17 Minutes

Subject to including apologies from Rob Kirkwood and amending SDP to SPD in minute 8, the minutes of the meeting held on 18 January 2021 were confirmed as a true record and will be signed by the Chair.

18 Membership.

Resolved to note that:

- a) Sofia Thomas has replaced Jacob Collier as the Student Union Representative;
- b) Sue Twyford (Chair of the Wollaton Park Community Association) will be temporarily attending meetings in place of Pauline Peck;
- c) Julie Smith-Yeomans has been appointed as representative of Friends of Wollaton Local Nature Reserves.

19 Police and Community Protection Area Update

Nottinghamshire Police Inspectors James Walker and Amy English, along with Senior Community Protection Officer Tom Lynk, provided activity updates for the area.

Nottinghamshire Police Inspector James Walker provided an update for the Meadows Policing Area:

- a) for the year-to-date, all reported crime is down by 8.6% across the Meadows. This is mainly due to covert, but this figure is lower than other areas across the city;
- b) violence with injury is down by 17%;
- c) there were five fewer robberies, resulting in a drop of 23%;

- d) burglary reduced by 20%;
- e) theft reduced by 14.9%;
- f) vehicle crime was down by 17.9%;
- g) drug offences have increased, but this is considered a positive outcome due to targeted and proactive focus of Operation Reacher. Five individuals have been arrested following a raid on Beardsley Gardens, November was detention following a find of 'class A' drug wraps. In September there were 2 confiscation orders enforced, in which assets and cash were seized from offenders sentenced in the previous year to the value £28,00 £35,000;
- h) there been very few complaints regarding resident's non-compliance to the COVID-19 restrictions;
- i) contrary to media insinuation, Police did intervene at the protest march which took place on 3 January, ending at the Memorial Gardens on Victoria Embankment. A total of four arrests were made and 14 fixed penalty notices issued.

Nottinghamshire Police Inspector Amy English provided the following update:

Wollaton West Area (on behalf of Inspector Gordon Fenwick)

- j) overall within the area, reported crime is down by 18% (99 less crimes April-Jan year to date);
- k) victim based crime reduced by 78% (17 fewer instances);
- I) violence with injury was down by one offence;
- m) sexual crime was down by 28% (4 fewer incidents);
- n) burglary reduced by 46% (30 fewer incidents);
- o) theft down by 29% (39 fewer incidents);
- p) vehicle crime increased by 7% (three additional incidents);
- q) domestic crime increased by 3% (three additional incidents), but nationally reporting has risen due to lockdown;
- r) hate crime is reduced by 5% (one fewer incident);
- s) antisocial behaviour (ASB) has increased by 76% (98 incidents), but this is mainly due to including reported COVID-19 restriction breaches, and is not the highest increase within the city, even though there is a high proportion of students within the area;
- t) no new trends or hotspots for any specific crimes have been identified.

Lenton and Wollaton East

all reported crime within the area is reduced by 26%, again mainly due to COVID-19 restrictions;

- v) there were 30% fewer victim based crimes (150 fewer incidents);
- w) violence against the person increased by 11% (11 offences);
- x) sexual crime reduced by 33% (7 fewer offences);
- y) robbery reduced by 16% (one fewer offence);
- z) burglary reduced by 37.9% (22 fewer offences);
- aa) theft reduced by 39%, however, shoplifting increased by 46% (15 additional offences), but a prolific shoplifter was identified and has been arrested and remanded;
- bb) vehicle crime is down by 76.5% (39 fewer offences);
- cc) drug offences increased by 140% (7 additional offences), but this can in main be attributed to the proactive work of Operation Reacher;
- dd) domestic offences have increased by 13% (8 additional offences), but as previously stated, this reflects a national trend due to lockdown restrictions;
- ee) hate crime has reduced by 40%;
- ff) antisocial behaviour has increased by 121%, again due to Covid reporting the large student population should and within the area;
- gg) on 16 December, 4 distraction burglaries took place in the Lenton Area. The offender was identified, arrested and remanded, and there was a similar situation the month before with the offender identified and arrested:
- hh) Police patrols have increased following the new Covid 19 restrictions legislation
- ii) the Police continue to work jointly with Community Protection Officers to address ASB, noise and COVID-19 breaches:
- jj) in the New Year, an operation targeting drink driving resulted in 6 people being served court summons, 5 cars seized, and one person arrested.

Questions from Committee members were responded to as follows:

Inspector James Walker

kk) With regard to members concerns that it appeared the Police merely observed the gathering in Market Square prior to the march, and that no action was seen to be taken as that stage, the Police hadn't anticipated the large number of people attending the event and were massively outnumbered. With an inevitable anti-police element amongst the protesters, it was necessary to draft in additional officers prior to engagement with the group, to ensure the safety of Police Officers. Once an appropriate number of additional police officers were in attendance, action was then taken.

Members of the Committee acknowledged the explanation of the Policing activity around the illegally held protest march which breached COVID-19 social distancing restrictions, and welcomed the associated arrests.

Concern was expressed at the City-wide increasing issue of graffiti, but specifically in the Meadows Ward, and a request made that strong action is taken.

Further information on known drug dealing spots within the Meadows will be passed to the Police outside of the meeting.

The close work of the Student's Union with the Police and Community Protection Officers is acknowledged, along with the benefits that students can bring to communities.

Tom Lynk, Senior Community Protection Officer, provided a brief update on activity during the past three months:

- II) during October there was a big spike in antisocial behaviour and noise into with Halloween and bonfire night;
- mm) there were small gatherings of people, mainly in purpose-built student accommodation, for which committee protection worked with the universities to address;
- nn) during the Christmas period, there was one student party for which finds were issued for breach of Covid social distancing restrictions;
- oo) the overall majority of additional ASB complaints are currently around breaches of Covid social distancing restrictions;
- pp) there is a weekly operational meeting with Police, Universities, including the Student's Union, City Council departments and partners including the Fire and Rescue Service, which consider and discuss student related issues across the City and co-ordinate proactive approaches;
- qq) student funded overtime will continue depending on the demands to the Service;
- rr) fines have been issued for refuse bins left on streets in the area Lenton and Wollaton East ward:
- ss) the numbers of neighbourhood disputes has risen, particularly around noise and nuisance probably as a result of people are staying at/working from home;
- tt) officers have supported the establishment of the food bank at Wollaton Park Community Centre and were involved in delivering packages over the Christmas Period;
- uu) in supporting the Student's Union, care packages were delivered to over 100 students who remained in Nottingham over the Christmas period;
- vv) more than 1,000 vulnerable citizen checks have been completed during the pandemic.

Resolved to note the updates.

20 Items of Good News

<u>Sue Twyford (Wollaton Park Community Association)</u>, informed the Committee that Wollaton Park Community Association Food Bank had distributed food parcels to over 100 adults and 60

Lenton & Wollaton East, Meadows and Wollaton West Area Committee - 6.01.21 children during its first week of operation. It has been very humbling how the community has responded by donating food to the local shop and Community Centre. There is still capacity to help more residents.

<u>Kevin Spencer (26th Nottingham (The Meadows)</u> <u>Scout Group)</u> The Scout Group is still operating but struggling to engage young people digitally to the same extent as in-person prior to lockdown.

Rob Kirkwood (Friends of Wollaton Park). Local Wollaton Park community groups and primary schools are also involved with the food bank. Volunteering at the Park is on-going as social distancing can be maintained and people are willing. This has been valuable for people's mental health. The Wollaton Park Light Show was a great success and brought a lot of joy to people at a difficult time until it had to close prematurely due to the introduction of stricter COVID -19 restrictions.

Steve Battlemuch thanked the Councillors in Wollaton West for helping with the set up the food bank, particularly where local school children were receiving free school meals. This is filling a gap which residents need. Residents and citizens have very much appreciated the ability to maintain public access to Wollaton Park. There is plenty of space for people to exercise at a safe distance. With so few events and activities available, the light show was welcomed.

Councillor Trimble (Portfolio Holder for Leisure Culture and IT) welcomed the enthusiastic response to the Wollaton Hall Light Show and informed the Committee that further events are proposed for future years, including during the summer.

The Chair welcomed the establishment of the food bank and commended the work of volunteers and the community.

23 Area Partnership / Community Hub

Parbinder Singh, Neighbourhood Development Officer, presented the report which outlines the newly established Area Partnership and Community Hub, which has further evolved through partners working to co-ordinate support for citizens during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The following points were highlighted:

- a) Nottingham Trent University MBA students worked with Neighbourhood Development Officers to help identify the most appropriate Community Hub model for the city;
- b) the partnership consists of statutory, voluntary and faith sector representatives, including a councillor from each ward and is currently proposed to be structured within the current Area Committee boundaries;
- c) it is anticipated that each Area will identify ambitions, vision and priorities relevant to the community within its own specific area, and work with partners, including through community hub, to ensure progress;
- d) each Area Partnership will identify the most appropriate site for the community hub, although currently venues are not accessible due to COVID-19 lockdown restrictions;
- e) the Partnership is still evolving and has already identified the following priorities:
 - i. isolation and loneliness
 - ii. mental health
 - iii. food poverty
 - iv. benefits and welfare advice;
- f) community, councillor and partner buy-in to the model is essential although there is still clarity to be sought regarding the site and resourcing of some hubs, but work is progressing well, especially considering the current difficulties in engaging and consulting all sections of the community during the pandemic;
- g) existing resources, such as 'Ask Lion' will be drawn upon and existing partnerships built on, but to ensure the best local outcomes, further consultation is required.

Lenton & Wollaton East, Meadows and Wollaton West Area Committee - 6.01.21 Community representatives who had already been involved in the initial stages of establishing the Area Partnership welcomed progress to date, agreeing that some elements of current Area activity, such as social prescribing, worked well and could just be transferred to the new model. Existing connections, particularly with the Health and Social Care Sector, needed to be built on to prevent duplication of work.

Resolved

- 1) to adopt in principle the four priorities recommended by the newly formed Area Partnerships, based on a needs analysis of the Area;
- 2) to support the Area Partnership in delivering the initial actions required through further consultation, ensuring senior representation, and identifying key communications channels and messages towards the formation of ward based Community Hubs.

24 Nottingham City Homes Update

Joanne Smith, Nottingham City Homes Area Housing Manager, presented the report which provides an update on performance, activity and engagement, and informs the Committee of the Current financial position, for which a revised Appendix 3 will be circulated with the initial publication of the minutes.

It is noted that there are currently no requests for scheme approvals, and whilst normal services are yet to resume due to the COVID -19 restrictions, officers are maintaining contact with vulnerable tenants and those at high social risk, with appropriate health and safety measures observed.

1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 The Nottingham City Homes Update provides a descriptive and statistical picture of what is happening at an area level and invite community representatives to comment, debate, and challenge and identify how they can add value to improve their neighbourhoods.

1.2 The update also monitors progress in the wards and acts as a catalyst for debate about the key performance issues impacting upon the ward on a quarterly basis.

2 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Nottingham City Homes previously reported on performance at local Area Panels that sat below the respective Area Committees. These panels were attended by local residents, local Councillors and partner agencies.
- 2.2 Nottingham City Homes has a goal to 'create homes and places where people want to live' and to give tenants and leaseholders an input in shaping what happens in their area. The Nottingham City Homes Update and Performance Report is one of a number of initiatives that increases the transparency and accountability of the Company's performance.
- 2.3 Following the decision for Nottingham City Homes reps to attend Area Committee, it was decided to provide the Nottingham City Homes Update Report to Area Committee. Appendices 1 and 2 provide the latest performance position for the committee to note and comment on.
- 2.4 Appendix 3 outlines the remaining capital budget for this area

Housing Income Management commentary: Arrears have increased slightly.. We have now been able to start some enforcement action, working with the "won't payers" to start some reduction in their debts. We have had our first handful of Court hearings, but there are some evictions that have been delayed until July. There are some large debts that we have no ability to recover at present. We have rolled out our new recovery process and we are working to support those who are still struggling financially due to the impact of Covid-19. We are still maintaining a 100% collection rate.


Lettings and Relocation Support commentary: We have implemented the new allocations policy on our IT systems and this has led to a slight reduction in the number of applicants through data cleansing. However the number of new applicants continues to increase and we are working hard to process each application and ensure people are able to apply for a new home. We have seen an increase in voids and average relet time compared to last year due to the impact of Covid-19. In part this has been due to the number of people willing to move in this uncertain period, and in particular older people, which has impacted on letting our Independent Living homes. There has also been an impact on carrying out work in empty homes as we need to ensure social distancing guidelines are followed but we are increasing resources to reduce the number of voids. We continue to work to prioritise housing the homeless and most vulnerable.

Responsive Repairs continue to offer a full repairs service throughout the second and third lockdowns, the deferred repairs from the first lockdown were completed back in October 2020.

Demand for our repair service is high, our work colleagues have the appropriate PPE and follow Covid risk assessments to ensure that repairs are completed in a safe manner.

Repairs receive;

- 200 emergency orders per day with 99% of those completed in target.
- 200 appointed jobs per day with 97% attended on time.
- Our Mechanical and Electrical team continued to deliver the gas servicing programme and currently every home has a valid gas certificate.

ASB customer satisfaction:

The number of respondents satisfied with the service received is 87.18% for Q3. Year to date overall performance is 87% (Target 90%). Despite the figure being slightly below the target, it continues to show an upwards trend. It is positive to see that customer satisfaction continues to show an upwards trend, despite the challenges of COVID-19. The ability to undertake ASB work has been restricted and affected by COVID and therefore the service has had to adapt considerably. ASB cases have continued to be managed well and effectively and we are engaged in the local partnership response through the ASB Tasking meetings.

To drive improvements, there will be a continued focus will be on managing expectations in relation to case outcomes and focus on providing timely, quality information and updates throughout the case. Area Housing Managers will continue to drive high-quality case management through monthly case supervision.

Daisy Project: NCH has been awarded additional Ministry of Justice Funding via the PCC to continue with our Daisy domestic abuse project which is making sure that we are providing an enhanced level of support for survivors of domestic abuse. Domestic abuse has been on the rise since the start of lockdown, and we want everyone to be

alert to it, therefore we are providing additional training to our workforce.

1 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 The Nottingham LTP strategy 2011-2026 maintains a commitment to deliver local transport improvements across Nottingham's Neighbourhoods and prioritises small scale transport improvements of importance to local communities
- 1.2 As part of the budget process Nottingham City Council approved at the Executive Board meeting on 18 February 2020 an LTP capital allocation of £1.25 million citywide between 2019 -20 was approved. At the same meeting a citywide allocation of General Fund

Element (public realm) of £750,000 was agreed. At the subsequent Executive Board meeting on 21 July 2020, as part of the budget update, a top-slice of 20% was made to the General Fund Element (public realm) reducing it to £600,000

2 BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

- 2.1 The Area Capital Programme was established in 2006 to improve the environment of the neighbourhoods and to create a sense of place for residents in order to improve the quality of life of local people. The improvements that have been carried out to date using this programmed have included footpath, fences, visual enhancements to public realm, refurbishment of parks and improvements to public buildings
- 2.2 Resources are allocated from the Nottingham City Council general fund, the Local Transport Plan (LTP) and from the Housing revenue Account. To achieve a joint approach to environmental improvements in neighbourhoods, a greater degree of flexibility has been established to prioritise and deliver improvements so that there is a synergy in local solutions for local issues across neighbourhoods
- 2.3 The programme of works is a rolling programme. There have been instances where schemes are started, with strong community involvement and interest, only to be altered at a later stage due to changing circumstances such as economic conditions and changes in land values
- 2.4 The Area Committee, particularly community representatives, are invited to comment specifically on those schemes identified in the proposals column and also to consider whether certain schemes can be linked to other programmes of work in order to generate best value and create a greater impact on the local area
