Report of the Portfolio Holder for Communities, Highways and Strategic Transport

One Nottingham and the Nottingham Plan to 2020 Final Report

1 Summary

- 1.1 In 2010, following an extensive citywide consultation, Nottingham City Council and the One Nottingham partnership outlined a 2030 Vision to help transform Nottingham by breaking the cycle of inter-generational poverty, through accelerating wealth creation and developing early intervention measures.
- 1.2 The Nottingham Plan to 2020 brought together diverse groups and organisations from across the city, to work together under the One Nottingham Partnership umbrella. It set out the overall strategic direction and targets for the city over a 10-year period, to go part way to achieving that Vision.
- 1.3 This report draws the Nottingham Plan to 2020 to a close, highlighting some of the key achievements, the lessons learnt and some of the difficulties remaining. The report also sets out and celebrates the impact and achievements of the One Nottingham partnership over the last 10 years.

2 Recommendations

- 2.1 To note the contents of the One Nottingham and the Nottingham Plan to 2020 Final Report, as set out in Appendix 1, and provide any comment.

3 Reasons for recommendations

- 3.1 The Final Report demonstrates the successes of the Nottingham Plan to 2020 and the One Nottingham Partnership, which have benefitted the lives of people in Nottingham.
- 3.2 Not everything that was set out in the Plan to 2020 has been achieved, but the Final Report summarises improvements that the city can be proud of. The commitments in the 2020 Nottingham Plan for a sustainable future, with more active people, has been a foundation for exciting developments that will be at the heart of the city's recovery from the effects of COVID-19 and the longer term health, wellbeing and economic prosperity of the people of Nottingham.
- 3.3 Strong partnership working towards shared ambitions and goals, has been and will continue to be key to the future success of the city. The development of a renewed longer-term vision for Nottingham is a target in the Council Plan 2019 - 2023.
- 3.4 The Final Report was discussed and agreed by the One Nottingham (ON) Board on the 11 December 2020.

The ON Board was keen that it should reflect not just the performance of the Nottingham Plan to 2020, but also celebrate the achievements of the One Nottingham Partnership over the last 10 years.

4 Other options considered in making recommendations

4.1 No other options were considered – the Nottingham Plan to 2020 was approved in 2010 as the overarching long-term and strategic plan for the city of Nottingham, and ended in March 2020. Amendments and progress reports on the Plan have been reported regularly over the last 10 years and the Plan has now ended.

5 Background (including outcomes of consultation)

5.1 In 2010, following an extensive city-wide consultation, Nottingham City Council and One Nottingham outlined a 2030 Vision, which set out to tackle inequality in Nottingham and set a new direction for the city by breaking the cycle of inter-generational poverty, through accelerating wealth creation and developing early intervention measures.

5.2 The Nottingham Plan to 2020 set out the overall strategic direction and longer-term plan to get Nottingham “half way” to achieving the 2030 Vision and ran from 2010 until 31st March 2020.

5.3 Over the last 10 years, the Nottingham Plan has been viewed as a long term commitment between the City Council, partners, and the local communities who took part in its development. The Nottingham Plan has also shaped and informed other key strategies and organisational plans for Nottingham, including the City Council’s “Council Plan”, the Crime and Drugs Partnership (CDP) plan, and the work of the Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB).

5.4 The Final Report presents a high level summary of the overall performance of the Nottingham Plan to 2020 over the 10 years of the plan, with a focus on areas where it has had the most and least impact, and the lessons that can be drawn from this.

5.5 The Nottingham Plan to 2020 was in place before the current context of Covid-19 and a global pandemic. The local response to the pandemic demonstrated the commitment and strength of partnership working in the city, but the challenging longer term trends facing the city around the economy and health inequalities (for example), that the Nottingham Plan sought to address are only going to be exacerbated further by the pandemic.

5.6 The One Nottingham Board has had an overview of the Nottingham Plan to 2020 performance throughout the last 10 years, and the performance of the Plan has been reported and considered regularly at both the One Nottingham Board and the City Council’s Executive Board.

5.7 The One Nottingham Board agreed to produce a brief Final Report covering not just the headlines of the Plan, but also the achievements and activities of the One Nottingham Partnership itself. This is ahead of a review of the partnership, with a focus initially on recovery and rebuilding from the pandemic and then work to develop a refreshed long term vision for the city.

5.8 As funding and resources to support the Plan have reduced, one of the positives of the last 10 years of One Nottingham has been that the continued commitment to partnership working from partners across the city, and that our shared ambitions for a better Nottingham have been maintained.

5.9 Production of the Final Report was delayed by the response to the pandemic. However, a copy of the Final Report formally closing down the Nottingham Plan to 2020 and marking 10 years of the ON Partnership is attached as Appendix 1 for

noting and comment.
