Housing Development in Bestwood: Implications for local services

Nottingham City Council is intending to build a range of new homes in Nottingham including to directly develop a number of surplus sites in partnership with Nottingham City Homes. The intention is for mixed tenure developments involving market sale, market rent and affordable housing.

There are several reasons why new homes are needed both in the City and in Bestwood Ward:

- Government policy meeting the City Council's housing targets
- Making best use of surplus public land
- Diversifying the tenure of the area
- 'Step up' housing to retail aspiring families within the locality

A number of these development sites are in the Bestwood Ward, including Padstow, Ridgeway, Haywood and Eastglade. There are currently 7,855 homes in Bestwood Ward, and these proposed development sites could result in around an extra 570 new homes (7.3%). Although the overall population growth represented by these developments is relatively small as a proportion of the existing population in the area, concern has been raised about the impact of this population growth on local services, including health, schools, policing, transport and Early Help/Sure Start.

General comments

As part of any development proposal being awarded planning permission, a site will be required to provide a 'Section 106' contribution to fund impacts on services in the area including education expansion, transport improvements and open space provision/ enhancement. All relevant service provider partners have been consulted generally about the implications of the Local Plan however officers have in undertaken specific additional consultation in relation to the development in Bestwood.

Health

Health provision planning is undertaken by the Clinical Commissioning Group. As part of the development proposals Council officers have been in touch with the CCG to make them aware of the level of the development in this area and ask them to advise on the impact on Services. These discussions are ongoing.

Schools

Nottingham City Council has a duty to assess and support the develop sufficient education provision to meet the needs of local populations. NCC Education officers have been engaged in the decision for new build housing in Bestwood and have agreed that there is a need for additional school places to be created in the area. Their plan is to meet the additional requirements by extending existing schools rather than create a new school. They are currently reviewing the best options to do this and a s106 contribution for Education expansion will be made through the planning process.

Policing

Ensuring adequate levels of policing is the responsibility of Nottinghamshire Police. NCC officers have consulted with Nottinghamshire Police as part of the proposals to develop a range of sites in Bestwood and made them aware of the collective impact on population levels. The Police are consulted on all relevant planning applications.

Transport

A full transport assessment will be carried out on each site and submitted as part of the planning application. The sites are all close to existing bus routes and the sites links to the existing network.

Early Help

Nottingham City Council's Early Help Services are delivered from the Sure Start Children's Centres and play and youth playgrounds and centres. The Children's Centre for the Bestwood area is located in the Southglade Access Centre and offers open access activities and more targeted services to meet identified additional needs of children and their families through family support clinics, groups and individual support. Play and Youth services are delivered from The Ridge Adventure Playground, which should have the capacity for additional demand. Officers managing the Early Help Service are aware of the development proposals in the Bestwood area and the impact on population growth. As the majority of the homes are targeted at planned to be private rent or open sale it is not envisaged that they will create a large additional demand in terms of children who fall into the target group for additional support. Nevertheless the effect on demand for services in this area is being tracked and the Service will look to respond appropriately to changes in demand."

Housing Infrastructure Fund Bid.

In addition to the measures taken above the Council has also applied for £5.85 million Housing Infrastructure Fund specifically to provide additional infrastructure improvement in the Bestwood area. The bid related to a range of major junction transport improvements around Hucknall Road/Arnold Road Junction, Gala Way/Hucknall Road Junction and Arnold Road Beckhampton Road Junction. It also requested funds to support Education provision expansion in Bestwood and for the improvement of open space on the proposed development sites.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importage delipcal communities.

- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved at the Executive Board meeting on 21 February 2017 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2017-18. At the same meeting a citywide allocation of General Fund Element (public realm) of £750,000 was agreed.
- 1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comment on suggested schemes and their progress

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programme, have included: footpaths, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund and the Local Transport Plan (LTP). To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Each Area Committee has agreed priorities which link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015 19. Actions for each priority will be developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships for example Area 1 & 2 Employment and Skills Area Partnership. These meetings are led by Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs) and supported by core partners including Nottingham City Homes (NCH), Neighbourhood Policing, Community Protection, Early Help, City Services / Waste Management; Fire and Rescue Services and Health.
- 2.2 Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.
- 2.3 Ward priorities are identified and informed from a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 2.4 Ward reports also reflect some of the wider area concerns and priorities which have been either addressed previously through area committee or have been developed as part of the Area Cluster reviews. Some of these wider priorities such as youth provision will be taken forward through appropriate area focussed meetings.
- 2.5 The intention is to work towards a Ward Report which is consistent across all City wards. It will provide details of the pledges which Councillors have prioritised for their respective wards.
- 2.6 The previous Area Committee Priorities Action Plan will be incorporated within the ward plans to avoid any duplication.
- 2.7 Area Committee Chairs will be invited to review the latest Ward Reports to ensure that the format is accessible for Councillors and community representatives and there is sufficient consistency across all areas.
- 2.8 The current individual Ward priorities for Basford and Bestwood are shown in Appendix 1 and 2 respectively and will be updated for each Area Committee.
- 2.9 The ward priorities also make reference to a number of development sites which are listed within the Neighbourhood Regeneration Strategy document Building a Better Nottingham.
