

Description

The Elms Primary School dates from the late 1940s and is a good example of an Art Deco style school of the period. The design's effective use of cheap materials is indicative of the frugal times in which it was built, but demonstrates a refusal to compromise on good design principles. The architect of the building is unknown, but it is assumed that it was designed 'in house' by the local education authority. It is a competent architectural composition on a difficult sloping site and is of good aesthetic value, despite its current dilapidated condition. Whilst the building could not be considered an architectural rarity it is felt to be of local architectural interest and contributes to the character of Elm Avenue as a place. Additional Description:

As the largest and most significant building dating from Conservation Area's 20th century phase of development, the school demonstrates a strong commitment to the educational needs of a growing population. The building's association with the population boom and austerity which followed the Second World War afford it a moderate degree of historic interest. The original extent and external character features of the building, though damaged, have been little altered since the initial phase of construction. The School's fabric therefore possesses a high degree of authenticity and integrity, contributing to its significance.

The School will undoubtedly figure prominently in the collective and living memory of its former teachers, pupils, parents and neighbours. Having operated as a school for around 60 years the building has been experienced by a large number of people which affords the structure a higher communal value than the majority of structures in the Conservation Area.



Description

Base of a WW2 spigot mortar now on land to the back of 2 Medway Street covered by a shallow layer of earth - NCS Newletter 4 Summer 2017.

On a small patch of wasteland opposite the end of Triumph Road, was a cylindrical block of concrete, about four feet in diameter with a short stainless steel spigot, or pintle, protruding vertically from its centre.

Additional Description:

The projectile had a tube through its centre, which fitted over the spigot and contained an explosive charge. Because the projectile fitted over the spigot, rather than inside a barrel, its diameter was not limited by the size of the barrel, allowing a much larger explosive charge to be launched from a comparatively small weapon. This allowed the development of a gun light enough to be carried by a small group of infantrymen and capable of doing serious damage to an enemy tank. In the dark days at the beginning of the war a great need existed for such a weapon.



Information at: http://southwellchurches.nottingham.ac.uk/bilborough-st-john/hintro.php - This modern brick church is the post-war successor to St John's, Leenside, Nottingham, which was destroyed by enemy fire on 8th May 1941. To make the best use of the site it was orientated with the altar at the west and main entrance at the east. The nave is a large rectangle (with north and south aisles) free of columns, the Lady Chapel separate behind the altar wall. There is a priest's vestry and choir vestry, a north east tower, but no bell, and a transept.

Additional Description:

On 21 May 1959 the new church was consecrated by Bishop Gelsthorpe. The church was designed as a large rectangle with no columns so that everybody inside the church would have an unobstructed view of the altar. The altar stands at the west side of the church, opposite the entrance to the east, an unusual arrangement. The Lady Chapel was planned to stand behind the altar wall, an area now used for quiet contemplation. There is also a priest's vestry, choir vestry, a north-east tower without bells, and a transept. There is no east window, but plain rectangular ones all round. Rectangular pillars bear stations of the cross and there is a plain, flat baldachin. The stone tub font is tall and tapered, the wooden pulpit square and bearing nine apostles in stainless steel. There is a priest's desk and one for readers. All the craftsmen who built the church are commemorated on a special wooden plaque. Outside are five mosaic panels on the south transept wall.




