



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Description

Georgian style house with main façade facing west. Symmetrical façade, hipped roof with dentil molding under cornice. 8 over 8 sash windows. Central door with fanlight set into two archways. Voussoir arch extending to floor. Smooth render to front and sides, brick to rear. Typical Georgian double pile house with symmetrical façade, now rendered to front and brick to rear. Hipped roof with moulding under eaves. Eight over eight sash windows. Central door with fanlight; slightly recessed in two arches with voussoir arch extending to floor. Main façade faces west. Additional Description:

The first known residents of the property were a surgeon, William Maltby, and his wife Rose Maria, from 1853 although it is suspected the building pre-dates 1840. Features of the building included stone gate piers marked 'Maltby, Surgeon' onto Alpine Street and on the interior, a marble fireplace with their initials in the top corners. There was a Victorian extension which served as servants quarters, highlighting the status of this house. By the 1980s the building was in a poor condition and was restored by developers Hamilton Knight, who also built Roman Court and the houses in close proximity.



Reason for Designation

A good quality mid-Victorian public house, with a much older site history. Evidential value for potential older fabric, particularly if the cellars remain. Historic value for the events that happened at the site, and for the evidence of an inn providing a far wider range of community functions than just a drinking establishment.



Local List Proposal



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Description

Mid-Victorian public house on a much older site. On local list for historic value, Formerly named The Bowling Green, and mentioned as an day trip destination. Prior to 1790, the cellars were a prison. Presumably a newer building on the site, but do the cellars or earlier fabric remain? Had the name Fox and Crown by 1826. Rendered twin gabled façade with plinth. Central doorway with stone surround and pediment. Bay windows to each side and three rectangular windows above. Chimney to both ends of the pitch roof. Additional Description:

The history of the site can be traced back to 1707, when an inn named 'The Bowling Green' was run by innkeeper and gaoler James Pearson. The inn had a bowling green to the rear, slightly south west of the building. The Bowling Green was a well-thought of day trip destination from Nottingham in the eighteenth century, with positive descriptions recorded. But the inn was also a prison, possibly for debtors, and the cellars held two lock-ups: one main room with three beds, and a smaller room for female prisoners. In 1776 there were three prisoners held and two in 1779. Use as a prison ended in 1790. Also in the eighteenth century, there was a pistol dual behind the pub which led to a death. In the nineteenth century, the pub was used for property auctions.



With other churches in the area, Basford Road Baptist evidences the popularity of non-conformist religions in Nottingham at this time but also denominational divisions. The building of a Sunday School demonstrates the contribution of churches to education for working class children.

Central door with rounded arch springing from narrow columns with elaborate capitals and imposts above. Voussoir also decorated. Each window has a decorated hood molding, with a twisted cord molding finishing in leaf corbels. Date stone in gable apex 1857. Associated school built 1899 not added to the local list. Sunday school: Red brick building with grey brick plinth and sill bands. Stone sills and lintels. Date and foundation stones inset to east side. Original windows blocked or replaced.
