53 <u>MINUTES</u>

The minutes of the meeting held on 15 February 2017 were agreed as a true record and they were signed by the Chair.

54 COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES UPDATE

Christine Willetts, Nottingham Tartanaires/Aspley Partnership, thanked the Committee for its contribution to securing a new minibus. She also advised that the Tartanaires were available to attend local weekend events held on Saturdays, but had competitions and other commitments on Sundays.

55 POLICE UPDATE

Sergeant Ian Johnson, Nottinghamshire Police, provided an update on policing issues in West Area, highlighting the following issues:

- (a) Nottinghamshire Police is starting a round of recruitment, and the Area may temporarily lose a PCSO if they are successful in being appointed as a Police Officer;
- (b) Her Majesty Inspectorate of Constabulary has changed crime reporting procedures, making comparisons with historical data less easy. However, antisocial behaviour is down considerably in all 3 wards, in part as a result of good partnership and youth working;
- targeted interventions at Tenbury Crescent (letter drop) and Broxtowe Country Park (CCTV) have had positive outcomes, and officers will respond to local intelligence to disrupt anti-social activity through disrupting gathering points of those involved;
- (d) there is a an ongoing issue with the misuse of off-road bikes, but there is a difficulty in identifying individuals involved.

During discussion, it was explained that bikes bought by Area Committee on behalf of Nottinghamshire Police had been disposed of some years ago. It was also confirmed that there were no identified pattern to reported hate crime in West Area, and that monitoring was ongoing.

RESOLVED to note the update.

56 BROXTOWE COUNTRY PARK UPDATE

James Tilford, Park Development Officer and Alastair Glenn, Green Space Activation Ranger (GSAR), introduced a report and presentation on work at Broxtowe Country Park since Alastair's recruitment to his post in the summer of 2016, highlighting the following points:

 the GSAR has worked with over 1,100 pupils from local schools, including Glenbrook, Horsendale, Bluecoat Academy and Djanogly Strelley Academy, as well as working with local community and youth groups;

- (b) there has been a lot of effort in establishing and building a variety of volunteers groups, engaging with Experian an the Prince's Trust, among others, to support a volunteer network. A Melbourne Friends group is established, and a Friends group for the Country Park is in progress;
- a wide range of activities in addition to core summer events have been delivered, including den-building, bat walks, scavenger hunts, bird box making, cook-outs and lantern making. Upcoming events include dog agility, Parkour and the possibility of bike trails and exercise equipment;
- (d) motorbike misuse, fly-tipping and vandalism remain significant issues for the Park, and will require significant and ongoing input by a range of partners to improve matters.

The Committee commended Mr Glenn for his very positive impact during his first year in post, and especially welcomed the expansion of the 'offer' at the Country Park and other open spaces in West Area.

RESOLVED to note the report and presentation, and to thank Mr Tilford and Mr Glenn for their attendance.

58 NOTTINGHAM CITY HOMES

Kristian Murden, Tenancy and Estates Manager, Nottingham City Homes, introduced a report of the Chief Executive, Nottingham City Homes, requesting approval for Area Capital funding, and providing updates on the following key themes:

- Capital programme and major work;
- Area regeneration and environmental issues;
- Key messages from the Tenant and Leasehold Congress;
- Tenant and Residents Associations updates;
- Area performance; and
- Good news stories and positive publicity.

The following issues were raised during discussion:

- (a) Mr Murden undertook to provide information on procedures for 'sell-back' of homes to the City Council, though he advised that historically NCH tended to value at less than the value on the open market;
- (b) Mr Murden explained that demand for independent living schemes ebbed and flowed, meaning that it was not always possible to meet void re-let times for this type of property;

(c) several councillors expressed concern that the current NCH tenancy office presence on Harvey Road was under-advertised and difficult to get to on public transport from other parts of West Area, especially for the elderly. The Chair undertook to contact Mr Nick Murphy, NCH Chief Executive, about the issue.

THE ROLE OF AN AREA COMMITTEE COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVE

THE ROLE OF AN AREA COMMITTEE COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVE

- You will be encouraged to act as an ambassador for the Area Committee to help to raise the profile of the work done by the Area Committee.
- You should attend all Area Committee meetings, events, training etc. wherever possible.
- If you cannot attend the meetings try to find someone who will cover for you.
- You should represent the views of residents and of your group or community who live and work in the area.
- All business representatives should have business premises within the area.
- You will be encouraged and entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings.
- Events and training will be held for you to give you the confidence and knowledge to be actively involved within the Area Committee. We will ask you what training and events you would like.
- You will be invited to put forward items for discussion at the Area Committee meetings. You will need to do this at least 3 weeks before the date of the meeting.
- You will be encouraged to tell us when things are not running well.
- You will find it much easier to fulfil your role if you have read the reports before the meeting and, if possible, had a chance to discuss the report with your community group. Everyone will benefit from this as it allows the community representatives to play a much more active role and makes for a more effective and informed contribution to discussions and debate.
- Most importantly, any relevant information should be passed back to your community group to any local friends, neighbours or colleagues. None of the information made available during the meetings are secret or confidential.
- One of the biggest challenges for the Area Committee is to keep people informed. Your agreement to pass on information, display and distribute any publicity material in community venues and promote involvement in the work of the Area Committee and to take an active role in local community consultations is appreciated.

NORTH LOCALITY - COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES: THE CRITERIA AND PROCESS FOR SELECTION INTRODUCTION

• Encouraging greater participation in service delivery and decision making was one of the main reasons for establishing Area Committees in 1995.

• The new terms of reference give Area Committees more responsibilities which in turn will have an impact on the involvement of local representatives.

THE CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

- Community or Voluntary organisations that wish to be represented on Area Committees will be properly constituted (i.e. have a constitution/terms of reference, have regular meetings, and operate an Equal Opportunities Policy)
- All community group representatives (except those representing citywide organisations), should live in the area and seek to represent the views of their group(s) or community organisation and not individual viewpoints.
- Community Group representatives will have established networks / systems for passing information to the Area Committee from groups that they represent, citizens that they aim to serve within their area and likewise feedback information from the Area Committee.
- Representatives will be selected each civic year (normally in May), only one nomination per group will be accepted by the Area Committee at any given time. Any person from the group can attend Area Committee meetings although only the nominated community representative will be allowed to speak. If the community representative is unable to attend a meeting, the group can nominate an individual to speak on behalf of the community representative for the group.
- Any member of the public may have the right to attend Area Committee meetings as an observer.

POWERS OF COMMUNITY GROUP REPRESENTATIVES

- Community Group Representatives are entitled to speak on all items discussed at Area Committee meetings and can 'influence' the decisions (but cannot vote on any matter) being made by the area committee.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to claim expenses for travelling and care costs related to attending Area Committee meetings.
- Community Group representatives will be able to submit items for inclusion on the Area Committee agenda at least three weeks before the meeting or in advance of the meeting with the agreement of the Chair.
- Community Group representatives will be entitled to attend specific events and training across the city in order to carry out their role and responsibilities in relation to Area Committee/Working.
- Community Group Representatives can make formal presentations at Area Committee meetings on community projects/initiatives with the prior agreement of the Chair.

POWERS OF COUNCILLORS IN RELATION TO COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT IN AREA COMMITTEES

- Only Councillors can vote on all matters in respect of the Area Committee.
- If a representative fails to attend committee meetings consistently without good reason, the Area Committee may approach their organisation for a replacement.
- If a representative is deemed to persistently not abide by the corporate policies of Nottingham City Council, (e.g. Health & Safety, Equality and Diversity), he/she will be required to resign their position as local community group representative on the Area Committee
- Councillors may choose to invite representatives from other organisations outside their geographical area in order to widen participation from under-represented groups.
- Councillors will allocate a small 'rolling budget' for reimbursement of Community Group Representative's expenses.
- If Community Representatives find it beneficial and have made a request, Councillors will provide community group representatives with an opportunity to meet together with the Locality Team prior to each Area Committee meeting, to discuss the agenda or other items of concern.

THE PROCESS

- Each year Councillors must determine the number of Community Representatives that they wish to represent the community. This may be based on a set number of places per ward or according to specific interests and issues in the area. Representation should take account of the population make-up of the area. Where under-representation exists, city wide groups may be approached for representation.
- Once per year (normally in March) the Locality Team will send out nomination forms by post, (together with an Area Committee information pack), to all community organisations in the area, inviting them to nominate a representative from their organisation to be involved in Area Committee meetings.
- Neighbourhood Development Officers will assess completed nomination forms to ensure that the selection criteria are met and will produce a report for Area Committee detailing nominations received.
- Councillors will decide which of the nominations should be selected for community group representation at Area Committee meetings, taking into account the population make-up of the area or specific issues/interests in the area.
- Those community group organisations selected will be notified in writing of the offer by the Locality Team. Details of future dates of committee meetings will be sent out at the same time.

• A review will take place each civic year (by Councillors – advised by officers) to determine what groups are the most appropriate to be represented on the area committee.

- Where nominations are not accepted; a letter explaining why will be signed by the Chair and sent to the organisation, together with details of other options for involvement in area working.
- Where groups are dissatisfied with the decision; they have the right to appeal to the Area Committee within four months.
- Councillors will then enlist the assistance of other Councillors of the city (Area Chairs Panel), to review the decision and any decision made thereafter, will be final.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

Once adopted, the Land and Planning Policies Document will form the second part of the City Council's Local Plan for Nottingham City, alongside the Nottingham City Aligned Core Strategy (Local Plan Part 1), which was adopted in September 2014.

A Revised Publication version of the Land and Planning Policies Document will be published for a six week period from Friday 29 September to Friday 10 November 2017 to allow formal representations. This follows several consultation stages including Issues and Options consultation, a Preferred Options consultation, and a Publication version consultation.

Following this Revised Publication stage, the Land and Planning Policies Document will be submitted to the Secretary of State and undergo independent examination. If found sound, the document will be adopted and, alongside the Core Strategy, will replace the current Local Plan (2005).

The Land and Planning Policies Document contains planning policies to guide decision making on planning applications. Some policies have been carried forward from the last Local Plan (adopted in 2005) but there are also new policy areas. The Land and Planning Policies Document also includes 79 specific sites which are allocated for particular uses, such as housing, employment or retail.

Site allocations and policy designations are set out on the Policies Map, and changes to the Policies Map will also be published alongside the Revised Publication Land and Planning Policies Document.

That the committee notes that the Local Plan Part 2: Land and Planning Policies document (Revised Publication Version) and the accompanying Policies Map changes will be published for representations, and the period for making representations ends on Friday 10 November 2017.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Production of a Local Plan is a statutory requirement.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Once adopted, the Local Plan Part 2: Land and Planning Policies Document (Local Plan) will form part of the statutory planning framework for Nottingham, alongside the Core Strategy. Before the Local Plan can be adopted, it must go through several stages of formal and informal consultation. To date, the Local Plan has been through three informal stages of consultation the Issues and Options consultation stage, the Additional Sites consultation stage and the Preferred Option consultation stage, and one formal stage of consultation on the Publication Version of the Local Plan.
- 2.2 The previous consultations have informed the development of the Local Plan, and a number of changes are proposed to the previous Publication Version of the Plan. It is therefore considered necessary to consult on a Revised Publication version of the Plan before it is ready for independent examination by a Government appointed Planning Inspector. The Revised Publication Version of the Local Plan will be published for representations, with consultation focussed on the changes between the Publication Version and the Revised Publication Version of the Local Plan. This provides a formal opportunity for the local community and other interested parties to consider the changes made to the Local Plan since the original Publication Version.

CONSULTATION

- 2.7 164 individual people and organisations responded to the Publication Version consultation and there were approximately 967 individual responses.
- 2.8 A Report of Consultation has been produced setting out the measures undertaken at previous consultation stages. This has been published for information alongside the Revised Publication Local Plan.

SUSTAINABILITY APPRAISAL

2.9 Under the requirements of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act (2004), a Sustainability Appraisal (SA) (which incorporates the EU requirement for Strategic Environmental Assessment) has been produced. The SA has 14 objectives relating to economic, social and environmental issues in Nottingham. The SA assesses the potential impacts of each of the policies and site allocations against the 14 objectives, and has been published alongside the Local Plan.

OTHER BACKGROUND ASSESSMENTS

- 2.10 In addition to analysing the consultation responses and undertaking the SA, a number of other background assessments have been undertaken to inform the Local Plan. Each of the sites put forward for allocation has undergone a detailed assessment. The assessment involved collecting information regarding planning history, land use, constraints, transport and accessibility, wider regeneration benefits, infrastructure and energy and heat networks and previous work, including Development Briefs. Site visits were also undertaken for each site.
- 2.11 Background Papers have also been produced to inform the Local Plan policies. Where necessary, addendums have been produced to update them for the Revised Publication Version of the Local Plan.

NEXT STEPS

2.12 Any representations received will be considered and technical drafting changes may be proposed if any factual or minor inaccuracies emerge. These will not be consulted upon. However, if the City Council wishes to make any further substantial changes to the draft Local Plan in response to the representations or other key factors, then it is likely that these will need to be subject to further consultation.

2.13 The Council will summarise the main issues raised by representations, and submit the summary together with the Local Plan and all the representations received at both Publication and Revised Publication stage to the Secretary of State for independent examination by an Inspector. The examination is likely to include a public hearing session, when parties making representations may, at the Inspector's discretion, present their views in person. The examination is expected to be in Summer 2018, and if the Local Plan is found legally compliant and sound it is anticipated that it will be adopted later in 2018.

5.1 As indicated in the main body of the report, the Council is under a statutory duty to produce a Local Plan of which the LAPP is part. Requirements relating to the production and adoption of the local plan are prescribed by regulations. The approval of such documents is not the sole function of the Executive and only full Council can approve the submission of the LAPP for independent examination. Whilst there are risks that the Plan (or parts of it) could be found to be unsound or challenged on adoption the LAPP has been the subject of legal advice during its preparation to seek to ensure its compliance with the law and planning policy. Although the LAPP has already been through one period of consultation it is prudent to carry out a further consultation on the proposed changes (especially those which may affect the Plan's soundness), to strengthen the Council's position at the submission stage and this report is brought before the Committee as part of that process. 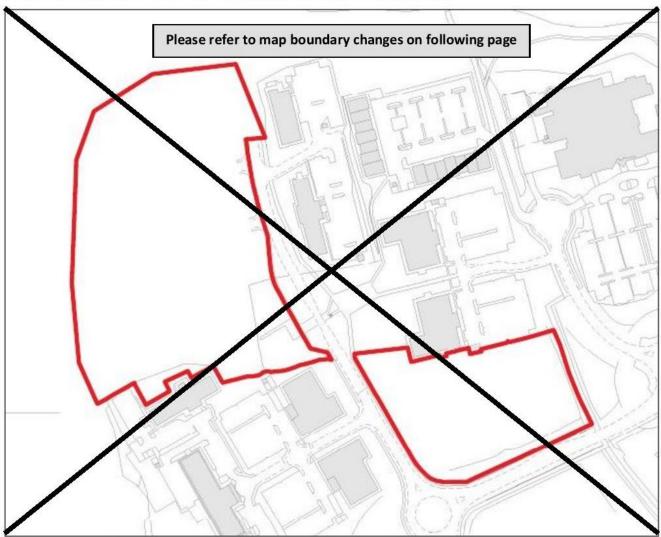

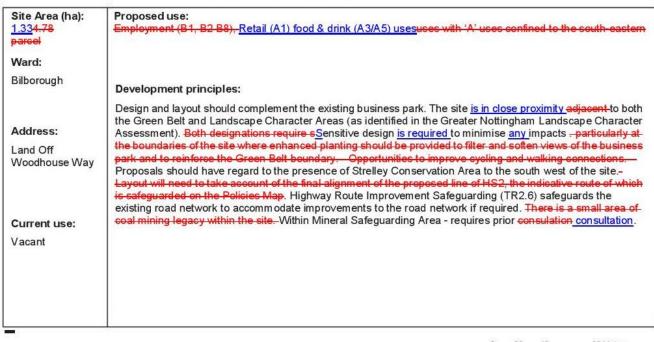

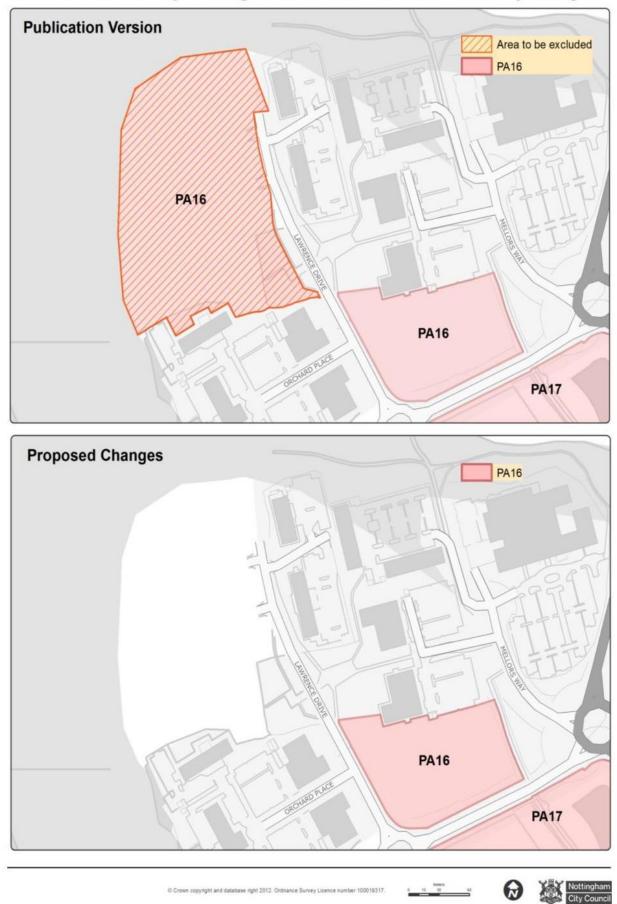


PA16 Woodhouse Way - Nottingham Business Park North



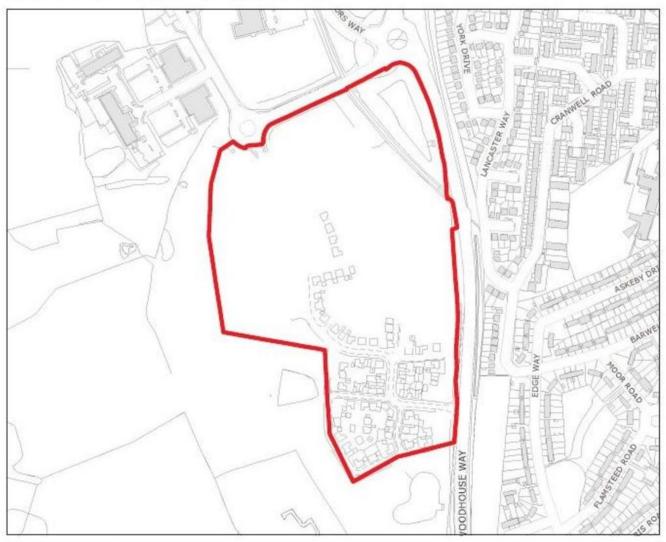
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PA16 Woodhouse Way - Nottingham Business Park North - Boundary Changes

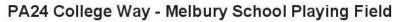

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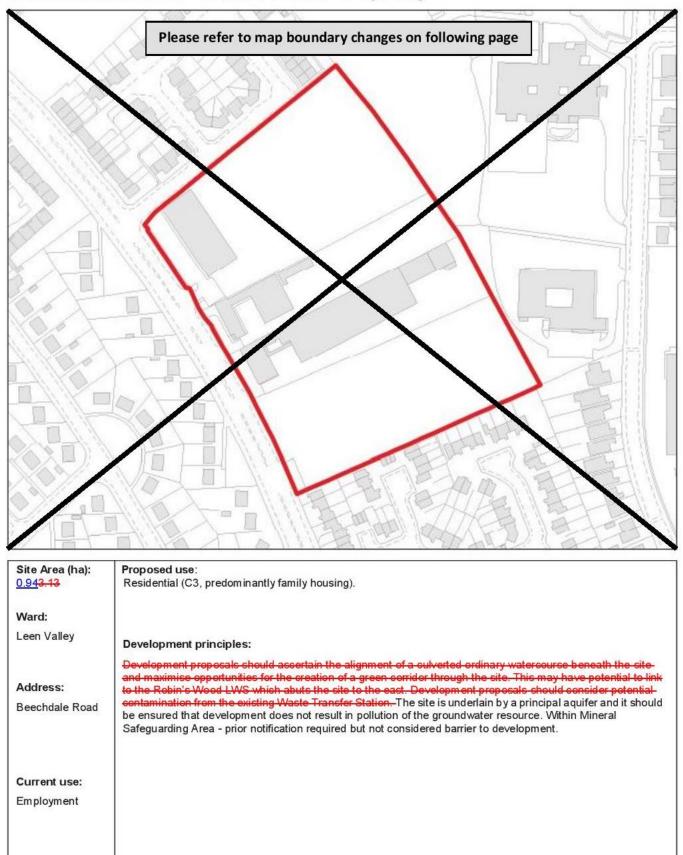
PA31 Ascot Road - Speedo - Allocation Deletion





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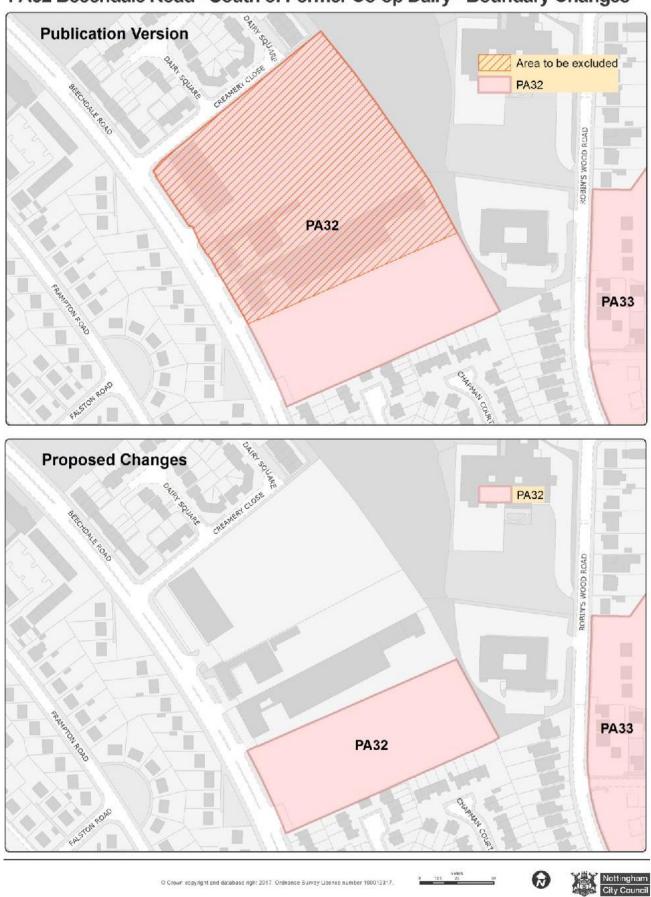

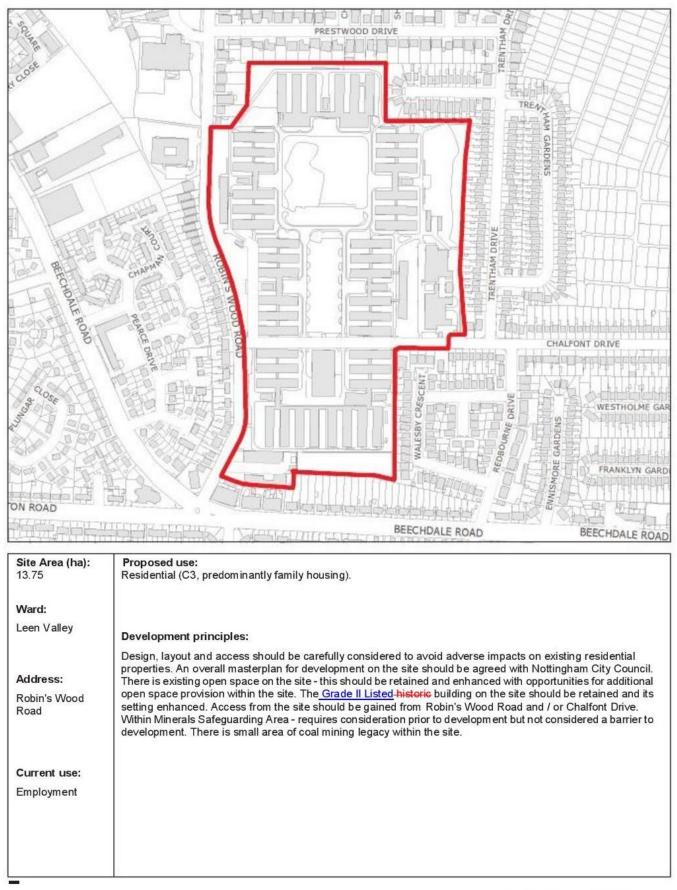
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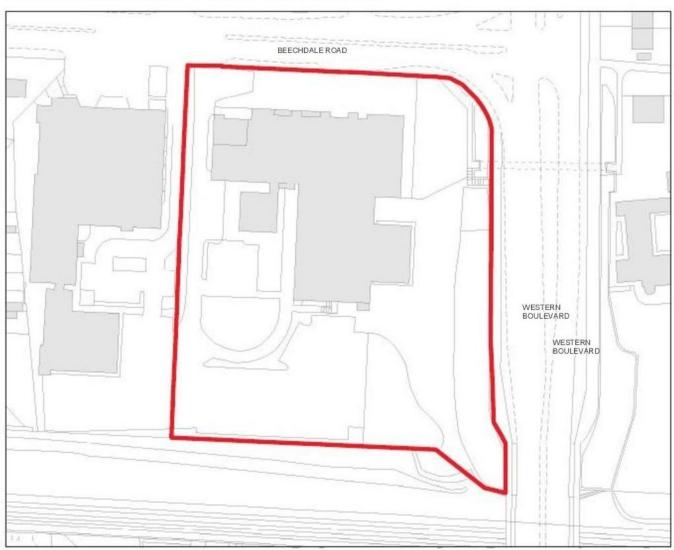

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

It is proposed to allocate Section 106 and WREN funding to install a new play area at Bilborough Park.

1	That the Area Committee endorses the use of £97,971 of Section 106 funding from planning application 09/00526/PFUL3 to create a play area at Bilborough Park.			
2	That the Area Committee supports the submission of a bid to Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd (WREN) in November 2017 for £50,000 towards the above project.			

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Bilborough Park is a large and popular open space in the Bilborough Ward, which is now home to the Harvey Hadden sports village, cycle track and stadium. There have been suggestions over the years of installing a new play area at the park to meet local demand and the funding is now available to do so.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Bilborough Park is the largest and most centrally located park and open space within the Ward. It sits within a number of housing estates and serves a large catchment area.
- 2.2 The site is home to a new state of the art leisure centre and swimming pool along with an outdoor cycling track; it is home to Bilborough Boxing Club and the Harvey Hadden stadium which acts as a home for Notts Athletics Club and Nottingham Caesars American Football, with Bilborough Football Club also hoping to establish a new long term arrangement as well. The Park is a citywide hub for sports and recreational activity.
- 2.3 There have been numerous requests over the years for a children's play area at this site and one that can offer inclusive play for children with a range of special needs, both mentally and physically. The Ward has two special schools within its boundaries: Oak Field School and Sports College, and Westbury School.
- 2.4 The site and community would hugely benefit from an inclusive children's play area and this is why we are proposing to seek funding for this project.
- 2.5 Subject to Area Committee endorsement, a delegated decision on project funding will be a matter for the Portfolio Holder for Culture and Leisure.

3 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED IN MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 If the Section 106 funding is not used for this project, it could be used on other open space improvements in the area.
- 3.2 If a play area is not built at Bilborough Park it is likely that community demand for a facility on the park will continue.

4 FINANCE COLLEAGUE COMMENTS (INCLUDING IMPLICATIONS AND VALUE FOR MONEY/VAT)

- 4.1 Planning application 09/00526/PFUL3 was for a residential development at the former GCNS Dairy site and is now known as Dairy Square. A Section 106 payment of £97,971 for improvement to open space is due from the developer and it is proposed to use this at Bilborough Park.
- 4.2 £25,000 of Area Capital for this project was allocated at the West Area Committee meeting on 16th November 2016 and this will be used for the 11% "third party funding" to WREN and towards the works on site.
- 4.3 It is proposed to retain £30,000 of the Section 106 funding for future maintenance and repairs; it is hoped that this will last for up to 10 years. There are over 120 play areas in the City with a declining repairs budget and a team of just two Playground Maintenance Operatives to inspect and repair them on a weekly basis. This funding will ensure that day-to-day wear and tear and larger scale repairs can be sustained.
- 4.4 The funding is proposed to be used as follows:

5 <u>LEGAL AND PROCUREMENT COLLEAGUE COMMENTS (INCLUDING RISK</u> <u>MANAGEMENT ISSUES, AND LEGAL, CRIME AND DISORDER ACT AND</u> <u>PROCUREMENT IMPLICATIONS)</u>

5.1 Procurement has no significant concerns with the recommendations set out in the report and will support the client through the procurement phase to ensure compliance with Public Contract Regulations and establish value for money.

<u>LEGAL</u>

- 5.2 A section 106 agreement dated 27 April 2006 linked with planning permission reference 05/02295/PFUL3 in relation to the residential development of the site at the former GNCS Dairy, Beechdale Road secured a range of community benefits including payment of a financial contribution of £97,971 towards off site open space.
- 5.3 The 2006 agreement was modified by a variation agreement completed on 23 April 2007 with changes to the lender's obligations in relation to the on-site provision of affordable housing. The obligations relating to open space in the 2006 agreement remained unchanged.
- 5.4 In the 2009 an application was made (reference 09/00526/PFUL3) to vary the planning permission by altering the housing mix. To apply the section 106 obligations in the 2006 agreement (as varied) to this new permission, a second variation agreement was completed on 20 July 2009. This further amended the affordable housing provision but left the substantive open space obligations contained in the 2006 agreement unchanged.
- 5.5 The 2006 s106 agreement (as amended) requires the site owner to pay the open space contribution to the Council on or before 50% occupation of the development. It is understood that this stage was reached some time ago and that the payment is outstanding.
- 5.6 Under the section 106 agreement (as amended) the Council is obliged to use the open space contribution "*towards the provision or enhancement of public open space in the City of Nottingham*". It is considered that the proposed expenditure on the creation and maintenance of an inclusive play area at Bilborough Park would comply with this requirement.
- 5.7 Under the Council's Constitution, Area Committee is a consultee on the proposed expenditure of section 106 open space monies within the local area, and it is to comply with this requirement that this report is brought to Committee.
- 5.8 The decision also seeks support for the submission of an application for WREN funding towards the same inclusive play area project. Grants may be made by WREN from its Community Fund for amenity projects within 10 miles of a FCC Environment landfill site in WREN's operating area. In the case of the Bilborough Park project, this site is Eastcroft. Funding applications may be made between £2000 and £50000 and the primary intent of the project must be for the protection of

the environment, maintenance or improvement of a public park, or another public amenity.

5.9 In the case of all grant applications which are approved by WREN, the City Council will be required to enter into an agreement covering the purpose to which the monies are put, delivery of progress reports, maintenance of records of income derived and provision of documentation and expenditure details to WREN as the projects are implemented. There will also be obligations to ensure the availability of the projects to the general public.

Best Garden Competition - The annual best garden competition has been held in Nottingham for more than 80 years. It recognises the genuine pride taken by our tenants and leaseholders in looking after their gardens. Our Ace Inspectors have recently been judging this year's competition. The winners will be invited to an awards ceremony at the council house in November. Families Fund Application Bid to Sport England working in Partnership with Notts County Fit In The Community. - If the NCH bid is successful we hope to encouraging families to exercise together in their local neighbourhoods. Green Spaces have been selected from our most deprived communities. Consultation has recently taken place within the locality of these areas to see what activities local residents would take part in on the green space near to their home. It is hoped that organisers can provide free or very low cost activities for local residents to take part in together as a family.

We are working hard to reduce this debt; we have the first of our UC days of action planned at the Woodlands on 28th July. The whole of the North Team, including Tenancy Sustainment Officers will be based in the blocks for the day talking to tenants about UC and taking enforcement action where appropriate. We are also working on a revised process for dealing with UC cases and will be rolling out refresher training to all RAMs and TSOs over the next few weeks A corporate programme of NCH responds to the challenges of UC and wider welfare reforms. The Welfare Reform Programme Board is working closely with strategic partners such as the DWP, NCC and voluntary sector groups to mitigate the impact of Welfare Reform on our

							tenants and our rent performance. It will also monitor the actions taken to mitigate against the impact of UC. Last financial year, we commenced the 'Rent First' campaign with a series of events aimed at raising awareness amongst staff and residents of the importance of paying rent on time and this will continue next year. There will be articles in staff and tenant publications, in addition to messages on social media. We are continuing to meet our target for evictions, however we have completed 31 so far this financial year and this compares with 27 at the same point last year. The numbers are likely to increase as the team tackles the higher level debt, although eviction is only ever a last resort and we try where possible to work with tenants to resolve their debt by other means.

- Positive feedback from families on the impact the stay, play and learn sessions have on their children's confidence and their own confidence to access services, as well as singing and reading with their child.
- The Aspley library session has good partnership; the library deliver singing and reading time in the session; encouraging early literacy and reading with an increase of the loaning of books from the library by families with children under 5.
- Sessions have good partnerships with FIS to promote the 2 year ELP.
- Comments from parents for the Stay, Play and Learn session at Aspley Children's Centre:
 - "I have learnt how to help my child learn and develop at home through what I have seen and learnt in this session"
 - "My child became more confident in his interaction with other children"

Progress stars and tracking:

- 24 completed progress stars for Stay Play and Learn at Aspley Library
- 21 completed progress stars for Aspley Childrens Centre Stay Play and Learn session
 - 15 children tracked for the two open access Stay Play and Learn groups
- Let's Get Moving session delivered Qtr 3 63 attendances All children's tracking scores improved throughout the session, the area being tracked was Physical Development. The average starting score of the children's tracking was 19.5 and the average end score was 21.7.
- Forest school tracked 9 children from Nursery setting. Feedback- staff noted significant difference in gross motor skills, being able to move outside on uneven ground. Nursery expressed that they would like to continue with this

service as it has shown significant improvement in children's development holistically.

All programmes/sessions have some outcomes at the end of term (progress stars and children's development tracking) – where this was low this has been reinforced with individual staff members.

Workforce Development sessions are delivered monthly by the Early learning Specialist when the processes are reinforced with the staff team

Group evaluations:

- 4 families completed the Me and My Child programme; social care fed back that's a result of attending the programme, one family with 5 children came off their child protection plan and the case was closed to social care. Also, the school fed back that children's behaviour had improved, with parents managing behaviour better as a result of attending the course.
- 6 adults successfully completed the Volunteer (Getting Ready for Work) programme and 5 have been identified to undertake some volunteering in the children's centre.
- Stay, Play and Learn at Aspley CC was observed and received a 'Good' grading with some outstanding features with families positively feeding back about the benefits of the session. Learning journeys and WOW moments are completed by parents actively and are written in the child's voice.

How it was promoted?

Central 1 Play and Youth and Family Support Workers have been advertising these trips equally in all sessions. Within shut down week this year we will work together to review how these trip can be made better and how attendance can be improved.

There was a number of children and young people on the day called to say they could not make it due to illness or other unforeseen circumstances.

Harvey Haddon and Shelia Russel play and youth sessions in the Bilborough wards were made aware of the summer trips before the Aspley wards sessions. Feedback from the young people was positive but when it came to booking on the trips numbers from the Bilborough wards was not as high as the Aspley ward.

Our Plan

The Play and Youth team have been tasked to consult further with children and youth people in both wards to see how we as an area/ city can improve on our services and ensure next time they come to these amazing trips and be a part of our youth council.

Children and Young people's views, progress and feedback

Children and Young people's views and feedback are vital to ensuring that they are heard and listened too. This is now undertaken in a few varies ways. They are;

(1) Score on the door

This way of capturing children and young people's feedback has been successful in the north of the city. As a learning city we encourage sharing good practice so central 1 team have now implemented using this tool to capture children and young people's feelings, opinions and general feedback at the end of each session.

Their feedback will be taken into account and followed through either into next session or future planning. The play and youth service are passionate about ensuring the service is what the children and young people want and need.

(2) Outreach

Outreach is undertaken to enable the play and youth team to meet the children and young people in the Aspley and Bilborough wards. This method of working was used when undertaking consultation with trying to increase Balloon woods weekly attendance.

The consultation gathered suggested the following;

- Children and Young people wanted a venue that was easy to get too and with transport links.
- Asked for the session to be at Harvey Haddon
- Wanted a session that was well lit and felt safe to get too.
- Play session at Shelia Russell Community centre.

The outcome was;

- A new Youth session in the Bilborough ward would take place at Harvey Haddon on a Wednesday evening
- A new play session in the Bilborough ward wold take place at Shelia Russell community centre on a Tuesday afternoon.

Since both sessions have now started there has been an increase of children and young people's engagement. It is still early days but we have already increased engagement by more than half.

(3) Bullseyes

Bull's eyes are used for evaluating children and young people's progress when undertaking a themed project. There are 4 priority themed projects through the year which progress is captured and evaluated by using the Bull eyes tool.

Central 1 undertakes a priority themed project each quarter. (Refer to box below for more information).

Identified learning opportunities and skills will be thoroughly reviewed to ensure all themed projects will enable children and young people to be able to achieve AQA accreditations. This will be celebrated through monthly award ceremonies.

This summer the children and young people have successfully achieved a number of AQA accreditations through attending The Mill Adventure base and Colwick Park City wide trips.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Each Area Committee has agreed priorities which link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015 19. Actions for each priority will be developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships for example West Area Employment Hub. Priorities are updated for each area committee, taking into account discussions at NAT meetings and various groups and activities involving Councillors, residents and local groups.
- 1.2 The events and activities detailed in the report take account of the work which all NDOs undertake with partner organisations within the wards. It shows a

range of activity in place across neighbourhoods to improve social cohesion and tackle local priorities.

1.3 Crime and Drugs Partnership Performance data relating to crime and antisocial behaviour is attached as Appendix 4.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Each Ward manages a set of priorities and key issues through regular meetings of the NAT. These meetings are led by Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs) and supported by core partners including Nottingham City Homes (NCH), Neighbourhood Policing, Community Protection, Early Help, City Services / Waste Management; Fire and Rescue Services and Health. Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.
- 2.2 Ward priorities are identified and informed from a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 2.3 Ward reports reflect some of the wider area concerns and priorities which have been either addressed previously through area committee or developed as part of the Area Cluster reviews. Some of these wider priorities such as health and employment will be taken forward through appropriate area focussed meetings.
- 2.4 The ward priorities (Appendices 1 3) also make reference to a number of development sites which are listed within the Neighbourhood Regeneration Strategy document Building a Better Nottingham.

- 1.1 The Nottingham Local Transport Plan (LTP) Strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities
- 1.2 As part of the budget process for 2016/17 Nottingham City Council approved a Citywide Local Transport Plan capital allocation of £1.25 million.

1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Fund (ACF) Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since it was established in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council General Fund, the Local Transport Plan and the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started with strong community involvement and interest and altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee and particularly community representatives are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
