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5. Summary

This report focuses on getting approval to complete three high priority Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) schemes that will develop the provision on the sites of three academies to support pupils particularly with autism. These schemes are linked to the Draft SEND strategy that was out for consultation between 25th January 2023 and the 28th February 2023. Overall 81% of the consultees strongly agreed or agreed with the proposals. Where concerns were,

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raised with the strategy it has been reviewed in the light of those concerns and where possible changes made to the final version of the strategy which is in the process of being approved but waiting for the approval will delay these schemes.

At Nethergate Special Academy the works will take an underused building and convert it into a base for 6 pupils with severe autism. By providing this facility these pupils will be able to remain in Nethergate, benefiting both the LA and the pupils and parents as the alternative is without this provision, 6 students will need to be placed in independent specialist provision. There is very limited provision within or close to the City and there is a risk that some students will be without a school place.

At Djanogly Strelley Academy and Whitegate Academy the works will provide for Focus Provisions which will provide a base for between 10 -16 pupils. This specialist provision will allow these pupils to remain in mainstream education and to be supported in an effective teaching environment. The provision will support these pupils remaining at their local primary school with their peers.

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6. Information used to analyse the effects on equality:

For the pupils that use these facilities there will be a benefit in that they can be taught in a local school, the alternative at Nethergate Special School is that the pupils go to an independent school or outside the city boundary, by providing this facility it will help pupils with complex needs remain local and to have the specialist teaching and support that they require. The works at Nethergate will be completed before September and the new school year. The two focus provisions will allow pupils with Education Health and Care (EHC) plans to be supported in their local school and to remain with their peer group. While these will not be completed by September the schools in question have an existing provision, but this new provision will provide significantly more space to deliver education.

If the report is approved then contractors will be procured using either the Scape Regional Framework, which is a direct award process although it is a competitive tender to get on the framework or directly be the academies. All of these are compliant routes for procuring works. Contractors on the SCAPE framework have key performance indicators in place to ensure they monitor local spend and involve small to medium enterprises where possible. The information is monitored by SCAPE and reviewed by the City Council Procurement team.
