organisation up to the end of Quarter 3, and highlighted the following points:

Targeted and Diversionary Youth:

- (a) work is being done to ensure there is provision in the south of Bilborough, and Switch Up have been commissioned to work out of the Birchover Community Centre until March;
- (b) work is taking place on the Ainsley Estate in Leen Valley through A Place 2 Be Me;
- (c) there have been complaints of young people gathering outside Asda, and the perception of anti-social behaviour because of this, so Strelley Community Centre have been commissioned to work out of the Hope Centre to try and address the perceived issues;

Employment and Skills Provision:

- (d) level 2 training is below target due to the lack of funding for the 30+ age group;
- the 240 people accessing work clubs are different people, rather than the same people repeatedly attending;
- (f) the eligibility criteria for traineeships makes them difficult to access and this is being challenged;

(g) there has been a growth in the number of non-claimants of benefits, which is a concern as it has an impact on their income level and skill development;

Support for Older People Provision:

(h) all targets are being met apart from the activities, but this is due to a loss in resources;

Community Centres:

- (i) the Lead Organisation is still waiting for returns from some Community Centres;
- (j) previous issues with governance still remain.

The Committee expressed concern with the perceived anti-social behaviour at Asda, as it is felt that it could be used as a beneficial community hub, and agreed that the Chair would write to them to arrange for a discussion on establishing community links in the area.

RESOLVED to

- (1) note the information provided;
- (2) write to Asda to arrange for a discussion on establishing community links in the area.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Alastair Glenn has been in post as a Green Space Activation Ranger, principally covering Broxtowe Country Park, for almost one year. This report summarises the work carried out so far and is a reflection of the progress, obstacles and more importantly solutions needed to get the best from the site and its surrounding communities.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 Schools

Between October 2016 and April 2017, the Ranger has worked at the park with 1,134 pupils from local schools including Glenbrook, Horsendale, Bluecoat academy and in particular the local primary, Djanogoly Strelley Academy.

2.2 Other Activities

Each school holiday Alastair puts on drop-in activity sessions on the park including: Den building, bug hunting, outdoor games, scavenger hunts and woodworking.

At certain times of year he provides activities such as nest box making, Christmas crafts and bat walks. All open to everybody and free of cost. After the initial disappointment of low numbers, attendance is improving with each event.

The Ranger also supported big summer events at Broxtowe Country Park and Woodfield Road Park and other organisations events such as World food day at the local church and an upcoming annual Easter celebration.

He has also built relationships with the local Reverend who runs a community group and the Bilborough Youth Network, Think Forward, and Broxtowe Children's centre, helping to deliver outdoor youth play sessions.

Weekly Forest School sessions take place for an increasing group of local home educated families, and after consulting local teenagers a weekly bush craft club has started.

Appendix 1 shows example activity posters and photos.

2.3 Melbourne Park

Alastair also works at Melbourne Park and meets monthly with the newly formed Friends Group and on volunteer sessions. This has provided further useful links into the local community.

2.4 Partnerships

Partnership working with Nottingham City Homes has taken place on issues such as fly-tipping and the new Fenton Road pocket park. Regular liaison takes place with the Police and local CPOs.

2.5 BMX Track

After lots of maintenance work on the BMX track Alastair will be starting weekly bike training sessions with Ridewise with a view to having a big BMX event in the summer, This will be a key area moving forward as the BMX track links in to exactly the age group (local teens) we need to engage with on the park. The sessions booked in for the summer will be the start of rebuilding the BMX track as a much well received resource.

Dr Bike is booked in for sessions and ParkLives funding is being utilised to have BMX events to promote the track.

2.6 Park Maintenance

The Ranger has instigated a lot of park maintenance and improvements, gradually improving the overall feel of the park. Much of this has been path clearance as this what most users have said they would like improving.

One example is a woodland area that was previously inaccessible but after clearing and working with groups a new path has been installed; this fits in well with volunteer group projects and has been received really well.

He has also worked with volunteer groups on tasks such as removing invasive plant species threatening the local biodiversity, woodland management and new path creation.

2.7 Challenges / Future Developments

The Ranger currently has no storage or welfare facilities on site and a key need is to establish some local storage and use of welfare facilities.

Fly-tipping, vandalism and anti-social behaviour (e.g. motorbikes on the park) continue to be a regular occurrence at the site, with newly planted trees pulled out of the ground straight away, for example.

Heavy duty noticeboards are being installed at site entrances to promote what goes on, both on and around the site.

- Positive feedback from families on the impact the stay, play and learn sessions have on their children's confidence and their own confidence to access services, as well as singing and reading with their child.
- The Aspley library session has good partnership; the library deliver singing and reading time in the session; encouraging early literacy and reading with an increase of the loaning of books from the library by families with children under 5.
- Sessions have good partnerships with FIS to promote the 2 year ELP.
- Comments from parents for the Stay, Play and Learn session at Aspley Children's Centre:
 - "I have learnt how to help my child learn and develop at home through what I have seen and learnt in this session"
 - "My child became more confident in his interaction with other children"

Progress stars and tracking:

- 24 completed progress stars for Stay Play and Learn at Aspley Library
- 21 completed progress stars for Aspley Childrens Centre Stay Play and Learn session
 - 15 children tracked for the two open access Stay Play and Learn groups
- Let's Get Moving session delivered Qtr 3 63 attendances All children's tracking scores improved throughout the session, the area being tracked was Physical Development. The average starting score of the children's tracking was 19.5 and the average end score was 21.7.
- Forest school tracked 9 children from Nursery setting. Feedback- staff noted significant difference in gross motor skills, being able to move outside on uneven ground. Nursery expressed that they would like to continue with this service as it has shown significant improvement in children's development holistically.

All programmes/sessions have some outcomes at the end of term (progress stars and children's development tracking) – where this was low this has been reinforced with individual staff members.

Workforce Development sessions are delivered monthly by the Early learning Specialist when the processes are reinforced with the staff team

Group evaluations:

- 4 families completed the Me and My Child programme; social care fed back that's a result of attending the programme, one family with 5 children came off their child protection plan and the case was closed to social care. Also, the school fed back that children's behaviour had improved, with parents managing behaviour better as a result of attending the course.
- 6 adults successfully completed the Volunteer (Getting Ready for Work)
 programme and 5 have been identified to undertake some volunteering in the children's centre.
- Stay, Play and Learn at Aspley CC was observed and received a 'Good' grading with some outstanding features with families positively feeding back about the benefits of the session. Learning journeys and WOW moments are completed by parents actively and are written in the child's voice.

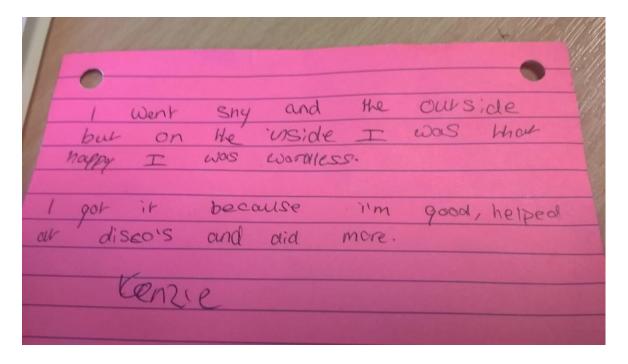
Christmas has brought out the good will in one young person at Bells Lane Youth session read on to hear more...

- 2.2 Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.
- 2.3 Ward priorities are identified and informed from a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 2.4 Ward reports also reflect some of the wider area concerns and priorities which have been either addressed previously through area committee or have been developed as part of the Area Cluster reviews. Some of these wider priorities such as health and employment will be taken forward through appropriate area focussed meetings.
- 2.5 The intention is to work towards a Ward Report which is consistent across all City wards. It will provide details of the pledges which Councillors have prioritised for their respective wards. Actions from the previous Area Committee Priorities Action Plan have been incorporated within the ward plans to avoid any duplication.
- 2.6 The ward priorities (Appendices 1 3) also make reference to a number of development sites which are listed within the Neighbourhood Regeneration Strategy document Building a Better Nottingham.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) Strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process for 2017/18 Nottingham City Council approved a Citywide Local Transport Plan capital allocation of £1.25 million.

- 2.1 The Area Capital Fund (ACF) Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council General Fund, the Local Transport Plan and the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started with strong community involvement and interest and altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee and particularly community representatives are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
