
Assessment against Local Criteria

1. Age: 1913 vicarage
2. Historic value: associated with St Aidan's church. As a chapel-of-ease for St Leodegarius which is situated in the historic core of Old Basford, St Aidan's and the vicarage evidences the expansion of Basford to the east by 1900. Building a vicarage ten years later confirms the establishment of St Aidan's and the congregation.
3. Architectural value: A good quality brick building with Bulwell stone boundary wall and gateway.

Reason for Designation

A large vicarage with good quality design, showing the status of the vicar of St Aidan's church. Likely to have been a building well-known in the local community.

Description

Large former vicarage built 1913. Asymmetrical façade in brick with ashlar dressings, glazing bar sash windows with flat brick arches and keystones, brick quoins to corners, stone doorcase with flat canopy and overlight. Plain tile hipped roof, oversailing corbelled eaves, prominent brick stacks. Bulwell stone boundary wall incorporating arched gateway. IN BASFORD HISTORIC AREA ASSESSMENT



Description

1940s Art Deco style factory. 2 Storey, wide horizontal façade in brick with reconstituted stone window surrounds, sill and lintel bands. Original Crittal windows. 

Reason for Designation

A purpose-built lending library architecturally borrowing from the classical tradition to show the status of the building. The building of libraries in Nottingham suburbs showed an increased importance of education and accessibility of books in the early twentieth-century.

Description

1925 by F Evans & son. Neo Georgian purpose built library with symmetrical façade in brick with Portland Stone dressings. Very fine stone doorcase with pair of fluted Doric columns. Pediment with inscription: 'Nottingham Public Libraries Basford Branch'. Original cast iron rainwater goods, glazing bar sashes and timber front door. Hipped slate roof with Portland Stone eaves line and central cupola. Bulwell Stone dwarf boundary wall to front. SEE BASFORD HISTORIC AREA ASSESSMENT

Additional Description:

Foundation stone laid 1925 and the library opened on 30th November 1926. The scheme to build a library in Basford has been under consideration for several years, but World War I delayed the erection of the building. The original layout contained a reading room, newsroom and magazine and general reference room, a lending library, a children's reading room and an attendance office. The building underwent renovation in 1981 by the County Architect's department including new flooring, new lighting system, furnishings, decoration, new shelving and fittings. The fittings were from Gibson Lea. A new community room was also created in the area of the original junior reading room.


Assessment against Local Criteria

Reason for Designation

A footbridge worthy of protection for its architectural design and meaning to local people. In addition, the bridge evidences the development of travel infrastructure in Basford due to its position.

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Description

Additional Description:

In 2001, there were injuries due to the wooden floor planks needing replacement. The city council planned to demolish the bridge and build a new one over both the rail and tram line. However, the Basford Bystander records several people who wrote in support of keeping the bridge as part of their local heritage. In the end, the bridge was retained. It should be noted that the tram line originally operated to the east of the rail line and was changed to the west in the mid-twentieth century so while the footbridge seems oddly positioned now because it leads to the tram line, it would not have been at the time of building.

1. Age: 1840 – 1914
2. Heritage asset type: Sports and recreation. An example of a swimming baths provided for health and leisure in Nottingham suburbs in the early twentieth century
3. Communal value: local residents remember visiting or learning to swim here. Now as a religious building it plays a community role.

Reason for Designation

Good surviving example of a public baths designed for recreation and hygiene for two local communities. The surviving chimney evidences the boiler house. The building has since been reused as a church, retaining a community-serving purpose.

Additional Description:

The erection of a baths at the Vernon Road site was the result of deliberations between 1904 and 1908. The Nottingham Corporation Baths Committee initially sought to provide a public baths in Bulwell, but after reviewing the costs, decided that a shared provision on a site accessible to people in Basford and Bulwell would be better. The land was purchased in 1907 and the baths built in 1908, opening in August. 300 towels with 'Northern baths' embroidered on them were ordered, along with 36 ladies 'bathing dresses' and 144 gentlemen's 'bathing drawers'. The entrance charge was 3d including one towel and the baths consisted of a main swimming 'pond', slipper baths for men and women, changing rooms, a ticket office and a boiler house. The building underwent alterations in 1922 when the city architect, A Dale, was employed to add a further 9 slipper baths. This suggests that in the inter-war period the requirement for personal hygiene facilities continued to be needed outside of the home, matching with the aim to provide better quality housing.


Assessment against Local Criteria

1. Age: 1840 – 1914
2. Asset type: cultural and entertainment. A reasonably early example of a suburban picture house following the 1909 Cinematograph Act and the first 3 cinemas in central Nottingham being built in 1910.
3. Communal value: The Basford Bystander included oral histories from those who visited and worked at this cinema

Reason for Designation

An example of an early suburban picture house, showing the expansion of leisure activities from the middle classes to the working classes built in a flamboyant neo-classical Edwardian style.

 Local List Proposal



Description

Built in 1915, this former cinema is now used for offices and light industry. It is at the junction with Vernon Road and Southwark Street. Opened on 19th January 1917, the Vernon Picture House took its name from the street it is situated upon. It had a 17 feet wide proscenium and in 1930 was equipped with a Western Electric (WE) sound system. By 1948 it had been taken over by Levin's Invincible Cinema Circuit. It appears to have had an uneventful life until closure on 27th August 1961 when the final films were "The Monolith Monsters" and "Abbott & Costello Meet the Mummy". From 2nd September 1961 it was re-opened as a bingo club, which closed in 1990.

It is now an industrial unit operated by Flashing Services Ltd

Additional Description:

The plans were first drawn in 1915, but had to be redone. The building opened in 1917. The interior included seascape murals of Neptune either side of the proscenium. In 1961 the cinema closed and the building was used as a bingo hall called the 'Vernon Tombola and Social Club'. After that, it was in use as a sheet metal works company.



Typical architectural of a Victorian school building with red brick, stone dressings and large rectangular windows. Built by the Nottingham Corporation as a board school. The building continues its educational function as part of the Green Academy's nursery and school, as well as holding a mosque.

Description

Building forms a set with larger buildings on Queensberry Street (with HA548); reads as a former school. Typical architectural of a Victorian school building with red brick, stone dressings and large rectangular windows. Built by the Nottingham Corporation as a board school. The building continues its educational function as part of the Green Academy's nursery and school, as well as holding a mosque.
