17 Minutes

The Committee agreed the minutes of the meeting held on 16 September 2020 as a correct record and they were signed by the Chair.

18 Area Partnerships and Community Hubs

Gursharan Singh Nijran, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented the report, which detailed a proposal to form Partnership/Community Hubs in all areas, with the intention of continuing to support local communities by combining Council and external organisations' knowledge and resources, as has been happening during the pandemic.

It was stated that:

- each of the Area Partnerships would have their own distinct ambitions, visions and priorities aimed at meeting the local needs and aspirations of residents living in the wards that fall within an Area Committees' boundaries;
- ii. Neighbourhood Development Officers have been working with Nottingham Trent University MBA students and have carried out research to investigate and recommend which Community Hub model fits better locally to meet the changing needs and demands of the communities living in the areas during and post Covid-19;
- iii. a questionnaire was formulated and distributed to partner organisations to complete, and they were invited to a meeting to discuss the results;
- iv. the questionnaire and meeting were designed to determine the partner organisation's priorities and see if there was a consensus among them. They were asked to select four key priorities from the questionnaire/meeting, based on the themes that had gained most importance during wave one Covid-19 pandemic, relevant to all wards in the area. The top 4 priorities for this ward are isolation and loneliness, mental health, food poverty and benefits and welfare advice:
- v. the Community Hubs would support the delivery of the Area priorities and help reframe the connections and relationships between statutory, voluntary and faith sectors, change the way services are operating by removing silo-working and barriers and explore opportunities for joint working and funding;

vi. the Area Partnerships would be aligned to the existing Area Committee boundaries and each Area Partnership would report to the relevant Area Committee.

During discussion, it was stated that it was pleasing to see isolation, loneliness and mental health as the top priorities as they were all linked, but that the most hard-to-reach groups must be included as that is sometimes where the most issues can be found.

In response to a question, Gursharan stated that the scheme would be led by the community / partners, with the Council acting as the facilitator.

- (1) that based on the needs analysis as detailed in the report, to adopt the four priorities of isolation and loneliness, mental health, food poverty and benefits and welfare advice:
- (2) to note the proposed way forward for agreeing a Community hub model for this area, as detailed in the report.
- 19 Issues raised by Community Representatives

No issues for consideration had been raised.

20 Nottingham City Homes update

Katie Sharp, Area Housing Manager, presented the report, updating the Committee on key issues and themes linked to local priorities and strategic themes for Nottingham City Homes. The report also provided summary updates on the following key themes:

- capital programme and major work;
- area regeneration and environmental issues;
- key messages from the Tenant and Leasehold Congress;
- Tenant and Residents Association updates:
- area performance;
- good news stories and positive publicity.

The Committee stated that good progress has been made in respect of the communal gardens at Carter Gate and hopefully it would inspire residents to maintain their own gardens, and that the report contained useful local data, so Ms Sharp was commended for her work.

In response to questions, Ms Sharp stated the following:

- i. in respect of the Remourban Project, the last update was sent via letter to residents in September 2020, however, she will enquire what the latest position is and let the Committee know;
- ii. the Tenant Academy is run both in-house and external, currently only digitally;

iii. levels of domestic violence in the area, and the city as a whole, have increased substantially during the pandemic, and it is currently the 2nd highest reporting statistic in the ward.

Resolved to note the report.

21 Police and Community Protection updates

The Committee received updates on activity in the area and year-to-date statistics as follows:

(a) Police (Sergeant Bruce Clarke)

Summary of crime figures

- i. total crime is down significantly (by 16.2%) across the area. This is a total reduction of 1,051 recorded crimes;
- ii. there has been a significant increase of ASB incidents (up 70.2%). This is largely due to the reporting of Covid breaches as they have been included within the ASB figures, although over the last month ASB figures have reduced by 19.4%, so we are now seeing a reduction from its peak;
- iii. burglary, robbery, vehicle offences and victim based crime have all reduced by 36.2%, 22.5%, 56.1% and 18.9% respectively;
- iv. increases of crime can be seen from the statistics (in the agenda report) however, the numbers are minimal and no patterns or risks regarding these increases have been identified.

Activity

- v. there has been a significant amount of work and resources used to proactively and reactively deal with Covid breaches. This includes in response to a large amount of student parties across the area. We have issued hundreds of FPNs, including five £10,000 fines, to individuals that have hosted significant gatherings of over 30 persons;
- vi. Operation Reacher was launched in October 2020, which is a force wide operation to bring proactive policing into the Neighbourhoods. This team is made up of 1 Sergeant and 6 PCs. They have executed a number of warrants, engaged with local schools in the area and assisted Neighbourhood officers with tackling areas of concern;
- vii. Neighbourhoods and Operation Reacher officers took part in a successful operation on University Park following an increase in pedal cycle thefts. Two repeat offenders were arrested and remanded to prison, and four individuals were arrested from a vehicle nearby containing a number of weapons;

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- viii. NPI has successfully obtained funds from the Councillors (with many thanks to them) to erect 2 CCTV cameras within Forest Recreation Ground to prevent and detect serious and violent crime;
- ix. ASB in and around ASDA, Hyson Green, remains a high priority concern for the City Central area. NPI and SCPO have met with the Area Manager of ASDA and a long-term plan is now in place;
- x. Operation Sceptre (National knife crime week of action) saw 150 school children successfully engaged within the City Central area. They were delivered an anti-knife crime package. Open spaces were searched for hidden and discarded weapons.

In response to the inappropriate use of the recycling bins on the scheme NCH have installed fly tip signage and worked closely with the Community Protection Officers to tackle the issue. This has resulted in two offenders being identified and being issued with Fix Penalty Notice's. We will continue to work with our partners to tackle issues of the kind.

Housing Income Management commentary: Arrears have increased slightly.. We have now been able to start some enforcement action, working with the "won't payers" to start some reduction in their debts. We have had our first handful of Court hearings, but there are some evictions that have been delayed until July. There are some large debts that we have no ability to recover at present. We have rolled out our new recovery process and we are working to support those who are still struggling financially due to the impact of Covid-19. We are still maintaining a 100% collection rate.

Lettings and Relocation Support commentary: We have implemented the new allocations policy on our IT systems and this has led to a slight reduction in the number of applicants through data cleansing. However the number of new applicants continues to increase and we are working hard to process each application and ensure people are able to apply for a new home. We have seen an increase in voids and average relet time compared to last year due to the impact of Covid-19. In part this has been due to the number of people willing to move in this uncertain period, and in particular older people, which has impacted on letting our Independent Living homes. There has also been an impact on carrying out work in empty homes as we need to ensure social distancing guidelines are followed but we are increasing resources to reduce the number of voids. We continue to work to prioritise housing the homeless and most vulnerable.

Responsive Repairs continue to offer a full repairs service throughout the second and third lockdowns, the deferred repairs from the first lockdown were completed back in October 2020.

Demand for our repair service is high, our work colleagues have the appropriate PPE and follow Covid risk assessments to ensure that repairs are completed in a safe manner.

Repairs receive;

- 200 emergency orders per day with 99% of those completed in target.
- 200 appointed jobs per day with 97% attended on time.
- Our Mechanical and Electrical team continued to deliver the gas servicing programme and currently every home has a valid gas certificate.

of respondents satisfied with the service received is 87.18% for Q3. Year to date overall performance is 87% (Target 90%). Despite the figure being slightly below the target, it continues to show an upwards trend. It is positive to see that customer satisfaction continues to show an upwards trend, despite the challenges of COVID-19. The ability to undertake ASB work has been restricted and affected by COVID and therefore the service has had to adapt considerably. ASB cases have continued to be managed well and effectively and we are engaged in the local partnership response through the ASB Tasking meetings.

To drive improvements, there will be a continued focus will be on managing expectations in relation to case outcomes and focus on providing timely, quality information and updates throughout the case. Area Housing Managers will continue to drive high-quality case management through monthly case supervision.

Summary of issues (including benefits to citizens/service users):

This report focusses on current priorities and issues facing the three wards, Castle, Hyson Green & Arboretum and Radford and gives details of forthcoming events and activities. It also highlights the latest issues now being addressed through regular Neighbourhood Action Team (NAT) meetings.

Recommendation:

1 Reasons for recommendations

- 1.1 Each ward has agreed priorities, which link to the City Council's current ambitions contained in the latest City Council Plan 2019-2023. Actions for each priority are developed and led by appropriate service teams and partnerships. These priorities are updated for each Area Committee, taking into account discussions at NAT meetings and various groups and activities involving Councillors, residents and local groups.
- 1.2 The events and activities detailed in the report take into account the work undertaken by Neighbourhood Development Officers (NDO's) with partner organisations within the wards. It shows the range of activity in place across the neighbourhoods to improve social cohesion and tackle priorities at a ward and area level.

- 2.1 Each ward manages a set of priorities and key issues through regular meetings of the NAT. These meetings are led by NDO's and supported by core partners including: Nottingham City Homes (NCH), Neighbourhood Policing, Community Protection, Early Help, City Services/Waste Management, Fire and Rescue Service, Employment and Skills and Health.
- 2.2 Ward Councillors are also invited to participate in these meetings.
- 2.3 Ward priorities are identified through a range of sources including Citizens, Councillors, Partners and Officers and current issues will be updated for each area committee.
- 2.4 Area Committee Chairs will be invited to review the latest Ward Reports to ensure that the format is accessible for Councillors and community representatives and that there is sufficient consistency across all areas.
- 2.5 The current individual Ward Priorities, Key Issues and Opportunities for Engagement for Castle, Hyson Green & Arboretum and Radford are shown in Appendices 1, 2 and 3 respectively and will be updated for each Area Committee.

- The student areas are still experiencing issues with bins on street and contaminated bins, especially on Cromwell Street, Portland Road. Addison Street and Alpha Terrace, CPOs were asked to prioritise these streets for enforcement action.
- Street Scenes has completed the Autumn Spring Clean across the areas with a large student population, which has led to a major reduction of resident complaints.
- A number of student were fined £200 across the ward by the police. For holding parties and gathering illegally, ignoring covid 19 restrictions.

Appendix 4

Castle, Hyson Green & Arboretum and Radford Area Partnership Update

The first meeting of the Castle, Hyson Green & Arboretum and Radford Area partnership hub took place in November and included a range of partners from statutory, voluntary, community and faith groups and ward councillors. At this meeting, it was agreed that the initial priorities to work on should be mental health and isolation, food poverty and benefits and welfare advice. The sub groups have met in February.

Mental Health and Isolation

The group recognised that this is a huge problem and that the true effects of the COVID pandemic and the lockdown are to still to be felt. Partners at the group discussed the services they offered and what may be need going forward. A mapping exercise to identify groups and professionals that can support this work is ongoing. Delivery of this service on line has challenges and the lack of trained professionals in the area may be a problem once lockdown ends and demand for this service increases.

Food Poverty and Benefits and Welfare Advice

This group's initial focus is to ensure that anyone across the 3 wards who needed access to free food could access the help they needed and that information about food banks such as Himmah was shared as widely as possible through networks. Going forward the group recognised that there will be gaps around access to benefits and welfare advice and employment support as we come out of lockdown and the furlough scheme comes to an end. Future meetings will focus on expanded the food offer and look at ways of providing advice within local community facilities such as school and community centres. Mapping exercise to identify services and provide a service contact sheet is ongoing.

Community Hub

It was agreed that initially the aim of community hubs was to ensure that all residents, regardless of where they live in the three wards, should be able to know where they can easily access advice and information about services which are available. The list of places shared at the meeting of where people already access information was extensive and included schools, online sites, community and faith groups, leisure centres, GP surgeries. However, it was clear that many front line staff did not always have up to date information on all the issues which they had to deal with thus restricting the level of support given. Ways of increasing this knowledge were discussed and included the need to strengthen the Ask Lion service. Initially, it was agreed that all organisations would check that their information on Ask Lion was up to date and would check with their front line staff what additional information would be useful. Work is being done within Nottingham City Council to improve the Ask Lion Service and this will be reported back to the sub group as it progresses.

Conclusion

The partnership hub has only been in existence since November but the strength of the working relationships between partner organisations and the commitment to trying to improve outcomes for local residents during a crisis has been reflected in the willingness of very busy people to give up time to progress and move suggestions forward. A very big "Thank You" to all the partners involved.

1.1 The Nottingham LTP strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's neighbourhoods and prioritises small-scale transport improvements of importance to local communities.

1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved at the Executive Board meeting on 18 February 2020 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2020 -21 was approved. At the same meeting a citywide allocation of General Fund Element (public realm) of £750,000 was agreed. Pade Subsequent Executive Board meeting on 21

July 2020, as part of the budget update, a top-slice of 20% was made to the General Fund Element (public realm) reducing it to £600,000

2 Background (including outcomes of consultation)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. Since its establishment in 2006 to meet the then corporate priority of 'Transforming Neighbourhoods', the Area Capital Fund has included a total programme expenditure portfolio of £40 million. The improvements that have been carried out to date using the programme have included footpath construction and repairs, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings.
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing Revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods.
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values.
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area.
