20 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 11 June 2019 were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

21 <u>COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES</u>

RESOLVED to note the appointment of Reg Knowles of the Bradford Street Allotment Association as an Area Committee Community Representative for the 2019/20 municipal year.

22 AREA POLICING AND COMMUNITY PROTECTION UPDATE

Police Sergeant Nev McGeehan and Senior Community Protection Officer Darryl Paxford, provided a verbal update on policing issues within the wards, highlighting the following:

- (a) overall, crime has reduced by 10% and violence has reduced by 23%. There have been reductions in burglary, vehicle offences, cycle theft, shoplifting, criminal damage, arson and anti-social behaviour;
- (b) resources and patrols have been increased in the Top Valley area following a recent shooting and attempted murder case;
- (c) traveller activity has been high in the area, but travellers have been generally cooperative and cleaned up quickly;
- (d) there has been a problem with fly-tipping at Blenheim Industrial Estate and funding for 2 CCTV cameras has been found for the site;
- (e) Southglade Food Park is a hotspot for littering so a clean-up has taken place there, and around 12 Fixed Penalty Notices were issued.

Bestwood Councillors reported that they will be meeting with the Police and Crime Commissioner to discuss knife crime.

23 VOLUNTEER POLICE CADETS

Romel Davis, Volunteer Police Cadet (VPC) Engagement Officer, delivered a presentation on youth engagement and intervention through the VPC, highlighting the following:

(a) the VPC youth engagement programme is a national pilot and targets young people between the ages of 10-18 years who are either vulnerable, socially excluded or involved with crime. This includes young people at risk of joining gangs or becoming first time offenders, people from hard to reach or new emerging communities and people who are assessed as vulnerable by VPC or

- Bestwood, Bulwell and Bulwell Forest Area Committee 4.09.19 partner agencies;
- (b) partner agencies include children's homes, charities, local authorities, schools, religious groups, the police and youth organisations;
- (c) the purpose of the programme is to deter young people from crime, build confidence, aspirations, give them a purpose and positive role models. It should also build increased trust and confidence in the police and build stronger relationships between the police, young people and the diverse communities. It may also lead to future recruitment into the police force if appropriate;
- (d) the cadet programme meets once a week in term time, and offers sport activities, learning about police roles and careers, community work, trips to police departments, crime and personal safety education, and days out;
- (e) there are currently VPC bases in Bulwell, Sherwood, Radford and St Anns, with more bases coming on board from January 2020. The Bulwell base is supported by the mother of Lyrico Steede who was stabbed in the local area;
- (f) young people can come to a cadet session and observe before deciding if they want to take part. There will also be a cadet roadshow starting on 13 September which provides sessions during the holidays in other areas, including Bestwood;
- (g) the VPC organises community cohesion events providing free activities and sports for young people. These also include talent competitions, speeches and discussions around youth violence, knife crime and other issues. They also support other community events such as the Stephen Lawrence Day event in Bulwell;
- (h) the VPC also offers mentoring and one to one support for young people and can provide bespoke events depending on the numbers and needs of the young people;
- currently there is only one VPC Engagement Officer and resources are stretched for the cost of venues, equipment and materials. Volunteers are also required to run the programme.

The following answers were provided to questions from Committee members:

- (j) volunteers must be over 18 and DBS checked. Social workers and universities have been approached;
- (k) the age limit was lowered to 10 but due to capacity cannot be lowered further. The mini police programme runs in some primary schools for younger children;
- (I) impact of the programme is difficult to measure, however the number of missing children has reduced and the need has been assessed through the number of referrals made;
- (m)anyone can join the VPC programme but vulnerable children are particularly targeted, with spaces held back for them should they wish to join.

24 <u>LEAD ORGANISATION - BESTWOOD PARTNERSHIP - PERFORMANCE</u> <u>AND ACTIVITY UPDATE</u>

Donna Denning, Bestwood Partnership, provided an update to the Committee, highlighting the following:

- (a) 40% of the Area Based Grant is awarded to Play and Youth. 15 play sessions take place per week, all but 3 of which are free with the rest costing only £1;
- (b) £10,000 will be released for the Community Initiative Fund which will be distributed by Neighbourhood Development Officers;
- (c) 9 employment sessions are run each week, including sessions on Universal Credit and employment training.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

The purpose of this report is to bring the principal policies and proposals of the Land and Planning Policies Document (LAPP) which have a bearing on the local area to the attention of the Area Committee, as these will form part of the statutory planning framework for Nottingham.

The LAPP contains planning policies to guide decision making on planning applications and also includes 74 specific sites which are allocated for particular uses, such as housing, employment, retail or open space.

Once adopted, the LAPP will form the second part of the City Council's Local Plan for Nottingham City, alongside the Nottingham City Aligned Core Strategy (Local Plan Part 1), which was adopted in September 2014.

After extensive consultation, which included all area Committees, and a public examination, the LAPP is to be considered by full Council on 13 January, with a view to its adoption as formal policy.

At the time of writing, the Inspector's report of the Public examination is awaited. However, the Main Modifications to the LAPP agreed as part of the examination process have been subject to consultation, and there is a high degree of certainty about the content of the final Local Plan which means it is now capable of being given weight in the consideration of planning applications and after adoption will carry significant weight.

Site allocations and policy designations (e.g. open space, retail and employment etc.) are set out on the Policies Map, and changes to the Policies Map have also been published alongside the Main Modifications to the LAPP.

Recommendation(s):

That the committee notes that the Local Plan Part 2: Land and Planning Policies document and the accompanying Policies Map will be considered for adoption by a meeting of the Full City Council on 13 January and note the relevant policies and site allocations therein.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Production of a Local Plan is a statutory requirement which impacts on the development of the Committees area.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 If adopted by City Council on 13 January 2020, the LAPP will form part of the statutory planning framework for Nottingham, alongside the Core Strategy.
- 2.2 To date, the LAPP has been through several stages of formal and informal consultation:—
 - the Issues and Options consultation stage,
 - the Additional Sites consultation stage and the Preferred Option consultation stage,
 - three formal stages of consultation on the Publication Version,
 - the Revised Publication version and
 - the Main Modifications.

The last of these stages took place during the a public examination conducted by a Government appointed independent Planning Inspector.

- 2.3 All documents can be viewed at www.nottinghamcity.gov.uk/examination. Once the Inspectors report is received the LAPP will be updated to reflect any necessary changes, check numbering and cross referencing and for any typographical errors before the final version is put before Council.
- 2.4 The policies in the LAPP address the following matters:
 - Climate Change
 - Employment Provision and Economic Development
 - Role of Town, District and Local Centres
 - Regeneration
 - Strategic Regeneration Sites
 - Housing Size, Mix and Choice
 - Design and Enhancing Local Identity
 - The Historic Environment
 - Local Services and Healthy Lifestyles
 - Community Facilities
 - Managing Travel Demand
 - Green Infrastructure, Parks and Open Space
 - Biodiversity
 - Minerals
 - Telecommunications
 - Land Contamination, Instability and Pollution
 - Developer Contributions
- 2.5 The LAPP also includes a Policies Map showing new or amended designations (e.g. the Castle and Creative Quarters, Retail Centres, Green Belt Revisions and Minerals Safeguarding Areas), together with the site allocations.
- 2.6 Policies of particular relevance to this Area Committee include Policies HO1 (Housing Mix) and HO2 (Protecting Dwellinghouses (Use Class C3) suitable for Family

Occupation), which seek to encourage the provision of family housing on sites, and control the loss of existing family housing. There are also policies which seek to promote the vitality and viability of Bulwell Town Centre, and to ensure that the loss of existing employment land is controlled. Other policies seek to; increase the quality of design of new development, protect and enhance local open spaces and create new open spaces, and increase biodiversity.

2.7 The following site allocations are relevant to this Area Committee, and site plans and Development Principles are included as Appendix 1 to this report (in site order rather than ward order). Development has commenced on some of the sites. The appendix includes any Main Modifications of the sites or to the Development Principles, which are currently under consideration by the Planning inspector:

5.1 As indicated in the main body of the report, the Council is under a statutory duty to produce a Local Plan of which the LAPP is part. Requirements relating to the production and adoption of the Local Plan are prescribed by regulations and the relevant statutory procedure has been followed. The approval of such documents is not the sole function of the Executive and only full Council can approve the adoption of the LAPP. As this report is for noting only no risks arise from it. 6 STRATEGIC ASSETS & PROPERTY COLLEAGUE COMMENTS (FOR DECISION RELATING TO ALL PROPERTY ASSETS AND ASSOCIATED INFRASTRUCTURE) (AREA COMMITTEE REPORTS ONLY)

6.1 Property has been fully consulted as appropriate throughout the preparation of the Nottingham City Land and Planning Policies Development Plan Document (Local Plan Part 2), The LAPP contains a number of sites owned by the City Council the development of which will increase the provision of new homes and employment opportunities, assist in regeneration and generate capital receipts for the Council. 



1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved at the Executive Board meeting on 19 February 2019 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2019 -20 was approved. At the same meeting a citywide allocation of General Fund Element (public realm) of £750,000 was agreed.

1.3 To give opportunity for the Area Committee to make comments on suggested schemes and their progress.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP). To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 Each Ward has agreed priorities which link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2015-19. Actions for each priority are developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships. These priorities are updated for each Area Committee, taking into account discussions at NAT meetings and various groups and activities involving Councillors, residents, and local groups.
- 1.2 The events and activities detailed in the report take account of the work undertaken by Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDOs), with partner organisations, within the

wards. It shows a range of activity in place across neighbourhoods to improve social cohesion and tackle priorities at a ward and area level.

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 Each Ward manages a set of priorities and key issues through regular meetings of the NAT. These meetings are led by Neighbourhood Development Officers and supported by core partners including: Nottingham City Homes (NCH), Neighbourhood Policing, Community Protection, Early Help, City Services/Waste Management, Fire and Rescue Services, Employment and Skills, and Health.
