# 6 POLICE AND COMMUNITY PROTECTION UPDATE

Inspector Riz Khan, PS Nicholas Wealthall and PC Jordan Hinds, Nottinghamshire Police, and Rupindar Kooner, Community Protection, updated the Committee on policing matters in the wards, including crime and arrest figures, local initiatives to address crime and anti-social behaviour, actions in respect of ongoing issues, and current Police and Community Protection areas of focus.

During discussion, it was stated that:

- the Police are working with Pete Mitchell, Community Protection, to address issues associated with persons sleeping rough and/or begging in the wards;
- Operation Scorpion, which addresses knife crime, has been very successful, both in investigating stabbings and targeting those suspected of carrying knives;

• in the 3 wards, the Police / Community Protection are carrying out more investigations and prosecutions in respect of fly-tipping.

# 7 FLOOD ALLEVIATION SCHEME UPDATE

Further to the previous Basford and Bestwood Area Committee minute 30 dated 12 December 2018, Paul Horn, Major Projects, and James Dymond, Parks Development, updated the Committee, via a presentation, on the development of the River Leen and Day Brook 'Blue Green Infrastructure project', a scheme to alleviate flooding and improve the environment / bio-diversity along both, including creation of a new park.

It was stated that consultation, including community meetings, on the final proposals would commence shortly and run throughout the summer.

Party in the Park is Nottinghamshire Hospice's annual festival by and for the local community - offering accessible, family friendly fun for all. Alongside archery, drumming workshops and hulahooping, you can learn about the amazing work we do at the hospice, get your fingers green in our new eco corner, sample fantastic local food, arts and crafts, and chill to lovely live music.

2018's debut event was a great success, with an estimated 2,000 families in attendance. Due to its popularity we have hired in toilet extra facilities for this year, and Nottingham City Council have also allowed us to invite some (local) outside caterers. We are braced for another success.

#### Who we are

Nottinghamshire Hospice is an independent local charity, caring for adults across Nottinghamshire with cancer and other life-limiting or terminal illnesses, and supporting their family and carers too. Our Hospice in Your Home services provide symptom management, advice, emotional support and physical care to enable patients to remain in the comfort of their homes. Our Wellbeing Centre offers patients and carers a wide range of services addressing their physical and emotional needs, in a welcoming and relaxed environment.

## Party in the Park 2019 Vision

Whilst our key priority is promoting the work of the hospice and highlighting our role in the local community, there'll be a strong sustainability focus, alongside a wealth of activities centred around wellbeing, creativity and community, in a fun-focussed and accessible family friendly environment.

#### The work of Nottinghamshire Hospice

#### **RobBins**

This is an additional proposal to further the event's sustainability agenda and increase branding and legacy opportunities for Robin Hood Energy. This could also play a lasting role at future events and within our nine shops. We are currently developing the scope and establishing potential costs of this project.

## Volunteer sign ups

We anticipate signing up approximately five new volunteers, each giving a typical five hours per week. This equals 2,600 hours PA, at living wage rate of £9 per hour (non-London) and calculated over a typical 4 years of service, the value of this is £93,600.

## Clothing and goods donations

We also anticipate clothing and goods donations on the day, and an increase in these donations at our local charity shops in Mapperley and Sherwood following the event. We can expect sale of these items to equal a retail value of £1000.

Total expected benefit to hospice patients and families (cash + in-kind) = £106,670
